Drastic Measures Possible Owing to Shortage of Coal

Arrest of Miners who Refuse to Work Being Considered in Federal Circles; Schools of Kansas City Closed.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
WASHINGTON, December 1.—The pinch of coal shortage promises to force the adoption of drastic measures to avoid actual famine. A vacation of one month by the coal miners has brought on conditions like those prevailing during the war in many sections of the country, but wartime restrictions have not stopped the drain on the coal piles.

Not much hope is held out by officials for the early production of bituminous coal in quantities sufficient to prevent the maintenance of the present slim stocks under the supervision of the railway and the administrator of the coal committee.

The latest authentic figures show that last week's soft coal output did not reach fifty per cent of the normal production.

May Arrest Miners.

INDIANAPOLIS, Dec. 1.—The possibility of the arrest of the miners who refuse to return to work when the mines have been opened by the operators in compliance with the decision of the Government and under their direct orders, is being discussed in federal circles.

CHICAGO, December 1.—Regional coal committees are taking charge of the fuel supplies in many states. Kansas City schools are closed owing to a lack of fuel and there is no chance of reopening until the general supply is increased. It is expected that many public buildings will have to be closed.

SEVERE STORM IN EAST DOES MUCH DAMAGE

Five Deaths in Detroit; Demoralized Telephone and Telegraph Delays Information.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
DETROIT, Michigan, Dec. 1.—For twenty-four hours since the most severe wind storm experienced in Michigan since 1913 the demoralized conditions of telegraph and telephone wires throughout the city, is such that no accurate or complete reports of the damage could be ascertained.

Five deaths occurred in Detroit. Scores have been injured by falling cornices and signs of flying glass. Thousands of dollars worth of damage has been done to buildings here and at Grand Rapids, Jackson, Port Huron, Saginaw, and elsewhere. At Richmond, Michigan, a three-story business block was unroofed and collapsed, the damage being estimated at \$100,000.

The official record of the velocity of the wind showed that it blew at eighty miles an hour.

At Toronto.

TORONTO, Dec. 1.—One man was killed and several injured in a terrific gale on Saturday night, the property loss runs into many thousands of dollars. George Dawson, expressman, was hit by a falling tree on the street and died from fractured skull.

Take to Lakes.

PORT HURON, Mich., Dec. 1.—At least ten and probably more of the largest boats sailing from lake ports were on the lake during the hurricane on Saturday, rather than take a chance of being dragged aground and take the chance of rescue. There was also a liner running from Port Huron on Lake Huron.

KOLCHAK FORCES RETREAT RAPIDLY

LONDON, Dec. 1.—The forces of Kolchak, the anti-Bolshevik leader, are retreating with such rapidity that they are unable to construct defensive works, of which there are none west of Irkutsk, according to a Soviet wireless dispatch.

FRAUD CHARGED OVER ELECTION

Truman Newberry Indicted by Grand Jury for Corruption and Fraud in Defeating Ford.

GRAND RAPIDS, Dec. 1.—Truman Newberry, United States senator for Michigan, has been indicted by a grand jury for corruption, fraud and conspiracy in connection with the election by which he obtained his seat in the senate, defeating Henry Ford his Democratic opponent.

Included in the indictment with Newberry are 433 other persons charged with a similar offence.

PLOT TO BRING EX-KAISER BACK

Ramifications Throughout the Country Discovered by Socialists.

DUSSELDORF, Dec. 1.—German Socialists have discovered a monarchist plot with ramifications throughout the country, which has as its purpose the return to German of the Emperor William and the Crown Prince Frederick William.

PRINCE IS HOME.

LONDON, December 1.—The Prince of Wales landed at Portsmouth this morning and was greeted by the officials of his Household. He left immediately on board a special train for London. Arriving there, he was met by King George, Queen Mary, Prime Minister Lloyd George, and High Commissioner Sir George Perley.

HUNGER STRIKE ON AT ELLIS ISLAND

NEW YORK, Nov. 29.—Five of seventy radicals interned at Ellis Island who are on hunger strike, are in hospital from fever and weakness. This is the fifth day of the strike.

HENRY ROBERTS DROWNED NEAR SWANSON BAY

Returned Soldier with Past Life of Mystery Loses Life.

