## Sir Robert Borden is About To Retire From Public Life

### New Premier Will be Chosen by the Cabinet Council; Announcement of Change to be made at Early Date.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

OTTAWA, December 15.—After a vain endeavor to build up his health and strength sufficiently to cope with the duties devolving upon him, Sir Robert Borden has finally been forced to the conclusion, after consultation with nerve specialists of Toronto and Montreal, that he must retire from public life and make way for another leader of the Government. The Premier was forced to leave the cabinet council on Friday and was not present on Saturday. His retirement will take place early in the new year, indeed an announcement that Sir Robert is no longer premier may come at any time.

It is possible that Sir Robert may make an announcement of his retirement to a caucus of his followers about January 3.

It is said to be the opinion of a majority of the cabinet that a leader would be chosen by the cabinet council and six names were mentioned as possible candidates for the position. These are: Sir Thomas White, former minister of finance; Sir Henry Drayton, present minister of finance; Sir James Lougheed, leader of the Government in the Senate and minister of soldiers civil re-establishment; Hon. N. W. Rowell, president of the privy council; Hon. J. A. Calder, minister of immigration, and Hon. Arthur Meighen, minister of the interior.

OTTAWA, Dec. 15.—(Noon)—The morning Journal says in connection with the reported retirement of Sir Robert Borden that at least five ministers are likely to retire, including Sir George Foster, Sir Edward Kemp, Hon. A. L. Sifton, Hon. C. J. Doherty, and Hon. Martin Burrell.

LONDON, Dec. 15.—The Yorkshire Post, referring to the report that Premier Borden will accept some office under the League of Nations, says the people in London know what possibilities the League may possess. At present no unimportant office would be offered to Sir Robert Borden, who would make an admirable first president of the League, if such an office were created.

## AUSTRALIAN GOVERNMENT SUSTAINED

### Farmers Hold Balance of Power With 11 Seats, But Support Administration.

MELBOURNE, Dec. 15.—Virtually complete election returns received today show that the Liberal and Nationalist-Labor parties who support the Australian Government have won 35 seats in the House of Representatives and the Farmers' party, also supporters of the Government on some questions 11 seats, while anti-Government factions and laborites have secured only 29.

## CLEMENCEAU HAD A RIB FRACTURED ON TRIP TO ENGLAND

PARIS, Dec. 15.—Dr. Tuffier, who made an examination of Premier Clemenceau, found that he was suffering from a fractured rib. His condition is not serious. The French Premier met with a slight injury on his trip to England through a fall on board the destroyer on which he crossed the channel.

