A survey was made to determine the cost and feasibility of a road extending from American Creek over the Bear River Summit, a total 2.80 distance of 14 miles.

Considerable work was carried 1.40 out under the "Mines Development 02 Act."

What I consider one of the most important projects undertaken during the season was an aerial survey to determine the feasibility of a route from Prince Rupert east, other than following the Skeena River. A series of photographs taken conclusively proved that the reports of a hidden pass were a fallacy. The next step in this direction was to make a reconnaissance survey to find out the best possible route to a point on the Skeena River as far as it was possible to go east without interference with the under investigation.






