DRIFTED FOR SIX DAYS ON ATLANTIC GOLD STANDARD SUSPENSION IS PASSED BY PARLIAMENT

Flying Trio Are Due At New York by Ship Friday of This Week

Clung to Wreckage After Plane Crashed on Monday Last—Are Transferred from Motorship to Steamer

S.S. STAVANGERFJORD, Sept. 22.—Wily Rody and Christian Johannsen, Germans, and Fernando Costa Viga, Portuguese, trans-Atlantic airmen who were rescued yesterday off the coast of Newfoundland by the motorship Belmoira after having spent six days adrift in the wreckage of their Junkers plane, which crashed on the ocean last Monday in the course of a Lisbon to New York flight, were transferred to this Norwegian-American Line steamer today. The three airmen, who had been practically given up for dead, will arrive in New York Friday.

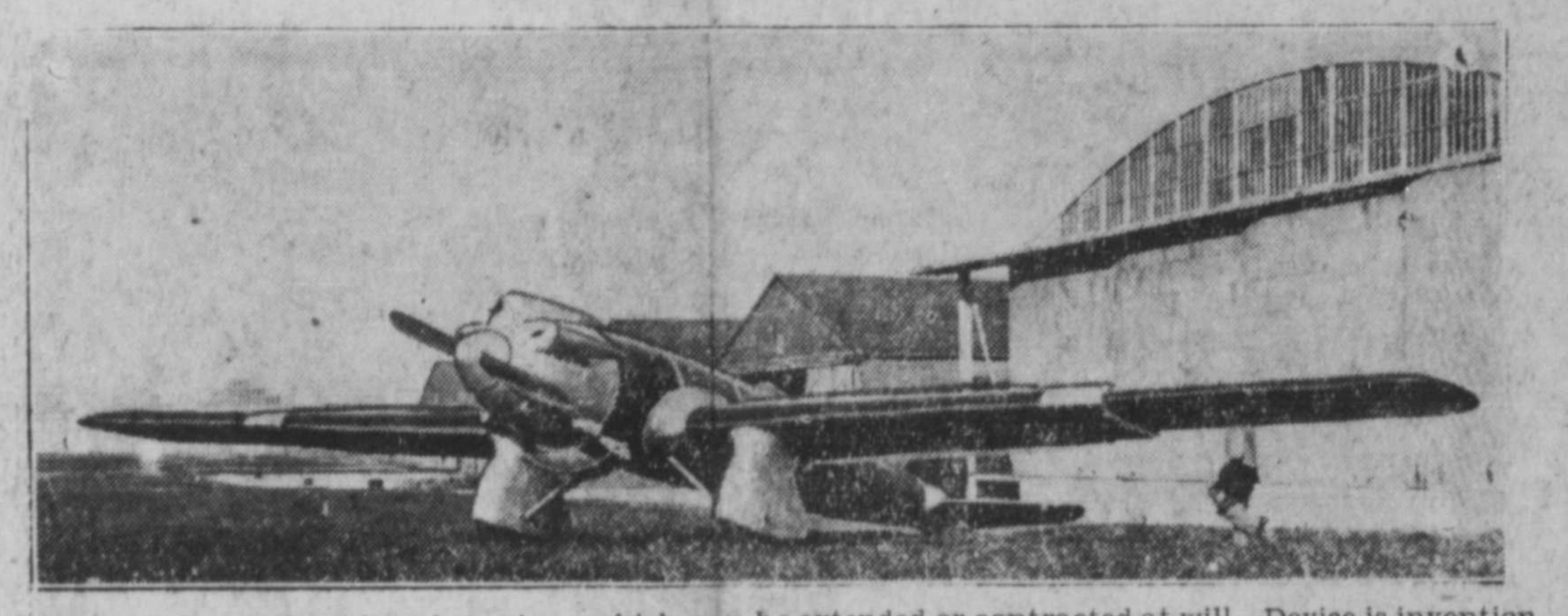
UNITED STATES TO SEEK PARTNERSHIP OF FRANCE IN PLANS

VANCOUVER, Sept. 22.—Having concluded a tour of the province, including the Peace River Block, T. D. Pattullo, provincial Liberal leader, will address a meeting in the Hotel Vancouver on Thursday night of this week. He will discuss unemployment, taxation and kindred matters.

