LEAGUE IS DRAWING UP PEACE TERMS

MINISTER TELLS OF IMPROVED CONDITIONS IN DOMINION

Comparative Peace Prevails in Manchuria As Truce Dealings in Paris Proceeds; Both Obstinate

BLOCKADE DECLARED

Chinese Dealers in Vancouver Will Not Handle Japanese Goods

VANCOUVER, Nov. 23.—Out of sympathy for the Manchurian situation, local Chinese dealers have declared a blockade against all Japanese Christmas goods.

Local Japanese declare that they are not worried as a result. Japanese oranges, for instance, of which Chinese dealers usually handle a large quantity, are always greatly in demand and, if they are not sold through one channel, they will be through another, declare the Japanese.

LIBERAL MEETING

National Organization Committee Opens Session Today Under Mackenzie King

OTTAWA, Nov. 23.—Matters of finance and organization were under discussion when the national Liberal organization committee met here today with some sixty prominent Liberals present from all provinces. Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King presided.

British Columbia representatives at the meeting are Hon. Ian Mackenzie, Senator J. H. King, Wendell B. Farris and George Martin.

CONDITIONS ARE BETTER

Hudson Bay Co. Head Expresses Pleasure at State of Business Affairs in Canada

NEW YORK, Nov. 23.—Before sailing from here on the steamer Britannic at the end of the week for his home in London, England, Major G. Ashley Cooper, president of the Hudson Bay Co., declared that he had found conditions in Canada definitely better than he had believed they were before leaving England.

Major Cooper spent two and a half months in Canada and visited all the more important centres of his company's business activity.

OFFICERS ARE FREE

Acquittal Brought in in Connection With Shooting of Mexican President's Relative

OKLAHOMA, Nov. 23.—William Guest and Cecil Crosby, state police officers, were found not guilty by a jury on charges arising out of the shooting last June of a young relative of the President of Mexico. The officers were able to prove that they had shot before they were fired upon.

Japan Insists on Maintaining Army in Zone of Hostilities; China Will Not Consent Mediating Body Is Criticized

PARIS, Nov. 23.—Comparative peace prevailed in Manchuria yesterday although the Japanese were reported to be alarmed at a mobilization of troops on the Chinese Eastern Railway beyond Tsihiar which is now being held by the Japanese forces. Despite his defeat in the Tsihiar engagement last week, General Mah Chan Shan has gathered up the remnants of his army and has established a provincial government seat at Hailun, terminus of the Hargin-Hailun Railway.

OPTIMISM JUSTIFIED

Hon. H. H. Stevens Addresses Canadian Life Assurance Officers Toronto Convention

TORONTO, Nov. 23.—Urging his listeners to carry on a campaign of optimism which is fairly based on facts so far as Canada is concerned, Hon. H. H. Stevens, minister of trade and commerce, addressed the Canadian Life Assurance officers convention here on Saturday.

For the year ending September 30, 1931, Mr. Stevens declared that there had been a marked improvement in many industries including woollens, textiles, footwear, printing, etc. The minister also referred to the notable improvement in Canada's trade balance this year and the increase in construction projects including homes.

TRAINLOAD OF WHEAT

Grain Is Continuing to Roll in Large Quantities to Local Elevator

A full train of 38 carloads of wheat arrived last night from the prairies for the Alberta Wheat Pool's local elevator. The house is not half full of grain as yet but, according to railway reports, there is enough wheat on the way to fill it.

No word is available as to when ships might be here to load grain for export.

The trainload of grain arriving this morning together with 51 carloads which came in Saturday night make a total of 129 cars at present remaining to be unloaded in the yards. This morning there were reported to be a total of 385 cars on the territory west of Jasper Park bound here.

Soldiers and Bandits Clash in Nicaragua

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, Nov. 23.—In a clash between 1500 Nicaraguan government soldiers and an unknown number of bandits on Saturday, two men were killed and 13 wounded. All the casualties were among the rebel ranks.

Los Angeles Nurse Took Her Own Life

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 23.—Determined to commit suicide, Miss Frances Miller failed in an attempt to jump into the ocean Saturday night but soon after threw herself in front of a street car by which she was killed.

WINTER IN VANCOUVER

Heavy Snowfall Followed By Sharp Frost at End of week—Mountain Highway Blocked

NORTH VANCOUVER, Nov. 23.—Blockaded with snow and with the snow plough temporarily disabled, Grouse Mountain Highway was closed to traffic over the week-end. There is three feet of hard snow on the mountain slopes to which many hikers were attracted on Saturday and Sunday.

