## Million Workers Idle in U.S. States are Taking Over Mines

Many Men Express Wish to Return to Work; Some of Mines Worked by Volunteer Help; No Increase in Price of Coal Allowed.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

WASHINGTON, December 6.—More than one million workers are now completely idle or employed part time as a result of the coal shortage. The estimate was considered extremely conservative by G. D. A. Morrow, vice-chairman of the National Coal Association.

The wage loss is estimated at more than \$2,000,000 and to employers and businessmen it is beyond all estimate. Chicago, which yesterday went on a six and a half hour business day, is hardest hit. More than 400,000 there are affected.

DETROIT, Dec. 6.—Fourteen passenger trains on the Grand Trunk system in Michigan will be suspended Monday or Tuesday.

### Take Over Mines.

BISMARCK, N. D., Dec. 6.—Power to take over and operate coal mines or any other utility in any emergency when necessary for the protection of life and property is vested in the governor of North Dakota in a bill passed by the House at a special session of the North Dakota Legislature. The measure had already been passed by the Senate.

JEFFERSON CITY, Dec. 6.—The coal mines of Missouri have been taken under control by the state, under a proclamation issued by Governor Gardner.

PITTSBURG, Kansas, Dec. 6.—Football rivalry and football energy have been turned to account in the mines here, Kansas University athletes are vying with each other in efforts to show up their pals working in other pits. Nine mines all manned by volunteers are in operation today.

DES MOINES, Dec. 6.—State Fuel Administrator Charles Webster today issued an order placing business on a six-hour day basis.

### Would Go Back to Work.

CHICAGO, Dec. 6.—Reports from Pittsburg, Pa., district indicated that many miners had expressed to their employers a desire to resume work. Word was received from Richard J. Hopkins, attorney-general of Kansas, that he believed the coal diggers of that state would break away from the leadership of President Howatt of District 14 of the Mine Workers.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6.—Not one cent can be added to the price of coal to finance any increase in wages to the miners, Fuel Administrator Garfield declared today.

FREDERICKTON, N. B., Dec. 6.—The Minto coal miners voted last night to go on strike.

## NO LOANS FOR BRITAIN UNDER EXCHANGE RATE

Government of That Country not Displeased at Embargo as it Encourages Home Manufacture.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

OTTAWA, Dec. 6.—It is not outside the bounds of possibility that the Dominion Government will refuse to extend any more credits to the British Government unless some thing is done to rectify the exchange situation.

Lloyd Harris and various members of the Government, when questioned as to the effect of Canada's prospects for foreign trade, admitted that the exchange rate would have a most serious effect unless the drop was only a temporary one.

There is suspicion expressed by officials that the British Government is not greatly displeased with the prospect as the exchange embargo discourages import of manufactured luxuries and will give an impetus to manufactures.

## VANCOUVER MEN MEET MINISTER

Make Recommendations to Hon. C. C. Ballantyne Regarding Harbor Improvements.

OTTAWA, Dec. 6.—A number of recommendations for the improvement of Vancouver Harbor were made by the Board of Harbor Commissioners at an interview with Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, Minister of Marine. They include the construction of a moored pier, the construction of a North Vancouver wharf with Vancouver, and the construction of a terminal railway system.

The suggested improvements would cost several millions.

## FISH RETURNS FOR NOVEMBER

Nearly Million Pounds Landed Here During Last Month.

CONSIDERABLE INCREASE OVER MONTH LAST YEAR

The report of the Fisheries Inspector's office here giving the amount of fish landed at this port during the month of November has just been given out. The halibut landed this November shows an increase of over 200,000 lbs. over that landed in November last year. Weather, however, worked against fishing during the past month on account of the many storms prevailing. The total amount of halibut landed here during November was 880,400 lbs. as compared with 653,500 pounds for last year.

Following are the figures showing the quantity of each kind of fish landed here during November: Halibut (Canadian Bottoms) 146,200 lbs. Halibut (American bottoms) 854,300 lbs. Salmon 1,300 lbs. Red Cod 300 lbs. Ling Cod 200 lbs. Black Cod (Canadian bottoms) 2,200 lbs. Black Cod (American bottoms) 134,900 lbs. Plaice 900 lbs. Soles 1,800 lbs.

## Self Government Is Given to India

Third Reading of Bill is First Step in New Era for That Country, Says Edwin S. Montague.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, December 6.—The House of Commons passed the third reading of the India Bill giving India a measure of self government. William Anderson, laborite, and Sir Donald MacLean, Liberal, while complimenting the government on what they declared was a long step forward, expressed regret that self-government in a larger measure had not been given to India.

