Irish Home Rule to be Very Radical, Says the Daily Mail

Measure to be Delayed Until After Holidays and Original Proposals to be Considerably Altered; Details to be Given Soon.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegrams.)

LONDON, December 3.—The belief held a little while ago that the Government would before Christmas introduce a bill for the establishment of self-government in Ireland is not likely to be fulfilled, says the Daily Telegraph.

The cabinet committee appointed to deal with the draft of the new measure is still engaged upon the difficult question of finance and as the bill cannot be ready for another fortnight at least, the opinion now prevails that time will not be available for settlement of the Home Rule problem until next session.

What the Government is expected to do is to acquaint Parliament and the country with the details of the plan before prorogation. In that manner the Government will satisfy the country of their intention to deal with the matter and will put the bill on the program among the first measures to be dealt with in the session of 1920.

There is reason to believe that the Government's original Irish Home Rule proposals are undergoing considerable alterations, says the Daily Mail, particularly with reference to the proposed executive of the two provincial legislatures. It is also believed that a considerably larger measure of home rule is contemplated. "It is significant," the newspaper adds, "that a strong body of young Unionist members of Parliament are pressing the Government to adopt a very forward policy with regard to Ireland."

GERMANY WILL NOT SIGN THE PEACE PACT

Refusal of United States is Powerful Influence Against Settlement of Difficulties.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.)

PARIS, Dec. 3.—Germany has decided not to sign the protocol presented by the Allies as a condition for not putting the Peace Treaty into effect. This action of Germany is caused by a reaction following the refusal of the United States to ratify the Peace Treaty.

The German line of argument is that if United States can refuse to sign the treaty, so can she.

GOVERNMENT ACQUIRES HUDSON'S BAY LANDS

Will Use 100,000 Acres for Soldier Settlement Purposes.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.)

OTTAWA, Dec. 3.—More than 100,000 acres of Hudson's Bay Company's reserve lands in the three prairie provinces have come into the hands of the Dominion Government and the tracts are being turned over to the Soldiers' Settlement Board for the use of returned soldiers.

These lands were given by the Dominion Government to the Hudson's Bay Co. as compensation when the country was taken over from the company by Canada. The company had several sections in each township and much of the land was very good. A great deal of it had been sold for settlement.

ANOTHER MOONEY TRIAL

PRINCE ALBERT GOING ON DRYDOCK TOMORROW

Will Receive Her Annual Overhaul At Local Yards.

The Prince Albert will go on the local drydock tomorrow morning after completing the discharge of a cargo of coal there. She will receive her annual overhaul before the Prince Rupert goes in on the 27th.

Chief Engineer R. Knox, of the Prince Albert, returned to town on the Prince George this morning. He will take over his regular duties on the Albert, after having acted as chief on the Prince Rupert during the absence of Alec S. Munro in the Old Country.

LIQUOR VENDOR GOT BIG SHIPMENT TODAY

102 Cases Arrive This Morning to Fill Local Prescriptions

On this morning's boat the watchful eye of Constable Bailey spied 102 cases of first class liquor being unloaded from the steamer Prince George. This booze was not subject to seizure, however, as it was consigned to the local liquor vendor for local distribution. The difficulty in having prescriptions filled should now be removed.

TRAIN ROBBER IS CAPTURED IN STATES

Was Seriously Wounded Before Being Taken at Douglas, Wyoming.

DOUGLAS, Wyo., Dec. 3.—Wm. Carlisle, train robber, who for three weeks had dodged the secret service and private detectives, was captured at Douglas, Wyo., after he had been seriously wounded.

CANADA WILL ACT FOR GREAT BRITAIN

LONDON, Dec. 3.—The British ministry of pensions has empowered the Canadian Pensions Administration to act for it in dealing with Imperial pensions in Canada.

STRIKE IN FORCE

Magala, Dec. 3.—The strike is still in force here. All stores and factories are closed.

PIPE ORGAN IN PORT SIMPSON

Indian Congregation of Grace Methodist Church Get Instrument.

Herbert Lye, a member of the firm of Edward Lye and Sons, pipe organ manufacturers of Toronto, returned from Port Simpson on the Venture early this morning after installing a beautiful \$1500 organ at the Indian village. He will remain in Prince Rupert till Saturday night when he will return to Toronto via Vancouver and the C.P.R. This is Mr. Lye's first trip west and he is very much taken with the scenic grandeur and hospitable customs of the province.

