DISORDERS ARE CONTINUING IN SPAIN

STIFF SENTENCE IMPOSED AT ASSIZES ON RAZOR WIELDER

Twenty-One Church Buildings Have Been Destroyed in New Republic Within Last Two Days

Jeering and Cheering Mobs Sweep Police, Civil and Military Guards Aside in Anti-Religious Demonstration—Remarkably Few Casualties

MADRID, May 12:—Jeering and cheering mobs, which swept police and civil guards as well as soldiers aside, attacked and burned churches and church buildings in cities of Spain today as the month-old provisional Republican government strove with all its resources to restore order.

KILLED ON C. N. TRAIN

Also Injured Three When Freight Was Derailed at Ribstone

EDMONTON, May 12:—D. Bourque, believed to be from Vancouver, was killed and three other men, who were stealing a ride on a Canadian National freight train, were severely injured Sunday night, when the train was derailed at Ribstone. Twenty cars left the rails.

FIVE KILLED IN EXPLOSION

RIVER HERBERT, N.S., May 12:—Five men were killed and eight or ten injured by an explosion in No. 2 Victoria mine here at 8:30 yesterday morning. The dead are Sam Rector, Charles Stevens, Sanford Legere, Thomas Jones and Garfield Stevens.

WAS GREAT VIOLINIST

Eugene Ysaye Passes Away in Belgium After Lengthy Illness

72 Years of Age

BRUSSELS, May 12:—Eugene Ysaye, famous violin master, died this morning at the age of 72. He had been ill for some time and death was not unexpected.

Although he made his first public appearance as a violinist at the age of seven, Eugene Ysaye as a youth did not attract much attention.

It was his good fortune, however, to have contact with some of the great masters of the latter half of the nineteenth century and from two of them he received encouragement and assistance.

There was some difference of opinion as to whether the young musician possessed extraordinary ability and talent.

The salient feature of the art of Ysaye was his originality in technique and in his conception and treatment of music.

Ysaye was born July 16, 1858, at Liege, Belgium, the inhabitants of which displayed much predilection for string music. His early lessons were given to him by his father, Nicolas Ysaye, beginning when the son was five years of age.

After three years with Henri Wieniawski the young violinist struck his first bit of good fortune when Henri Vieuxtemps heard Ysaye play one of his concertos at Antwerp. The master was so impressed with the young man's talent that he used his influence to obtain a special government subsidy that enabled Ysaye to continue his studies three more years.

Married Twice Ysaye was married twice. His first wife, Mme Louise Ysaye, died suddenly at Brussels February 13, 1924. His second wife was Miss Annette Dincin, 44 years his junior and daughter of Dr. Herman Dincin of Brooklyn. They were married July 9, 1927, at LeZoute, a Belgian seaside resort.

Miss Dincin met Ysaye in 1920 while he was conductor of the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra. After hearing her play, her aptitude for the violin was so evident to him that he invited her to become one of his pupils.

Miss Dincin continued her studies in the United States for two years and then went to Brussels to begin her instruction with Ysaye. Ysaye made his first trip to the United States in 1894. He was engaged as conductor of the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra in 1919 and remained for three years.

As a teacher Ysaye insisted that his pupils come to him fully equipped as to the technical side, as he wished to devote his time with them to interpretation. In the early days of the World War the famous violinist was among the Belgians who fled their country when it was invaded by the Germans.

Local Rains Improve Crops In Parts of Prairies; Good Soaking All Over Is Needed

WINNIPEG, May 11:—Local rains have, in many districts, improved growing conditions but, generally speaking, the whole of Western Canada is still requiring a good soaking, because, while the local heavy rains did some good, the land was so abnormally dry that the moisture only penetrated the surface an inch or two.

Practically all sections weather has been cool with frosty nights and local showers. Soil drifting has been in evidence as land is abnormally dry and some seeding of wheat was necessary. A slight decrease in wheat acreage will result as farmers contemplate assigning more land to summerfallowing. Some wheat is now showing above ground but growth is spotty and a good general rain would improve uniformity of sprouting in the later sown fields.

Along the Craik, Rosetown, Conquest, Beechy, Elrose subdivisions soil drifting is slightly prevalent on some of the heavy lands while light soils have drifted a little, but not sufficient to cause any damage. Light showers prevailed on May 7, and while there is sufficient surface moisture to germinate the grain, some rain would be welcome. Wheat seeding varies from 50% to 100% and there may be some reduction in acreage due principally to farmers.

YUKON RIVER ICE NOW MOVING OUT

DAWSON, May 12:—The ice started to move in the Yukon River here at 8:23 p.m. yesterday. Owing to the mild weather of the past winter, the ice is rather earlier than usual in moving.

Charles Olsen Sentenced to Four Years in Penitentiary For Razor Attack Last Fall

Four years imprisonment at New Westminster Penitentiary with hard labor was the sentence imposed this morning at the Supreme Court Assizes by Mr. Justice W. A. Macdonald upon Charles Olsen, who was convicted by a jury yesterday afternoon on a charge of wounding with intent to maim. In passing sentence, His Lordship castigated Olsen, referring to the seriousness of the crime and the fact that Warren Scott, his victim, would be disfigured for life.