Constable Geo. P. Logan returned from Swanson Bay on Saturday morning after having made an investigation at that place into the circumstances surrounding the drowning of Henry Roberts, a hand-logger for the Whalen Pulp and Paper Co.

The deceased was at work on a boom with his partner, F. H. Morris, about two weeks ago at Altanash Inlet, 17 miles north of Swanson Bay. He lost his balance and fell backwards into the icy waters, sinking immediately. He was never seen to rise again and the police were notified as soon as possible. At the point where the drowning occurred there is a very strong current and it is thought that his body was carried away.

Constable Logan arrived on the scene four days after the drowning and although dragging operations were at once instituted no trace of the body could be found. It is quite evident that the death was accidental so no inquest was called. The drowning was witnessed by F. H. Morris as well as his wife and son.

Was Soldier.

Roberts was about 35 years of age and was unmarried. He was a returned soldier, having enlisted in 1918 with the 2nd Depot unit later being transferred to the 78th battalion with which he served in France. He is believed to be a native of New York state coming to Canada some ten years ago. He was discharged from the army in June of this year and came to Swanson Bay. Although his military papers were found among his effects no trace could be found of his next of kin or relationship. He had never made his past life known to anyone apart from the statement that he had met with some disappointment some twenty years ago and had left home.

Among his belongings, which consisted mainly of souvenirs from the battlefields of the recent war was a considerable sum in cash which has been turned over to J. H. McMullin, official administrator.

Murderer Kills Death Watch and Turnkey and Severely Injures Two

HAMILTON, Dec. 1.—Paul Kowalski, sentenced to be hanged on December 19, has added a double murder to the crime of which he has already been convicted. The victims were A. C. Springstead, county constable, serving as death warden, and Arthur Awty, turnkey at the jail. In addition to these Ex-Sergeant John Lowery and William Berry, turnkeys, are in the general hospital suffering from wounds inflicted by Kowalski, when he ran amuck in the jail. Berry is in a very serious condition.

The prisoner who was allowed to walk about the corridors for exercise, sprang upon his death watch and tying a handkerchief around his neck twisted it up with a spoon, thus throttling him. Then he tore out the window sash in the cell and extricated an iron sash weighing ten pounds and shattered the skull of his victim.

Awty and Berry were going into the corridor together to change the prisoner's dishes. Kowalski sprang upon them as they entered, attacking them with a spoon which he had sharpened into a knife.

GERMAN VESSEL HAS HARD TIME

No Ship Would Go To Her Help When in Distress at Sea.

HALIFAX, Dec. 1.—The first German vessel to enter the harbor since the war is the barque Paylo of Hamburg. The vessel left Hamburg 38 days ago in ballast for Philadelphia and was buffeted by a succession of fierce storms. She was reported in distress a week ago but passing ships refused to render any assistance in the way of taking off the crew in case they proposed to abandon the vessel. No one would take her in tow.

CRIMINAL CASES IN COUNTY COURT TODAY

Marvin Allen up for Speedy Trial; Valpey Will Elect.

In the County Court before Judge Young this afternoon at 3 o'clock, Marvin E. Allen, charged with obtaining money under false pretences by issuing worthless checks, comes up for speedy trial. He elected some time ago but the trial was adjourned to secure further evidence.

Ernest Valpey, charged with shooting with intent to do grievous bodily injury, also elects in today's court.

Well Known Local Soldier Back From France Last Night.

Many friends in Prince Rupert are greeting Jock Campbell who is home this morning after over four years spent in the service of his country in the battlefields of France. Jock arrived home on last night's train from Blighty having crossed the Atlantic on the Empress of France.

Before leaving here in April, 1915, to join the Royal Army Medical Corps, he was employed in the Post Office.

While in Scotland he met Chief Engineer Alex S. Munro, of the Prince Rupert, who just arrived from the Old Country last Tuesday night.

May be Government Lottery in England

Proposal is Being Opposed by Bankers and Churches on Ground that it Would Demoralize the Public.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
LONDON, Dec. 1.—The question whether the Government shall embark on a policy of raising money by lottery methods, will come up before the House of Commons when the proposal for the issue of premium bonds is discussed.

