MADRID, May 11:—Defiant of every effort to restore order, mobs surged through the streets of Madrid today, burning four Roman Catholic institutions and attacking numerous others in anti-church demonstrations.

Three Years In Penitentiary On Kitwancool Indian Because He Took Life of Tribesman

Mr. Justice W. A. Macdonald, in the Supreme Court Assizes late Saturday night, passed sentence of three years' imprisonment at New Westminster Penitentiary upon Samuel Douse, Kitwancool Indian, who was found guilty on Friday of manslaughter in connection with the death of Silas Brown, another native, at Kitwancool on the night of January 9 last.

When asked if there was anything to say before the sentence of the court was passed upon him, Douse replied through an interpreter: "It is impossible that a crowd of people should throw stones at my life which is already shattered and destroyed. I know the weight of punishment of the world is on me. I turn and submit to my father, the King, and plead and ask for mercy. I am a poor, weak man, the youngest of the family."

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Fred Wiggins Is Acquitted By Jury on Charge of Trying to Burn Down Store at Southbank

The crown failed at the Supreme Court Assizes here on Saturday to produce convincing evidence that Fred Wiggins, Southbank merchant, had attempted to burn the store of Phil Brunell, another merchant at that small Francois Lake settlement, on the night on January 9-10 last and the jury brought in a verdict of not guilty, on a charge of arson. Wiggins being immediately released from custody.

The only evidence the crown had in its endeavor to incriminate Wiggins were a thread of grey wool yarn, a quantity of cotton batting and some wood shavings. The contention was that the thread of wool, which was found caught to the wall of Brunell's store about twenty-one inches from where the fire attempt was made, came from an old sweater belonging to Wiggins; that the cotton batting, which was saturated with kerosene and shoved through an augur hole, then being set fire to, came from an old quilt in the possession of accused, and that shavings or sawdust found in the grooves of Wiggins' brace and bit were identical with those found below and believed to have been ejected from the augur hole in the wall of Brunell's store.

SAFETY JOB STARTED

Store of F. E. Hunt Ltd. Entered By Burglars But Got Only Twelve Dollars

Some time last night or early this morning, a burglar or burglars entered the ship chandlery store of F. E. Hunt Ltd. on the local waterfront and attempted to crack the safe. The dial was pried off but no further entry was made to the safe.

WIGGINS ASKED ACQUITTAL

At the conclusion of crown evidence, W. E. Williams K.C., defence counsel, moved for acquittal on the grounds that there was no prima facie evidence to show accused had committed arson.

The judge, however, thought that there were circumstances that the jury should pass upon. Wiggins then took the stand on his own behalf. He had been a storekeeper at Southbank since four years ago next September. He had a moderate sized business in groceries, small hardware, shoes, clothing etc. Brunell had opened up his store at Southbank last April or May but it had not affected accused's business adversely so far as he could see.

Wiggins declared that he had had a turnover of some \$300 a month before May while, since then, it might have been around \$285. Falling prices might have had something to do with this. Accused did not attribute it to Brunell having opened the store. He and Brunell had always been on good terms. Wiggins declared.

WIGGINS ASKED ACQUITTAL

Wiggins, asked regarding his movements on the night of January 9 last, said that he had been in his store except for a short time when he had gone to the hotel to see about having some freighting done. He came back to his store, accompanied by two men. This was about 9 p.m. The two men remained until about 11 o'clock, one buying some tobacco while the other had two or three glasses of cider. Then accused went to bed, reading for a while before turning out his lamp to go to sleep.

Wiggins admitted that a grey sweater produced belonged to him. He had, however, not used it since the spring except for a cover for his blow.

Accused rose in the morning in the customary way and got his breakfast after lighting the fire. It was about 10 a.m. that he first heard of Brunell's fire, having learned about it from conversation from his store. Speaking of the quilt, accused declared that it did not belong to him. He did not know where it came (Continued on Page 2)

RAZOR CASE IS NOW ON

Jury at Supreme Court Assizes Hearing Charge of Wounding Against Charles Olsen

The case of Rex vs. Charles Olsen is proceeding at the Supreme Court Assizes today before Mr. Justice W. A. Macdonald and a jury consisting of J. A. Morris, foreman, John Chapman, J. H. Birnie, William A. Boyce, William Anderson, William Robb, James McGlashan, George E. Hills, J. A. McDermott, A. B. Armstrong, W. H. Pettman and Charles Cundell.

