STEAMSHIP AMALGAMATION IS PLAN

THORNTON URGES GOVERNMENT STOP SHIPPING BUSINESS

Canadian National To Pool Its Coast Steamers With Those of C.P.R.; Scheme Being Considered

Service Would Be Extended to California—Duplication Would Be Eliminated and Economies Effected—Big Boats to Run South

OTTAWA, June 25.—Sir Henry Thornton, president of the Canadian National Railways, announced before the special committee of the House of Commons yesterday that the Canadian National was considering pooling its passenger boats on the Pacific Coast with those of the Canadian Pacific and extending the joint service to San Francisco. This, Sir Henry added, was only one of two or three important joint arrangements pending with the Canadian Pacific Railway.

Fined For Filling Milk Bottles In London Streets

LONDON, June 24.—What was probably the first case of the kind in this country was the fining of a dairyman by a Southport magistrate recently for filling milk bottles in the street. For the prosecution it was stated that bottles should be filled only on registered premises. It would have been lawful for the defendant to fill a customer's vessel in the street, but apparently, he could not fill his own bottles there. The act bearing on the case has been in operation since 1926 but has not heretofore been tested. The fine was \$5.

OTTAWA, June 25.—The proposed trade agreement with Australia will necessitate a number of changes in the tariff schedules brought down in the budget, Premier Bennett told the House of Commons yesterday.

JOHNSON CRITICAL

California Senator Does Not Like Hoover Moratorium Plan

SAN FRANCISCO, June 25.—Senator Hiram Johnson of California yesterday bitterly assailed the proposal of President Herbert Hoover for a one year's moratorium for the nations on intergovernment war debt payments. Senator Johnson saw this proposal as the first move toward complete cancellation of debts owing the United States.

VICTIMS OF DEATH PLOT

Emil Toscanini and Wife of San Pedro Suicide at Blaine

BLAINE, Wash., June 25.—Victims of a double suicide pact, Emil Toscanini and his wife of San Pedro are dead here. Toscanini had been arrested here on a charge of having absconded with funds of a San Pedro bank of which he was cashier. He and his wife were allowed to spend the night alone in a hotel room and yesterday morning both were found dead. They were supposed to be fleeing to Canada.

NO STAMPS REQUIRED

Private Enterprise in South Africa Delivers Mail in Opposition to Post Office

PRETORIA, S.A., June 25.—Some municipalities and business firms have undertaken to deliver their own correspondence, thus saving the cost of postage stamps, and the General Post Office at Pretoria has been approached regarding this matter. The Post Office, however, states that there is no intention of reducing the rate of postage for local postal matter to half that obtaining outside the local area, as requested by many merchants, backed up by outside municipalities. The Post Office authorities hold the view that no private enterprise can cope with any large amount of mail matter, particularly in the large centres like Johannesburg and Pretoria. Johannesburg, for example has a postal area of about 80 square miles and a street mileage of from 800 to 900 miles. Even supposing private enterprise undertook the task of delivering letters and other matter to any extent, it is considered by the Post Office that much delay would result and, further, that the expense would be heavier than that incurred by posting.

LIKES HER OLD HOME

Mary Pickford Sorry to Hear That Birthplace is to Be Torn Down

TORONTO, June 25.—It was evident when Mary Pickford and Douglas Fairbanks arrived in Toronto recently after their "second honeymoon" trip to England that Mary has a real interest in this city, her birthplace. She said she was sorry to hear that her old home on University Avenue was being torn down. When told of the splendid developments of that thoroughfare, Mary said: "I am glad to hear that the city is making such advances," and then continued with a childhood remembrance of walking down the street to Sunday School too conscious of some new squeaking shoes.