Edwin S. Montague, Liberal sponsor of the bill, said the proudest moment of his life had arrived. The passage of the bill he declared ended the old era and started a new one.

## Social Welfare Commission Is To Inquire Into Health Insurance and Pensions

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

VICTORIA, December 6.—While the people of the province will have ample opportunity of posting themselves upon the various subjects into which the newly appointed social welfare commission will inquire, the more general phases of its investigation are explained in a memoranda now issued by the Hon. J. D. MacLean, Minister of Education and Provincial Secretary, whose department assumes immediate jurisdiction. As already announced in the press of the province, the scope of the inquiry will include state health insurance, mothers' and widows' pensions, and public health nursing.

### State Health Insurance.

The present Workmen's Compensation Act is a species of state health insurance itself inasmuch as it provides for surgical and hospital treatment in all cases of accident. The act, therefore, creates a basis from which the larger provision might be made. That is to say, its machinery would lend itself to meet the cost of treatment of medical ailments, not only of the workman, but also of his family. Under such a plan, in the event of its feasibility being established, both the family and the workman would be given the choice of a medical practitioner whose fees would be fixed by an administrative board in consultation with doctors, nurses and hospitals.

## Allies Preparing To Invade Germany

Ultimatum sent That Country Saying Failure to sign Protocol will Oblige Recourse to Military Measures.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

PARIS, Dec. 6.—The Allies today prepared to start a new triple invasion of Germany if she refuses to sign the protocol to the Peace Treaty. The press and the public are alike confident that a virtual ultimatum will be despatched to the German Government within 48 hours. Preparations for a decisive military blow are already under way.

Under the armistice the Allies can denounce that agreement under three days' notice, re-establishing a state of war.

Following conferences between Field Marshal Wilson of Great Britain and Marshal Foch of France, military plans to enforce the terms of the armistice have been completed.

LONDON, Dec. 6.—Field Marshal Wilson in his conference with Marshal Foch yesterday offered the co-operation of the British fleet if armed force is necessary to compel Germany to accept the protocol, an Exchange Telegraph despatch from Paris said.

PARIS, Dec. 6.—A note delivered by the Supreme Council today demands that Germany sign the protocol for carrying out the peace terms at once. Failure to do so will oblige the Allies to have recourse to military measures.

## MANY PEOPLE ENTER CANADA

Quarantine Returns at Quebec Show 141,128 Passed There.

QUEBEC, Dec. 5.—A total of 141,128 persons coming into Canada passed the quarantine station at Grosse Isle near Quebec Harbor in the present season of navigation. During the preceding year the number entering was 101,052. The ocean vessels examined at quarantine during 1919 numbered 363 and of these 80 were passenger steamers.

## JOHN KENT PASSES AWAY AT HOSPITAL

Came From Swanson Bay Saturday and Died Last Night.

John Kent, who was brought here from Swanson Bay on Saturday morning, passed away at the General Hospital last night. He had been ill for some time and finally it became necessary to bring him to the city for treatment.

The deceased was a native of Savil Firth, Scotland, where his aged mother now resides. More recently he lived at Brandon, Man. It is believed he has no relatives in this country. He was 49 years of age.

The funeral arrangements are in charge of the B. C. Undertakers and interment will take place on Monday.

## GERMANS JOIN AIR SERVICE OF MEXICO

Number of Machines Located Along United States Boundary.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6.—Mexico has 24 war type airplanes mobilized at Chihuahua City alone and is obtaining additional planes from Germany, according to war department information given to the House military committee by Brig. Gen. Mitchell, chief of operations of the air service.

The department also has information, General Mitchell said, that former pilots in the German army are arriving in Mexico for service in the Mexican army air forces there.

## MCCAFFERY IS ON THE JOB

Wires From Ottawa Conference With Minister Arranged for Fifteenth.

M. P. McCaffery, president of the Board of Trade, is on the job at Ottawa. He wires today that he has arranged with C. C. Ballantyne for a conference on the fisheries question on December 15 and asking for co-operation.

Col. Peck will leave for Ottawa on Monday, in all probability. It is possible that Mayor McClymont may accompany him.

## LINNELL TRANSFERRED TO PLYMOUTH, ENGLAND

Former Vice Consul Here Gets Diplomatic Appointment in England.