The proposal is strongly opposed by bankers, churchmen and others on the ground that it would constitute gambling, lower national financial prestige and demoralize the public.

Supporters of the method state that the lure of the big prize would draw out at least £10,000,000, which the treasury could not get by ordinary means.

The cabinet has adopted an attitude of neutrality in the matter.

FISHING BOATS HAVE TROUBLE

Allen Arrives Without Rudder and Panama Had Collision.

BIG BOATS ARRIVE WITH BIG CATCHES

Good weather has been prevailing for the past few days following the storms of a week ago, with the result that some big fishing boats were in port over the weekend with good catches. During the storm the most of the boats on northern banks sought shelter and the fish are schooling so some heavy arrivals are looked for this week at the fish wharves. Last week only 5 cars of halibut were shipped east but already this week 8 cars are ready.

Among the boats coming in yesterday were two that had met with accidents while on the fishing banks. The Allen lost her rudder and had to be helped in with her catch of 80,000 pounds. Having disposed of her fish yesterday afternoon, she is now in the drydock where a new steering gear is being installed.

The Tjordenskjold collided with the Panama on the fishing grounds and damaged her port-side bow somewhat, but the injury is not very serious and it did not delay her in delivering her catch or getting out again.

CHURCH LAND NOT EXEMPT FROM TAXES

Mr. Justice Macdonald Gives Judgment Against Bishop of Vancouver Isld. on Cathedral Site.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
VANCOUVER, Dec. 1.—There was consternation in church circles when Mr. Justice Macdonald in the Supreme Court gave the city of Victoria judgment for \$15,000 against the Roman Catholic Bishop of Vancouver Island for overdue taxes on the St. Andrew's Cathedral, one of the oldest and finest buildings of the capital.

The city's counter claim for the full amount of the taxes was successful. The judgment asserts that the exemption of church property in British Columbia from taxation has been illegal since 1913, when the statute on the subject was amended.

CONGRESS AGAIN CONVENES TODAY

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1.—Congress convenes today in regular session. It will have under consideration at an early date the serious situation caused by the coal strike.

TUG REPAIR CASE SET FOR DECEMBER 17

The case of the G.T.P. Development Co. vs. Don W. Peck, arising out of repairs made to the tug McCulloch, was before Judge Young in the County Court this morning and was set for trial December 17 at 2 o'clock.

This case was up before Justice Clement at the recent Supreme Court sittings and was remitted to the December sitting of the local County Court.

Destruction of Enemy Ships.

The news that the enemy warships that were surrendered would with a few exceptions be destroyed seems like a terrible waste of valuable property, but it must be remembered that it is much cheaper to destroy the ships than to man and operate them.

The joker in the news despatch of Saturday is that while the Allies propose to make the Germans pay for sinking the ships, the proposal is made to destroy them all in order to get rid of them.

Liquor Prescription Abuse to be Remedied.

Attorney General Farris says that the amount of liquor to be sold under prescription is to be reduced to eight ounces. That will work a great hardship on a few old toppers who go dry on the least possible provocation.

By next autumn, according to the statement of Mr. Farris, the people will have a chance to say whether they require that more than eight ounces of liquor should be dispensed by the Government at one time.

Law Making Machinery is very Expensive.

The law making machinery of the province is very expensive. A news despatch on Saturday told of the cost of Dominion legislation and to this must be added the cost of every provincial legislature, nine in all, and then there are some few hundreds of thousands for municipal government.

JELlicoe WANTS GREATER NAVY FOR DOMINIONS

Recommends That a Far Eastern Fleet be Formed by Mother Country and Overseas Dominions.

In a recent issue of Reynolds' Newspaper an account of Admiral Jellicoe's report to the British House of Commons is given. This report embodies many recommendations for the improvement and extension of British naval affairs. He recommends that a great Far Eastern fleet be formed and that as well as ships from the Grand Fleet each dominion contribute boats to the fleet and that bases be formed for coast and harbor protection at suitable seaports in the dominions. This fleet would ensure the protection of the long coastlines which are practically defenceless against foreign invasion. The fleet proposed by Admiral Jellicoe would consist of eight modern battle-ships, 8 battle cruisers, 10 light cruisers, 40 destroyers and 30 submarines and would cost £19,750,000 or about \$95,000,000 and the share of Canada would probably be about \$20,000,000.

