

Pictures in Victoria Newspapers Indicate Seriousness of Vessel's Immersion at Dock Yard

Pictures in Victoria papers show graphically the position the steamer Prince Rupert is now in following her sinking last Friday night at Yarrows shipyard wharf where she had just completed annual overhaul.

A particularly good picture in the Times shows how the vessel is submerged aft to the level of the boat deck with a list of probably forty-five degrees to port. This indicates that the furnishings and nterior of the vessel's dining sapassengers' staterooms as well as crew's quarters will have been runed, necessitating extensive recon-

ditioning once the vessel is raised. A picture in the Colonist is taken from forward of the vessel's bow and shows the mass of cable and rope that was being used to prevent the vessel from heeling







# HIGH COST

Official Government Document Shows That Prince Rupert Is. One of Most Expensive

According to the last Labor Gazette, a Dominion government publication, which has just come to hand, the retail prices of staple foods, groceries. fuel, etc., in Prince Rupert are higher than in the great majority of places in Ca-

In the category of meats, sirloin steak price may be taken as an example. The price of sirloin steak in Prince Rupert is placed at 40c. per pound. There is only one other place in Caanda where the price of sirloin steak is higher, that is Halifax. In that city, further removed from the cattle raising districts than any other in Canada, the price of sirolin s eak is 40.3c. per pound. In other kinds of meats Prince Rupert maintains this high average. The price of fresh leg of roast pork for instance is 37.5c. per pound in Prince Rupert, Nelson and Trail, at | 33.5c, per pound, have the next highest prices in the Dominion for this commodity.

Even in the fish lines, Prince Rupert prices are high in comparison with those in other Canadian cities although it is lower than in many. 


