PEACE RIVER FOLK DEMAND ACTION

ESTRANGED PARENTS WATCH MICHAEL'S FIGHT FOR LIFE

Mass Meeting of Delegates From All Parts of Northern Farming Area Insist On Outlet Building

Are Disgusted With Delay of Governments in Matter—Resolution is to be Forwarded to All Interested Parties

PEACE RIVER, Alta., May 1:—Disgusted with the delay of governments in taking some action on their persistent appeals of the past, a mass meeting of delegates representing practically all boards of trade in the district last night passed a resolution definitely demanding immediate action on the construction of a railway outlet to the Pacific Coast. The resolution will be at once conveyed to the authorities interested.

FRIGHTFUL FIGHT ON

Rebel Leaders Resort to New Tactics in Honduras and Nicaragua

COLON, May 1:—Rebel leaders in Honduras and Nicaragua are resorting to a policy of frightfulness in continuing the rebellion in the two Central American republics. It is believed here.

It is the intention of the rebels henceforth, it is stated, to decapitate all enemy prisoners who are captured and mount their heads on poles. Already such atrocities as these are reported to have been perpetrated in Nicaragua.

COMPROMISE ON SPEAKER

Republican-Progressive Nominee is Likely in United States House

WASHINGTON, May 1:—That a compromise Speaker for the House of Representatives, being the joint choice of Republicans and Progressives, would be chosen at the next session of Congress seems likely.

Congressman Schneider of Wisconsin announces that the Progressives intend to nominate a third candidate for Speaker in which case neither Republicans or Democrats would be able to get a decisive majority.

Widow of Former Ambassador to London Passes

PARIS, May 1:—The death occurred here Wednesday of Mrs. Whitelaw Reid, widow of a former United States ambassador to Great Britain.

OPERATION ON KING OF SIAM NECESSARY

BALTIMORE, May 1:—The King of Siam, if the sight of his left eye is to be saved, must undergo an operation for cataract, he was advised yesterday by his physician, Dr. William Howard Wilmer. The operation will be performed by Dr. John M. Wheeler, New York specialist.

Mayor Taylor of Vancouver Visits Canadian Capital

VANCOUVER, May 1:—Mayor Louis D. Taylor is at present in Ottawa where he is interviewing E. W. Beatty K.C. and governmental officials with respect to Vancouver railway matters including the Burrard bridge.

SENSATION IS SPRUNG

Seattle Grand Jury will Reopen Whole Savings Company Case as Result of Evidence

SEATTLE, May 1:—As a result of sensational evidence given by Adolph Linden, impeached former president of the concern, the King County Grand Jury decided to reopen the entire investigation into the affairs of the defunct Puget Sound Savings & Loan Co.

It is expected an indictment will be brought in by the Grand Jury by tomorrow night.

Properties of Vancouver Lumber Co. Bring \$1,200,000 Today

VANCOUVER, May 1:—Properties of the Vancouver Lumber Co. Ltd. of Vancouver were sold at auction today for \$1,200,000 to Robert Bone, who acted on behalf of the Montreal Trust Co. and Calvin Pentress, Chicago, trustees of first mortgage bonds.

Twenty persons were arrested at Brisbane when a crowd attempted to stage a forbidden demonstration.

In Sydney several thousand persons participated in an orderly parade through the city.

PILOT HAS COOL HEAD

Ohio Flyer Set Plane Down Safely After Engines Gave Out Yesterday

CLEVELAND, May 1:—After two of the three engines of his big passenger plane had stalled, an Ohio commercial pilot used the remaining one to good advantage and set his plane down safely with injury to no one.

Last year all three engines failed on the same pilot but he made an emergency landing safely in a backyard and no one was hurt.

SUSPICION OF MURDER

Deranged Thirty-Year Old Man Placed Under Arrest at San Diego

SAN DIEGO, May 1:—Anthony Barrett, aged 30, has been placed under arrest here on suspicion in connection with recent girl killings in this city. Believed to be in a partially deranged condition, Barrett has been mumbling about killing a girl and cutting up the body. He also says that he killed a man.