W. E. Fisher is acting as crown prosecutor while W. E. Williams, assisted by T. W. Brown, is appearing as defence counsel. The crown contended to prove in evidence that accused, Charles Olsen deliberately slashed Warren Scott seriously about the face and neck with a razor last fall in a cabin near the junction of Second and Third Avenues after an altercation had taken place.

Warren Scott was the first witness. After him other participants in the alleged brawl gave testimony. The case is continuing. The taking of crown evidence had been completed at 1 o'clock this afternoon when the court rose until 2:15 p.m. for the noon recess.

COLLISION WITH TRAIN

One Killed and Two Seriously Burned Near Toledo, Ohio

TOLEDO, Ohio, May 11:—A tank truck and a train collided on a crossing here. The truck was demolished and the driver instantly killed. The engineer and fireman sustained serious burns by spurting flames when the contents of the tank truck caught fire.

ALL ROUND CUT OF TEN PER CENT MADE AT OCEAN FALLS

Word has reached the city that the Pacific Mills has made an all-round cut of 10% in wages at the Ocean Falls pulp and paper mill. However, to compensate for this, there has also been an all-round reduction of 10% not only in rent of houses but in store prices.

VANCOUVER HAS LEFT

Canadian Destroyer is Continuing Convoy of Seal Herd on Its Migration North

After a three-day stay in port, H. M. C. S. Vancouver sailed early this morning to continue her convoy of the fur seal herd on its annual migration north to the Pribilof Islands.

Yesterday morning the personnel of H.M.C.S. Vancouver had a parade to St. Andrew's Anglican Cathedral to attend divine service. The body was addressed by Dean Gibson.

### RADIO BROADCAST

Editor, Daily News:—

I have read with great interest the report in your paper dealing with the meeting of the Prince Rupert Radio Association and a question has arisen in my mind that I would like answered.

We read every so often in your paper and others of the progressiveness of our city and its citizens and yet when one of our young citizens steps out with the idea of starting a local broadcasting station the Radio Association puts its foot down and restricts him to daylight hours.

A second question arises. Are we true Canadians or not. A gentleman got up at the above mentioned meeting and asked if the proposed station would interfere with KOMO Seattle or any other U.S.A. station near the proposed channel. Mr. Batt was very conservative in his answer and said: "He would not say." Any one who knows a little about radio knows the effect of crystal control in keeping a station on its assigned wave band and the cutting out of one Yankee station ten kilocycles away from the local station would not matter as the local enthusiasts who would sooner listen to Uncle Sam would have lots more to listen to.

Aside from interference. Have we not here in Prince Rupert talent that is miles away ahead of some of the stuff we hear from the majority of the Pacific Coast stations? At least we have as good a collection of gramophone records and it would cut some of the power used and be a lot easier on tubes and speakers and still we could listen to the same hokey as we hear from station BUNK at Centreville OHO.

Let's get busy and put all the words that have been said about progress into actions and support this local project and give our musical clubs, Boys Band, etc. a chance to show the Northwest the town of Prince Rupert isn't a logging camp at the back of beyond.

## FRED WIGGINS IS ACQUITTED BY JURY ON CHARGE OF TRYING TO BURN DOWN STORE AT SOUTHBANK.

from. It had lain for some time over some boxes under the telephone. On the night of January 13, accused heard from Bruce Little that the police were looking for an old quilt in connection with their investigation of the fire and that, if Wiggins had one, he had better get rid of it. Tom Nolan came and asked if he could borrow some bedding. Accused pointed to the old quilt, saying that it was all he had. Nolan took it away.

### Officers on Scene

On January 16, police officers came to the store and searched it. They took the sweater and brace and bit and asked for the quilt. Fearing that some one was trying to work a game on him, accused denied having had a quilt or knowing anything about one.

Accused then described the clothing he was wearing, stating that a black sweater and blue jumper had been his costume all winter. He gave details as to buildings which he used in connection with his store.

