

So far the Germans have suffered no more hardships than the winning countries. The people are just as prosperous, are as well fed, dress as well and so far have not held. Winners were Mrs. E. France has been prosperous because of the reparations money being spent there but Germany has been prosperous because she has had to pay her debt in goods and manufacturing these has made her prosperous.