Party in Edmonton After Trip to Tropical Valley of North British Columbia

EDMONTON, Sept. 22.—Back from a 1000-mile trip to the "Mystery Spot" of Northern British Columbia, Dr. A. N. Norman Henry and party of Philadelphia brought word here of having explored the "Tropical Valley." They found it three-quarters of a mile in length and honeycombed with boiling hot springs. In some places the water is too hot for human beings. Indians said that, in a temperature of fifty degrees below zero, water did not freeze.

PLANTING DOUGLAS FIR ON QUEEN CHARLOTTE ISLANDS

SKIDEGATE, Sept. 22.—Forest Ranger Benson of the Queen Charlotte Islands has been carrying on interesting experiments with the planting of young Douglas fir on various parts of the Queen Charlotte Islands. The young trees seem to be thriving splendidly wherever they are planted. People of the Queen Charlotte Islands are co-operating in connection with the experiments.

President Hoover Visited Detroit

Chief Executive of United States Gives Address Before American Legion Convention

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21.—President Herbert Hoover left by special train Sunday night for Detroit, where he gave an address at the convention of the Canadian Legion yesterday. The chief executive returned to Washington immediately after the speech.

ROAD WORK APPROVED

North to Receive Attention Under Government's Unemployment Relief Scheme

VICTORIA, Sept. 22.—The provincial government has finally approved its unemployment relief program and has forwarded it to Ottawa for ratification. The road scheme includes improvement of the northern trans-provincial highway from Prince Rupert to the Rockies with new construction east of Prince Rupert, west of Hazelton and east of Prince George and general improvements on the Cariboo road north from Spence's Bridge to Prince George.

Both government and opposition front benches in the House of Commons were as one in agreeing upon the need for united action at once to avoid the impending crisis.

WORK NOW STARTING

Authorization Received for Relief Camps Near Terrace

TERRACE, Sept. 22.—Word was received in Terrace on Saturday that consent has been given by the provincial government for the opening of relief camps at Usk, Cedarvale and Kitwanga, each camp to accommodate 120 men and to be engaged on the work of bridging the distance between the transcontinental highway at Usk and at Kitwanga and on to Skeena Crossing.

The lumber for these camps is to be shipped from Terrace on next Thursday's freight, and construction work will begin on Friday, the clearing work being got under way on Monday.

This is the only relief work authorized in this district so far and it is more than welcome, as numbers of men have been out of employment for a considerable time.

SAILING ON PR. HENRY

Big Passenger List Assured For Vancouver-Halifax Cruise

VANCOUVER, Sept. 22.—With receipt today of a reservation for J. Robertson of Halifax, coast-to-coast representation is assured for the 23-day cruise of the Canadian National steamship Prince Henry from Vancouver to Halifax. Several bookings from the three prairie provinces have already been received while parties from Montreal and Toronto have also announced their intentions of being aboard the steamer when she leaves this port on November 21.

The well-planned itinerary for the cruise has drawn many inquiries from Pacific coast points in the United States and it is probable that a number of passengers from San Francisco and Los Angeles will be included.

The ship will call at Manzanillo, Mexico, pass through the Panama Canal and touch Havana and Bermuda before she completes the cruise at Halifax on December 13.

THE CRISIS IN BRITAIN.

The one topic of conversation in Prince Rupert yesterday and this morning was the financial crisis in Great Britain and what its probable effect might be on Canada. Everyone is more or less in the dark as to the meaning of it all, each person having his own interpretation. In many quarters there was a feeling of pleasure expressed that France and United States might find their stock of gold not quite so good a bargain as they had anticipated. The hope was also expressed that the change might affect the price of silver and thus improve conditions in Western Canada.

All are agreed that the crisis must have been a very important one or such drastic action would not have been taken. Future international financial developments will be watched with great interest.

NO TIME TO DREAM AND DRIFT.

This is no time to dream and drift, as the writer in a Vancouver trade journal suggests. It is the time when every person in business and every wage earner will do his utmost to bring affairs back to normal. It is useless to live in the past. The future is before us.