### Goes to Hanceville in Chilcotin Country and Will Not Return Here.

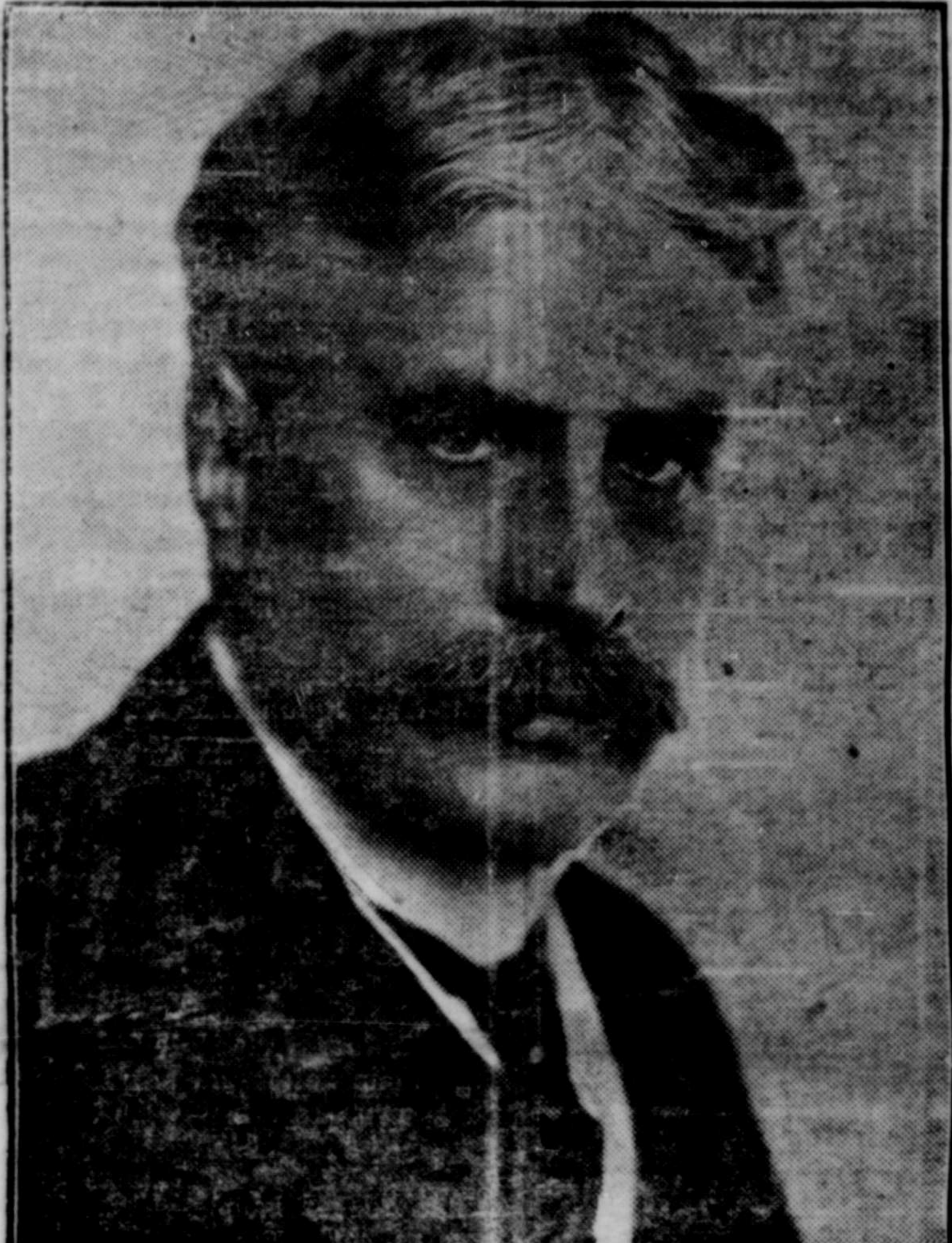

## Lumber Industry is Healthy in District

### Number of Mills Operating and more to Open in Near Future; Besner and Buckley Mills Both to Cut Soon.

Six months ago all the mills in the neighborhood except the Prince Rupert Spruce Mills, the Georgetown mill and the Kitsumkalum mill were closed. Today there are a number of mills operating and more will open within the next few weeks and operate steadily through next summer.

The Aeroplane Spruce Lumber Co., usually known as Lewis' mill, on Graham Island, is running steadily and so is the Graham Island Spruce and Cedar Co.'s mill, usually known as Lynch's mill. Now comes word that Mr. Buckley has a new company

formed to take over and operate the Buckley mill at Buckley Bay, Masset Inlet, and also that the Queen Charlotte City mill which is owned locally by O. Besner and others is about to start cutting.

E. Doby, formerly manager of the local mill has gone east with plans for the reorganization and rebuilding of the Kitsumkalum mill owned and operated by Sir Henry Pellatt of Toronto, and it is expected that he will have charge there this coming summer.

At Usk the Royal Mill, recently taken over by Hanson & Allen, of this city, is cutting lumber, and Kenny Brothers are operating. The third mill which also is owned locally has got over; its financial difficulties and will be running directly.

