CANADIAN LOAN IS OVERSUBSCRIBED

SALMON FISHING TO BE PERMITTED DURING DECEMBER

Lists In Government Bond Issue To Close Tonight 'Tis Decided

Oversubscription of \$150,000,000 Is Now Assured—Applications Poured in in Great Volume on Saturday and Sunday

OTTAWA, Nov. 30.—Subscription lists of the National Service Loan will be closed tonight, it is announced by Hon. Edgar N. Rhodes, acting minister of finance.

TWO MEN LOCATED

Brothers George Feltes and Marshal Lapeyre Safe in Alaska After Plane Crash

ANCHORAGE, Alaska, Nov. 30.—Brothers George Feltes and Marshal Lapeyre, "flying missionaries," long overdue on a flight from McGrath to Holy Cross Mission, have been located and both are safe.

Aerial searchers located their plane almost covered with snow. The two missionaries had evidently crashed. Twenty-five miles northeast of McGrath the two men were located.

Dog teams have been dispatched in from McGrath to bring the pair out.

MASSETT BOY IS DEAD HERE

Raymond Yeltatzie, Aged 18, Passed Away in Hospital This Morning

Raymond Yeltatzie, 18-year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Alex Yeltatzie of Massett, who was brought to the city early this morning from the Queen Charlotte Islands for treatment, died later in the morning in the Prince Rupert General Hospital.

The body will be taken back to Massett for interment.

Police Court Fines Again Show Falling Off During Month

Police court fines for the month of November this year totalled only \$35 as against \$430 in the same month last year. So far this year fines have reached a total of \$4,991.25 as compared with \$4,991.25 in the first 11 months of 1930.

OTTAWA, Nov. 30.—According to figures compiled by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, there was an increase of 1311 in persons employed in retail and wholesale establishments of Canada between October and November this year.

STEAMBOAT HEAD DIES

Capt. J. W. Troup Passes Away in Victoria Today at Age of Seventy-Six

Heart Failure

Was Manager of C. P. R. Coast Steamships For Long Period of Years

VICTORIA, Nov. 30.—Capt. James William Troup, for the past sixty years identified with shipping development on the Pacific Coast and for 26 years manager of the British Columbia Coast Steamship Service of the Canadian Pacific Railway, died today from heart failure following a three weeks' illness with bronchitis.

The funeral of the late Capt. Troup, who was born in Portland, Ore., on February 5, 1855, will take place on Wednesday.

The late Capt. Troup entered steamship service in 1872 and was successively purser, pilot and master with the Oregon Steam Navigation Co. From 1875 to 1883 he was master of steamers of the Oregon Railway & Navigation Co. and from 1883 to 1892 was master of steamers of the Canadian Pacific Navigation Co. In 1892 he returned to the Oregon Railway & Navigation Co. as superintendent of water lines and held that position until 1897 when he became manager of the Columbia & Kootenay Steamship Navigation. From 1899 until 1901 he held the post of superintendent of Columbia & Kootenay steamers of the Canadian Pacific Railway. After holding the post of superintendent of railway and steamship lines of the Canadian Pacific Railway with headquarters at Nelson for a short time he was promoted to the management of the British Columbia Coast Steamship Service at Victoria in 1901, holding that post until 1928 when he retired and was succeeded by Capt. C. D. Nureutos. Capt. Troup was also a member of the Dominion Lighthouse Board.

Besides his widow, the late Capt. Troup is succeeded by one son and one daughter. He was a member of the Anglican Church and his principal recreation was motoring.

VESSEL IS DESTROYED

Steamer Alameda Burns at Seattle—Was Valued at \$600,000

SEATTLE, Nov. 30.—The veteran steamer Alameda of the Alaska Steamship Co.'s fleet, valued at \$600,000, was totally destroyed by a fire of mysterious origin which broke out aboard her on Saturday. The vessel took fire at her berth at Pier 2 and she was towed to Harbor Island and beached. There she was virtually consumed.

The Alameda had been operated for 20 years or more on the Alaska run and, in the early days, was a very popular ship. For years she held the speed record between Seattle and Ketchikan. Before coming on the Alaska run, she operated out of San Francisco.