NEW LOAN IS LAUDED

Support of Conversion Issue Urged by Premier Tolmie

TORONTO, May 12:—The following message has been received by the press publicity committee of the Dominion of Canada conversion loan from Hon. S. F. Tolmie, Premier of British Columbia: "The offer which Mr. Bennett is making to holders of early maturing Dominion bonds strongly commends itself to me. From the standpoint of the individual investor who desires safety and security, its terms are particularly attractive. From the viewpoint of the country, the successful conclusion of this operation is of the utmost importance not only in solving an important financial problem but also in that it will demonstrate to the world the faith of Canadians in their own country and its future. I am confident that the people of British Columbia will realize the soundness of the proposal from a business standpoint and be glad, as in the past, to lend a hand in the enhancement of their country's credit."

HEARING OF CIVIL CASE

Halvarson vs. Brown and White Action on at Supreme Court Assizes

The civil case in which Carl Halvarson is suing Joe Brown and William White for damages arising out of serious injuries sustained by plaintiff's son when he was allegedly run down two years ago by a taxi car owned by Brown and driven by White, opened before Mr. Justice W. A. Macdonald at the Supreme Court Assizes yesterday afternoon and is continuing today. Gordon Sloan, Vancouver barrister, is acting as counsel for plaintiff while W. E. Williams and T. W. Brown are appearing for the defendants.

Documentary evidence was tendered yesterday afternoon by Mr. Sloan and the court then proceeded to the home of Mrs. Augusta Halvarson, mother of plaintiff, who gave her evidence there, being unable because of illness, to appear at the courtroom. The court also viewed the scene of the alleged knocking down of the boy on Eighth Avenue East.

The case resumed at 10 o'clock this morning and is expected to be concluded today.

The Halvarson vs. Brown and White case is the last action of any importance on the Assize Court list. Besides it, there remain to be disposed of only two divorce petitions. This morning when A. Halvarson, father of the plaintiff, was giving evidence, an interpreter in the person of Oscar Larson had to be used.

## PLAN FOR NEW ROAD

Fair Board Has Plan For Relieving Congestion of Traffic Near Exhibition Building

The city council last night promised a delegation from the Fair Board that the assistance of the city engineer as well as a quantity of old planks in connection with a project for the building of a new road clear around the Fair Building would be forthcoming.

It was further suggested to the Fair Board delegation by Mayor C. H. Orme and some of the aldermen that there might also be forthcoming to assist in the project a limited amount of money from the provincial government unemployment relief fund.

The Fair Board delegation consisted of H. F. Glassey, George B. Casey, J. J. Gillis, W. H. Sherman jr. and N. Mussallem. The road project was outlined to the council by Mr. Casey, chairman of the sports and attractions committee, who explained that one of the principal advantages from a road circling the Exhibition Building would be to relieve congestion as seen on the present road to the building. All the delegation actually asked for was the assistance and advice of the city engineer as well as the plank.

Mayor Orme brought up the proposal that there might be some money available from the unemployment fund for the project.

## Planning and Pricing a Home

Some people who begin to think about building a home for themselves are in doubt as to what to do first. Also the question of financing it comes in. Here is the way one man did:

