

British Columbia Gets First Pinch From U.S. Coal Strike

Drastic Action Taken Throughout the United States in Cancelling Trains and Reducing Consumption of Power and Light in Big Cities.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

NELSON, B. C., December 9.—Under orders from the United States Railway Administration the Great Northern will discontinue its daily passenger service between Nelson and Marcus, Wash., and will substitute a mixed train service, which, however, will not give connections with Spokane.

The Board of Trade has wired the Dominion Railway Commission and Great Northern officials demanding a continuance of the present service. While the change is ostensibly based on the coal shortage in the United States, Great Northern locomotives on this line coal here.

Garfield Gets Busy.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9.—Drastic nation-wide restrictions in lighting and heating, similar to those in effect during the coal shortage of 1917 and 1918 were ordered by Fuel Administrator Garfield, the limit to be made effective immediately.

All street lighting, other than that necessary for the safety of the public in stores, office buildings and industrial plants, with few exceptions, are put on reduced rations as to both lighting and heating. All manufacturing plants, except those engaged in making necessary products, shall reduce operations not to exceed three days in each week. Electric railways are required to reduce their schedules to minimum requirements and no heat shall be provided in electric cars during rush hours.

Trains are Cancelled.

CHICAGO, Dec. 9.—Hundreds of passenger trains have been withdrawn from service on the railroads of the country, mostly in the middle west, south and southwest in accordance with instructions issued by the Railroad Administration. Hundreds of other trains have been ordered cancelled on Wednesday, chiefly in the east as a result of the coal miners' strike. In New England alone orders have been issued cancelling 300 trains on Wednesday and dozens are to be discontinued in Pennsylvania.

The reduction of the passenger service in the United States since the strike began on November 1 amounts approximately to one-third of the total.

NEW CONTROL OF RAILWAYS IN ENGLAND

Four Representatives of Workers on Board of Management From January 1.

LONDON, Dec. 9.—Sir Eric Geddes, minister of transportation, announced here yesterday that a new railway control board would assume office on January 1. The new board will consist of the executive committee of twelve general managers of the roads and four representatives of the workers.

It is not expected that the motion will carry, as important resolutions of that kind on matters of international policy usually are introduced by the Government. If this were carried it would be looked on as a vote of censure on the Government.

Lloyd George Says That Government is Redeeming Pledges Regarding Russia

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, Dec. 9.—The Trade Union Congress, originally called to deal with the question of nationalization of the mines, will discuss labor questions generally. In view of this conference, the deputation of the parliamentary committee of Congress had an interview with Premier Lloyd George yesterday to ascertain the Government's attitude on various matters likely to come up, especially conscription, intervention in Russia and cessation of the unemployment dole.

The Premier made a reassuring reply. According to unofficial reports he asserted that the Government was redeeming its pledges regarding Russia and declared that he was as anxious as anyone to see the last of warlike methods employed against any nation, but unfortunately other people outside this country held opinions and directed policies which necessitated England's being prepared.

Open Fishing and Salmon Protection

Col. C. W. Peck Explains in Detail his Views and Asks for Unity of Action in Matter.

Before leaving for Ottawa, Lieut.-Col. Peck, the member for this district, sent the following letter to the News for publication:

To the Editor:—

"I would like to utilize some of your valuable space to explain my views on the fishery question.

"I am out to try and break the salmon cannery monopoly. As everyone knows the cannery owners have got a strangle-hold on the salmon fisheries of northern B. C. (No. 2 District).

"None of our citizens may engage in a cannery enterprise; only a limited number can engage in gill-net fishing, and nearly the whole of the district is blanketed by seine licenses held by cannery interests.

"Practically all supplies are brought here from Vancouver as well as the cannery crews, so notwithstanding the fact that this district has about two-thirds of the salmon fisheries of B. C., they might as well be in Timbuctoo as far as the residents of this north country deriving any benefit from them.

"All monopolies are immoral and unjustifiable and invariably militate against the free rights of the community.

The Proposals.

"I make the following proposals in regard to open fishing:—

(a) The right to build and operate a salmon cannery should be granted to all white British subjects.

(b) Gill net licenses should be granted to all white British subjects, but a provision made for gradually eliminating Oriental fishermen.

(c) Purse seine licenses should be granted to all white British subjects, to fish in any waters except those exclusive to other modes of fishing, or at least the purse seine areas should be greatly extended.

(d) Drag seines should be abolished except where no other mode of fishing can be utilized, or where canneries entirely depend on them for their supply.

This is Second Time he Has Been Convicted on Liquor Charge.

Mah Sang Sing, of the West End Rooms, was fined seventy-five dollars in the police court this morning for supplying liquor to Indians. This is the same Chinaman who was fined fifty dollars some weeks ago for having liquor in his possession and was caught coming off the Anyox steamer.

He had supplied liquor to an Indian, Jacob Shaw, who appeared as a witness against him. Jacob swore positively that he had obtained the liquor, which was a combination of wood alcohol and lemon extract, from Mah Sang Sing in the rooming house. Other conclusive evidence was given against accused.

