An Anti-German Outbreak At Kitchener, Ontario

Alderman Forced to Kiss Union Jack and Ducked in Lake; Member of Parliament Beaten Up After Refusing to Obey War Veterans.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
KITCHENER, Ont., Dec. 2.—Mob rule prevailed here last night. Alderman Bitzer was made to kiss the Union Jack and subsequently was torn from the hands of Constable B. Levins, rushed to the lake in Victoria Park and ducked four times. The alderman was kicked around by the mob and then given his liberty.
The row started in the city council chamber following the turning down of a clause to submit a plebiscite on the question of changing the name of Kitchener back to Berlin.
Later in the evening a mob proceeded to the club and, breaking in, seized W. D. Euler, M. P., whom they took over to the G. W. V. A. rooms. They demanded that he kiss the flag and apologize to the returned soldiers. Euler refused and was severely beaten, being knocked senseless.

VILLA'S MEN KILLED ALL OF REGIMENT

Revenged Themselves for Death of Angeles at Rancho Espejo.

EL PASO, Dec. 2.—Fighting like madmen to avenge the death of Angeles, 1,000 soldiers under Francisco Villa fell upon the Eighteenth Regiment of the Federal Army, 676 men, at Rancho Espejo, 21 miles north of Santa Rosalia, and massacred all but two members of the regiment.

KING VICTOR WAS CHEERED

Socialists Refused to Join and Left the Chamber to Show Dissent.

ROME, Dec. 1.—There was a very interesting scene in Parliament today when King Victor was greeted with loud cheers from the members. There was one group however that refused to join in the applause. The Socialists left the chamber in order to mark their dissent.

COMMITTEE FOR STREET GRADING

Will Evolve General Policy for Dealing With all Streets.

The general scheme of city grading came in for some more discussion at last night's council meeting. The mayor pointed out that to go ahead with this scheme would plunge the city into debt exceeding 20 per cent of its assessment which was contrary to the rules of the Municipal Act. It was his opinion that this general scheme should be left until the lands of the government and Grand Trunk Pacific are brought under taxation.
Ald. Rochester drew attention to the fact that in big work like this it would probably be the best course to have big contracting companies, who make a business of making hard surface streets, come in and put down sample blocks at cost. It would be better to have the work done by contract. Ald. Currie was also in favor of having the work done when the time came, by tender on contract.
A motion, made by Ald. Casey and seconded by Ald. McRae, that a committee of three be appointed to examine the Municipal Act as to borrowing powers, to evolve a general policy for rough grading and suggest amendments to the Municipal Act covering the difficulty of the city financing, was carried. This report will probably be the basis of work that may be done by next year's council along these lines.

GERMANS FAIL TO SIGN TREATY

Refusal by Berlin to Ratify the Protocol Revives Armistice Status.

U. S. DELEGATION IS DELAYED IN RETURN

PARIS, Dec. 2.—The United States delegation to the Peace Conference has postponed its departure for home, the change in plans being due to the failure of the Germans to sign the protocol ratifying the Peace Treaty.
The refusal of Berlin to sign will revive the status created by the armistice of a year ago.

INTERVENTION BY VATICAN SUCCESSFUL

ROME, Dec. 2.—Through the intervention of the Vatican the Bolshevik Government of Russia has agreed to an exchange of prisoners with Poland.

COPENHAGEN, Dec. 2.—Allied warships cruising off the coast of Dalmatia on Sunday, according to despatches received here.

Stringent Restrictions On Use of Coal Become Effective in The States

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
WASHINGTON, November 2.—Wartime restrictions on the use of coal, more stringent even than those applied during the war, have been ordered into effect to stave off the fuel famine. Fuel Administrator Garfield, acting in conjunction with the railroad administration, gave notice that hereafter only essential consumers included in the first five classes of the war priority list, would be supplied and asked the help of all state and municipal authorities to make the rationing effective.
Railroad administration officials concede that the order would mean an industrial shutdown of considerable magnitude. Industrial establishments, operating from their own power plants, it was said, probably would have to shut down when their present coal supply became exhausted.

