Trades Union Congress Asks Peace With Soviet Russia

Also Demand Independent Inquiry into Conditions in That Country; Unemployment Dole Withdrawal is Condemned.

LONDON, December 11 .- The Trades Union Congress has adopted a resolution calling upon the Government immediately to consider peace overtures with the Soviet Government of Russia and to raise the blockade between Russia and the outside world. They also demand the right for an independent inquiry into the political, industrial and economic condition in Russia.

Congress further adopted a proposal for the establishment of labor general headquarters replacing the parliamentary committee.

John Robert Clines, former food controller, moved a resolution "That this Labor Congress strongly condemn the Government for withdrawing civil unemployment benefit without making any alternative provision for the people who are out of work and demanding that effective steps be taken to find employment or maintenance for those affected by the Government's action.


