## All Night Session of British Commons Deals with the Navy

### Eight Hour Discussion on Important Topic; Lady Astor Sits it Through; Government Rebuff over Coal Mines Profits; Adriatic Trouble Discussed.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, December 12.—The Government met with another rebuff in the House of Commons when it was obliged temporarily to suspend the discussion on the second reading of the bill which limits the profits of coal mine owners. Both the mine owners and the miners are opposed to the bill.

The Commons rose last night at 2:25 o'clock after an all-night session and following an eight-hour discussion of the navy estimates, which ended twenty minutes after midnight. At that time the Government's Housing proposals were introduced. This signalled the departure of Lady Astor, who resolutely sat through the long discussion on the navy estimates. The housing proposals had passed through the committee stage when the House rose.

Right Hon. Walter Hume Long's presentation of the revised naval estimates were made to an almost empty House. He admitted that the Government had not yet decided on its future policy. In the general debate the most important points raised were the position of the air service in regard to the navy, co-ordination of the fighting services and the feasibility of Lord Fisher's idea of new construction.

On the second point Mr. Long replied that it would be criminal to abandon the great type of warships on the ground that the submarine and airship would replace the navy.

Sir Fortescue Flannery declared that nothing would bind the mother country and the dominions so completely as the co-ordination of the navy into one great Imperial force.

Sir Andrew Bonar Long, Government leader, answered several questions in the House, hinted that the Adriatic trouble was the subject of discussion between Premier Clemenceau of France and Foreign Minister Scialoja of Italy and the representative of Turkey. He gave no indication of the policy adopted by the conference.

**Record Quick Case.**

This case is one of the quickest on record to be disposed of. On Monday night the theft was committed and the alarm turned in. On Tuesday Constable Logan was on the ground and had the confessed robber by that night. By Wednesday the prisoner was in the city jail and preliminary trial took place on Thursday. Today, Friday, the accused is sentenced to three years' imprisonment. Constable Logan takes him south on the Princess Royal tomorrow night and on Tuesday morning he will be in the penitentiary to commence his term. The prisoner's own confession and ready admissions were a large factor in the quickness of conviction.

## MINIMUM TERM WAS GIVEN FOR POSTAL THEFT

Postmaster and Constable Give Evidence of Robbery and Arrest.

ACCUSED ADMITS THAT EVIDENCE IS CORRECT

The preliminary trial of Alonzo Tait, charged with robbery of the mails at Port Simpson, was held yesterday afternoon in the Court House before Stipendiary Magistrate McMullin. This morning the prisoner was tried by Judge Young and sentenced to three years in the penitentiary. Two witnesses, Charles Bertram Flewin, postmaster, and Constable Logan, were examined.

**Postmaster Testifies.**

Charles B. Flewin testified as to making up the mail on the morning of Monday, December 8. It was to have gone out on a gas boat, but had missed the boat so was left over until the Venture that night. The mail sack contained 2 letter packets, 3 papers, some parcels as well as one package of registered mail. The registered parcel contained four separate packages, one of which was to the Canadian Bank of Commerce at Prince Rupert and which contained \$1,280.37 in cash and checks. The bag was in good condition and was securely locked.

noticed his personal money was not in its proper place. He, however, did not search at all until 11:30 when he took the mail out of the sack to re-sort it and discovered the loss of the registered package containing the money. Looking at the bag he saw it had been neatly slit between the folds. He examined the place and notified the Prince Rupert police as soon as possible.

**Police Evidence.**

Constable Logan said that he was called at 10 o'clock on Tuesday by Chief Minty to investigate the case. He arrived at Port Simpson on Tuesday afternoon and at once proceeded to look into matters. He went to the hospital and questioned accused. He discovered that he had been lying about being near the post office. Accused finally confessed and said that he would get the money and he took the constable to an empty house and produced \$781 from over the bedroom.

The checks, he said, he had hidden under a tree and he could not locate them in the dark. The next morning they went to look for the checks but they could not discover them. Accused said he was very excited when he had hidden them and could not remember exactly where they were.

Constable Logan then took accused and the money to Mr. Flewin, who identified it. On the confession of the accused and the identification of the money Constable Logan arrested Tait and gave him the customary warning.