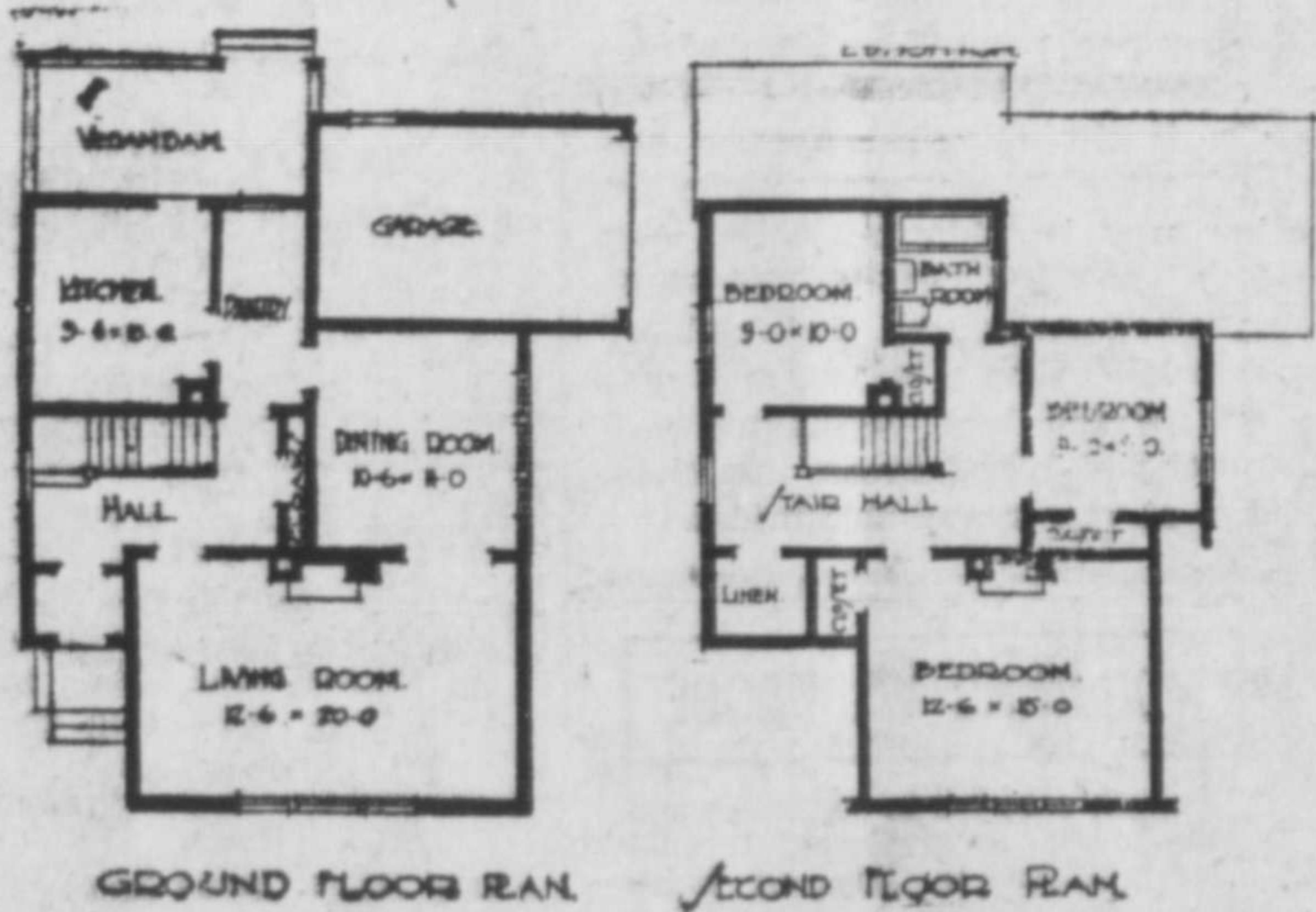
This man had rather limited finances. He wished to spend as little as possible and yet get a home that he and his wife could enjoy. He first looked about for a man to finance the job. He talked the matter over, told the man what his present financial conditions were and what were his prospects. Finally he arranged to borrow enough money to complete the building, giving a mortgage on the house and lot as security.

Then the man went to a builder of repute who also had some ability in making a sketch plan. He talked over his needs and the man drew a rough plan as they talked and by the time the interview was over there was a floor plan all ready for the superstructure. Knowing the required style, it was not difficult to fit in the remainder of the building. Specifications were drawn, a contract prepared and within a week work on the house had commenced.

That is one way. The other is to employ an architect to draw plans and specifications, invite tenders and let the contract.

The man who knows something about building sometimes prefers to employ his own carpenters, masons, bricklayers, etc., keeping track of their time and superintending the work himself. All depends upon the knowledge and ability of the man.

## SIX ROOMS AND BUILT-IN GARAGE

HERE is a true rendition of the English style in which artifice plays no part. Elaborate detail has not been indulged in, the detail work being confined to the simple brackets supporting the entrance canopy, and the graceful entrance gate which combines so harmoniously with this type of home.

As the importance of ornamentation diminishes, however, the less expensively obtained part of color and texture increases, and here this demand has been adequately met by the use of cream stucco walls, wood shingle roof, and green painted woodwork with cream window sash.

The hall, which contains a wide coat cupboard is of distinctive appearance, with a rather unusually planned stairway, under which the basement stairs are located.

Directly opposite the mullioned window in the good sized living room, is the fireplace, beside which doors glazed in small lights give access to the dining room.

Silver grey paint has been used throughout for the interior woodwork, giving the owner freedom from trouble resulting from color discord between the trim and furniture, for a neutral grey harmonizes with practically any other color.

A pantry, having a door into the main hall, is located between the kitchen and dining room. No equipment is shown in the kitchen, allowing the housewife, whose domain it is, scope to arrange this as she may, while considering, of course, the architect's advice.

Three bedrooms with clothes closets, a linen closet, and a bathroom, comprise the second floor accommodation. The front bedroom, which is the largest, contains a tiled fireplace directly above that in the living room.

Second only to electricity, the most limited supply of which prevents its use, gas is the cleanest and most convenient fuel. Here it is used in combination with a hot air furnace, and one may easily imagine the ease and rapidity with which the house may be heated.

A 40-foot by 150-foot lot provides ample space for the garden, both front and rear, shrubs, and hedges, which seem so necessary to the English style home.

The cost of this house exclusive of lot is approximately \$5,500, which low figure may be largely accounted for by the absence of expensive "frills."