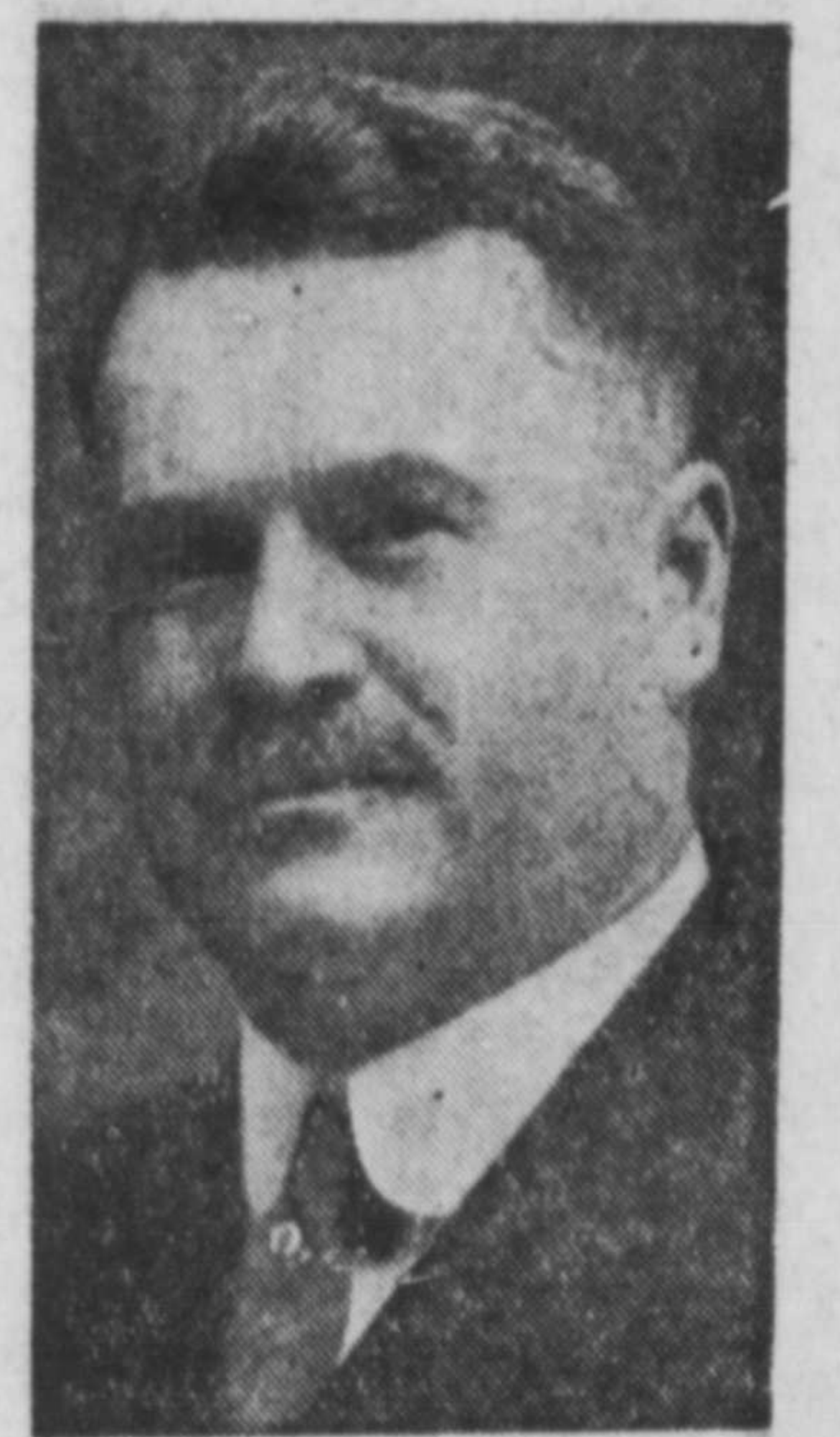
BAD CHECK MEN GONE

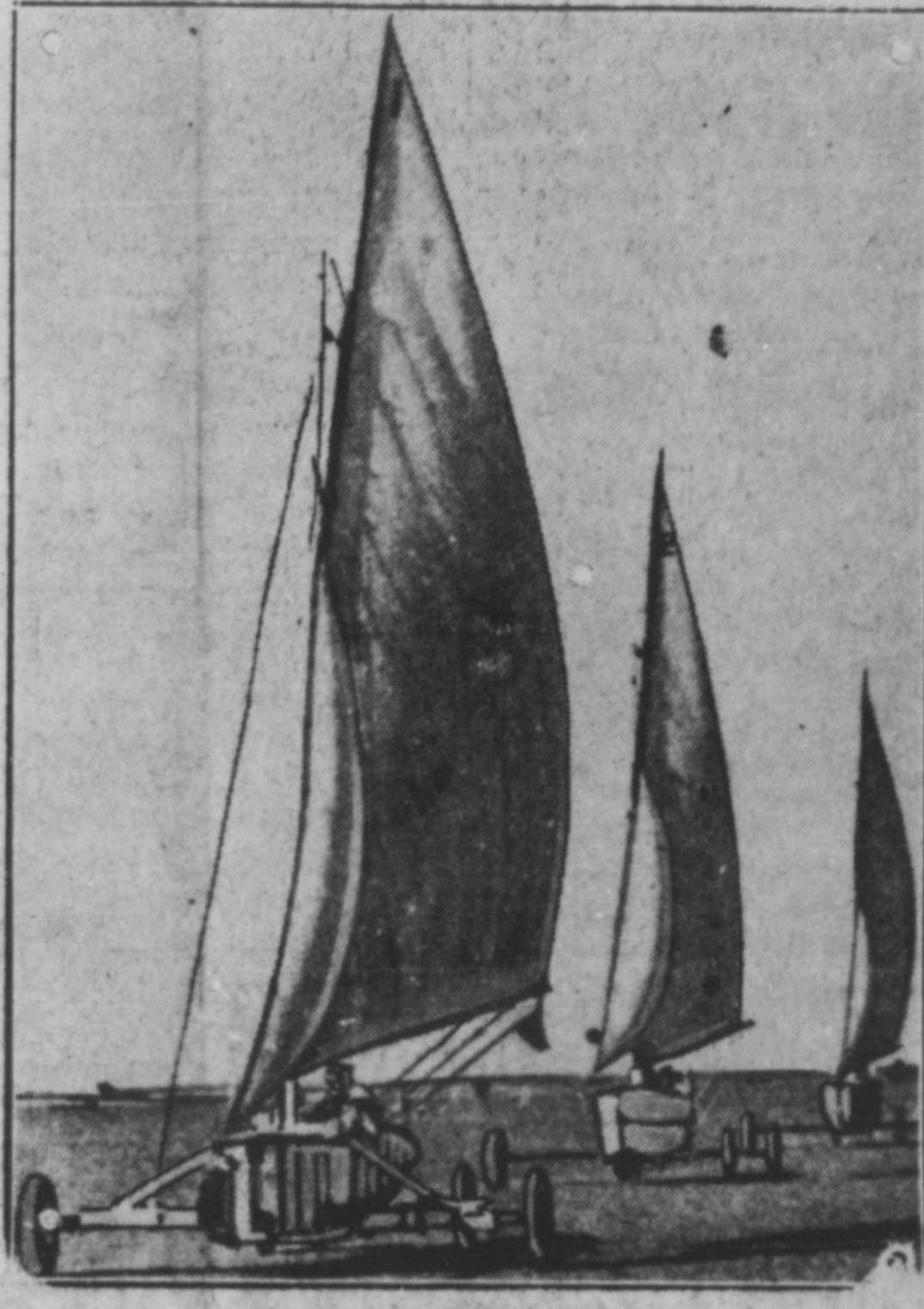


Premier Tolmie tells Nanaimo convention he would be glad to retire any time.

Because, for the first time in the history of the grain and hay show, one individual has been crowned Wheat King three times, Trelle will be awarded the International Wheat Cup to keep permanently.

It was the first time that Durum wheat has risen to championship class.

American Speed Flyer Plans Record Breaking Trip From Vancouver to Mexico

VANCOUVER, Nov. 30.—Capt. Frank Hawks, American speed flyer, arrived here yesterday afternoon to make preparations for making a flight from Vancouver to Mexico in six or seven hours, thus setting up a new commercial record.

Spokane Business Man is Victim of Attack of Heart

SPOKANE, Nov. 30.—George A. Phillips, former department store owner of this city, died suddenly in his hotel room here Saturday, the victim of heart failure. He was one of the best known business men of this city, and during recent years had been a travelling executive for a Seattle firm.

SEATING ALTERED

B. C. and Alberta Gain Seats Following Census—Nova Scotia and New Brunswick Lose

OTTAWA, Nov. 30.—Redistribution of federal electoral seats, following the decennial census, will give British Columbia two additional seats, making a total of 16. Alberta will gain one seat, making a total of 17.