**Evidence Correct.**

The accused on being questioned if he had anything to say said that all he would say was that the evidence given was correct. Accused has his head bandaged and has been in the hospital at Port Simpson. He is said to be in a bad state of health. After confessing he gave the police all the assistance possible in getting information and making recovery of the stolen money and checks.

The case was rushed through this morning when Tait was sentenced by Judge Young to three years in the penitentiary, the minimum penalty for mail robbery. The accused pleaded guilty, speedy trial and pleaded guilty. Owing to the assistance he had given the police and his repentance His Honor dealt with him as lightly as possible.

Tait said that he was sorry he had committed the theft. He had been a sick man for two years and, on the impulse of the moment, he thought that committing this crime would help him to better himself. W. E. Colli-

## OLD COUNTRY MAIL LIGHT

Return of Soldiers Eliminates a Good Deal of Overseas Business.

DAILY TRAIN MIGHT BRING CITY DELIVERY

The Old Country outbound mail this year has fallen off a good deal owing to the return of the soldiers from overseas. Now that all of the men have returned, there are fewer parcels for overseas, as well as letters.

Christmas business is making itself felt in both the outgoing and incoming mails. From this time on until the holiday there will be a gradual increase in business and the post office staff will find it hard work to cope with it.

This morning three mails arrived together, the two-day eastern mail, and the letters from Stewart and Anxox. Besides the sorting of the local letters those bound for other points have to be re-sorted here and a good deal of work of that kind keeps the local postal staff busy. In spite of the large triple mail this morning the letters were all distributed by 9:15.

Postmaster R. L. McIntosh is looking forward to having a daily train service during the coming summer. Such a service would simplify the mail distribution and would make possible a city delivery. It would, however, eliminate the Sunday night sorting and those looking for Sunday letters would have to wait until Monday morning.

## SEVERE WEATHER ON THE PRAIRIES

Due to the extremely cold weather prevailing in the east the trains are meeting with considerable difficulty in keeping on time. The train that was due here at 7 o'clock last evening did not get in till 7:30 this morning. Extremely severe weather was reported all along the line. Stories of terrible cold at Winnipeg prevail but the accepted figures for Monday were 45 below zero. At Jasper Park it was 40 below and at Prince George, 35. As a result of the train being late the Prince George did not get away for Vancouver till 8:30 this morning.

## Open Fisheries and Use of Gas Boats

### Large Meeting of Fishermen and Others Discuss Proposals made by Colonel Peck and Endorse Them.

A largely attended meeting of citizens, prominent among whom were a number of fishermen, discussed the matter of open fisheries and other matters pertaining thereto last night in the City Hall and passed resolutions endorsing the policy being pursued by Lieut.-Col. Peck, V. C., M. P., and expressing confidence in him.

Acting Mayor Rochester presided and S. E. Parker was appointed acting secretary. Among the speakers were Capt. Selig, G. W. Nickerson, Alex. McLeman, Mr. Wright and a number of fishermen.

Captain Selig was the first to express his views on fishing matters. He objected to the use of drag seines, stating that if their use was continued the industry would be destroyed. They should use purse seines and thus give the salmon a chance. He also objected to the whole coast being tied up by the canneries. The fishing grounds, he thought, should be open to everyone, and if the canneries wanted the fish they could buy them from the independent fishermen. As it was the industry was controlled by the Japs and white men had no chance. He gave instances of purse seining.

**A Dog's Life.**

Capt. Selig also urged that those who wished should be able to use gas boats. To fish with the row boats as they did now was a dog's life.

The statement recently published by Col. Peck was then gone through clause by clause and with one or two very light amendments unanimously endorsed, and there was added to it a resolution asking the right to use gas boats for fishing on the Skeena River.

In discussing clause "e" having to do with the use of purse seines, Alex McLeman objected to the use of purse seines. With their use the Skeena would soon be like the Fraser, no fish left. He objected to the power the canneries were given and thought they should not be allowed to have any licenses for fishing.

The whole matter of the use of purse seines and drag seines was discussed and the clause was then slightly amended.

The extension of the open season was criticised as it was suggested that fish could be followed up the river and they would have no more chance of escape than if there was no close season.

**Use of Gas Boats.**

In moving for the use of gas boats, G. W. Nickerson said that the progressive fishermen did not like the old style of fishing. He thought that if the same aid was given returned soldiers in the fishing industry as was given them in farming they would have 500 returned men fishing on the Skeena. At present 80 per cent of the fishermen were Japanese. Where the canneries controlled or where there were government restrictions it was found that Orientals controlled the business. (Applause).