Prince Rupert Building Shows Substantial Increase So Far This Year Over 1930 Figure

If times are hard in Prince Rupert this spring, they are, at least, not reflected in lessened building activity here. To the contrary, there is a substantial increase in local building, permits taken out so far this year representing a total value of \$52,023 as against \$43,685.50 in the first four months of 1930. The increase is due to a substantial list in April, just ended, totalling \$24,755.

Last year in April the permits represented a value of \$3,250. The list for this April provides, among other minor undertakings, for one dairy, one gymnasium and four new residences in various parts of the city. The April list is as follows:

King Carol and Queen Helen Guard Their Son In His Fight For Life

Royal Mother Refuses Advice of Physicians Not to Risk Her Own Life—Father Reiterates Advice But All in Vain

BUCHAREST, Roumania, May 1:—While his estranged father and mother stared coldly at each other from opposite sides of his sick bed, Prince Michael, the boy who was King, today lay suffering with diphtheria. Serious danger of death is believed averted but anxiety must continue. Physicians warned Queen Helen that she must not endanger her own life by too constant attendance upon the patient who is nine years old. Helen looked at King Carol and answered: "What is life to me? I have only one child. I shall never have another. My place is at his side."

CHECK UP PETITION

Seattle Mayor Takes Steps to Block Recall Proceedings

SEATTLE, May 1:—Forty clerks are engaged in checking over 24,000 names appended to the petition of the Citizens' Municipal Protective League asking for the recall of Mayor Frank Edwards.

Meantime, the mayor is not idle in the fight but has instituted legal proceedings designed to block the recall move.

The line of action to be taken by Mayor Edwards will not be divulged until court proceedings are actually taken against him.

MILL WAS DESTROYED

Plant of Powell River & Lake Shingle Mills Wiped Out With Loss of \$50,000

POWELL RIVER, May 1:—The plant of the Powell River & Lake Shingle Mills and four of fire houses in which employees lived were destroyed by fire yesterday afternoon. Damage is estimated at \$50,000. One hundred men were employed in the mill.

CHICAGO MURDERS

Led United States For Number in March With Twenty Killings

WASHINGTON, May 1:—Chicago was the high city of the United States for murders in March, there having been 20 life-takings in the Windy City during that month. Philadelphia came next with 11 murders. Birmingham and Detroit had eight each and Washington and New York, seven each.

BIG SLUMP IN STOCKS

Heavy Selling Movement Forced Down Prices in New York Today

NEW YORK, May 1:—Heavy selling swept the stock market during the last hour today. Auburn tumbled \$40 from day's best price after surging up \$14. United States Steel dropped more than \$6 to a new low level since 1927 at \$113.50 and closed at \$114.25.

CURE IS QUICKER

Divorces at Reno Made Even More Convenient

RENO, May 1:—The divorce mill will henceforth turn even more quickly, quietly and smoothly. Under new state regulations, people now have to establish but six weeks' instead of three months' residence here before applying for divorce. It is also provided that there shall be no publicity for those who desire to "take the cure" quietly. Three hundred and fifty prospective divorces now in residence here are rejoicing at the new regulation.

LABOR HAS LOST SEAT

Mosely Deflection Allowed Conservative to Win Ashton Seat in By-Election

ASHTON, Under-Tyne, Lancashire, Eng., May 1:—The Conservatives regained Ashton seat from Labor in yesterday's by-election, electing Lieut. Col. J. Broadbent over J. W. Gordon, the Laborite, and Allan Young, candidate of the Moseley party.

UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE

Undoubtedly some more or less definite form of unemployment insurance must be adopted by Canada in order to meet a condition like that which existed last winter. It does not necessarily have to be along the lines of any insurance scheme already adopted. It must be such as will preserve the independence of the worker and must be effective in preventing women and children from starvation without frequent appeals to charity or to municipal or other government aid.

If Mr. Bennett can draw up a suitable measure that will be satisfactory to the workers and the employers he will be acclaimed a statesman. It is a difficult matter to deal with but must be dealt with soon by some government.

THE NATIONAL POLICY

The Edmonton Bulletin in a recent issue has the following interesting editorial article dealing with the policy of finding markets for Canadian produce:

Hon. Herbert Greenfield says the way to sell more Canadian wheat in Britain is to buy more British goods in Canada. Up until last mid-summer Canadians seemed to be pretty well agreed that international trade worked in that way. Then, seemingly, the voters of the Dominion changed their minds, in a number large enough to put the idea out of court.

