## Trades Union Congress Asks Peace With Soviet Russia

### Also Demand Independent Inquiry into Conditions in That Country; Unemployment Dole Withdrawal is Condemned.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
LONDON, December 11.—The Trades Union Congress has adopted a resolution calling upon the Government immediately to consider peace overtures with the Soviet Government of Russia and to raise the blockade between Russia and the outside world. They also demand the right for an independent inquiry into the political, industrial and economic condition in Russia. Congress further adopted a proposal for the establishment of labor general headquarters replacing the parliamentary committee.

John Robert Clines, former food controller, moved a resolution "That this Labor Congress strongly condemn the Government for withdrawing civil unemployment benefit without making any alternative provision for the people who are out of work and demanding that effective steps be taken to find employment or maintenance for those affected by the Government's action."

## Dutch Deputy Would Have Wilhelm of Germany Sent Away From That Country

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
THE HAGUE, December 11.—"If previously we have not regarded him as a danger to the country, he is now proving to be a danger," said Deputy Sannes in the Chamber today, referring to the former Emperor William of Germany. Deputy Sannes asked the Government to reconsider the question of the sojourn at Amerongen of the former Kaiser, and to consider the question of his extradition. This move on the part of the deputy constituted the first serious anti-Kaiser movement to occur in the Dutch Parliament.

## SPITBALL IS TO BE BANNED

Those Already Using Freak Delivery May Continue, But no New Freaks.

NEW YORK, Dec. 11.—At the national league club owners' annual meeting there was a good deal of discussion about the use of the spitball and other freak deliveries. Every club owner went on record as being opposed to that class of pitching and a recommendation was made by the joint rules committee to this effect. In order, however to prevent doing any injury to any of the old pitchers who use the spitball, it was decided that they should be exempt, but that no one except these men would be allowed to use that delivery.

## PRINCE OF WALES IS SUGGESTED AS THE NEXT GOVERNOR

LONDON, Dec. 11.—A suggestion that the Prince of Wales become next Governor-General of Canada has been received here with considerable interest, but competent opinion exceedingly remote. The Prince's general duties for one thing, would preclude entirely the possibility of his assuming the position, even for a limited period. There is, however, no reason to think that the Duke of Devonshire will relinquish his position before the end of his term.

## CLEVER RUSE TO SMUGGLE WHISKEY

Chan Lee, However, Does Not Fool Constable Adams—Fined \$50.50.  
Chan Lee was fined \$50.50 by Stipendiary Magistrate McMullin in the police court this morning for having liquor in his possession. Last night Chan Lee was stopped by Constable Adams, coming from the wharf, and on being searched he was found to have 7 bottles of imported Chinese whiskey in an inner vest specially made for the purpose. He pleaded guilty this morning and was fined. On paying his fine he produced a bank-roll of over \$400 cash.

## EXCHANGE PRISONERS

Outlook for Agreement With the Soviet is not Promising.

## POPULAR OFFICIAL FOR SWANSON BAY

Car Ferry Will Soon be in Operation, so V. Warren Will Move Office.  
V. Warren, the local agent for the Whalen Pulp and Paper Co., expects to remove his office to Swanson Bay as soon as the ferry system between here and Swanson Bay is in operation. This will probably be some time shortly after Christmas as the barge is just about ready to go on the run. Mr. Warren has made a number of friends in the city who will regret his departure. He will remain in charge of the shipping of pulp, shingles, etc., over the Grand Trunk, but the cars will be loaded there instead of here, as at present. He may make frequent visits to Prince Rupert in connection with his duties.

## CLOTHING REDUCTIONS WILL NOT BE LARGE

Order of Board of Commerce to Be Effective Monday Next.

TORONTO, Dec. 11.—Retail clothiers predict that when the Board of Commerce order comes into effect on Monday next, the reductions in the price of clothes will be small. Those suits now priced at \$38 will sell for \$34.45 and suits at \$40 and over will be practically unchanged.

## Ship Coal Monday From the U.S. Mines

### Telegrams Sent to 4,000 Locals by International Officers Instructing them to Return to Work Immediately.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
INDIANAPOLIS, December 11.—The coal miners' strike is ended. With but one dissenting voice the general committee of the United Mine Workers of America voted to accept President Wilson's proposal for an immediate return to work pending the final settlement of the wage controversy by a commission of operators and miners to be appointed by him. Telegrams were sent to 4,000 locals of the union by the international officers of the Mine Workers instructing them to return to work immediately. Full instructions with regard to wages will be sent out tonight and it is predicted there will be a full resumption of operations and that shipment of coal from the mines will begin on Monday. The miners, operators and Government officials are pleased over the settlement and on all sides appeared confident of a final satisfactory settlement of the fight by the commission. The action of the committee ends a tieup of the coal industry of more than five weeks' duration. As a result of the strike the country was fast approaching a complete shutdown of industry and widespread suffering.