Mr. McLeman said the present regulations were a disgrace to a civilized country. They found that they could not get anything passed by the Government if it was a workmen's proposition. One speaker told of having been able to use gas boats at one time on the Naifs.

**Final Resolutions.**

The motion expressing confidence in Colonel Peck was then carried unanimously and a resolution by Mr. Wright asking that a bounty be placed on predatory birds and animals that destroyed the fish and that the spawning grounds be improved, was passed, and the chairman empowered to appoint a committee to embody the resolutions in a telegram to Colonel Peck and Mayor McClymont at Ottawa.

## NEW DOCK SITE WAS INSPECTED

Col. A. E. Griffin, Contractor, and J. D. Heaman, Chief Engineer, Were Here.

Col. A. E. Griffin, representing Stewart & Welsh, contractors; J. A. Heaman, chief engineer for the Grand Trunk Pacific and W. H. Tobey, divisional Engineer, made a trip of inspection over the site of the new extension to the Grand Trunk Pacific dock yesterday morning. It is expected that plans and specifications will arrive here in the course of two weeks and work will probably commence before long. Full particulars of the extent and nature of the new wharfage has been given in these columns before. There will be 1000 feet of additional wharfage put in at the west end of the present dock and sheds will be built.

Col. Griffin was here looking over the ground in the interests of his company. It is probable that when specifications and plans have been prepared they will make bids on the work. Col. Griffin was assistant director of light railways in France during the war under Major General J. W. Stewart, who is head of the firm of Stewart & Welsh. He returned to Vancouver on the Prince George this morning.

Mr. Heaman came to town on Wednesday morning and is on his way to Winnipeg. Besides the wharf matter he has looked into several problems in connection with the local engineering department. He leaves on to-morrow's train for headquarters in Winnipeg.

## Many Coal Mines Working In the United States Following Settlement

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

CHICAGO, December 12.—Work has been resumed in the mines in several of the states as a result of the settlement in Indianapolis of the strike in the bituminous coal mines, but no relaxation of the fuel restrictions followed the plans for a return to normal of the passenger train schedules under consideration.

INDIANAPOLIS, Dec. 12.—Mining in the bituminous coal fields of Indiana has started. Reports from all the belts indicate that the resumption is pretty general.

PITTSBURG, Dec. 12.—Not a union mine in the Pittsburg district resumed operations today. It is confidently expected that the men will be back not later than Monday.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—Fuel Administrator Garfield's resignation is in the hands of President Wilson because he disagrees on principle with the coal strike settlement arrangements between the Government and the mine workers' union.

## Must Buy Less From The States Says Minister to Remedy Unequal Exchange

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

NEW YORK, December 12.—The stock market was visibly affected and financial circles are gravely worried by the violent decline in the exchange rates. International bankers expressed discouragement at the situation and declared that unless remedial measures were soon forthcoming a serious curtailment of the country's exports would soon be inevitable.

Remittances or demand bills on London fell to \$3.67 1/2 to the pound sterling against a normal pre-war rate of \$4.86 1/2. An overnight drop of nine cents brings the rate such that it represents a discount of almost 25 per cent of what for several years has been regarded as the basis of international exchange.

OTTAWA, Dec. 12.—The only remedy is to buy less, said Sir Henry Drayton, minister of finance, commenting on the very low level to which Canadian exchange on New York has dropped.

Proportional Representation Being Much Discussed.

Proportional representation is being much discussed throughout the Dominion. The idea is that by the utilization of a system of voting every part or group of the electorate can secure representation in Parliament or in the city government. As it is today a very considerable section of the community has no representation.

A dispatch sent out from Calgary to Vancouver tells of the lack of interest at that city in municipal affairs and blames it all on the P. R. system. The dispatch says in part: "The answer is that each set of citizens or class which has put forward candidates, knows all about its own nominees and is going to make them the first selection to ensure election. One class will not bother with another class, but will centre attention on putting its own representatives into office. Hence the people do not feel that it is necessary to turn out to hear the other fellows. They are only interested in their own candidates."

