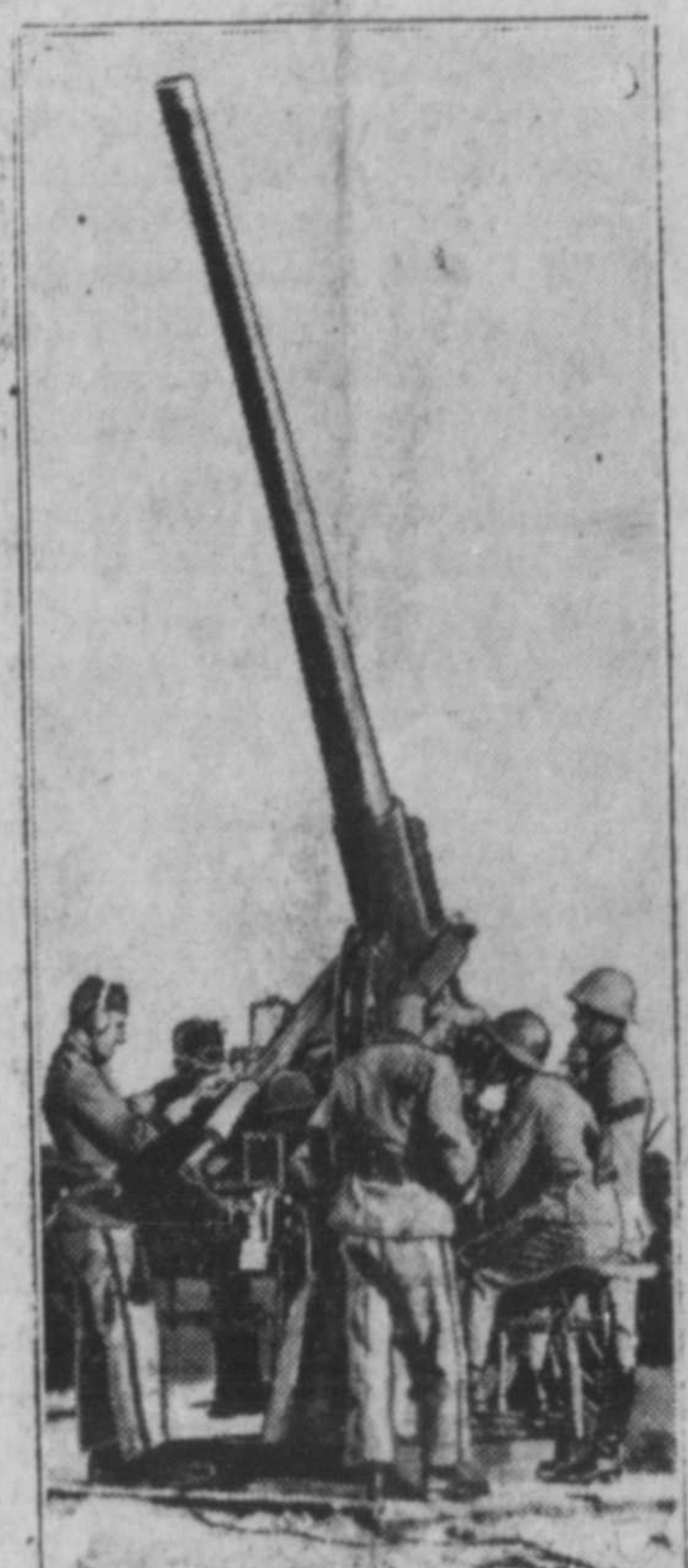

THANKS GIVING

True Spirit of Brotherhood Has Been Evident During Past Year

(Albert F. Gilmore in the Christian Science Sentinel.)
In a masterly exhortation to righteousness, Paul calls upon the Christians at Ephesus, in recognition of God's bestowals, to speak to themselves "in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs—giving thanks always for all things unto God and the Father in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ." Thus did the apostle emphasize the necessity of recognizing God as the source of all good, and the obligation of the recipients of His bounty to acknowledge it in appropriate terms. This habit of thanksgiving is a most important one to establish for it turns our thought to God and to the contemplation of divine beneficence, in itself a valuable experience. But its benefits go much further. The custom of recognizing the divine source of our blessings and expressing our thanks therefor uncovers a well of gratitude in the voicing of which thought is opened and the channels are broadened through which divine Love blesses us. We are thus doubly profited by the experience.

