LONDON, Oct. 28.—Not in more than one hundred years has any British government secured such an overwhelming majority as the Nationalist government will have in the new House of Commons. The government will have a majority of over four hundred. Conservatives alone, disregarding other factions of the government, have a majority of more than two hundred members over all other parties combined.
