FURTHER MONIES TO BE VOTED LOCAL HIGHWAY WORK

Pattullo Assured That Appropriation Will Be Made For Rupert Road

Hon. R. W. Bruhn Tells Local Member That Sum Will Be Voted Also For Queen Charlotte Islands

VICTORIA, March 31:- During debate on the government's \$5,000,000 loan bill in the Legislature Monday, T. D. Pattullo, Opposition Leader, obtained assurances from the government through Hon. R. W. Bruhn, minister of public works, that, in addition to the annual district vote, there will be additional sums out of the Loan Act for work on the Prince Rupert highway and the Queen Charlotte Islands road.

Mayor's Scheme Approved By Council-Ratepayers to Co-Operate

The city council last night invited the Prince Rupert Ratepayers' Association to co-operate in a campaign designed to bring about the putting on the market by the provincial government of the old court house square. This action on the part of the council followed the reading of a letter from the Ratepayers' Association, the contents of which have already been published, in regard to the desirability of having the square placed on the mar-

Mayor Orme again mentioned his scheme for a monster petition to be signed by all citizens, public and semi-public bodies to lead in the movement. Ald. Macdonald approved of the mayor's scheme and moved that it be endorsed, the resolution being passed.



Formation of Northern B.C. Airways, Limited, a company with headquarters in Prince Rupert, was announced yesterday by Captain S. L. Punnett, general manager of the new concern, says the Victoria Colonist. The company has recently bought out the Yarrow Aircraft Corporation, Limited, of Vancouver, which controlled Dominion Airways, Limited, also of that city.

The new company, with a capitalization of \$25,000, has secured as its first president, Mayor Cyril Orme of Prince Rupert. For the present it will operate none but marine aircraft, and will immediately organize a flying school for Northern British Columbia.

In addition the company will carry prospectors into the interior. and, with the aid of a newly-purchased \$14,000 camera, will undertake aerial mapping and government survey work. If the dormer is tall and narrow, round-arched but with no angle between the side wall and the arch, it is sometimes referred to as the prairie schooner type; easily enough accounted for considering the shape of these old-time conveyances.

Sometimes the roof is brought so low on the wall that the second storey windows break the cornice line, extending upward to form small dormers. When well executed. these give great distinction.

The most glaring fault of dormers on modern Dutch Colonial houses is their large size, because of which they give the appearance of over-balancing the roof. This is particularly true where the outer wall of the dormer is merely an extension of the first storey, across which runs the line of the eaves.





of the body servants of King George had tried to explain to him some incident. The servant began, "Me and the King-" Lord Stamfordham King and I" he observed. The man looked up at him and then said, "I beg your pardon sir, I did not know you were there. However, 'you and me and the King-" Lord Stamfordham laughed and left him to tell the story in his own way. Lord Stamfordham was knighted

in 1885, commander of the Order of the Bath. His subsequent honors included C.M.G., 1887; K.C.B., 1895; K.C.M.G., 1901; G.C.V.O., 1901; I.S. O., 1903; K.C.S.I., 1906. He was sworn of the Privy Council in 1910 and created Baron Stamfordham of Stamfordham in Northumberland,

His lordship was a Grand Officer of the French Legion of Honor, and received the First Class of the Order of the Redeemer of Greece, of th Order of the Red Eagle of Prussia and of the Order of the Crown of Prussia.

He married on February 10, 1881, Constance, daughter of the late Rev. William Frederick Neville, Vicar of Butleigh, Somerset. There were one son, John Neville, killed in action in France in 1915; and two daughters, Victoria Eugenie, who married Captain Henry Adeane of the Coldstream Guards; and Margaret. Lady Stamfordham died in 1922. Although the duties of a private

secretary to the Sovereign must be highly exacting several of these august officials have come to long years. Lord Stamfordham, as will be noted, was well over 80. Lord Knollys, who for so long served King Edward, died 14 years after his royal master at the age of 87. Sir Dighton Probyn, for many years keeper of the privy purse, and finally secretary to Queen Alexandra, died at 91 years of age.

MILL RATE CONSIDERED

Levy of 521/2 Is Cited in Bylaw-Estimates Are Cut to Bone

The city council last night gave introductory readings to the rate bylaw for the year which now provides for taxation in 1931 of 521/2 mills on the dollar-81/2 mills being for general expenditures, 25 mills for schools and 19 mills for special rates and money debts.

In connection with the passing of the rate bylaw, the council resolved itself into committee for another tussle with the estimates, the idea being to pare off as much as possible. City Treasurer Matheson was present and pointed out where reductions in expenditure had aleady been effected in many cases.

Some rather drastic cutting of the proposed estimates was done in order to bring the mill rate down to a point that it was thought would be satisfactory to the ratepayers of the city. The largest cuts were in the public works department where about seven thousand dollars was shorn off, the largest amount being one providing for a new tractor to replace the one at present in use which is said to be almost out of Telephone Dep't commission. This makes the public works estimate for the year about \$17,000 less than for 1930.

In other departments the grant of \$400 to the board of trade was cut in half, relief was shorn of \$3,-00, the telephone department onsiderable sum and it was decided that the finance committee should meet the fair board Wednesday night at its meeting and see how large a reduction could be made in its grant without impairing the efficiency of the organiza-

The total cut amounts so far to about \$14,000 and would enable financing for the year with a rate of approximately 521/2 mills. A further effort will be made to get off the half mill and a careful scrutiny of the figures will be made when the revised estimates has been compiled. The rate bylaw was put through ally passed at the next meeting.

Jones reported to the city council last night that he had interviewed Shang How, Chinese, who had protested against the local improvement initiative bylaw providing for a concrete sidewalk on the north side of Second Avenue between Seventh and Eighth Streets, and had found that he (Shang How) had protested against the work under a misapprehension. In view of the fact that Shang How had not actually signed the protest personally, Mr. Jones advised the council that it would be in order to proceed now with the construction bylaw. Accordingly, this will be done.

TRUSTEES

If at any time during 1930 you acted as Trustee, Executor, Administrator, Assignee, or in any other fiduciary capacity in connection with any property, business, trust or estate, you are required by law to make a detailed return of the income earned by such property, business, trust or estate.

Penalty for failure to file this return, on Form T3, on or before March 31st next-\$10.00 for each day of default. Maximum fine \$50.00.

EMPLOYERS

If you are an employer, and during 1930 paid a wage, salary, commission or fee to one or more persons, you are required by law to furnish the names and addresses of all persons to whom you paid \$1500 or more during the calendar year 1930, or who were paid at a rate of wage or salary (including bonus) equal to \$1500 or more per annum, stating the amount paid to each person.

Penalty for failure to file this return, on Form T4, on or before March 31st next -10 per cent. of the tax payable by such employees. Maximum penalty \$50.00minimum \$2.00.

CORPORATIONS

Corporations, Joint Stock Companies and Associations, in addition to filing their returns as employers on Form T4, are also required by law to file on Form T5 a complete return of any dividends or bonuses paid or credited to shareholders during the calendar year 1930. Any responsible officer of a Corporation may sign these returns.

Penalty for failure to file this return on or before March 31st next -\$10.00 for each day of default. Maximum fine \$50.00.