United States Government Again Takes Hand in the Coal Strike Settlement

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
WASHINGTON, December 2.—Under the permanent chairmanship of Secretary of Labor Wilson, another attempt to harmonize the relations between capital and labor began with the opening of the second industrial conference called by President Wilson. Herbert Hoover was elected permanent vice-chairman.
The conference began behind closed doors after the newspapermen present had been asked to leave.

CHICAGO, December 2.—The ranks of the miners in the central competitive field apparently remained unbroken on the thirty-first day of the strike. From other mining centres came reports of the miners leaving their posts, and only one report was received of men responding to the posting of the offer of a fourteen per cent increase.
Encouraging news came from Kansas, where production of coal by volunteer workers started under troop protection.
The operators posted notices in every state showing the increase in wages ordered by the Government, but it had no effect on the miners except at Braidwood, Ill., where eight men reported for work.

INDIANAPOLIS, Dec. 2.—The strike of bituminous miners entered the second month with all parties to the controversy apparently awaiting some Government action. At the headquarters of the United Mine Workers of America no action looking towards acceptance of the Government plan for the resumption of work in the mines.

MOUNTED POLICE REORGANIZATION

Amalgamation of Forces to Take Place in About ten Days.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
OTTAWA, Dec. 2.—Amalgamation of the Royal North West Mounted Police and the Dominion Police force under the name of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police will be completed within ten days. The Government has been induced to extend the jurisdiction to every part of Canada, and the suggestion has been made that it may assign a portion of the force to Northern Ontario.
Officials have been considering the feasibility of utilizing aircraft as an aid in patrolling the great northern hinterland. It has been suggested that lighter than air machines would be employed. Routes would be mapped out and stations established.

BUILD BRIDGE TO THE UNITED STATES

DETROIT, Dec. 2.—A movement is on foot to organize a corporation under a charter from the United States and Canadian Governments for the construction of a \$28,000,000 suspension bridge across the Detroit River connecting Detroit and Windsor.

Sir Robert Borden Again at the Helm

Premier is not Strong and it is Expected will be Given Another Position in Near Future.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
OTTAWA, December 2.—Sir Robert Borden is again at the helm but by none is it expected that he will long remain there. Far from being in robust condition, the strenuous burdens of the past five years have left a mark which neither rest nor conditions can entirely eradicate.
It is unofficially stated here that Sir Robert may be given a high position in connection with the League of Nations. Another suggestion is made that the Premier will be Canada's first representative in the Imperial cabinet in London, which next year's Imperial Conference is expected to bring into being.
Hon. Arthur Meighen is mentioned as a probable successor to Sir Robert. The matter may be settled in caucus when the House meets next February.

AMERICAN FREIGHTER STRUCK MINE OFF TERSCHELLING ISLAND

LONDON, Dec. 2.—The American freight steamship Kerwood of New York struck a mine off Terschelling Island in the North Sea and tugs are hurrying to her assistance.

MAN KILLED WHEN AUTO STRUCK STUMP

Several Sustained Injuries Just Outside Nanaimo in Accident.

NANAIMO, Dec. 2.—When an automobile crashed into a stump just outside Nanaimo, Ridley Morrison, aged 44 was killed, Chris Tobey and his wife each sustained arm and other injuries, and Wm. Moss, the fourth occupant of the car, was badly shaken up.

SIR EVELYN WOOD DEAD IN LONDON

Was Distinguished Veteran of Many Wars and Rose from the Ranks.