No Development In Connection With Speedboat

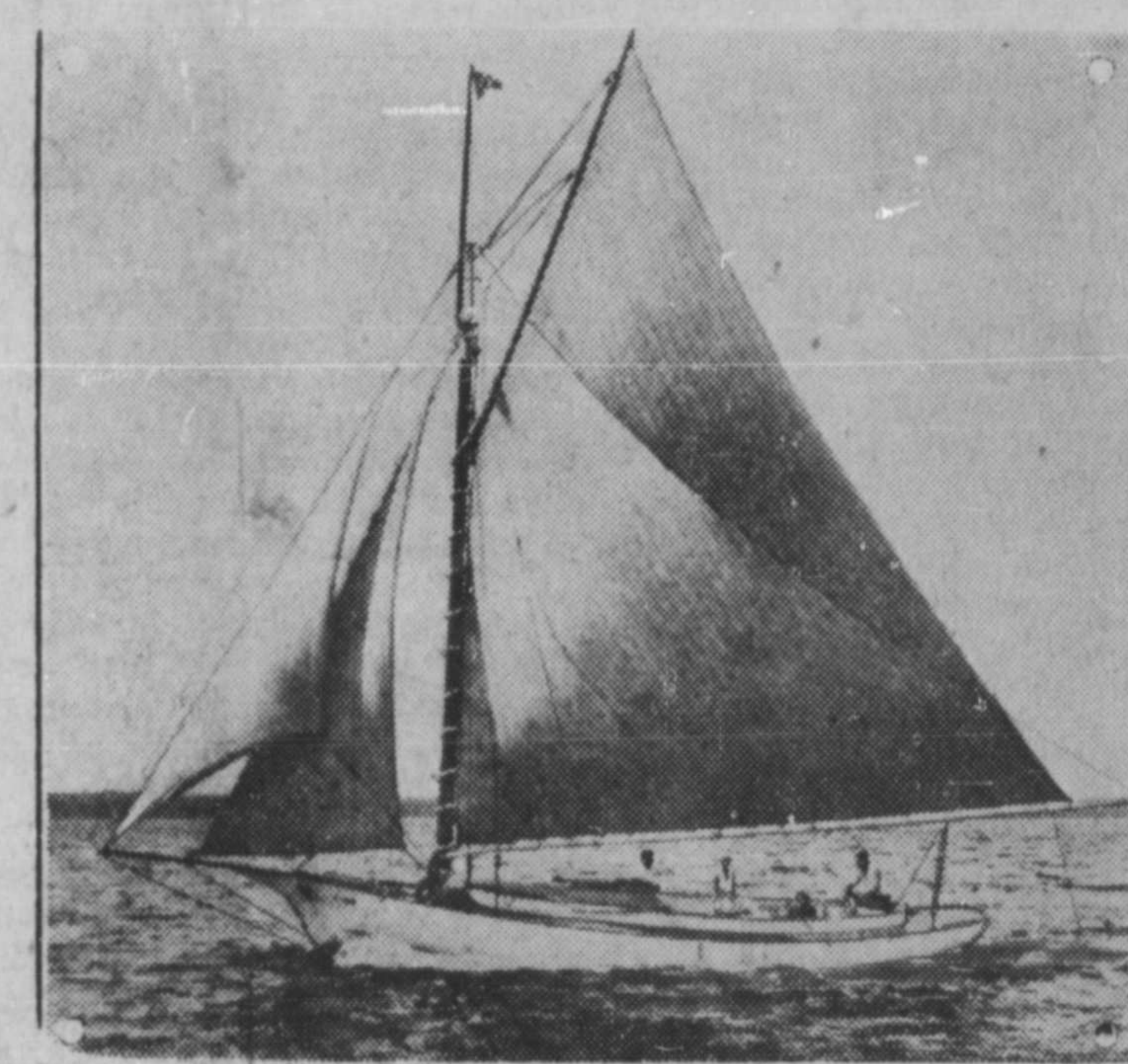

TO CRUISE ON COAST

General Atterbury, Pennsylvania Railroad Head, in Vancouver

VANCOUVER, June 25.—General W. W. Atterbury, of Philadelphia, president of the Pennsylvania Railroad, will arrive in Vancouver next Tuesday morning over Canadian National Railways on a combined business and pleasure visit to the Pacific Coast. He is accompanied by Mrs. Atterbury and their two sons. After a short visit to Vancouver, the party will go aboard General Atterbury's private yacht Armina, which has been tied up in the harbor for several days waiting their arrival. It is General Atterbury's intention to cruise along the Northern British Columbia coast and also call in at several points on the Alaskan coast. It is also expected this party will visit Seattle.

Sloop Sea Fox Recently Lost

W. J. Greer to Build New Bishop's House on Fourth Avenue West

W. J. Greer was last night awarded the contract for the erection of the new Anglican Bishop's house on Fourth Avenue West, adjoining the grounds of St. Andrew's Anglican Cathedral. Construction of the house, which will be one of the most imposing residence buildings in the city, will commence at once.