TRADES UNION ACTION ON THE ENGLISH MINES

They Decide to Move Constitutionally in February if Government Refuses to do Anything.

LONDON, Dec. 9.—Postponement of action with reference to nationalization of the mines was decided on by the Trades Union Congress. The warning was given that if the Government took no action towards nationalization, constitutional action would be taken by the miners labor organizations after next February.

LLOYD GEORGE AND COALITION ARE CRITICIZED

Westminster Gazette says Continuation of Present Government Makes Home Rule in Ireland Possible.

LONDON, Dec. 9.—The Independent Liberal press naturally criticizes at length Lloyd George's speech at Manchester in which he advocates continuation of the coalition government. The Guardian readily admits that the case for a coalition government has force for it carried the franchise education and semi-socialist legislation more easily, swiftly and probably more completely. On the other hand the coalition was called into being to give peace and it has given Budapest and has grossly mismanaged affairs.

The Westminster Gazette regards the speech as the Premier's most prolonged attempted so far to soften outside Liberal opinion, and says the weakest point is the Premier's assertion that the coalition makes possible the solution of the Irish problem by the introduction of Home Rule.

CAN CITY BREAK MILL CONTRACT

This is Question City Council Discussed at Meeting Last Night.

The power clause to the Emerson mill contract with the city came in for considerable discussion at the council meeting last night. Ald. Perry had asked that the correspondence on the matter be tabled for the information of the council. It is suggested that the contract has been broken with the transferring of the privilege to another company than the original one.

The contract was an extremely bad one, said Ald. McKee, and the city not only receives nothing for its power but also loses hundreds of dollars a year cash on interest and redemption. The plant uses half of the power produced by the city and only \$2,000 is paid for it.

Ald. McKee felt that even if the company had broken its contract, still the city was in duty bound to stand by its end. Ald. Perry and Ald. Casey felt that if there was a way out, the city should break the contract. Ald. Casey drew attention to the fact that when E. F. Doby had first asked for the power concession he had stated solemnly that no Asiatics would be employed. This had not been lived up to. Acting Mayor Rochester felt that if the contract had been abrogated the city had the right to break it.

Legal advice is to be obtained as to what procedure is open for the city to take.

TAKING ORE FROM THE LA ROSE MINE

Miles Donald, of Alice Arm, leaves tonight for Trail where he is taking 20 tons of high-grade silver ore from the La Rose mine for smelting. This ore was mined during the past season and was packed by horse down the side of McGraw mountain to the Dolly Varden Railway about six and one half miles from the dock. It is expected that the ore will run between \$400 and \$500 per ton.

FIUME, December 8.—Gabriele D'Annunzio plans to visit America after the Fiume situation has been adjusted. He will make the trip by aeroplane by way of Japan.

A report was received from the utilities committee recommending that the company pay the cost of labor, \$125, while the city pay for material, \$140. This report was adopted by the council.



OPEN FISHING AND SALMON PROTECTION

(Continued from Page One.)

The unscrupulous use of drag seines is destroying a great many creeks very rapidly.

(e) The price of cannery and all fishing licenses should be greatly reduced.

(f) The close season should be extended, beginning with an increase of 12 hours the coming season.

(g) Returned soldiers should be given preference in all cases.

(h) Legislation should be introduced enacting drastic penalties where licensees are fishing out streams, and these licenses should be taken away.

(i) The patrol system should be multiplied, and an elaborate program for the preservation of our spawning grounds introduced.

"Of course, I should have mentioned first that No. 2 District should be separated from the others, with a resident inspector who lives here all the time.

"Let us examine some of the reasons that are advanced against throwing the fisheries open.

Open Fisheries.

"One, is that it is impossible to protect and conserve the fisheries. We have cited to us the case of the Fraser River where the fishery is nearly extinct, but no honest man will blame that on to gill net fishing. It was the traps on Puget Sound and the avarice of American cannerymen there that destroyed the Fraser River fisheries.

"We are also cited the Alaska fisheries which show signs of depletion. That is being caused by the greedy shortsightedness of Alaskan cannerymen in fishing out streams—the same as I happen to know some of our cannerymen are doing.

"Another reason given by the cannerymen is that the fisheries would find its way into the hands of Orientals and that returned soldiers would be eliminated. This is a shallow camouflage. It is, however, edifying to find the cannerymen developing a violent affection for white men, after favoring the Orientals for some forty years.

"If Japanese are excluded from purse and drag seine net fishing and gradually eliminated from gill net fishing, and returned soldiers given preference in all cases, where can it be explained that returned soldiers are to be eliminated. The fact is that the cannerymen are trying to get behind the returned soldier and get him to bolster up their monopoly.

Faith in Business.

"I was in the cannery business myself for several years, and I would be very willing to go into it again and invest every penny I could scrape up, and to enter into competition with all the world. I don't think I could make any stranger argument than that, as it shows I have every faith in the business and would be willing to risk any available means I have in open competition.