LONDON, Dec. 2.—Field Marshal Sir Evelyn Wood died this afternoon.
Sir Evelyn Wood was born in 1838 and began his career in the Navy at the age of 14 but joined the army three years later. In the Indian Mutiny at the age of 21 he became a brigade major and won the Victoria Cross. He gained much distinction in the Ashanti War, 1873, and gained his K. C. B. in the Zulu War. He served with distinction in the Boer War and retired from active service in 1904.
Although his age made it impossible for him to serve actively in the recent great war he was greatly interested and did much to assist at home. He wrote a history of the Indian Mutiny and was an authority on cavalry matters.

TROOPS LEAVE FIUME BOUND FOR DALMATIA

Much Activity Reported at That Port in Belgrade Despatch.

BELGRADE, Dec. 1.—Great activity prevails at Fiume. Destroyers and troops, presumably bound for Zara in Dalmatia left that port on Saturday. The military forces that have gone are reported to have been composed entirely of "shock" troops.

All Are Subject To Furious Storms.

Sometimes we think Prince Rupert has wind storms that cannot be excelled for speed, strength and purifying power. There we seem to make a mistake. They had a storm on Saturday night in Ontario that must have been worse than our little recent breeze. They have also had storms in other parts of the country that are much worse than anything we get here. The wind so mixed things up in Detroit that twenty-four hours after the event they were still unable to find out what damage had been done, owing to the wires all being tangled. If we gave as much care to our buildings in this city as they do in Detroit we should not notice a little breeze like the one that broke some windows here recently.

Government Lottery In England Improbable.

A dispatch yesterday told of an effort being made to introduce the state lottery as a means of raising money in England. While the method has been mooted doubtless in certain influential quarters, yet it will not be accepted by the people of England. They doubtless are in financial difficulties over there, but they have not yet got to the point where an orgy of gambling is necessary in order to get the coin from the people. We are told that the bankers and the churchmen are against it, and well they may be. We look to Great Britain for our lead in a good many things. Let them lead off on state lotteries and the whole Empire would soon be gambling in the same way. It would be an excuse that some have been looking for. While we realize that everything in life is more or less of a lottery, we think the sense of insecurity which goes with gambling is bad for the nation as well as for the individual.

Coal Shortage is Very Serious.

The coal shortage is very serious and if the strike in the United States continues we shall feel the pinch even in Prince Rupert. On the prairies and in Eastern Canada they are already feeling it badly and are turning to wood fuel as a temporary substitute.

In Prince Rupert, fortunately for us, we have plenty of wood, if the coal supply should fail. The mill can supply us with practically all the firewood we can take. The woods in the neighborhood also may be raided in order to keep the fires burning. It will be difficult to freeze us out but it would be very inconvenient in weather like this to have to burn green or wet wood.

Marvin E. Allen Gets Two Months For Attempted Fraud.

Marvin E. Allen pleaded guilty before Judge Young in the County Court yesterday afternoon of attempting to obtain money under false pretences. He was sentenced to two months' imprisonment dating from the time of his arrest, which time will be up on December 14, 10 days being deducted for good behavior.

Ernest Valpey also appeared before His Honor and elected for speedy trial on the charge of shooting with intent to do serious bodily injury. He was released on bail until December 8, when the trial will commence. This adjournment had to be taken as one of the chief witnesses, E. Andrews, left on the Prince Rupert Sunday night for Vancouver, before he had been served with a warrant by the provincial police. In the meantime Andrews will be summoned when he arrives in the south.

COW BAY ROADWAY IS AGAIN DEBATED

The Cow Bay roadway was again the subject of considerable discussion at the council meeting last night. A recommendation for its repair from the Board of Works was read and its adoption was moved and seconded. However, on certain responsibilities being pointed out that would result from the city doing these repairs the report was again referred to the Board of Works. The roadway is not on public property and as long as the city left it alone they would incur no responsibility. This walk was originally put in by Sol. Cameron of the Westholme Lumber Co. and was not a public thoroughfare.

The correspondence between the city and the Emmerson Mills regarding light and power concessions, which was moved to be tabled by Ald. Perry on Friday night, has been laid over for a week pending the return of Ald. Perry from the interior.

