AUGSBURG, Germany, May 29:-Prof. August Piccard and Dr. Charles Kipfer, German scientists, are so elated over the results of their 52,000-foot ascent in an aluminum ball that they are already making plans for another similar flight, according to word received here from Switzerland where the pair landed vesterday.

Piccard and Kipfer made sensational discoveries in regard to radio activity from the stars. At an altitude of nine miles, they found the temperature 150 degrees below zero. The earth from there was almost invisible. They brought down samples of the atmosphere at that great altitude for analysis.