There will be other mills operating during the coming summer. The Sowell Mill at Masset Inlet has not opened up since the aero-

## For Open Fisheries On Skeena River

### Many Telegrams Sent to Minister and Delegation Supporting the Move; Conference is Being Held in Ottawa Today.

Besides many official messages to G. W. Peck, Mayor McClymont and the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, no less than seventy private messages have been sent from this city to the Minister at Ottawa backing up the request of the city for open fisheries and the use of gas boats on the Skeena River. Nearly forty of these were sent by bona fide fishermen and paid for by them. In all something like one hundred messages have been sent to Ottawa by wire or otherwise in regard to this matter.

## GROCERY THEFT WAS COMMITTED

### Harry Kingston and Three Partners Accused of Stealing from Launch "Tide."

Harry Kingston was this morning committed for trial by Magistrate McMordie on the charge of stealing from a vessel in port. He made an open confession of his guilt, hoping thereby to gain sympathy and leniency. Several witnesses were heard, including the police officers.

J. H. Hilditch, the owner of the "Tide," the boat from which the goods were stolen, testified. He discovered the loss two days after the robbery and reported to the police. The case of butter produced in court was part of the stolen goods. The accused and his brother had worked on his boat as deckhands.

The chief of police testified as to the complaint being laid. He had gone to the Dominion Lunch and found one case of butter and also a broken one. The owner had intimated that he had bought the goods from Harry Kingston. A warrant was then made out for Kingston's arrest and his mother promised that she would bring him to the station as soon as he came in from a trip on the water. She had done this. After being fully warned, Kingston had made a signed statement. Alleged partners in the crime Wm. (Red) McDonald, Paddy Brady and Green, a taxi driver, were also arrested.

### Sold Goods.

Tom Shimizu, Japanese owner of the Dominion Lunch, was called upon for evidence. He stated that he knew accused as he had come to him before and had obtained a meal ticket on his watch. On the night of the theft about 11 o'clock accused had come to him stating that he had some provisions for sale. These, he said, were his share of the assets of a bankrupt fishing boat. Accused wanted \$25 for them but witness demanded to see them first. They were then brought in a taxi and accused got a meal ticket, worth \$5, and \$25 cash as payment.

The accused stated that he had come to town at 6 o'clock the night of the theft, November 29, in company with his brother and Mr. Hilditch. After supper he came to town and met Red McDonald who asked him if he would lend him money to get some dope. Accused said he was broke, but he knew where there was some grub on which they could raise cash.

### Got a "Shot."

After getting a "shot" on borrowed money they went around to find a likely buyer for the goods. Finally Shimizu said he would buy the goods when they were produced. He had not understood they were stolen.

They got a taxi and explained to the driver, Green, that they were going to swipe some groceries and asked him if it would be all right. Green had said it would be all right.

## 6 MONTHS FOR HAVING DRUGS

### One Chinaman Sent to Jail and Another Fined \$200.

Lum Sing, a Chinaman who is suffering from very ugly wounds sustained at Kitsumkalum, was in the police court this morning charged with having drugs in his possession. Magistrate McMordie sentenced him to six months at Okalla Farm and gave a warning that another case like this one coming before him would meet with a stiffer penalty.

Harry Kingston testified that he had gone there and had got a "shot in the arm" on more than one occasion, the accused administering the drug. Constables Adams and Bailey told of searching the shack and finding all kinds of drugs in various places about the premises. The chief of police said that the place was the most disreputable and dirty he had seen in the city.

Lum Bing, a partner of Lum Sing, was fined \$200 or three months' imprisonment, having been found guilty of the same charge.