Word has been received in the city that Irving N. Linnell, American vice-consul at Vancouver, is to be transferred to Plymouth, England. Mr. Linnell was formerly consul here, having begun his diplomatic service at this place.

## Street Paving Report of Board of Trade Advocates Permanent Work at Once

**Either Asphalt or Concrete 24 ft. wide Along Centre of All Thoroughfare in Business Section Recommended**

"The pressing need of improving the streets in the business section of the city must be evident to all. It may be true that previously it would have been unwise to lay permanent pavement on account of the danger of settlement at fills, but we believe that danger to be past." This is the opening paragraph of the preamble to the report of the special committee appointed by the president of the Board of Trade to consider the matter of street improvements. The report continues:

"The present condition of these streets is not only a disgrace to the city, creating a bad impression in the minds of every visitor, but also affects directly each and every resident, no matter in what part of the city he may reside, or whether or not he may be the owner of a vehicle."

The committee outlines reasons why the paving should be laid and says: "It is a well established fact that a system of clean, well paved streets is practically the most valuable asset a city may have."

**Bituminous Macadam.**

The committee recommends the pavement of a permanent roadway 24 ft. wide down the centre of each street in the business section, the part between the permanent pavement and the curb to be covered with waterbound macadam. "This would leave the present sewers at one side, as they are well out toward the curbs and would allow using the old trenches, which in many cases were excavated from the solid rock, for new sewer construction." The pavement would only cross sewers at street connections. After describing the requirements of a good pavement the report continues:

"We are of opinion that bituminous macadam should be used in Prince Rupert, provided that expert opinion does not tell us that our somewhat moist climate will interfere too much with the laying of this class of pavement, which requires that the asphalt must be put in during dry weather."

**Second Choice.**

As the next choice the committee recommends the use of concrete which is coming more and more into use throughout the country and which is the cheapest of all pavements to lay and maintain, taking into consideration the first cost, sinking fund and annual repairs. When the surface of this pavement wears out the base may be used as a foundation for asphalt, or brick. The report suggests that an effort may be made to secure trap rock from Cedarvale, which it says is better than granite. The streets suggested for improvement are Second and Third Avenues from McBride to Park Avenue, and parts of McBride, Second, Fulton and 6th Streets, and Manson Way, the whole comprising approximately 10,000 feet of pavement. This amount the report estimates could be laid for \$65,000 and the water macadam at the sides for \$35,000, exclusive of sub-grading. It is believed that about \$25,000 would complete the sub-grading.

**Distribution of Payments.**

The suggestion is made that the property abutting on the improved streets pay 50 per cent of the cost, and the whole city be charged with the remainder. As the estimated cost of keeping up the present condition is \$3,500, the cost of retiring the bonds would not be great. It is also pointed out that the G. T. P. property valued at \$3,500,000 becomes assessable in 1921 which at the present rate of taxation would increase the annual revenue \$50,000.

The report was signed by J. H. Pillsbury, S. P. McMordie, and J. B. Roerig.

At the meeting of the Board of Trade last night a letter from the department of information at Ottawa regarding co-operation for publicity purposes was read and information in regard to the district ordered to be sent. The secretary reported that letters asking for literature on the district were received on every mail.

The Board of Trade at its meeting last night decided to co-operate with the Stewart Citizens' Association in regard to securing a weekly mail service to that town. The matter will be taken up with the post office department by the Trade and Commerce Committee with J. F. Maguire added.

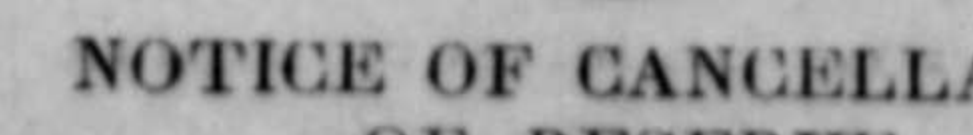

## TUESDAY'S BLAZE AT HAZELTON SPECTACULAR

Two Chinese Restaurants, Tailor Shop and Several Empty Stores, \$50,000 Value, Destroyed.

Arrivals from Hazelton on last night's train who witnessed the big fire there on Tuesday morning say that it was the most spectacular blaze ever seen there. With the thermometer 25 below zero, fire fighting with water was practically useless so the fire had to practically burn itself out and all efforts were used to keep it confined to the block of buildings, belonging to C. V. Smith, which it destroyed. Chemical extinguishers were used with little success.

