## General Store, Hotel and Barber Shop Are Destroyed by Flames

Damage Estimated at \$16,000 is Done When Conflagration Sweeps Interior Town-Origin of Blaze Has Not Yet Been Ascertained

BURNS LAKE, May 11:-A disastrous fire of unknown origin this morning destroyed H. J. Jewell's general store and all its contents as well as the Lakeview Hotel and Kissock's barber shop. Most of the contents of the last-mentioned two buildings were saved. The total loss is estimated at about \$15,000. There was great excitement during the fire which swept one of the closely built parts of the town.