"I would like to point out that under the present system the fisheries of this district are parcelled out in Vancouver by and to southern interests. We are not even privileged to know what and where licenses are granted unless we pick it up from the outside. I suggest that we northern people don't want to interfere in the affairs of Nos. 1 and 3 districts. What we do want to do is to run our own district and be permitted to engage in these vast fisheries that lie all around us.

Only Nickerson.

"What I want to know is whether public opinion is behind me in my endeavor to establish open fishing? I think we should treat this question quite aside from party and from politics and show that we are all united on the question. When I tell the inspectors down below that there is a profound public opinion on this question they say 'Oh, no, its only George Nickerson.' While I think that Mr. Nickerson is entitled to every credit for the fight he has put up for open fisheries, still I believe the vast majority of the public hereabouts are of the same mind. I have been driving this into the head of the Minister and department officials at Ottawa, and from telegrams I have received I am convinced they are disposed to do the right thing. But all the great and powerful interests of southern cannery owners are moving heaven and earth to defeat my proposals. The tremendous ramifications of this monopoly are almost unbelievable. It is now up to the residents of this country to show how they

stand, or forever after hold their peace.

Permanent Industry.

"The opening of the fisheries would, I am convinced, prove a great source of prosperity to Prince Rupert. Living as we do in the centre of one of the greatest fisheries in the world, I believe if we pursued an enlightened, free policy with our fisheries, with at the same time iron-bound regulations for conservation and propagation, we could have a great permanent industry which would develop our north country more than any of us can conceive. We must not underestimate the tremendous forces we have against us, and if we win we shall all have to pull whole-heartedly together.

LONDON, Dec. 7.—An official communication received from Denikine, anti-Bolshevik commander in Southern Russia, saying that on November 27 his cavalry defeated four Red regiments east of Dutarlingvka and that 4,000 prisoners were taken.

CHINESE CONSUL WRITES TO CITY

His Letter Elicits Considerable Discussion at Council Meeting Last Night.

"POLICE COMMISSION IS DEAD," SAYS ALD. PERRY

A letter from Hon. Kobiang Yih, Chinese Consul for British Columbia, brought forth much discussion at last night's council meeting. The letter objected very strongly to the discrimination that would be shown against the Chinese race by taking an individual Chinese census with a view to finding out undesirables. The consul asked that the council reconsider it as it was most unusual and probably not within municipal powers.

This suggestion was made three weeks ago by Ald. Perry following the many convictions against Orientals in the police court in contravention of the Drug Act. The matter had been left with Mayor McClymont to take up with the police commission. So far, it appears, no action has been taken.

Sticks to Guns.
 "I still stand behind my suggestion," said Ald. Perry, "and I further suggest that when the census is taken that it be sent to Hon. Kobiang Yih to show him what class of countrymen he has in Prince Rupert. I mean no discrimination but I maintain that this city has a right to take a census of conditions prevailing, whether it please the Chinese or any other authorities. The Chinese in this town are a poor bunch and there are some that should be deported. I would be prepared to pick out some fit subjects for deportation. To find out the law-breakers will not hurt the law-abiding ones."

Ald. McRae said that the police commission should be given time to act. They had not had a meeting since this had come up and really it was a matter for them to deal with.

Dead Anyway.
 "There is too much dilly-dallying with matters like this," replied Ald. Perry, "and our police commission is dead anyway."

Finally it was moved by Ald. Kirkpatrick, seconded by Ald. Perry, that the matter be taken up with the immigration authorities and the city solicitor for information of the council pending some action being taken by the police commission.

ERNEST VALPEY GETS 9 MONTHS

Found Guilty by Judge Young of Shooting With Intent.

PECK SAID ACCUSED GOOD ARMY CHARACTER

Yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock Ernest Valpey was found guilty of shooting with intent to do grievous bodily injury by Judge Young and was sentenced to nine months with hard labor at Okalla Farm.

In summing up the evidence the judge said that he could not agree with L. W. Patmore, counsel for the accused, when he argued that he had shot merely to break the lock off the door. In the first place he had not shot the lock but had shot above it. It seems he had never attempted to open the door by force or otherwise before shooting. He did not believe that it would have been necessary for the accused to shoot to gain entrance.

Provocation.
 It was very unfortunate for the boy that he should get tangled up in an affair like this but he doubtless had had provocation. On the other hand he might consider himself fortunate that the girl, Roberts, and Andrews had left the room for he might have killed someone. He was half drunk and had shot recklessly with a motive. This motive would be caused by finding the girl who had promised to marry him with another man.

He could do nothing but find the accused guilty but asked Mr. Patmore if he knew anything as to his character. Mr. Patmore said that, under ordinary circumstances, Valpey would not kill a flea. He had only shot to give the inmates a scare. As to his character, Col. Peck, under whom he had served at the front, would testify and also the local police. **Character Good.**