Some Decision Should Be Reached In Matter Of Steamship Service

"Either Go In With Effective Weapons or Get Out," C. N. R. Head Advises Parliamentary Committee On Railways and Steamships

OTTAWA, June 25.—Appointment of a government commission to investigate the general transportation system in Canada was suggested today by Sir Henry Thornton, president of the Canadian National Railways, before the Parliamentary committee on railways and shipping. Some decision should be reached, Sir Henry said, as to whether the Canadian Government Merchant Marine fleet of 30 ships should be continued. "We should either go into the business with effective weapons or get out of it," Sir Henry said. "Personally, I recommend we get out."

LIVED HERE MANY YEARS

Death came as a happy release to suffering of over a year.

PICNICKERS CARELESS

We draw special attention to a letter published today in which an ultimatum is given that picnickers must use more discretion at Digby Island or the privileges of using it as a picnic ground will be stopped.

What is true of Digby Island is true also at other places. Men, women and children when they get away for a holiday are sometimes carried away by the excitement of the occasion and want to do some mischief.

In the city the taking of flowers is another case of thoughtless vandalism. Spoiling a garden is worse than desecrating a grave. Complaints still come in of this being done in a small way. A good deal of education is required to bring people to a realization of their duties as citizens in protecting what is really public property.

UNEMPLOYMENT IN THE WEST

The Nelson News is one of the latest newspapers to take up the cudgels for the west and to demand "a wholesale plan of work which will extend over a long period." It says:

"Hon. Gideon Robertson, Dominion minister of labor, is at present in British Columbia, and on Monday discussed unemployment conditions at the coast with the mayors of various provincial municipalities. Mr. Robertson admitted the seriousness of affairs, but urged the cities and villages to co-operate with the provinces and the Dominion to relieve the pressure.

"Several Kootenay centres had delegations present. Kaslo and Fernie delegations showed how hard hit their communities had been through the low price of metals and labor conditions. Mr. Robertson no doubt learned a lot about western conditions at that gathering.

"While not officially stated, it is presumed his trip is to look into conditions, after which he might lay down some scheme of federal relief. Upon his report the government will likely arrive at measures to give financial aid.

"The past year municipalities have shared with the provincial and Dominion governments in relief work. But as Fernie and Kaslo authorities stated at Victoria, some municipalities have reached the limit. They have done their best, and cannot further raise money for such relief work. Other municipalities, who possibly could scrape up the money, cannot find any local work to do under such a relief scheme. But while municipalities declare the strain is heavy, they will have to do something. The Dominion government must be prepared to do even more.

"What this western country needs is some kind of work, and in a hurry. A wholesale plan of work which will extend over a long period would aid greatly. If the minister gets in touch with the men of the west who know conditions as they really are, and which he seems to be doing at present, he cannot but recommend to Ottawa that action be taken in this western territory forthwith."

VANDALISM AT DIGBY ISLAND

Editor, Daily News:— Would you be kind enough to publish the following in your valuable paper for the benefit of the people who prize Digby as a picnic ground.

On Sunday, the day of the Moose picnic the Isolation Hospital on Hospital Island was broken into twice in the course of two hours, in one instance by pulling the boards off the windows and breaking the glass, and again by forcing the basement doors. On the occasion of the High School picnic a few days previous a window was forced that was not boarded, and today entry was gained by scaling the roof and breaking the glass out of an attic window and by forcing the basement doors which had been barred by a two-by-four.

As you may know, there is a 10-foot fence across the approach from the bridge, and on Sunday I saw a woman get jammed on that fence trying to get over it. There are three notices on the property stating "No Trespassing" and one of these is on the gate at the bridge.

This thing has got to stop. If there is further vandalism by parties coming over here I will be compelled to use the authority vested in me and bar boats from landing at Digby float. This is not a public float and a notice nailed there states this fact. Apart from the above, the visitors seem to think that the gardens and houses of the operators and the office building itself are open to all and sundry to take the flowers or anything they can lay their hands on. Last Sunday owing to the people running in and out of the office the operator on duty was forced to lock the door and was treated to a shower of gravel through the window for his trouble. I would like to point out to the public that the wireless station is every bit as private as any telegraph office in town and that they have absolutely no right in there except on business.

Last Sunday the recording sheet from the Sunshine Recorder was taken away and names and initials carved all over the place. The police are being notified and arrangements will be made to meet boats at Rupert returning from Digby whose occupants are found trespassing or defacing property over here.