Mr. Lye arrived at Port Simpson on November 8 with the organ for the Grace Methodist Church. It is a large instrument and was built to order for the Indians who paid the whole cost of \$1,800 which included the installation as well as the initial cost. It is of polished oak finished in a dark shade and consists of 549 pipes including 31 speaking front pipes. To complete the design there are only two dummy pipes. The pipes are finished in gold.

The Indians are very proud of the organ which is an innovation in Indian churches. The instrument is fully paid for, Mr. Lye receiving the last payment of \$300 last Thursday as the result of an auction sale held for the raising of the balance of the money due on the organ.

During his stay in Prince Rupert, Mr. Lye will tune the organ in the local Methodist church as well as giving it a complete overhaul after which it will again be in perfect condition.

NO COAL FOR CANADA YET

War Board Says That Not a Car Has Been Received in Fulfillment of Agreement.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.)

MONTREAL, Dec. 3.—Of 150 cars of coal per day which the United States Government undertook to supply Canada, beginning November 24, not one has been received.

The prospects are that only a small amount of coal, if any, will reach Canada during December, even if the strike is settled. This information is contained in a statement by the Canadian Railway War Board.

VORARLBERG WOULD JOIN SWITZERLAND

VIENNA, Dec. 3.—The Vorarlberg Diet has taken action looking toward annexation with Switzerland.

Vorarlberg is to the west of Tyrol and abuts on Lake Constance. It is a part of Austria.

BUDAPEST, Dec. 3.—Count Karolyi, former Hungarian Premier, has been barred from the national casino for having committed treasonable offenses.

CONTRARY TO PEACE TREATY

Supreme Council Addresses Note of Protest to Germany Regarding Armaments.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.)

PARIS, Dec. 3.—The Supreme Peace Council today addressed a note to Germany protesting against the increase of Germany's armaments, contrary to the Peace Treaty.

Germany has been taking advantage of the labor and other complications following the war to push forward her armaments, thinking that the homogeneity of the Allied and Associated Powers is broken and that she can, not only refuse to sign but also break the terms of the treaty.

WILHELM MAY MAKE DASH INTO GERMANY

If Attempt is Made to Take Him, It is Said He Would Try to Get Away.

AMERONGEN, Dec. 3.—It is stated here that should the Allies attempt the removal of the ex-Kaiser from Holland he will attempt a dash into Germany.

Just what would be the effect of the presence of Wilhelm in the Fatherland is not known, but it is not anticipated that any serious trouble would follow.

Coal Miners not Yet Returning to Work

Schools Close in Many Cities and Districts Owing to Fuel Shortage; Men Ordered to Return by Union Leaders.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegrams.)

CHICAGO, December 3.—The miners have voted to return to work.

So acute had become the situation caused by the strike that restrictions were clamped tighter on the consumption of coal and there was additional closing of schools and industries and reduction in the hours of business in many regions were made necessary.

Little change was reported at the mines yesterday. The strikers in Wyoming who walked out were ordered by Union officials to return to work.

The schools were closed at Cheyenne, Wyoming, and at Springfield, Indiana.

The Anaconda Mining Co. announced at Butte, Mont., that it was preparing to close the mines and smelters, which would affect about 12,000 men. Governor McKelvin of Nebraska called for volunteers to go to the coal producing states to dig the state's supply. A number volunteered.

Mining operations in the Kansas surface mines have been started and the first car of fuel shipped to Goldwater, Kansas. Others were to be distributed to places where a coal famine exists.

CHICAGO, Dec. 3.—(Noon). There is no apparent intention of the miners in the great central coal district to resume work.

LIQUOR SENT AS ROOFING

Consignments seized on Canadian National Railway Amount to \$60,000 During Month.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.)

TORONTO, Dec. 3.—Liquor to the value of \$60,000 has been seized within the last two months by the Canadian National Railway officials and the city police. Most of the shipments come in designated as "everlasting roofing material" in large metal drums with the tops cut away and the liquor packed in sawdust and plaster of Paris.

BULL FIGHTING AGAIN LEGALIZED IN MEXICO

MEXICO CITY, Dec. 3.—The Mexican Chamber of Deputies restored bull fighting throughout the Republic. The Senate votes on the question tomorrow.