This scheme is now being worked upon by Admiral Jellicoe and was one of the reasons for his visit to this coast and his round-the-world tour on which he is calling at all the dominions. Although he did not call at Prince Rupert still two of his party did, including his chief of staff. Their opinion of Prince Rupert, with all its advantages as a naval base may yet be reflected in further recommendations of Admiral Jellicoe which will have much weight with the Admiralty in the shaping of future policies. The opinion is expressed locally that the strong delegation which left for Ottawa this morning might have an opportunity to take this most important matter up with the authorities in Ottawa.

Sport Briefs

The rules and regulations regarding the playing of the amateur games in the junior, intermediate and senior sections of the Prince Rupert Amateur Basketball Association for the Gilhuly Cup have been completely arranged although they have not yet been published. No players of professional standing are to be allowed to play and this point brought about quite a discussion at the meeting of the Rules Committee on Tuesday night. It was reported that a certain team in the league was to import "important" players from the south. This suggestion immediately met with a storm of opposition and some radical opinions on the matter were given. It was finally decided that all players must be able to produce their amateur tickets before entering games.

Another rule for this winter's basketball is that all players must be registered at least 48 hours before the playing of a game.

Under present plans the Amateur Basketball Association is to have a supervisory control over all junior and intermediate games and their games will be arranged to fill in with those of the senior teams playing for the Gilhuly Cup.

The Drydock and the Sons of Canada were to have had a game on Wednesday night but, on arriving at the Exhibition Hall they were unable to turn on the lights so the game had to be postponed.

Writing to Tex Rickard from Texas, Jess Willard has said that he is too busy to enter the ring as many reports had stated he would do. He claims to be done with the fistie art for life.

The announcement has been made in St. Paul that, on account of the wishes of his wife, Mike Gibbons is to retire permanently from the ring.

At the meeting of the executive of the National Hockey Association the announcement was made that four teams will comprise the circuit this year, these being Montreal Canadiens, Ottawas, Quebecs and Torontos.

In their annual football classic Harvard defeated Yale last Fri-

day by a score of 10-3. The game was played in the Cambridge Stadium before 50,000 people.

PUGILISM

Interesting Bouts at Calgary and Philadelphia: Tommy Gibbons of St. Paul Showed Title to Championship.

CALGARY, Nov. 28.—Tommy Gibbons of St. Paul, in a fifteen round battle with Mickey King of Australia, displayed everything that was done to make him the wonder light heavyweight champion of the world. The bout was a decisive win for the champion in every one of the fifteen rounds.

At Philadelphia.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 28.—Lew Tander, of Philadelphia knocked out Johnny Noye of St. Paul, in the second round. Tander hit Noye with the left, following quickly with a drive to the eye, which finished his opponent. Benny Leonard, the lightweight champion, and Soldier Bartfield of Brooklyn, also met and battled to a draw.