The voters then elected a government pledged to shut the products of other countries out of Canada and at the same time force Canadian products into their markets. This policy the government applied last September by raising the tariff against British goods. Whatever is to be said about that action, it was thoroughly in keeping with the platform on which Mr. Bennett asked for power and was given it. No charge of inconsistency lies against the government on that account.

Mr. Greenfield evidently thinks, after four years of residence in Britain, that this is not the way to enlarge the market for Canadian products in that country. A good many Canadians, though presumably a minority of them, think the same. But that is now the policy of Canada, explicitly stated, popularly approved, and already put into effect.

Whether this new national policy is right or wrong—and by all the laws of economics and human nature it is wrong—the unwelcome fact is that if increased sale of Canadian wheat in Britain depends upon increased sale of British goods in Canada being allowed, the prospect of marketing our wheat crop in that quarter is not very good.

Along about June we shall all be able to drive across the new bridge over Galloway Rapids and then we shall be happy once more. One bridge after another is the way we drive through life.

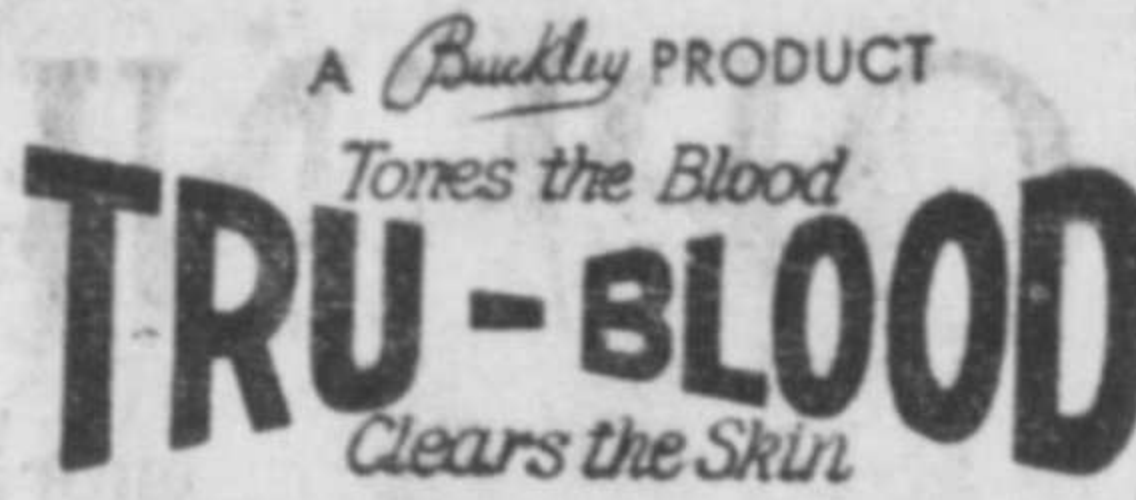

JUAREZ, Mexico, May 1.—It is announced here that the Americans are in the habit of spending some \$3,000,000 annually at this border resort while Juarez spends only about \$500,000 per year in the neighboring metropolis of El Paso.

MANY RIDE AIR LINES

Los Angeles-New York Route Was Most Popular in United States

WASHINGTON, May 1.—The Los Angeles-New York air line led all routes in the United States in March for patronage, having carried 2,353 passengers. On all air lines in the country 11,504 passengers were carried.

GRAIN SHIP IS LOADING

The Haxby arrived in port early yesterday afternoon from the Old Country.

The Haxby came here from Sunderland, England. Her master is Capt. Charles Norby.

STARVING MAY RIOT

OKLAHOMA, May 1.—Fifteen hundred destitute families near Henrietta, Oklahoma, are reported to be planning food riots unless some help is immediately forthcoming. Red Cross officials have left for the scene with a view to relieving the situation.

King of Siam Has Busy Day

WASHINGTON, May 1.—The King of Siam, here for ocular and dental treatment, had a busy day what with calling on President Hoover and having a session with his dentist.

It was the first time since the regime of Woodrow Wilson that royalty had been entertained at the White House.