At this season of thanksgiving when people, in accordance with the ancient custom, are again called upon to gather in their usual places of worship, there to render thanks to the Father for the bounteous blessings of the past year, there is more than the usual reason for grateful hearts to sing their hymns of joy and voice their prayers of thanksgiving. During the 12 months now closing there has become manifest in the hearts of men more distinctly than ever before the true spirit of brotherhood. The Prince of Peace has again touched the hearts of men and quickened them to a keener sense of brotherly love, awakened anew a sense of obligation one to another which finds expression in an affirm answer, clear and strong to the traditional query: "Am I my brother's keeper?"

This newly awakened spirit, so aptly taught and perfectly exemplified in the life of the Nazarene, promises the coming of a new day the noontime of which will see the nations of earth living in lasting peace, in amity and good will, with the prospect of international strife forever relegated to the realm of the impossible. "Where the Spirit of the Lord is there is liberty," declared the apostle; and none the less is the concept of brotherhood which precludes the possibility of international warfare the handmaid of the spirit of Truth. The truth recognized and made effectual in human experience through righteous prayers is bearing fruit, fruit of the Spirit grown upon the tree of brotherly love. Horror and inexpressible suffering, the inevitable aftermath of war, are the fruits grown upon the tree of evil, the trunk of which is material sense, the branches ambition, jealousy, hatred and egregious selfishness. These bearers of bad fruits are now falling under the incessant blows of the sword of the Spirit and friendship, good will and brotherhood are supplanting the old evils which have from the dawn of human history dominated mankind.

What could be a greater cause for giving thanks to the Father than this momentous situation? But the work is only just begun. There is much of righteous praying to be done, much of prayerful vigil to be kept, to insure that the great peace movement which like a beautiful paean of praise is sweeping over the hearts of mankind, lose not its momentum or be defeated in its perfect purpose. So long as evil seems to persist, so long will vigilance be the watchword of success.

ENGINEER IS NEEDED

Northern Mining Handicapped by Lack of Data, Declares Major MacLaren

VANCOUVER, Oct. 9.—The need of a government engineer in the more remote northern sections of the province was stressed by Major D. R. MacLaren, assistant general manager Canadian Airways Ltd., in a report to the B. C. Chamber of Mines executive on his company's activities in that area.

Data should be gathered on the geological formations, mineral possibilities, transportation routes, rivers, lakes and mountain ranges, prospectors travelling in and out, and a general record kept of all activities in those little known sectors, he said.

Many prospectors had taken advantage of the rapid means of transportation afforded by the company's aircraft operating out of Prince George into the North Country, he said.

Major MacLaren remarked on the lack of cohesion evinced by prospectors in the areas chosen for exploration, the majority of them spreading all over northern British Columbia.

He emphasized the fact that if prospectors would concentrate on a given area, favorable for mineralization, there would not only be a greater possibility of them finding deposits, but probably better flying rates could be offered.

In Many Areas

Several prospecting parties have been flown into the far northern sections of the province.

They intend staying in over the winter, he said.

One party is as far north as the Sifton Pass country, which divides the Finlay River from the Liard drainage system.

Many others are active in the Thutade Lake area, on the Nation, Omineca and Ingenika Rivers.