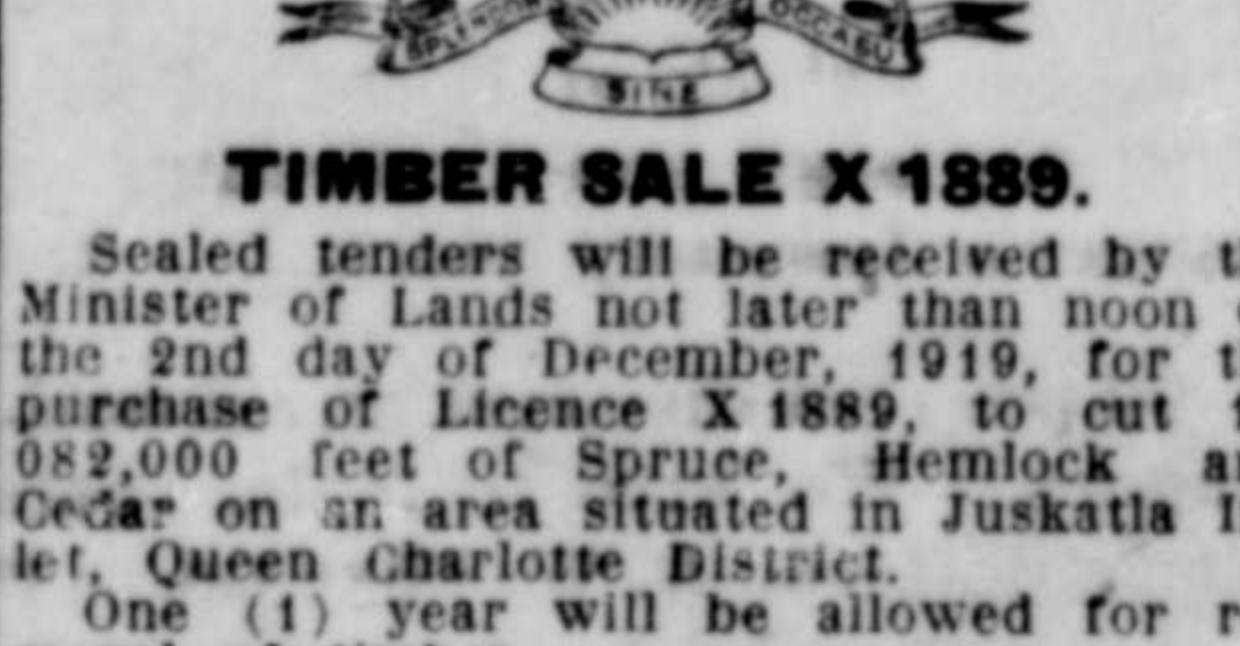

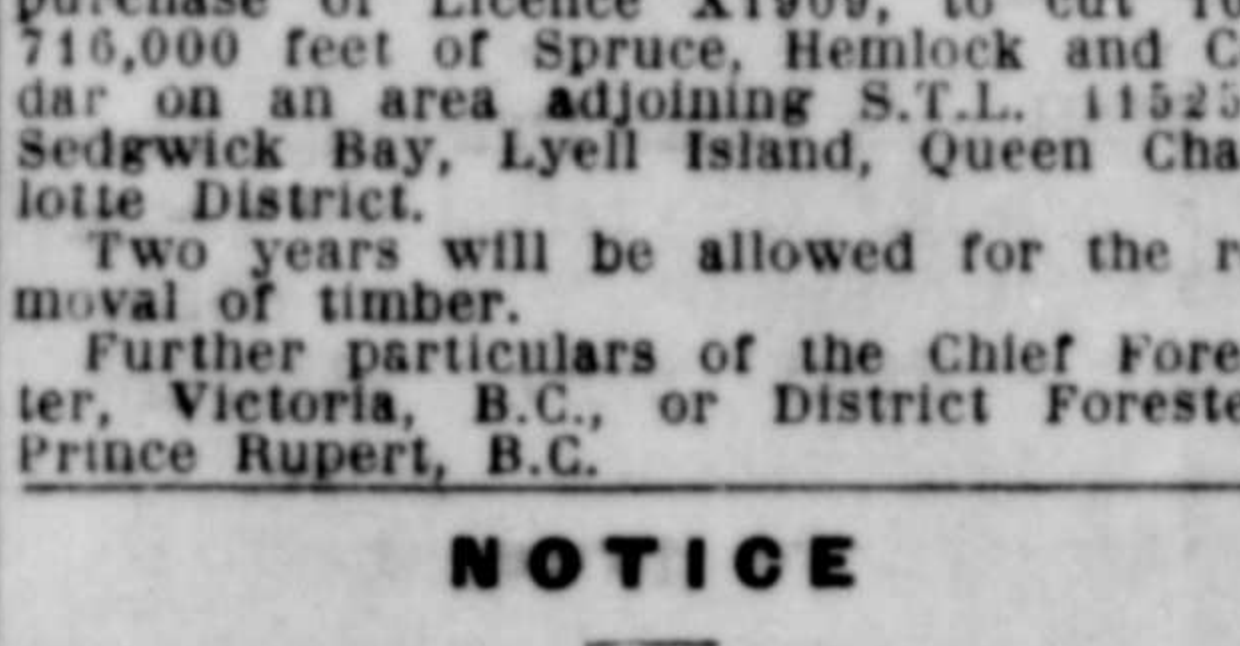