Accused admitted that a brace and bit produced in court was his. He had had it ever since he came to the country in 1919. He used it to bore bungs out of cider kegs. He had once loaned it out and it had come back very dull so he had to sharpen it up. It would have been quite easy for anyone to come into his store and take away the brace and bit while he was out, also returning it surreptitiously. There were several other persons in Southbank who wore sweaters like accused's old grey one.

In conclusion, Wiggins specifically denied knowing anything whatever about the fire.

Under cross-examination, Wiggins said he might make a monthly profit of about \$75, roughly \$14 from the post office, which he kept, about \$10 from his gas station and about \$50 from the store. There might be people in Southbank who would "frame" evidence against him, accused declared. As for Bruce Little, "he is a friend to my face and an enemy to my back," accused declared. While he was by no means a rich man, accused asserted that he was not hard up. He had once inquired about purchasing the building he occupied but had never made a definite offer. The rent was \$5 a month. Accused would not say that he would be better off if Brunell's store had not been there.

Alvin Bratten, Uncha Lake logger, told how he had borrowed the grey blanket from Hugo Melander, a neighbor at Uncha, to use it as a horse blanket. He told Melander he would leave the blanket at Wiggins' store after he was finished with it. This he did, leaving it one day when Wiggins was on the other side of the partition and did not see.

### No Smell

Under cross-examination, Bratten was unable to find horse hairs or smell the odor of horses on the blanket which he identified as being the one he had left at Wiggins' store for Melander.

Constable Tait was recalled for the purpose of settling a point in conversation when he had searched Wiggins' store for the quilt. Wiggins said that he never had had such a quilt.

Mr. Williams, defence counsel, in addressing the jury, pointed out that arson was never committed without motive and no motive had been shown in connection with this

Were there not others who would have benefitted from a fire in Brunell's store. Defence counsel contended that all actions of the accused had been consistent with innocence. It was not reasonable to think that, had Wiggins set the fire, he would have left a trail of evidence leading to his door. There was no definite evidence that the shavings in accused's brace and bit had come from the wall of Brunell's store, that the piece of yarn was from accused's sweater or that the cotton batting

had come from his quilt. He submitted that the crown had not proved its case beyond a reasonable doubt. Such evidence as there was was entirely circumstantial and he felt justified in asking the jury to acquit Wiggins. A. M. Johnson K.C., crown counsel, admitted that the evidence was largely circumstantial. He asked the jury, however, to consider the silent witnesses in the piece of yarn found near the auger hole, the nature of the cotton batting and the

shavings. He submitted that the circumstances were consistent with accused's guilt. As for the the evidence of Bretton, Mr. Johnson suggested that it was most improbable and, possibly, a "fairy story." All the evidence pointed in the direction of the accused's guilt. Was not his action in denying the quilt an evidence of guilt? Mr. Justice W. A. Macdonald reviewed the charge and dealt at some length with the question of reasonable doubt. In circumstantial evi-

dence, it was necessary to have a strong chain with each link pointing in the direction of accused before there could be a conviction. His Lordship discussed the evidence very briefly and declared that it was for the jury to form its own conclusions. The jury retired at 9:41 p.m. His Lordship this morning ordered his brace and bit returned to Wiggins. The old sweater and quilt will be destroyed.

Special Meeting Was Held at Citadel Last Night to Mark Occasion


There was an appropriate Mother's Day service at the Salvation Army Citadel last night. The attendance was quite large.

slaughter is imprisonment for life or there may be a much lesser degree of punishment.

"I think that the Indians should try to realize that the authorities are trying to treat them fairly and that they should not use firearms in doing harm either to themselves or to any other person.

"I know that, for an Indian, imprisonment for life is heavier than for those who might be used to being confined indoors. Certain circumstances have been brought to my attention as well as the recommendation of the jury for leniency of sentence. Whatever further representations on your behalf may result, my duty is to impose a sentence which I consider very lenient under the circumstances. I understand you have been in jail since last January. I am not certain as to the date but, so as it may be definitely ascertained, the sentence of the court is imprisonment for three years as from January 15, 1931."