Two Chinese restaurants were destroyed in the blaze and also a tailor shop. There were also a number of old tumble-down unoccupied store buildings which were burnt. The front of a full block was burnt to the ground. The property loss is estimated at \$50,000.

## THE MARQUIS OF QUEENSBURY RULES GOING TO DISCARD

NEW YORK, Dec. 5.—There was a meeting in London, according to private advices, of leading representatives of the United States and European boxing clubs to consider a new set of ring regulations to supersede the Marquis of Queensbury's rules which for decades have governed all bouts in all parts of the world.

Leaving for Victoria Tomorrow Night to Represent This District.

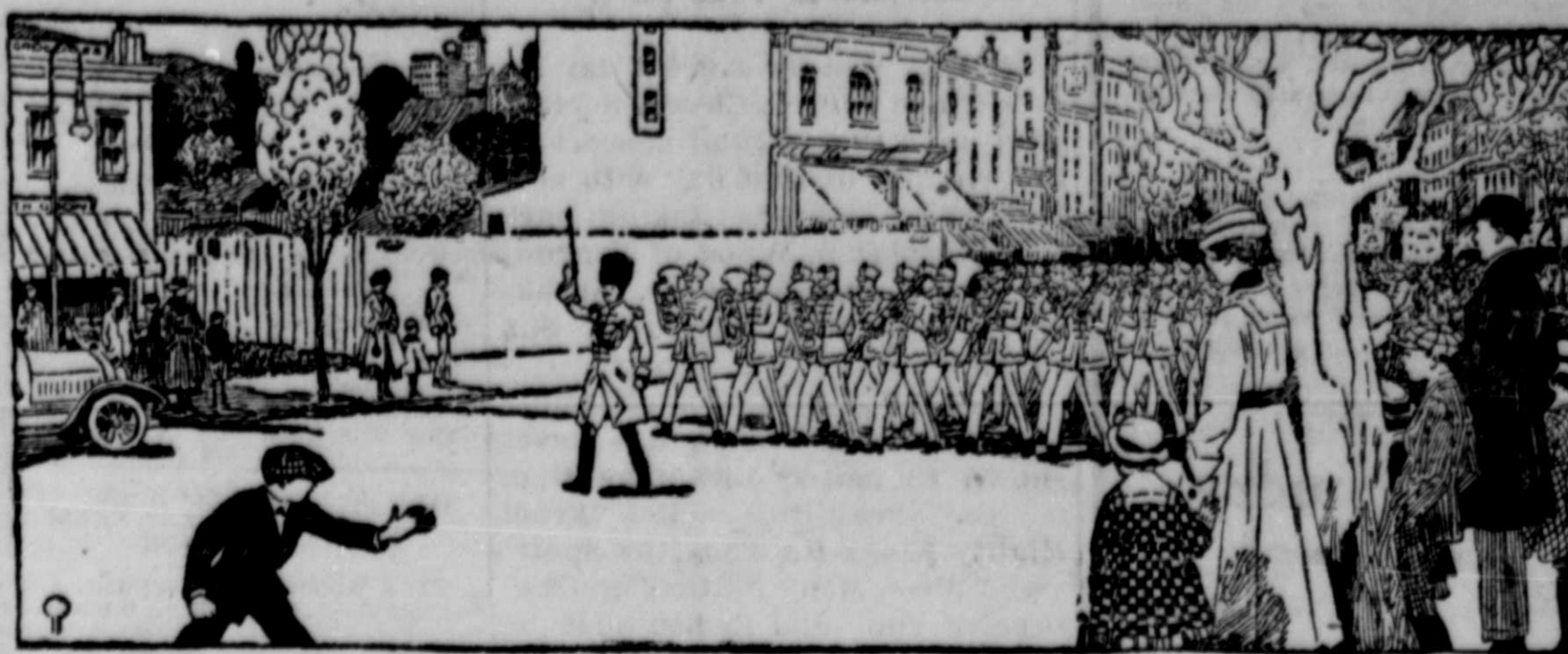

### In the Letter Box

#### SALMON FISHERIES

To the Editor:

In your paper lately has been several items in regard to the salmon fishing industry of this district. As a salmon fisherman I would like to advance by humble ideas on the same subject.

As I have been making my living for several years at the salmon fishing, and would like still to do so, and also see others continue in this business, if the salmon are not exterminated. I consider it about time we were making a change in the laws and thus protect so great and important an industry.