Provinces losing seats will be Nova Scotia, two, leaving a total of 12, and New Brunswick, one, leaving 10.

There will be no changes in the representation of the five remaining provinces. Representation for the various provinces is based on a statutory 65 seats for Quebec.

NEW YORK, Nov. 30.—The New York home of Herbert N. Strauss, wealthy railroad executive, was entered by burglars at the week-end and \$75,000 of jewels taken.

Announcement of Much Interest To Trollers Made by Department

Conservation Being Well Taken Care of and Additional Time is Held Necessary in View of the Present Conditions

A communication which reads as follows has been received by the fishing industry from James Boyd, supervisor of fisheries for District No. 2: "In view of the fact that conservation is being well taken care of and it is necessary that fishing be continued just as long as possible to help in the alleviation of the present difficult financial situation, I would inform you that the department has advised that salmon fishing, which is usually closed during the month of December, will be permitted."

JAP ARMY WITHDRAWS

Attack Upon Chinchow to Be Called Off, It is Said in Tokio

TOKIO, Nov. 30.—It was stated here on Saturday that the Japanese Army, no doubt on account of pressure brought to bear upon it, had decided to withdraw from Chinchow, Manchurian railroad centre.

The Japanese declare that there will be no more fighting in Manchuria unless the Chinese provoke it. Troops from Tientsin will be sent via Dairen instead of via Chinchow.

Official Tokio expressed itself as being shocked at the attitude of the United States in declaring that the Japanese had guaranteed not to attack Chinchow.

Western Canada As Cornerstone Of Grits Planned

OTTAWA, Nov. 30.—Between now and the next general election, Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, Liberal leader in Canada, will make an appeal that Western Canada be made the cornerstone of Liberalism in Canada.

MOVIE MAN IS VICTIM

A. P. Younger, Noted Scenario Writer, Loses Life From Bullet of His Own Gun

HOLLYWOOD, Nov. 30.—A. P. Younger, noted scenario writer and creator of the plots of many famous moving pictures, died here early yesterday morning, the victim of a bullet from a gun in his own hand.

Younger is alleged to have been disturbed in his sleep by a dog barking at a prowler. He seized a gun which exploded, a bullet entering his head. He died before reaching hospital.

B. C. Weather Is Still Cold

Prince George Coldest With Six Below—Nanaimo 43 Above

VANCOUVER, Nov. 30.—Prince George reported the lowest temperature in British Columbia on Saturday—six below zero. Nanaimo was the warmest point in the province with 43 above.