"For example, in the local elections, the G. W. V. A., Labor and the 'Citizens' Committee' have endorsed different candidates, and besides there are a number of independents. The G. W. V. A. members are expected to give their candidate for the council 'first choice'; Labor will do the same by its candidates, and the Citizens' Committee will follow suit. The 'first choices' win, and so the class votes will be segregated."

"It is feared that the municipal administration may suffer if sectional representatives are elected. The city abolished the ward system of representation some years ago in order to get away from the spirit of sectional representation, and now it is argued that proportional representation is causing a reversion to a state similar to that which was felt to be inimical to the city's interests."

The Vancouver World discussing the system editorially says:—"Proportional representation may be expected soon to be adopted in not a few provinces of the Dominion."

"It is a plank in the farmers' platform and no doubt Premier Drury will see that it comes into effect in Ontario. In Alberta Premier Stewart during the Cochrane by-election promised that a Proportional Representation Bill would be introduced into the legislature before the next provincial election."

"Premier Foster of New Brunswick is in favor of it and several members of the Manitoba government have declared their intention of supporting a measure of the sort."

"In view of the possibility of rapid growth of the 'group system' in provincial and Federal politics proportional representation, because of the equitable basis it affords, is bound to commend itself more and more to the electors."

Question of Titles Again Discussed.

The question of titles is being discussed in England. "Truth" the paper that was made famous years ago by the late Henry Labouchere through its attack of abuses, mentions that the Prince of Wales conferred titles in the United States but did not do so in Canada because Parliament had gone on record against it.

We are thankful here to think we do not have to pattern our conduct on any other country. We object to titles as a matter of principle and as being vicious in practice. In England it is well known that titles are bought and sold. Titles were sold hundreds of years ago and a somewhat similar custom obtains today.

In Canada there was a similar system. Men were given titles for nothing better than making large contributions to campaign funds, or because they had influential connections. The best men in the Empire have refused titles. Some very good men have in a weak moment accepted titular distinctions and they have gained nothing therefrom, while lowering themselves in the eyes of a large section of the community. William Ewart Gladstone and David Lloyd George are two outstanding examples of men who have consistently refused such tinsel rewards.

# CANADA'S POSITION REVIEWED AT BANK OF MONTREAL ANNUAL

## BANK OF MONTREAL ANNUAL MEETING

Sir Vincent Meredith, President, Points Out Manner in Which Many of Present Difficulties Can Be Overcome—Favors More Equitable Distribution of Taxation, so as to Cover All Classes Who Are Able to Pay—Sir Frederick Williams-Taylor, General Manager, Draws Attention to Fact That Bank was Never in a Healthier State and Deals With Manner in Which Exchange Between Canada and United States Can Be Corrected.

Montreal, Dec. 12.—(Special)—The annual meeting of the Bank of Montreal, held at the head office, was marked by important references to the main problems which the Dominion of Canada has to solve during the period of reconstruction. The world is passing through a period of very peculiar conditions and in dealing with many of the problems which Sir Vincent Meredith, the president, and Sir Frederick Williams-Taylor, the general manager, pointed out how many of them might be overcome and what Canada should do in order that the financial conditions of the country would be maintained in a healthy state. Sir Vincent attributed the high cost of living very largely to the increasing demands of European countries for commodities of every nature. He considered that Canada it might be possible to look forward confidently to a reduction in all commodities, both at home and abroad, after another year. He dealt particularly with the change in opinion that had developed as regards the relation of the reserve to note circulation. He expressed the view that it should be a part of wisdom to depart from the old notions of the rigidity of the gold reserve and recognize that we are justified in enlarging our note issuing powers to respond to all legitimate business demands in periods of great activity or emergency, provided such expansion is based on liquidating securities. The president also pointed out that it was vitally important that unoccupied areas of Canada should be settled and made productive with as much rapidity as possible, the future prosperity of the country and ability to meet its debts being largely dependent on increased production. The question of taxation in Canada also received particular attention and Sir Vincent expressed the view that trade was hampered by a somewhat unbalanced business profit. Furthermore, enterprise and industry are stifled and foreign investments deterred from entering the Canadian industrial field. He expressed the view that Canada should do away with many taxes and impose taxation on all classes of the community who have the ability to pay and at the same time place a higher tax upon imported luxuries. It would cause little hardship at the same time considerably less strained financial situation. Difficulties to be Overcome. Sir Frederick Williams-Taylor, general manager, dealt more particularly with the record of the bank during the past year, but touched on many of the developments outside of the country which had a bearing on the situation. Sir Frederick stated that it was reassuring reflection that the United States has already reduced her war debt by some \$800,000,000, while Canada was confronted with an increase of \$600,000,000 for the current year. Sir Frederick took occasion to point out that it was a matter of great importance to bear in mind that there had been no hearing whatever by the banks in Canada, for the price of money had not been raised. Alone of all commodities, the cost to the borrower of loanable funds of the banking institutions of the country had remained unchanged. Not was this the case, but speaking for the bank itself, it was only for that the shareholders should know that in handling the business entrusted by the several governments during the war and the policy had been to give only the narrowest of commissions and minimum interest rates. In many instances, where services were of a war character, the bank had acted free of charge. A satisfactory sign of the times in Canada was the increase in the buying power for first-class securities. This is a healthy and favorable condition induced by government war loans and war savings certificates. It is vital