April Police Court Fines Little Lower

Police court fines in Prince Rupert for the first four months of 1931 have totalled \$2,278.50 as compared with \$2,538 in the corresponding period in 1930. Fines for April this year totalled \$271 as compared with \$452 in the same month last year.

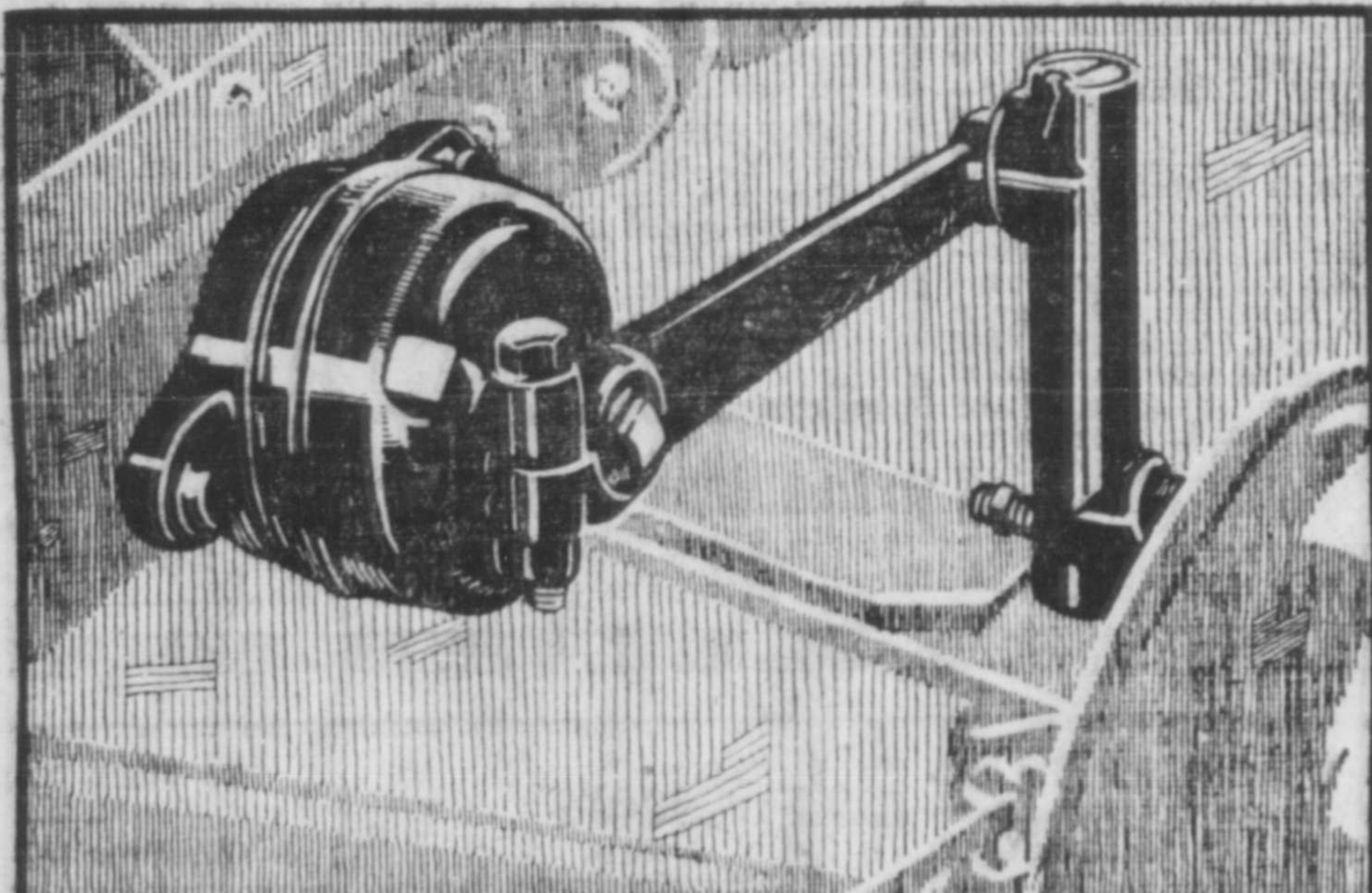

