It does not always make for justice. Juries are easily influenced by sentiment. It takes a judge, who is in the habit of trying cases, to see below the surface and give judgment according to the merits of the case.

Not that a judge is always right. Judges are human, and they are sometimes carried away by their prejudices. Lawyers know what kind of treatment their clients are likely to get from certain judges, and for that-reason they secure adjournments in the hope that some other judge may take particular cases.

There is no such thing in this world as justice, but the nearest to it is trial by a judge or a group of judges.