Marking time is sometimes necessary, but while doing so plans should be made for progress. Standing still is really losing ground. No one can afford to stand still long. There is the danger of slipping. Every day we lift our feet and replace them in the same place we are digging ourselves in and making it more difficult to extricate ourselves. The present is a time for forward movement, not necessarily by spending more money but by making expenditures more wisely or by initiating action which will keep the wheels turning in the business machine.

RECENT DEVELOPMENTS IN MINING IN THE BULKLEY VALLEY DISTRICT

(Continued from page one)

M. Campbell is in charge of development work. During the season a large number of open cuts have been made on five different veins and this work is still proceeding. A new camp has been built just below the high plateau on which these showings occur and is the highest mining camp in this part of the province. Survey work on some of the Schufer claims has been carried out by the optionees as well.

Silver King Mine at the head of Driftwood Creek in the Babine Range has produced some sensational native silver specimens in recent work. These and a choice specimen of fine-grained galena from a new surface cut are now on display in the local Chamber of Mines. Development is still being conducted on these properties for Omineca Silver King Mines Ltd., the present owner.

Babine Victoria or Lorraine property has also had some new work done, though the owners of this are very lacking in funds.

Rainbow Group, on the Bulkley Valley slope of the Babine Range close to the Driftwood Creek motor road and with fourteen miles of Smifthers, has had further development work carried out by the local syndicate owning it. This has achieved noteworthy results, opening up new silver-copper ores not hitherto exposed and adding to the promise of this property. Jas. Wright is the head of the local syndicate.

The Cronin or Babine Bonanza Mine goes steadily on with blocking out further silver-lead-zinc ores and preparing for the expansion sure to come to this proven mine when metal prices warrant the large expenditure that will be required to overcome its transportation problem and equip the mine for operation. In July some of the principals of the company—Babine Bonanza Mining and Milling Co. Ltd. (which is the company of the late Jas. Cronin) visited the property and they are expected to pay a further visit in the near future to inspect recent work and to plan for the future. Good results are reported from recent development.

Individual prospectors in the Milk Creek Section, Telkwa River, have been working in a small way opening up several high-grade and promising silver-lead showings. Without adequate capital they cannot do much, however great the promise of their showings.

SPORT NOTES

A little bit of bunting, found recently when a board-walk in Fort William was torn up, brought back memories of the days when lacrosse held sway at the lake-head. When the walk was renewed at the corner of Finlayson and McMur-ray streets, a badge was discovered where it had lain for 29 years. Wonderfully well preserved, the badge bore the wording—"1902 Dominion Day—Kaministiquia Lacrosse Club." Old timers began recalling the famous lacrosse club of that year on whose roster were many celebrities of the day, including Hon. R. J. Manion, Dominion minister of railways and canals who wielded a tricky stick at cover point, E. C. Little, prominent athlete of the time, said the badge was one of many sold to gain financial support for the club, Geo. A. MacDonald, retired merchant and now one of Canada's greatest

curling exponents, was field captain of the famous team. Of all the hundreds of ball teams in Canada, Winnipeg has what is perhaps the most unique—a one-armed brigade. Organized five years ago by a number of war veterans, it was made an iron-clad rule that no player could perform for the "Amputations" team unless he had lost an arm overseas. Winning and losing games all over the province—mostly winning—the team became famous, locally. But the strict rule was broken. They took in Jack Peppin, who qualified in every way except that he had two arms. But Jack had only one leg. In 1927 the most handicapped ball team in Canada played 46 games and won 43 of them. The lineup is: W. Farrell, E. Bailey, B. Shipman, H. Davis, Bill Wheeler, J. R. McDougall, W. Woods, Roy Sanderson, Jack Peppin and L. Johnson.