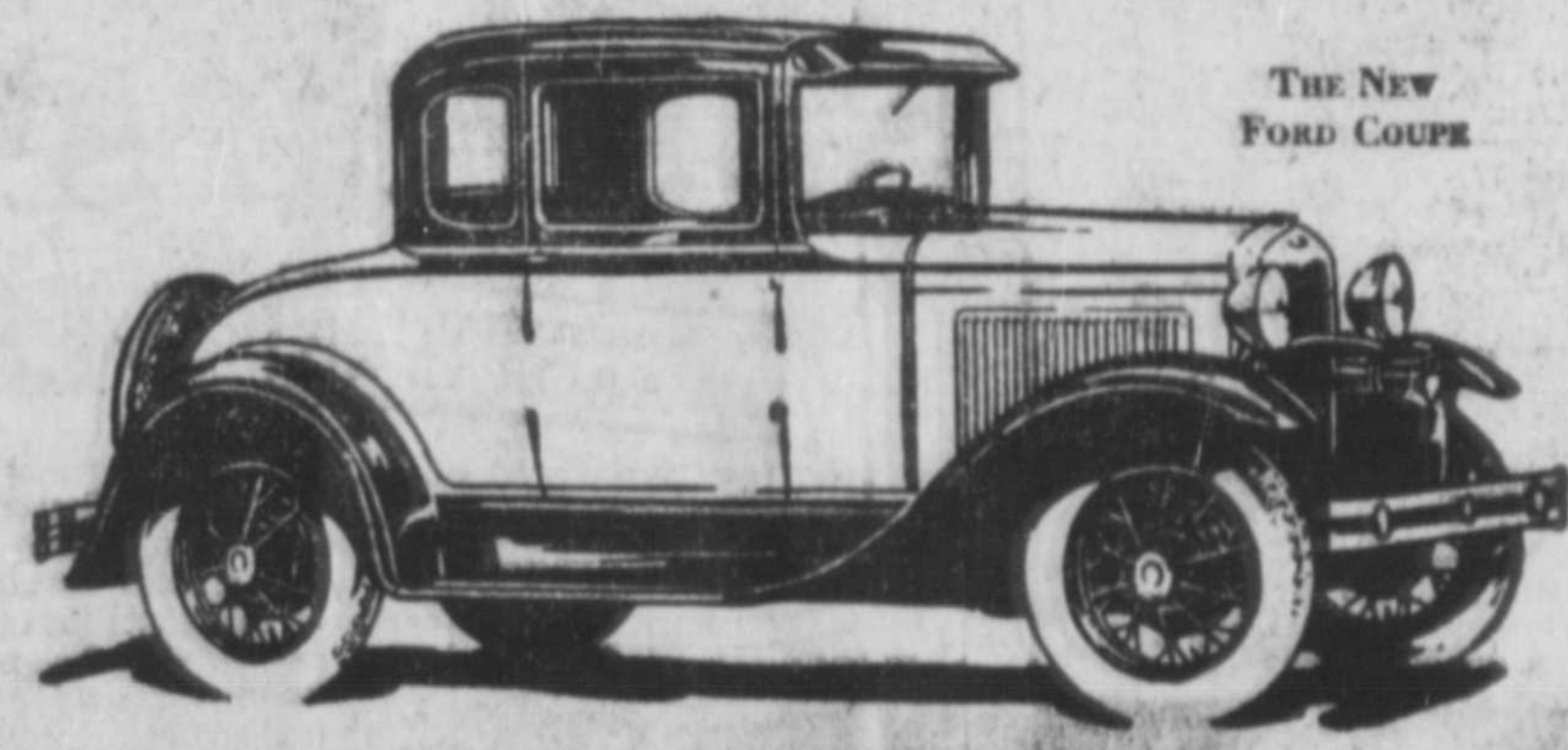

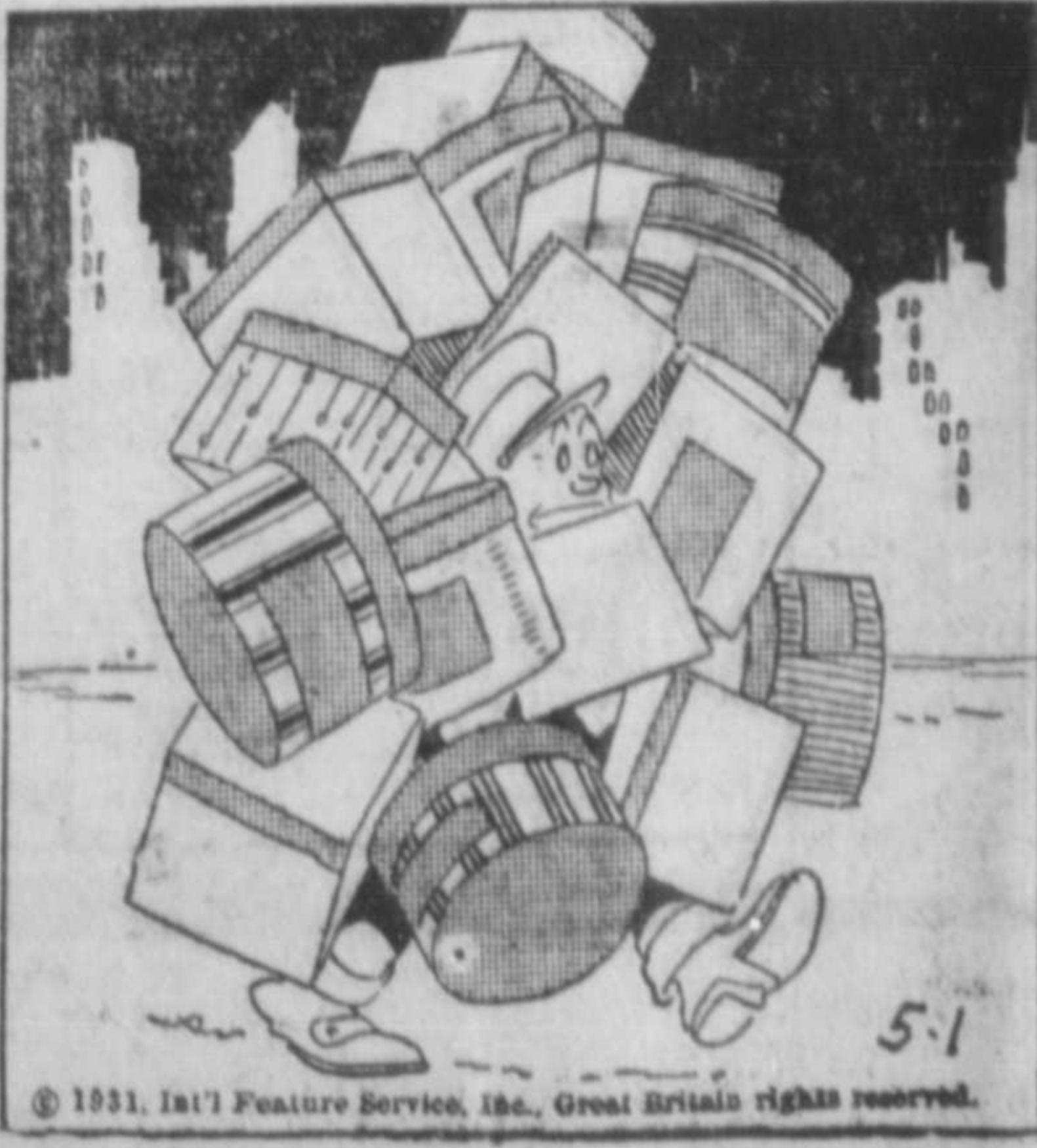

LESS SUN; MORE RAIN

Prince Rupert Weather This Year Not so Good as That Recorded During 1930

So far this year Prince Rupert has had a total of 188.4 hours of sunshine as compared with 393.7 hours in the first four months of 1930. Precipitation so far this year has totalled 40.38 inches as against 24.14 inches in the corresponding period of last year. Weather conditions have, therefore, been a good deal less desirable than in 1930. In April this year there were 13.7 inches of rain as against 5.56 inches in the same month last year. Sunshine for the month just ended totalled 96 hours as compared with 132.3 hours in April, 1930.