MINISTER WAS VERY ACTIVE IN OTTAWA

Hon. T. D. Pattullo Pressed on Ministers Need of Wharf Accommodation Here.

A special despatch to the Daily Province of Thursday last says: Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands for British Columbia, has completed his work in Ottawa and is leaving tonight for Victoria. He has taken up a number of questions with the departments and cabinet minister and is well satisfied with the result of his visit to Ottawa.

Mr. Pattullo has arranged for co-operation between the province and Dominion for a thorough investigation of the reclamation of 20,000 acres at the Kootenay flats. The project is one affecting both the United States and Canadian governments, and the Canadian authorities have already taken up the question of a joint investigation with Washington.

Groundhog Coal.

Mr. Pattullo urged upon the railway department the desirability of carrying on investigatory and survey work in the Groundhog district with a view to opening up the coal areas there tributary to the Grand Trunk Pacific.

He also arranged with the militia department for co-operation with the British Columbia forest department in the establishment of wireless stations for forest protection work. The minister discussed with the members of the recently formed air board plans for co-operation between the province and the Dominion to carry out aerial operations both for forest protection and survey work. The members of the Air Board were quite willing to co-operate as soon as their plans are sufficiently developed.

Prince Rupert Wharf.

Mr. Pattullo took up with the public departments the necessity of constructing better wharf accommodation at Prince Rupert to take care of the growing fishing industry, which is of national as well as provincial importance. He offered on behalf of the Government of British Columbia to provide a waterfront at Prince Rupert for this purpose if the Dominion Government would construct the wharf. This will likely be done.

He took up with the town planning and housing department the necessity of some provision being made to assist returned soldiers to purchase houses already constructed. Plans for co-operation between the publicity department of the natural resources intelligence department and British Columbia, for publicity work for the province, were completed. The natural resources branch has facilities for developing colored slides and photographs, and these will be made of projects being carried out in the province.

Mr. Pattullo discussed the question of the development of Mount Robson Park with the interior department. The Dominion is already developing Jasper Park, and if an understanding can be reached, will extend the road-building, etc., to Mount Robson Park.

BICYCLE RACE AT MADISON SQUARE

Fifteen Teams Picked from Best Riders in World are Competing.

NEW YORK, Dec. 1.—The annual six-day bicycle race begun at Madison Square Gardens is being contested over a track which measures nine laps to the mile. Fifteen teams picked from the best riders in the world, ten of whom are champions in their respective classes, makes up the field of starters.

OBJECTORS MEET IN NATIONAL ASSEMBLY

LONDON, Dec. 1.—Three hundred and seventy-two conscientious objectors delegated by one hundred branches of the non-conscription fellowship assembly are meeting in a national convention here. Many have suffered imprisonment during the war for their refusal to serve in the army.

ALICE ARM AND STEWART MINES

Major Davis and E. E. Campbell
Give Interesting Addresses on
Districts at Vancouver
Convention.

HEAVY VALUES THERE IN HIGH GRADE ORES

On Thursday last two very interesting addresses were delivered before the convention of the British Columbia Mining Institute in Vancouver. These were made by Major Angus W. Davis, superintendent of the Dolly Varden mine at Alice Arm and E. E. Campbell, mine superintendent at Anyox. Dealing with mining fields that have attracted world-wide attention during the past season and are of local interest being so close to Prince Rupert they will be of particular value to local people.

Dolly Varden.

Major Davis delivered a very informative address on the Dolly Varden Mine, the phenomenon of the Alice Arm district, the history of which has been so troubled and stormy, but which was finally placed on a firm basis as a steady shipper by the Taylor Mining Co. last August when they completed the last mile and a half of the Dolly Varden Mines Railroad. Since that time the mine had shipped 6,500 tons of high-grade ore some of it running into the thousands of dollars per ton. Operations would take place as far as possible into the winter but it was not expected that shipping could be carried on right through. In the spring a new and more extensive scale of operations would be adopted. The ore was of a richly high grade character and it was believed, of a secondary origin. Only this highest grade ore was being shipped this season, the poorer, being left until milling operations could be commenced.