On Friday of last week, Vancouver had its coldest weather so far this winter, the thermometer registering 24 above zero.

TIGHTEN UP ON RECRUITS

Qualification Standard Raised By United States Owing to Numerous Volunteers

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 23.—With many more men, owing to unemployment, trying to enter the United States army, the war department has decided to raise the standard of intelligence and other qualifications required of recruits.

UNITED STATES TO FIGHT NEW TARIFF

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 23.—The United States is preparing to meet the British tariff against this country with a tariff against Britain. A system of countervailing duties will be imposed which will impose duties on English goods equal to those imposed by Britain on United States goods.

OUTLET IS ADVOCATED

H. O. Richer Urges Peace Pass Route Tells of Progress in British Columbia Block

VANCOUVER, Nov. 23.—The Peace River Pass offers an easy grade and good building and operating conditions for a railway outlet for the Peace River country, it is declared by H. O. Richer, who has returned here after a six months' tour of the Peace River country.

Dawson Creek, now the end of steel, is rapidly taking on metropolitan proportions, said Mr. Richer. The Fort St. John district is the finest farming area he ever saw. Hudson's Hope has all the physical requirements and resources to make a great city of the future. All three towns are in the British Columbia block.

Mr. Richer is not much impressed with politicians and governments that cannot decide upon the building of the coast outlet which would open up an empire of enormously productive country and give work for all the unemployed of British Columbia for some time.

NURSE IS GIVEN UP

Hope For Safety of Miss Mary Warburton, 60-year Old Hiker, Is Abandoned

NORTH VANCOUVER, Nov. 23.—A third search party having returned here at the week-end without finding trace of the woman, search for Miss Mary Warburton, 60-year old nurse, who has been missing for over a month on a hike from Squamish to North Vancouver, has been definitely given up.

The last search party, headed by F. W. Haddington, a prospector, who is familiar with the country which Miss Warburton was travelling, reported on returning here on Saturday that heavy snowfall had completely obliterated all trails in the vicinity where Miss Warburton was last traced.

DOPE RING DISCOVERED

Federal Officers Arrest Men and Seize Narcotics in Tennessee

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Nov. 23.—A drug ring operating throughout the south is believed to have been uncovered as a result of the arrest near here on Sunday by federal officers of seven alleged leaders in the illicit trade together with seizure of a large amount of narcotics. A system of conveying drugs by airplane was revealed.

FOUR YEARS IS IMPOSED

Young Vernon Englishman Sent to Penitentiary on Account of Small Boy's Death

VERNON, Nov. 23.—Found guilty of manslaughter in connection with the death of a four-year old boy, Thomas Oliver, 18-year old English youth, was sentenced to four years in penitentiary at the Supreme Court Assizes here on Saturday.

Winnipeg Wheat Market Advance

All Futures Showed Gain of From 1c to 1 1/4c on Saturday

WINNIPEG, Nov. 23.—After a two-day slump, all wheat futures advanced on the local wheat market on Saturday. Gains at the close were from 1c to 1 1/4c over Friday's close.

Woman Committed On Theft Charge

Mrs. Edith Fitzgerald Sent to Higher Court For Alleged Stealing of Diamond Rings

Mrs. Edith Fitzgerald was committed for trial by Magistrate McClymont in city police court this morning on a charge of theft of four diamond rings. Mrs. Fitzgerald was arrested in Vancouver ten days ago and brought here for trial. She had left the city for the south about a month previous.

It is alleged that Mrs. Fitzgerald stole the rings from friends and then gave them away.

POLICY OF DEMOCRATS

Those Who Contributed to Campaign Fund to be Asked for Views on Prohibition

NEW YORK, Nov. 23.—Thousands of people who contributed to Democratic campaign funds in the last presidential election will be asked to express their views on the matter of prohibition, it was announced yesterday by Chairman Raskob. The object of this move is to decide whether the party should come out definitely in favor of prohibition or opposed.

THE DOMINION LOAN

The selling campaign for the Dominion Government loan of \$150,000,000 commences today and it is expected that within a day or two it will be reported fully subscribed. There is money in Canada and the new bonds looks very attractive as they pay slightly over five and a half per cent.

If this loan goes over well it will be a great object lesson to governments to do their financing in Canada rather than selling in other countries and be liable to a possible discount in repayment.

Canadian securities are sound and the Canadian people have money to invest. If they buy the bonds they will get a much better rate of interest than the savings banks can pay and the bonds are always convertible into cash. There are today few securities that stand higher than the Dominion Government bond, such as is being offered to the Canadian people at a very attractive price.