near future difficult to visualize. We derive a measure of consolation in comparing our lot with that of countries worse off than our own, but contiguity and ambition direct our eyes towards that country to the south which has benefitted so vastly by the war. Exchange Situation. "The premium on New York funds, the increase in our national debt and in our Canadian currency circulation, are matters of deep interest and should be studied by all. "The purchasing power of the Canadian dollar in the United States has decreased, as reflected in the premium on New York funds. A year ago it cost two dollars to send one hundred dollars to the United States of America; today the cost is four dollars. "It will interest you to know that on my recent trip to the Pacific Coast, when I travelled nine thousand miles in visiting various branches of the bank, I met some 110 of our managers, and returned more than ever satisfied with the personnel, the intelligent loyalty and devotion of our ever-increasing staff of officers. "Such meetings are advantageous to the bank and an inducement also to close relations between the bank and its friends at distant points. "It is impressive and satisfying to view the Dominion's greatest quick asset, the rich wheat areas of our three Western Provinces, at harvest time. While this year the yield was not up to the mark, the Western farmers had much to be thankful for. "In British Columbia, one is struck by the confidence of the people in the future of their rich and beautiful Province, with its wonderful climate. It is a healthy sign that the men of affairs in the West hold such sane views concerning the outlook locally and for the Dominion at large. "I hope that time may presently permit me to visit other divisions as I did British Columbia and the Northwest. "In concluding, I have no hesitation in expressing the belief that the affairs of the bank have never been in a healthier state. Our domestic business is expanding satisfactorily, our foreign branches and connections have been adequately extended to meet the development of the country's trade, and what is more important, we are well equipped in point of staff. Altogether, I feel that we are well prepared to meet any conditions and contingencies that may arise. Overseas Record. "The record of the staff of the bank overseas showed that 1,405 members of the staff had served with the colors. Of this number 1,182 had survived, of whom 663 have already been reinstated. Of the total who joined the colors it was Sir Frederick's sad duty to record the fact that 223, or 16%, gave their lives for their country. In paying tribute to them, Sir Frederick said: "No words of tongue or pen can fully express our pride in, or our admiration for, these gallant young crusaders. It must suffice to say that their names are not merely written in the records of this bank and in the history of the Empire they served so well, but live on far away, woven into the fabric of other men's lives. HON. ARTHUR MEIGHEN SPEAKS ON OFFER OF LAND TO SOLDIERS Says that Provisions are Extended to Men From Great Britain Who Fought Overseas. Hon. Arthur Meighen in an address on reconstruction recently said:— "Our scheme goes further than taking care of the ex-service men of the Canadian Expeditionary Force, it admits any sailor or soldier who fought under the flags of Great Britain and her allies, under certain conditions. "It is provided that soldiers of the Imperial forces who were not resident in Canada at the outbreak of the war shall be required to pass a special test of their fitness to farm; that is, Imperial soldiers who are experienced in agriculture, will be required to spend two years with farmers in Canada before they will be eligible for a loan. Those who have had experience in agriculture in the old country also will be required to spend sufficient time in training with a farmer in this country to become familiar with Canadian methods. "This provision is undertaken for the protection not only of the soldier from the motherland, but for the Dominion which undertakes to assist him. Farming methods are not the same in Canada as in England, and a short course of training is, I feel, in the interest of the soldier himself. "We have a further requirement with regard to Imperial or Colonial soldiers who propose to take advantage of the Canadian offer. On purchased land a cash down payment of 20 per cent. is required; that is, in the case of a farm worth \$5,000 the purchaser will be required to pay down \$1,000. He gets, however, in addition to this a loan up to \$3,000 for the purchase of livestock and equipment and the erection of buildings, and upon this there is no preliminary payment."