In the first place, as everyone knows, the cannery interests control the salmon industry, through their holding concessions to all the important fishing streams. Of course the government could at any time take their rights away from them, and for that reason the cannerymen do nothing to develop or preserve their fish, in the way of destroying the natural enemies of the salmon, cleaning out the rivers and seeing that there are enough salmon allowed to go up the different streams to perpetuate the species. In other words "The cannery men are getting theirs" while the getting is good.

#### Open to All.

There is a movement on now to throw the fishing rights open to everyone. That looks very democratic on the face of it, but we see what has happened on the American side where they have free competition, the Sound is almost fished out and so are parts of Alaska. The American boats were even coming down here and fishing off shore last summer and raiding some of the outside streams.

Thus you see what would likely happen to our fishing if we had the same system for a time. I like competition and would like this system if I thought the fish would not become exterminated.

Now why could not the government monopolize the salmon industry and develop it as I know it could be developed into a big paying proposition for all the people. The country has big debts to pay and why could not a big industry that is liable to be exterminated if left to private enterprise be used to help pay them.

## WHAT ABOUT GAS BOATS ON SKEENA RIVER?

Board of Trade to Hold Special  
Meeting to Discuss  
Matter.

At the Board of Trade meeting last night it was decided to call a special meeting of the Board for Friday next to discuss the use of gas boats on the Skeena River. At this meeting J. W. Nicholl will move a resolution expressing the opinion of the Board that there should be no change from the present system. G. W. Nickerson will oppose the resolution and it is expected that other Board of Trade members will join him in his fight for modern conditions.

The matter was introduced last night when Mr. Nicholl took exception to the Board requesting Col. Peck to secure the use of gas boats on the river. He said that the fishermen did not want the change and they were the ones who should be considered.

**Not Reasonable.**  
Mr. Nickerson claimed that most of the fishermen were Japanese and that it was because gas boats were not used that white fishermen did not take up the work. It was as reasonable to oppose the use of gas boats on the river as it was to oppose the spinning wheel or the use of automobiles.

O. H. Nelson suggested that it would not be obligatory to use gas boats on the river. The use of gas boats for trolling has taken the best of the white fishermen from the gill net fishing.

As there was no resolution before the board regarding the matter it was decided to call a special meeting to discuss the subject.

## GOOD PROGRESS WITH THE NEW GYMNASIUM

Dressing Room Should be Completed Before Christmas.

Good progress is being made on the new dressing rooms and other improvements to the Agricultural Hall on Acropolis Hill. The room is being lined out and Nelson & Currie, the contractors, expect to have everything completed before the holidays.

There are two rooms and one of them will be divided up somewhat by the lockers. They are lighted by large windows and have a very nice appearance.

If the heating plant can be installed in time the place should be ready for general use early in the new year.

one of co-operation and the pooling of monies with which the cost of material, nursing and hospital attention would be met. It is believed, too, that in operation there would be created a community sentiment bent upon its own self-preservation. For instance, there would be a direct incentive to be more careful in matters of sanitation because of the knowledge that upon the amount of sickness prevalent the cost to contributors would depend.

To the medical profession it is expected to appeal by reason of the automatic removal of bad debts. Popularly termed "good pay" for some patient well provided with this world's goods would not be made to pay for "bad pay" patients who usually omit payment altogether.

**Mothers' and Widows' Pensions.**  
It is realized that lack of provision for the mother or the widow with a family to support fastens an obligation on all governments. Unless the natural association of mother and child can be safeguarded the state runs the risk of reducing the value of the citizen of tomorrow. Take, for instance, the case of the mother with three children and the breadwinner incapable of earning a livelihood. She is obliged to eke out a miserable existence for herself and her family by her own labor, place her children in "homes" at a cost to the state, or otherwise add to honest wages such revenue as may be derived from questionable pursuits. In the absence of federal legislation, therefore, the Government of this province contends that it cannot afford to neglect either from a

**Public Health Nursing.**  
A system of public health nursing would contemplate the stationing of a nurse at strategic points whose duty it would be to carry out emergency work, sanitary work, school inspection and generally to act as an educational medium for the furtherance of health and child welfare work.

While it must be understood that these matters are to form the subject of careful survey on the part of the Commission the foregoing explanation will serve to post the general public upon the general principles of such eventuating policy as may follow the commission's declaration of the feasibility of a part or whole of the triple proposal.