Stewart District.

Voted one of the most interesting of the convention, was the paper read by E. E. Campbell, of Anyox. It was entitled "Mineral Developments in the Stewart District," and grasped the situation in that district very intelligently. The Salmon River district was receiving the most attention and publicity now because the most recent high grade discoveries had been made in that vicinity. The general structure of the mineral region was dealt with at length. Mr. Campbell, who made frequent reference to well known mineral groups which have given evidence of being very rich in high grade values. Usually the northern prospector has to deal with low grade ores, but the making of rich finds in the Stewart district has stimulated prospecting to a great extent. If a substantial tonnage can be guaranteed the district offers no hindrances to successful mine development and operation as there are no great obstacles to railroad construction and road building. The ore of the district is complex and would offer great scope to assayers and engineers in discovering processes for its smelting.

GAS EXPLOSION; TWO MEN BURNT

J. W. McDonald and W. Galbraith
Badly Injured When Shop is
Wrecked by Fire.

Two men, J. W. McDonald and W. Galbraith, were badly burned about the face and arms, when a gasoline explosion occurred in the cleaning and pressing establishment of the former at 516 Fulton Street last evening, resulting in the wrecking of the premises. McDonald had just opened his repair shop for business yesterday morning and was finishing up the day's work at 9:45 when the explosion happened. It appears that the place was badly ventilated and spontaneous combustion was caused by the heavy fumes of gasoline, probably being ignited by the heating stove. At any rate a terrific explosion was heard by neighbors half a block away and the whole front of the one-story frame building, which belonged to V. Reda, was at once in flames, the front windows being blown out by the concussion. McDonald and Galbraith escaped from the building with their clothes and hair aflame. They rushed down Fulton Street to the Norfolk Rooms, where they live, and Dr. Eggert was called to attend them. Their injuries, though very painful, are not considered very dangerous.

Quickly Vacated.
The rear of the building, which was divided into two sections, was occupied by Mr. and Mrs. E. A. Henderson and family. Mrs. Henderson was in the act of putting her two little children to bed when she heard the explosion in the front and flames gushed through the partition into the bedroom. They quickly vacated, removing their furniture, and were taken in by hospitable neighbors.

The fire alarm was rung in from the Norfolk Rooms and the department were out in quick order. While still unchecked, the blaze was quite spectacular, but was soon darkened with the force of water from No. 2 fire machine. Within 20 minutes the fire was quite out. A number of suits and all the equipment belonging to the business of one day was destroyed in the fire. The damage done to the premises of Mr. Henderson was very slight as the most of his belongings were removed. Several telephones in the vicinity of the fire were put out of commission by the melting of the cable in front of the shop.

WHO WANTS SECTION TWO WATERFRONTAGE?

Ald. McMeekin Would Like to Know Interested Party.

A letter from the secretary to the Minister of Lands was read at last night's council meeting. It was in answer to the communication sent to the minister advocating the centralizing the fishing waterfront in the vicinity of Seal Cove. It merely acknowledges the receipt of the city's letter and explained that Mr. Pattullo was not at the capital to reply.

The mayor said that he had been approached by a man acting for the fish interests at the waterfront. This man had said that the fishermen had inspected various places along the waterfront and had deemed Section 2 most suitable for fish wharves. Seal Cove was too far out of the way.

Ald. McMeekin, of the fisheries committee, explained that in making its report the committee had very little information to go on. He thought that the government might at least let the city know who had made application for waterfront at Section 2. He mentioned having seen the manager of the Atlin Fisheries, who stated it was not his company. All the committee had to work on was rumor as the interested party could not be discovered.