## MANY KILLED IN CLASH AT FIUME

Port's Troops Pillaged French Stores and Trouble Followed.

PARIS, Dec. 11.—D'Annunzian troops have clashed with French at Fiume and there are many killed and wounded on both sides. It is said that D'Annunzian men had pillaged the French depots at Fiume.

## VICTORIA SAWMILL DESTROYED BY FIRE

Loss of \$90,000 at Blaze in Moore & Whittington Plant.

VICTORIA, Dec. 11.—The Lumber mill of Moore & Whittington on the Upper Harbor was gutted by fire, the loss being estimated at \$90,000. The blaze originated in the planing mill and within a few minutes the main part of the mill was ablaze and much lumber consumed.

Wreckers of Steamer Josie Awarded \$200,716 for Floating Vessel.  
SYDNEY, N.S., Dec. 11.—The assessment board dealing with the claim of the Atlantic Salvage Co., in connection with the refloating of the Steamer Josie, lately ashore at Glack Bay, awarded the wreckers \$200,716.70.

## Premier Clemenceau Visiting Britain

### Arranging for Immediate Entente between France and Great Britain with Italy coming in Later, is Opinion.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
LONDON, December 11.—Premier Clemenceau of France arrived this morning by train from Dover after a stormy channel crossing in the destroyer Temeraire. The press and British official circles are unanimous in declaring the Tiger's visit has two prime objects in view. First the arrangement of a new organization to supersede the Supreme Council and second the completing of an immediate entente with Great Britain, which later may develop into a Franco-British-Italian alliance. Premiers Clemenceau and Lloyd George will arrange for an ambassadorial council to meet in London or Paris in 1920 to wind up the programs of peace making, including the Adriatic, Russian and Turkish problems. Vittorio, the Italian foreign minister, is also here for the conference.

## CONFESSES TO MAIL ROBBERY

Alonzo Tait, Sick Indian, Tells Whole Story to Officer Logan; Amateur Theft.  
Constable George P. Logan returned from Port Simpson last night after investigating the post office robbery at that place. The constable did some quick work while over there and located the robber before he had been there two hours. Immediately on arrival he set to work and soon found out that Alonzo Tait had bought some stamps at the office just before 6 o'clock when the robbery occurred. He went to see Tait, who was in the hospital, and on asking him if he had been near the post office he denied being there at all. This lie aroused the suspicion of Constable Logan and he had his confession inside of three minutes. Tait took the constable to a vacant house where he had concealed the money above a door and gave it up. The checks he had thrown away in the bush and they have not yet been recovered, although an 8-hour search was made. There is still over \$100 cash missing. Bert Flewin, the postmaster, says that he would never have noticed the loss from the post-office sack as it was already locked up with the money inside ready to go out on the Venture. However, on coming into the office after dinner he found that the cash from the post-office till and his own private cash-box was missing, so immediately he thought of the post-office sack which contained much more currency. On looking at it he found it had been neatly slit between the flaps and the loss would never have been noticed until it arrived at Prince Rupert, its destination. The alarm was turned into the office of the Provincial Police with the result that Constable Logan returned with his bird last night. He will come up before Stipendiary Magistrate McMullin for preliminary trial this afternoon.

## FIGHT POSTPONED

## MILITARY COSTS TO BE DOUBLED

Proposed to Expend \$25,000,000 Next Year as Against \$11,000,000 Before the War.  
(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
OTTAWA, Dec. 11.—Estimates for the permanent forces and militia of Canada are now under preparation. The total fund expected to be allotted for this purpose will be about \$25,000,000 as against \$11,000,000 before the war. The increase is attributed wholly to the tremendous rise in the cost of materials, food, transportation and accommodation.

## RETURNED SOLDIER DISTRICT COMMISSION

Large Sum of Money Has Been Handled Already by Provincial Body.  
VICTORIA, Dec. 11.—Up to the end of November, the B. C. district, Returned Soldiers Commission, had made loans aggregating \$258,091 upon which \$144,256 had been paid. In addition, gratuities have been paid to 1,070 returned men, the average amount to each being \$250. There has been spent in relief \$14,200.

## DISCUSS TARIFF

Public Meetings of Board of Commerce to be Held at Winnipeg.  
WINNIPEG, Dec. 11.—Public meetings of the Board of Commerce will be held early next year to determine the effect of the tariff on the necessities of life. ## DAUGHTERS OF EMPIRE EXPECT TO BUILD HALL

All Obligation on Their Property Paid—Will Now Proceed with Building Scheme.