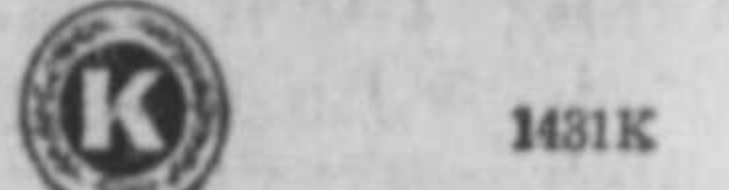

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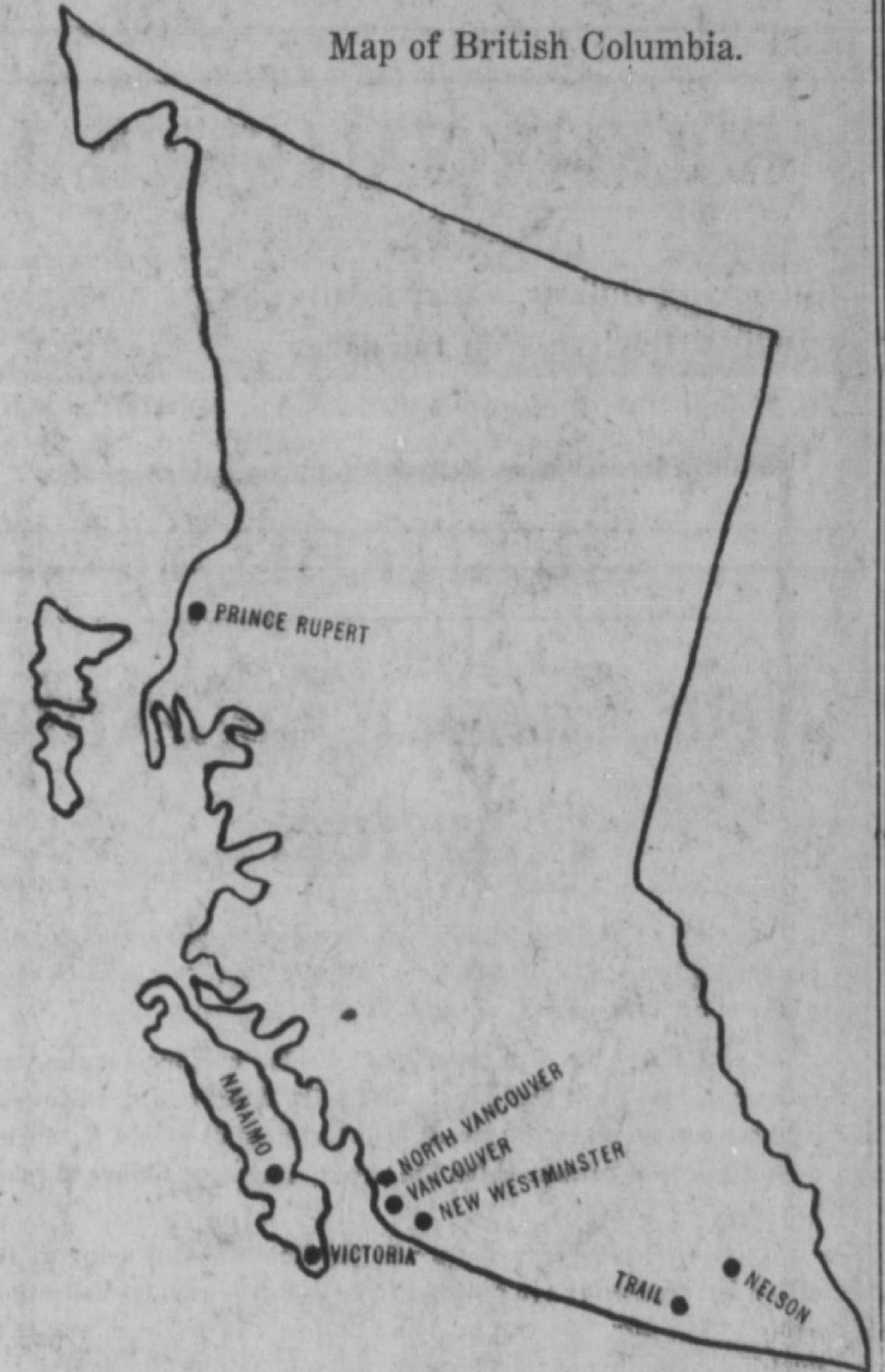