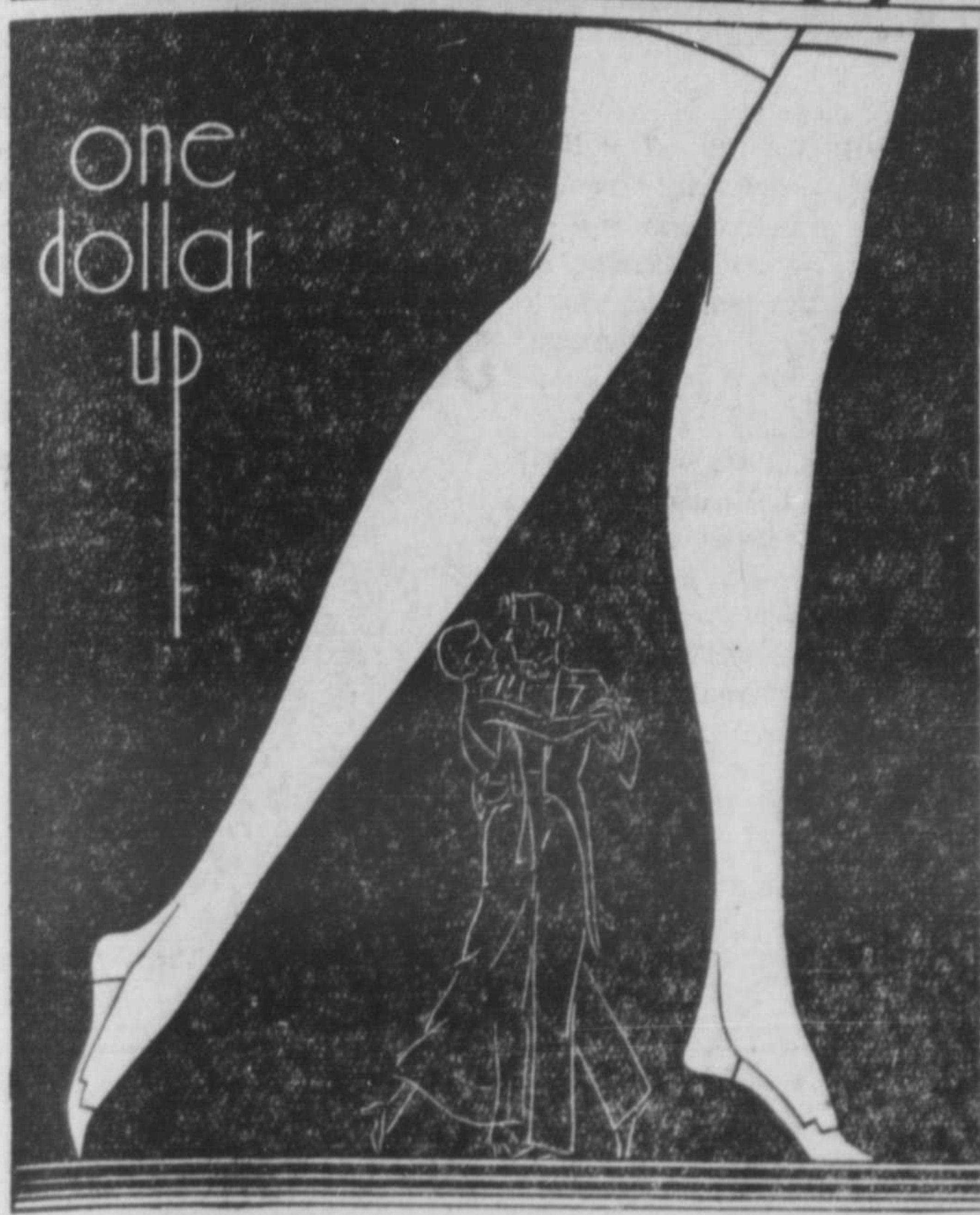

The Letter Box

UNEMPLOYED SECURED AID

Editor, Daily News:-

I am commissioned by the Unemployed Association of this city, to voice the appreciation of that organization, and to inform the public at large, that the government has taken action in relation to the immediate needs of the present inhabitants of the local road camp.

A few days ago the government was good enough to send out tobacco to the men, and has arranged to supply the needs of the workers in regards to clothing, such as underwear, socks, overalls, rubbers and mitts. While the workers will accept these necessities from a paternal government with due appreciation, yet they desire to convey their thanks to the local city council, who, in response to definite statements from the organization, immediately took steps to have the government remedy the situation.

Such action leads the association however to a desire to show that there is a large need for a continuation of the good work. Many local single men, unable to be permitted the shelter of the camps, are drawing direct relief from the city and government of 40 cents per diem, and are hard put to it to have the owners of the houses they inhabit, to continue to extend credit for such shelter, while it is well known that in Vancouver, a specified allowance of from twenty to twenty-five cents per day was given to obtain shelter. Such has never been forthcoming in this city, and it must be observed that these men are living on the charity of hotels, shack owners, etc.

Many of these men have no money for socks, underclothes, etc., and it is just as cold in the city with little clothing as it is in the camps, and when a man cannot pay his lodging, he is hard put to it to secure adequate clothing for this winter weather.

Is it not possible to extend this generous treatment to men in a like position living in the city on 40 cents per day, who feel the cold, like other humans, and make available some supplies, the cost of which to be worked out by the relief applicant in the future?

