

Has Been on Tour of Omineca Riding; Reports Good Crops

Party in Edmonton After Trip to Tropical Valley of North British Columbia

EDMONTON, Sept. 22.-Back from a 1000-mile trip to the "Mystery Spot" of Northern British Columbia, Dr. A. N. Norman Henry and party of Philadelphia brought word here of having explored the "Tropical Valley." They found it three-quarters of a mile in length and honeycombed with boiling hotsprings. In some places the water is too hot for human beings. Indians said that, in a temperature of fifty degrees below zero, water did not

The valley is at the mountains near the junction of Racing and Toad Rivers, 400 miles northeast of Fort St. John.