Should a tariff war develop between Britain and United States it will prove one of the most interesting battles in history. For years the United States has been levying on articles of British manufacture sold in that country. Now the United States is objecting to a belated retaliation.

CONFERENCE ON SILVER

Considerable demand is being made, particularly in Canada and the United States, for a conference on the silver question with the purpose of stabilizing the price of the metal. This does not meet with favor from President Hoover or from the heads of the British Government, all of whom seem to be agreed that this is not a suitable time for such a conference.

The refusal to consider calling a conference and the absence of any reason for the refusal has set everyone speculating as to what it is all about. Why are the big men of the English speaking world holding back? There must be a good reason and it seems as if it is a reason they cannot at present give to the world. Possibly we shall know the reason later.

NEWS OF THE MINES AROUND PRINCE RUPERT

Anyox Assayer Leaves For Korea—Interest in Taku Keen—Coal in Peace River Block

S. V. Crompton of the Granby Co.'s assay office at Anyox left the smelter town last week for Vancouver enroute to Korea where he will take a position with an English-owned gold mining and milling company. Mr. Crompton was at Anyox for about a year, having gone there from Allenby where he was for six years on the Granby Co.'s assay office staff. Mr. Crompton will sail from Vancouver for the Orient on the Empress of Russia on November 24.

New interest has been aroused in the mineral possibilities of the Taku River country by the news that the Treadwell Co. has taken new holdings there and the recent sale of the Whitewater group of claims to the Timmins interests of Toronto. The Timmins interests are reported to have agreed to pay D. J. MacDougall, Walter Barron, Ray Walker, William Strong, Arthur Heidman and Ray Rice, all of Taku, \$125,000 in three annual instalments for the Whitewater group of gold quartz claims. As soon as the papers covering the deal are signed the initial payment will be made. Arrangements for the deal were made last summer when Mr. Timmins and his associate, J. B. Woodworth of Vancouver, visited the district. Beginning of extensive development

Close by Hudson's Hope in the Peace River Block of British Columbia are famous undeveloped deposits of high class bituminous coal estimated at 900 million tons with indications of both oil and natural gas in great quantities.

Frank Perry, veteran northern prospector, was in Vancouver a few days ago after having spent the summer in the Liard River district of Northern British Columbia in which area he has been for years active. The territory in which he has been working is 700 miles long and runs northeast of the Liard River. In 1925 it will be remembered, Mr. Perry inspired the aerial expedition of Archibald Little, Detroit mining engineer, and Col. J. Scott Williams, aviator, into the Cassiar district on prospecting bent.

**DEFENDING
FREDERICKS**

A. H. McNeill is Counsel in Murder Appeal

A. H. McNeill K.C. of Vancouver was appointed by the crown to conduct the appeal of Karl Fredericks, young German, against a death sentence imposed at the last session of the Supreme Court Assizes in Prince George for the murder in June of last year of his two companions, Max Westphal and Herman Peter, in the vicinity of Trembleur Lake.

The crown is financing the appeal of Fredericks who is without funds. The proceedings started last week in Vancouver.

A. R. McDougall is assisting Mr. McNeill in the presentation of the appeal.

At the opening session of the Court of Appeal, permission was granted Fredericks to present his grounds of appeal.

The ground on which a new trial was asked was that a statement made by Fredericks to the police at Prince George on December 8 was not admissible in evidence. A. M. Johnson K.C., crown counsel, refused to submit the statement at the trial but it was admitted in evidence by the trial judge when submitted by the defence. It was also claimed that the trial judge had failed to instruct the jury with respect to the statement.

The Court of Appeal reserved its judgment until November 24. Fredericks is under sentence to hang on December 3.

Fredericks, who is 32 years old, still insists that he was not the slayer of Max Westphal but that Herman Peter committed the deed and then committed suicide. Fredericks claims that he concealed the bodies for fear of suspicion being cast upon him.

**"Soul and Body"

Equipment For Mixed Trains Arrives—Heating System Said To Be Effective

Combination express and passenger coaches which are to be used in connection with the winter mixed train service on the local line of the Canadian National Railways arrived attached to yesterday afternoon's passenger train from the East. These cars will be used instead of the regular full day coaches during the winter.

The mixed trains in and out of here will also be equipped with sleepers and buffet-observation cars.

Heating of the cars will be effected by what are known as Baker stoves in each coach. From these stoves hot water heating radiates through each car. Railway officials state that the cars will be quite comfortable so far as heat is concerned and point out that such trains as these are in common use during the winter on the prairies where it gets much colder than it does here.