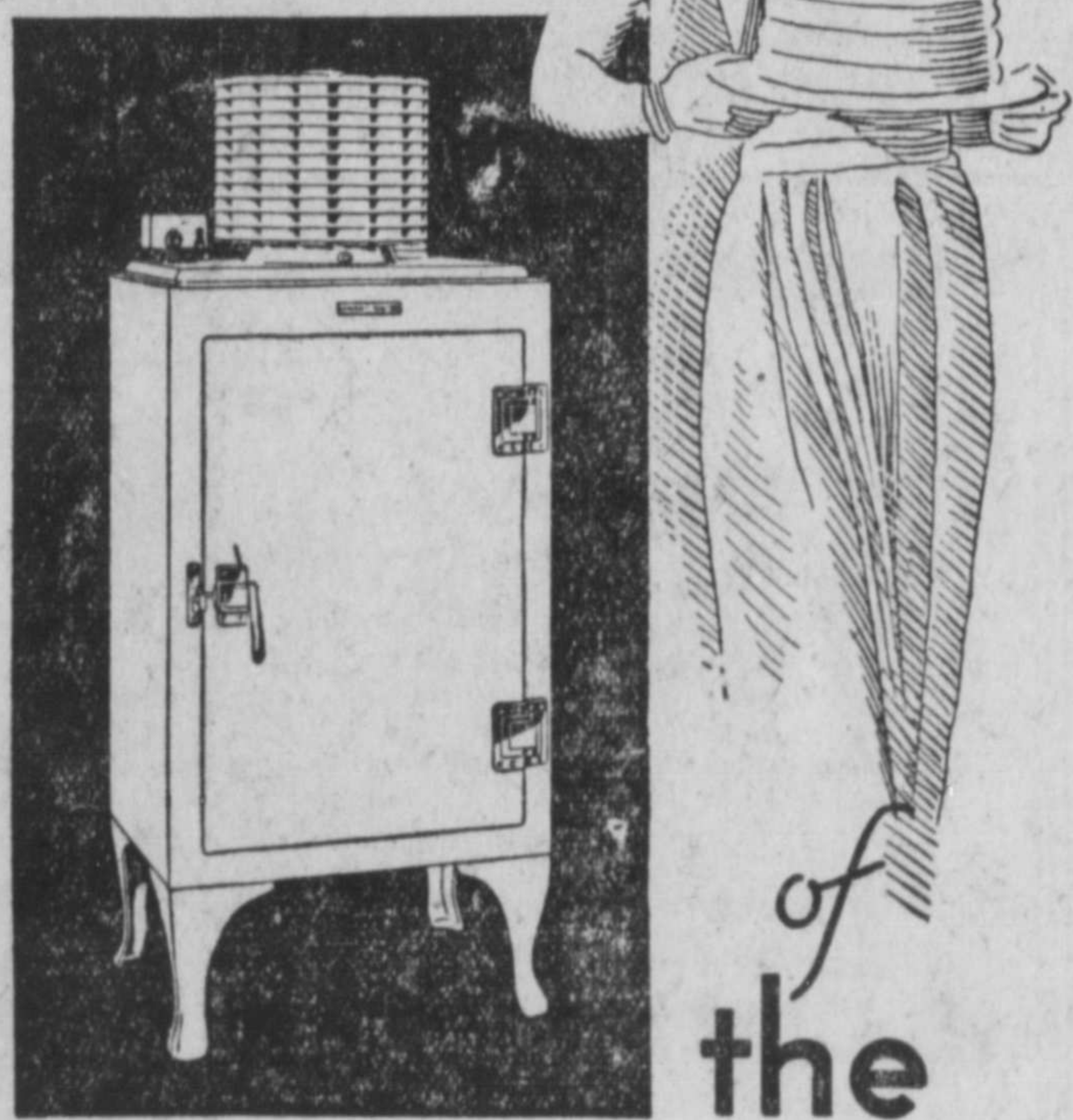

TALKS ABOUT FRUIT TRADE

Sid Thompson Addresses Rotary Club and Tells of Difficulties of Growers

The fruit business, with special stress on the apple situation as it exists today, was the subject of an address given before the Rotary Club yesterday by Sid Thompson. He told of the apple war going on in the Okanagan as a result of which every grower would lose money. In many cases, the freight on the apples amounted to more than the price paid for the fruit. The fruit growers were in a similar condition to the fishermen in that their product was sold for less than it cost to produce.

Mr. Thomson told of the failure of the co-operative movement in the fruit business but said that in California there was an outstanding co-operative success in the California Fruit Growers' Exchange. It was vital to the business in the south.

While the growers of the Okanagan were unable to sell their produce, there was being shipped from Seattle 300,000 boxes of apples for Europe, mostly United Kingdom, and 100,000 boxes from Portland. No explanation was given as to why this was done.

The minister of agriculture had recently visited the Okanagan, Mr. Thomson said, and had declared he was absolutely helpless to remedy the situation. The outlook was indeed dreary.

Mr. Thomson told how the oranges were grown and shipped in California. Every orange was washed before being packed and they were shipped immediately. None were stored. Australian fruit was not up to that grown in California.

No less than ten countries were represented in fruit just now stored in his warehouse here. Mr. Thomson said. The potato situation was similar to the fruit situation. Many of the growers were doubtful if it would be worth while digging their spuds.

Finally the speaker mentioned that Canadians did not pack their fruit and produce as well as was done in the United States. He suggested better government supervision and more education of the grower.

Increasing food prices in Great Britain, about which complaints are being heard are just as inevitable as lower prices for exported goods under the cheapened pound. Food must be imported; and the pound does not buy as many bushels of wheat or pounds of butter as it did a month ago.