NO MENTION OF TREATY IN MESSAGE

Satisfaction Expressed that President Wilson Omits all Reference to It.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—The omission of any direct reference to the Peace Treaty from President Wilson in his message to Congress meets with general satisfaction among both the Republican and Democratic Senate leaders, who are quite willing to leave the treaty in its pigeon hole until the important legislation of the session has been passed or a compromise effected.

The treaty is still a live question in the United States, however, and it may be again considered by the Senate at any time.

STERLING EXCHANGE LOW AT NEW YORK

Further Fall Against Britain in American Money Market Sets New Record.

NEW YORK, Dec. 3.—The rate for sterling exchange fell today to \$3.89 1/4, setting a new record for the depreciation of the British pound. The rates for French and German exchange also fell to new low records.

SHORTEN FRENCH TRAIN SERVICE

PARIS, Dec. 3.—The Government is considering the advisability of shortening the train service in this country as a result of the world shortage of coal. The shortage has been accentuated by the strike of coal miners in the bituminous fields of the United States.

People are Jumpy, Also Irritable.

In a recent number of an advertising journal appears an editorial article which seems to fit the case here, so we give it in full:—

"There has been a war. The effort put forth by our people has been greater than any single word can describe.

"The country has borrowed several times as much money as there is in the country. There is not an office, shop, factory or store that has not been pulled and hauled about. Men have gone from their desks and other men have taken their places. The personnel of customers has changed. Old standards are shot to pieces. Prices have gone everywhere. Costs, policies, methods have been changed and rechanged, and with all this we have bravely kept up a pretense that nothing much has really happened.

"But we are nervous. We are still worked up. The national pulse is higher. A scientist has said that the very secretions of our bodies are different, when we are at war.

"For four years the music we have heard has been war music. The talk we have heard has been war talk. The news we have read has been battle news.

"Go to the library and get a newspaper or a magazine of 1913 and try to read it and you can't. Its tempo is too slow.

"A manufacturer oversold a few months ago is piling stock today. Another who could not produce during the fighting days finds the bars down on raw materials, and he is running his factory night and day.

"Is it any wonder people are jumpy and irritable? Since the day last November when the armistice was signed, it is safe to say that more petulant letters have been written, more impatient telegrams filed, than in the entire decade from 1904 to 1914. Names for men and things are stronger and harsher. We have grown accustomed to calling men slackers, pro-German, Bolsheviks, profiteers. A cold in the head is 'influenza.' A sneeze is a crime.

"There are such things as wounds that do not bleed, scars that do not show. There are cases of fever in the trenches of business, and shell-shock where no real shells have burst.

"Let us try to calm our own nerves as much as we can and remember that the nerves of the other fellow have been against the emery wheel. Let's get back into the amiable habit of tearing up the impulsive letter and rewriting the brusque telegram. Let's call things by gentler names.

"A little less haste in our decisions, a little less of the court-martial in our judgments, a little less do-or-die, a little more do-and-live. The world has been made a safe place to live in. Let's act as if we felt safe."

Leader of Opposition Discusses Problems.

Now that W. J. Bowser has been confirmed in the position of leader of the opposition in this province, anything he says on current topics is interesting. As reported in the Vancouver World he addressed the Conservatives of New Westminster, the following being an extract from the report:

"Mr. Bowser took up the question of the new farmer government in Ontario, and denounced class governments of all kinds. He designated the farmer government as a most dangerous form of government, and said that no government that did not have a majority was any good to a country. The farmers, he said, had no more right to run the country than any other group of men. He pointed out that in Ontario the farmers were trying to combine with labor, and while labor was trying to cut down working hours, the farmers were trying to work labor from sunrise to sunset. The only safe way in which the country could be governed, Mr. Bowser thought, was to clean up the old parties. This was not a time, he declared, for group or class government. It was no time for O. B. U., federated labor, farmer or soldier parties."

DOLLY VARDEN RAILWAY DONE

Snow Stops Operations for the
Winter—Mine to Keep
Working.

ALICE ARM, Dec. 3.—Owing to the heavy falls of snow and the increased cold in the mountains, it is expected that operations on the Dolly Varden Mines Railroad will be done for the winter some time during the present week. Already some of the railroad operators have left and the remainder, with the exception of those who will watch during the winter, are preparing to leave at the end of the week. The locomotives and rolling stock will be placed in the roundhouses where they will be overhauled before the rush of spring ore hauling commences. Communication will be kept open for the distance of 17 miles between the beach and the mine by means of dog teams.