### BALL ROOM LONG FELT NEED HERE

Now that the two lots on Fifth Ave., near McBride Street, have been fully paid for, the Municipal as well as the subsidiary chapters of the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire in this city propose devoting their efforts towards the building of a meeting hall and club rooms on those lots. The lots were finally paid for as a result of the successful bazaar held two weeks ago. These lots which have a frontage of 50 feet on Fifth Ave. and are 100 feet long, are fifty feet from the corner of McBride and Fifth on the left hand side facing east. They were bought for the Daughters of the Empire at the first sale here in 1909 at the upset price of \$5,000 and after a long campaign for funds they are finally clear. The ladies of the different chapters are now working on plans for the hall.

#### Need Great.

The need for this hall is very great for the increasing activities of the order in the city, and a large assembly place would be a decided acquisition as a social centre. There are many cases when a meeting place is needed for large assemblies and often inadequate places have to be used. The proposed hall would always demand a fair rental which could go towards paying for the initial cost of building it.

Speaking to Mrs. J. C. McLennan, regent of the Municipal Chapter, last night, the News learned that definite plans have not yet been formulated, although the ideas are pretty well thought out. In the first place the hall will be used, primarily, as a home and meeting hall for the six different chapters, Municipal, Queen Mary, Adair Carss, Hill 60, Girl Guides and Children's. Mrs. McLennan emphasized the need for the children, on one occasion last summer 700 having gathered to take part in an I. O. D. E. demonstration. There is no convenient place in the city for them to gather except at great cost.

#### Matter of Finance.

The proposed building would probably be of two storeys. The entire ground floor would be used as a ball room which would be much larger than any in town at the present time. Upstairs would be sitting rooms, women's club room and a library. Also here could be stored the equipment belonging to the various chapters.

It is the hope of the regents of the chapters to interest public-spirited business men in the project. It might be possible to gain their assistance in financing and thus hasten the erection of some such building. This does not mean that the I. O. D. E. would require these men to give money but they could give valuable assistance in promoting their efforts. It is the ultimate desire of the organization to pay for the building themselves as they have paid for their lots.

## MEMBER FOR NANAIMO MAY RESIGN HIS SEAT

Ill Health is Worrying J. C. McIntosh Who is Visiting Tacoma.

Continued ill-health has forced Mr. J. C. McIntosh, M. P. for Nanaimo, to consider resigning his seat in the House of Commons, says the Victoria Colonist.

The first public intimation of Mr. McIntosh's intention was given by him to the Cowichan branch of the Great War Veterans' Association a few days ago, when he wrote to express his regret in being unable to attend a meeting.

His letter stated: "If my present condition should not improve within the next month or so, it is my intention to forward my resignation as representative of Nanaimo district in the House of Commons."

Mr. McIntosh has been unwell for several weeks. He contracted a severe cold shortly after his return from Ottawa, and he was confined to his home in Esquimalt for some time. At present he is visiting in Tacoma.

Since learning of Mr. McIntosh's statement regarding his possible resignation at an early date, many of his friends have urged him to retain his post. The pressure of his parliamentary duties have weighed heavily upon Mr. McIntosh, especially during the recent session, although he maintained his usual energy all the way through.

# FUR MARKET IN BAD CONDITION

## English Market is Glutted and New York Beginning to Reflect Low Prices.

The furmarket at the present time is in a very unstable condition. The English market is glutted with millions of dollars of fur and if conditions are settled in Russia it will still be worse. Prices for almost all varieties are away down and still falling and it is next to impossible to give quotations. As a result of the fall in the British market, New York prices are also going down. The present world strikes are also blamed, partly, for the decrease. The general condition is none too bright and trappers are not going to receive the big prices this winter that have been prevailing for the past season or two.

Musk rats, good mink and beaver are scarce and the price is, therefore, still strong. The demand for beaver, however, does not affect local fur men because a close season has been put on them. Lynx are also going at good prices. Fisher and marten are weak and going down fast. Wolf and coast mink are also very weak. Bear shippers have been making no profits as the market is 20 per cent lower on the furs of the bear.

As a result of the low prices in the London market much fur has been withdrawn and the shippers are holding it rather than sell at a loss. Dark marten which sold last spring in New York has dropped about 20 per cent, and pale marten is 20 per cent lower. Wolf skin costing \$20 in New York brought only \$11.85 in London. Silver and cross fox is all withdrawn in London on account of a 50 per cent drop.

On account of the great amount of fur now on the market, it is expected that higher prices will not be paid for raw fur for a long time and in the meantime a greater drop may be looked for.

## Sport Briefs

With no changes in the playing rules the National Hockey Association schedule of games will commence in Quebec and Ottawa when the Canadiens and Toronto's play the visitors respectively. The one referee rule will be enforced and one referee will be selected in each city on the circuit. There will be forty-eight games and twelve will be played in each of the four cities.