I do not wish to spoil anybody's fun, but there is no fun attached to the facts stated above.

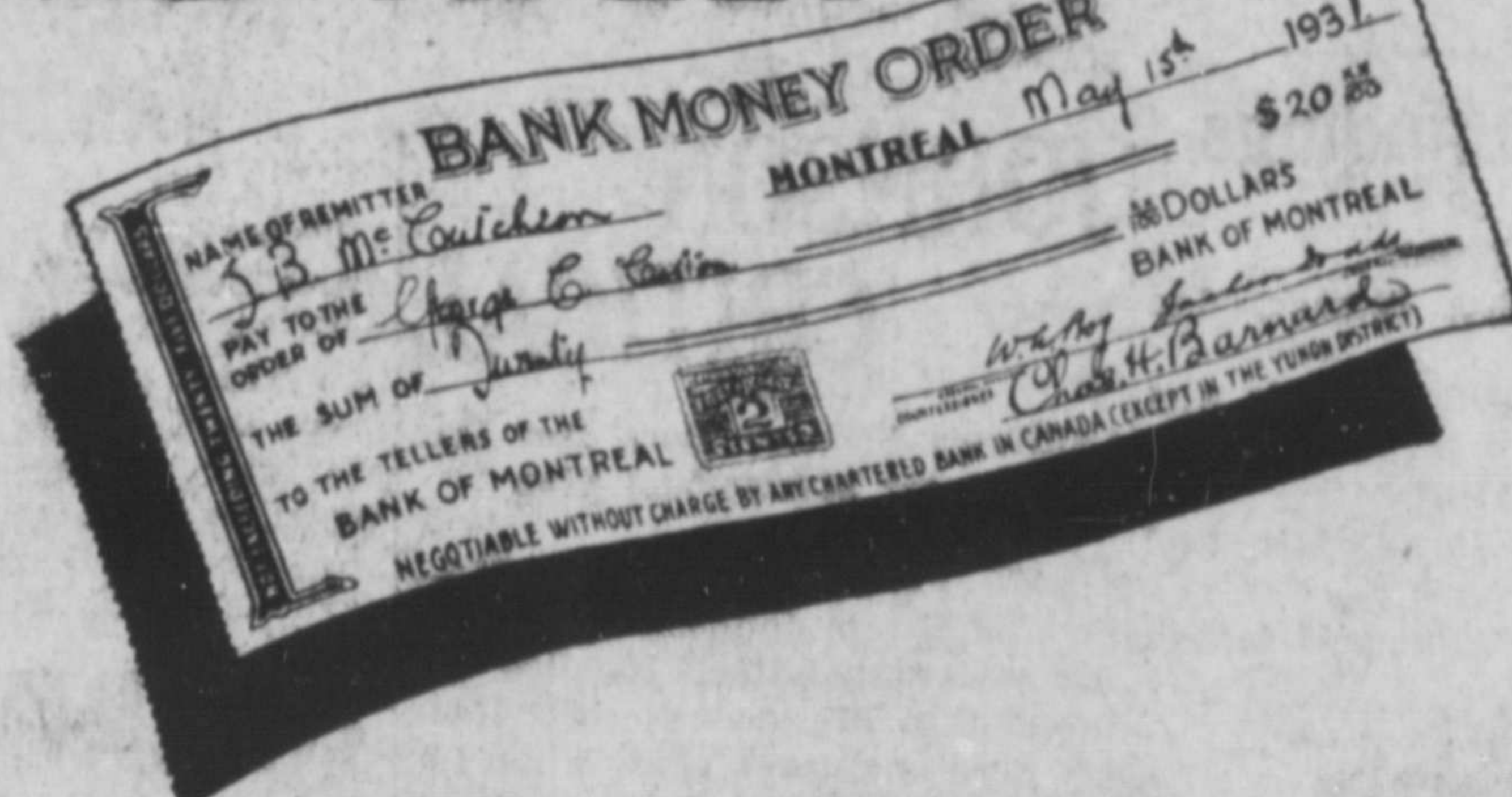

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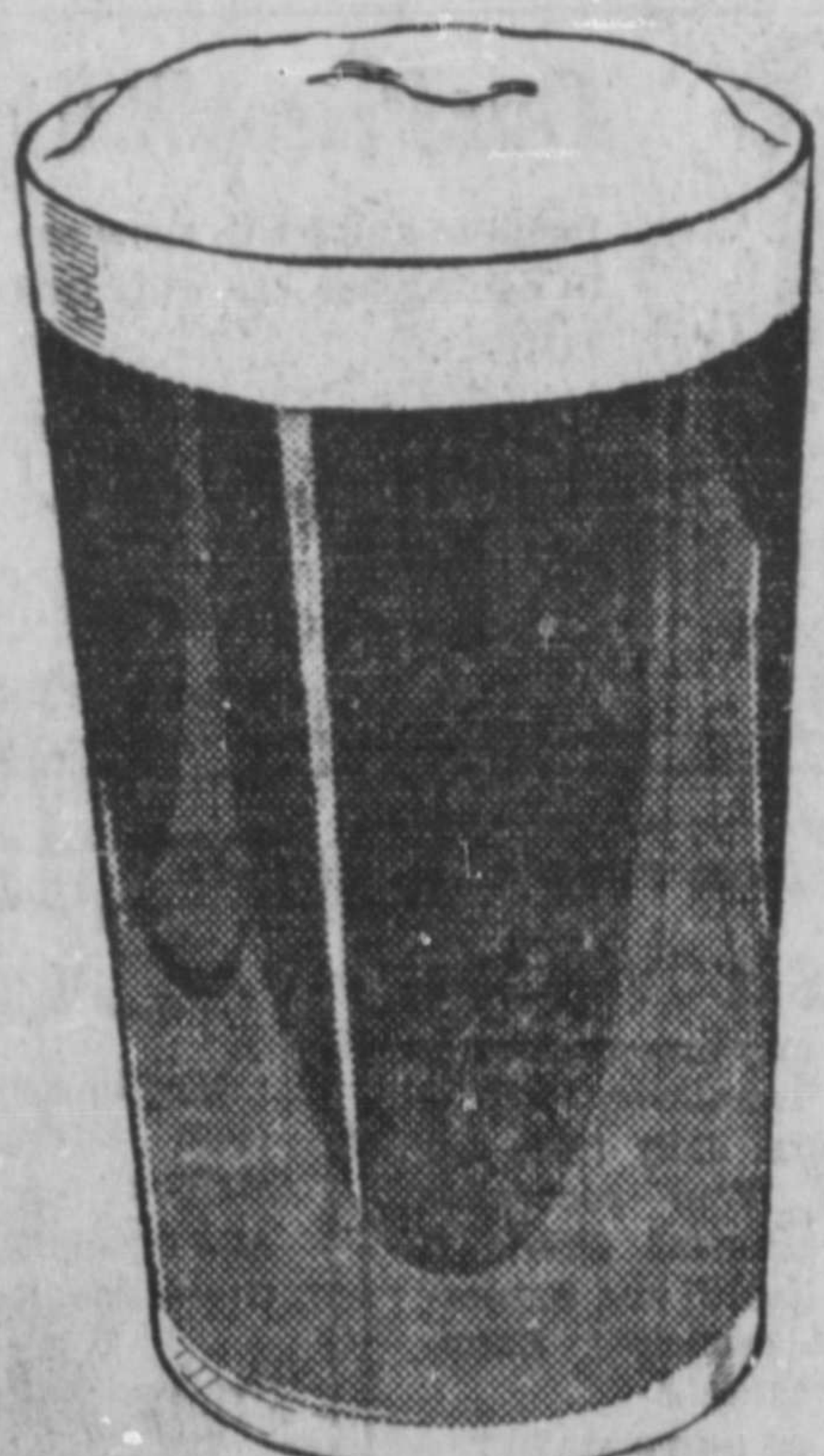

PRESS IS NECESSARY

Plays Prominent Part in Public Progress, Declares Governor-General of Australia

SYDNEY, Aust., June 25:—"The press is absolutely necessary to public progress," said Sir Isaac Isaacs, Governor-General of Australia, in an address at a recent luncheon here given by the New South Wales Institute of Journalists. He did not think that the power of the press had been more effectively described than by the poet Byron, when he said, "A drop on ink . . . produces that which makes thousands, perhaps millions, think." Following the traditions of British journalism, there had never been a design on the part of newspapers in Australia wilfully to mislead, though many people might have been misled by accident. The prosperity and welfare of a country might be endangered and justice and morality might be thwarted if the public were purposely misled. Sir Isaac spoke in glowing terms of the present-day journalist, and said that as a Minister of the Crown of some experience in the past he had never been "let down" or deceived by a journalist.