## MCCAFFERY GETS MUCH PUBLICITY

Despatch Sent Out to Canadian Papers Tells of His Mission to Ottawa.

A Canadian Press Association despatch sent out from Ottawa and published in a number of papers throughout Canada says: "M. P. McCaffery, president of the Board of Trade of Prince Rupert, B. C., has arrived in Ottawa, in connection with the question of throwing open to British subjects generally the northern British Columbia salmon fisheries. This matter is now under consideration by the government, which is obtaining information from the various interests concerned.

"Mr. McCaffery takes the ground that the fishing ought to be thrown open to all British subjects and to British subjects only. It would be as easy, he contends, to prevent over-fishing by limiting the hours and seasons for fishing, as by the present arrangement, whereby private rights in what is essentially the property of the state have been allowed to grow up.

"The present arrangement, he says, gives what is in effect a monopoly of the fishing to men who sometimes do not even reside in the locality and employ Asiatic labor largely.

"The government has as yet given no indication of its attitude in the matter."

## PROHIBITION BENEFIT TO TUGBOAT OWNERS

So Says Capt. George McGregor of the Victoria Tug Co.

VICTORIA, B.C., Dec. 10.—That prohibition has aided the Tug-boat owners to a large extent is the statement of Capt. George McGregor of the Victoria Tug Company, the largest operators out of this port.

Men who formerly blew in their pay on drink now send it home, keeping their families or the old folks. The boats are now decent places to employ young fellows, and the men stay with the boats longer and work better. Capt. McGregor says. While formerly one month was about the limit of employment of deck hands and firemen, men now stick it for many months.

Capt. McGregor has instituted the practice of hiring young High School boys and training them until they get their mates or masters' certificates. Taking the three years required at sea before they can go up for their papers the boys on the tugs learn the British Columbia coastal waters even better than they would on the larger boats. And they have proved good workers, too, Capt. McGregor states. The policy of hiring the young fellows, he says, has helped his business and helped them. The pay and the life are good, and at the same time men are being trained for Canadian ships.

During the war the various ship owners on the British Columbia coast commenced training young fellows in view of the shortage of experienced seamen.

## FRANK HEWITT LOST LIFE AT THE NAAS

Blew Off His Own Leg With Shotgun When He Slipped on Rocks.

Frank Hewitt, a former employee of the Granby Company at Anyox, was accidentally killed on the Naas River when his left leg was blown off at the knee. According to the explanation he gave before he died, Hewitt slipped on a rock, his shotgun falling, with the result that both barrels were discharged and he received the shot before it had spread.

Hewitt and a partner were trapping for the winter along the banks of the Naas River, and it was while going down the line that the accident happened. Although he received first aid almost immediately, and was taken to a shack and made as comfortable as the stormy weather would permit, he passed away after several hours of suffering. The Naas, known to be a treacherous stream, was too rough to launch a boat, and medical aid reached the unfortunate man too late to be of any assistance.

Frank Hewitt was well known in Anyox, and many friends here regret his passing. As far as can be learned his parents are somewhere in the United States, although he admitted that he did not know where. The remains will be buried at Anyox.

posals endorsed by the meeting:  
 (a) The right to build and operate a salmon cannery should be granted to all white British subjects.  
 (b) Gill net licenses should be granted to all British subjects, but a provision made for gradually eliminating Oriental fishermen.  
 (c) Purse seine licenses should be granted to all white British subjects.  
 (d) Drag seines should be abolished except where no other mode of fishing can be utilized, or where canneries entirely depend on them for their supply. The unscrupulous use of drag

seines is destroying a great many creeks very rapidly.  
 (c) The price of cannery and all fishing licenses should be greatly reduced.  
 (f) The close season should be extended, beginning with an increase of 12 hours the coming season.

 (h) Legislation should be introduced enacting drastic penalties where licensees are fishing out streams, and these licenses should be taken away.  
 (i) The patrol system should be multiplied, and an elaborate program for the preservation of our spawning grounds introduced.