Jack Dempsey is being plied with offers for a meet with Georges Carpentier, heavyweight champion of Europe, for the world's title. Dempsey says although he would prefer to fight in America, still he will go where the best offer is made. Cochrane, the English promoter, has offered \$175,000, while Tortorich, of New Orleans, has offered \$150,000.

M. Decoin, of Paris, who must have coin alright, goes them all one better. He says he is willing to put up any sum Dempsey asks to fight in New York bank. Decoin will continue fight at the sporting club that he runs in Paris on July 14. He is awaiting Dempsey's favorable reply before leaving for America to make final arrangements with Manager Jack Kearns.

This is boom week in the baseball world although no games are being played. On Monday the International League had its annual general meeting at New York. On Tuesday the National League had its annual meeting, when the 1919 pennant was formally presented to the Cincinnati Club. The American League is holding two meetings, one in New York and the other in Chicago, the two meetings being held on account of a disagreement between Coniskey, of Chicago, Frazee of Boston and Ruppert of New York and other managers of the league. Schedules for the 1920 playing season were drawn up at the meetings.

The Union Oil tanker Lansing is at the oil dock unloading 40,000 barrels of oil for the local tanks. She arrived last evening from San Francisco and will complete discharging this afternoon or evening.

The Prince Albert completed her underwater repairs at the local drydock yesterday morning and the Tilamook is again on the pontoons.

### FINANCIAL SITUATION

International Agreement Necessary to Rectify Present Condition.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
LONDON, Dec. 11.—Baron Swaythling who has just returned from the United States says that nothing but an international agreement among the Governments will rectify the present financial situation. He suggests the suspension of international payments among the Allies for three years.

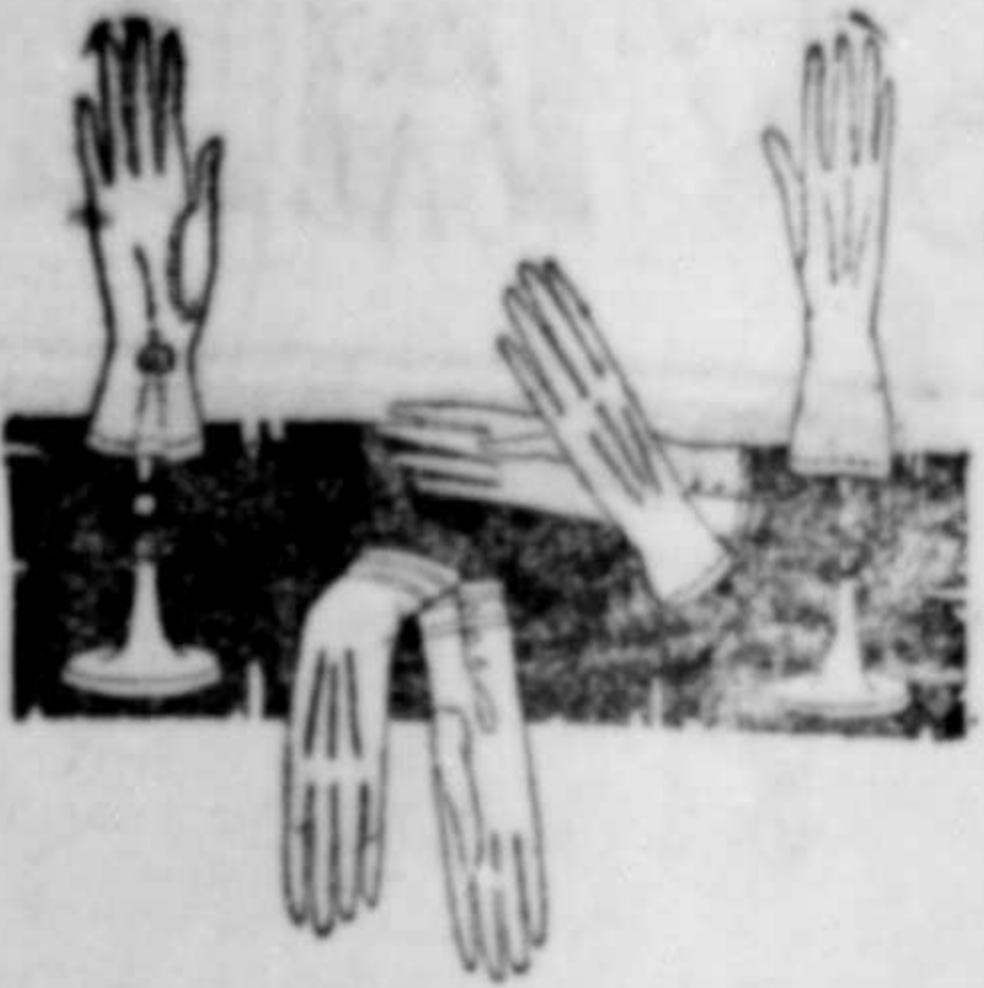