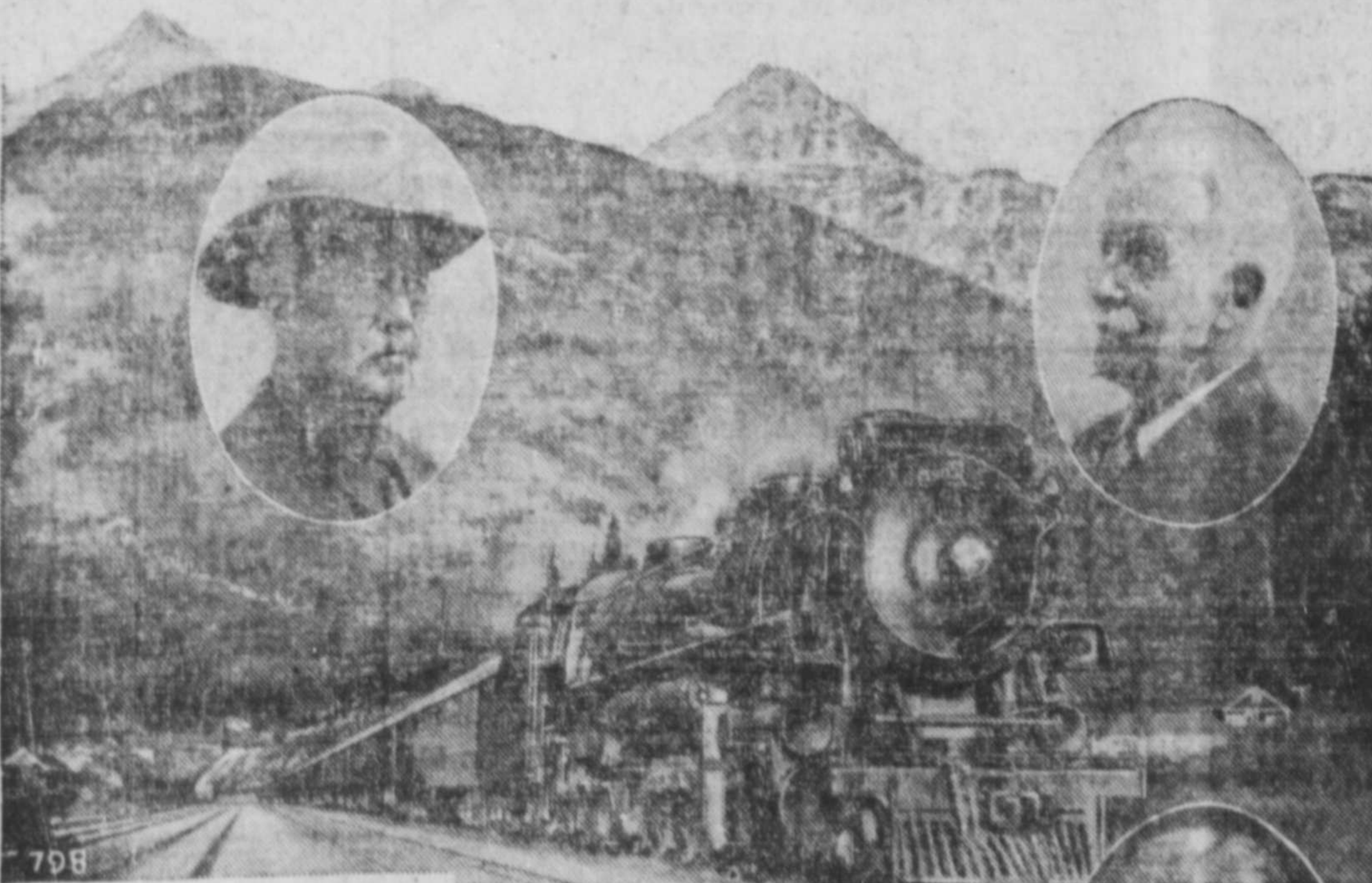

PIONEERS MEET AFTER HALF CENTURY



Half a century is a long way to look back and when Charlie Shaw (right) met Tom Wilson in the grounds of the Banff Springs Hotel last autumn, it was an occasion for both of them. Tom is a well-known Mountain resort. He is the sole survivor of the Canadian Pacific's first exploration party of 1881, and was the first white man to see Lake Louise. Shaw, who makes his home in Keremos, B.C., is the sole survivor of the survey party under C. E. Perry, C.E., which located the line across the Alberta prairies. The pair met, for the only time in their lives till 1931, in 1883, when Tom was working under Major A. B. Rogers, after whom Rogers Pass is named and Charlie was with Sir Sanford Fleming's memorable expedition through the Kicking Horse Pass. What this gallant pair of veterans must have had to say to each other when they renewed their acquaintance! From the days when they toiled over mountain and plain, blazing the way for the great steel girder which now binds the provinces of the Dominion together, down to the present day, is history. Their cheery determination has been, and is, reflected in the story of the world's greatest transportation system. The mantle of responsibility has passed from Mountstepien to Van Horne and from Shaughnessy to the broad shoulders of E.W. Beatty, chairman and president of the system. Many progressive improvements have been made. But the spirit which sent Tom and Charlie across hundreds of miles of unexplored territory remains unchanged, for the excellent reason that none better can be found.