### Pulp and Paper

#### Timber Becoming Scarce.

Canada produces annually about \$100,000,000 worth of pulp and paper products. During the past ten years, especially, the industry has made rapid progress, until it is now one of the most important in the country. The three outstanding requisites for the maintenance of the industry are large accessible forest areas, particularly of spruce and balsam, adequate cheap power, preferably water-power, and a plentiful supply of labor. As to the two former, nature has been prodigal in her gifts to Canada. Water-power is not only abundant but is widely distributed. The virgin coniferous forests of Eastern Canada were of vast extent, and it is perhaps not entirely surprising that the early settlers and explorers considered them to be all but illimitable.

But, for at least thirty years, keen observers have foreseen the possibility and, indeed, the probability, of exhausting the natural supply of pulpwood. The rapid growth of the paper industry has brought the time within measurable distance. The larger producers of paper, particularly in Quebec and Northern Ontario, where the industry is mainly centred, have scented the danger and have taken initial steps to put the pulpwood forests on a permanent basis.

On the North Pacific there are still large tracts of pulpwood forests, especially that part centering around Prince Rupert. In the East reforestation is necessary, but anywhere up this coast Nature does the work most effectually. The forest department at Victoria in charge of M. A. Grainger, under the Minister of Lands, studies local conditions and modern methods of protection and possible propagation.

The need of using some of the timber on this coast is necessary in any scheme of conservation. After a tree becomes a certain age and size, it ceases to grow and begins to decay. If the trees are not cut when they are ready, there is a constant wastage and the land is not producing. As soon as the crop is cut, reforestation takes place and the young trees begin to grow.

To conserve the forest trees in the older forests must be cut. That shows that there is need from an economic viewpoint to establish pulp mills in this neighborhood in order that the next crop of trees may have a chance to grow.

### Lumber is King In This District.

Just now lumber is king in this district. It is the business to which we look to make things busy here during the coming spring. Mills are reopening, loggers will soon be going into the woods and there is every prospect of a very busy season. As Prince Rupert is the entrepot for the Queen Charlotte Islands business it is plain to see that we shall stand to benefit very largely by the developments of the next few months.

### Silver Output Is Very Large.

The silver output in this district for the present year is 915,000 ounces valued at well over a million dollars. Last year the output was 408,000 ounces, so that the output has more than doubled. Next year it will be many times greater, judging by preparations that are being made to ship from many of the rich mines of the district, particularly at Alice Arm, Stewart and Hazelton.

Everything points to a mining boom in the spring. Alice Arm and Stewart particularly are in the public eye as producing centres and the entry of the Gugenheims into Hazelton has brought that camp well to the fore, especially as the mines have been producing steadily there for a number of years and the value of the deposits are well known.



**JESS WILLARD IS A PROFITEER SAYS FEDERAL WARRANT**

KANSAS CITY, Dec. 13.—A federal warrant charging profiteering in the sale of cord wood has been issued against Jess Willard, former heavyweight champion, by the United States district attorney for Kansas.

It is alleged that Willard asked Andrico \$3 a cord for wood stumps on his farm near Topeka, an amount the district attorney asserts is double what it should have been.

**Synopsis of Land Act Amendments**

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$100 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Recording Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homestead, title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 40 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased on condition of construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

**PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.**  
 The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 28, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase on city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 21, 1920.

**SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.**  
 Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

## CAPITAL AND LABOR INDUSTRIAL COUNCIL

Lieut. Joseph Clearihue Lectures on Subject in Victoria Recently.

Scientific management and the establishment of a provincial industrial parliament offer the solution to the present industrial difficulties in the opinion of Lieut. Joseph B. Clearihue, in an address at Victoria on the subject of co-operation between capital and labor. He outlined his plan very concretely, giving the various matters which would be dealt with by the organization which he thought it advisable to form.

In opening, the speaker said: "No one can accumulate anything whatever without becoming a capitalist. I believe that there should be two returns, one for labor and one for accumulated capital. I do not advocate state ownership. You cannot abolish private ownership without abolishing all accumulations of wealth."

An open forum where capital and labor might discuss their problems, a place where workers would be given their fundamental right to have a voice in the conditions under which they labored, was necessary. An industrial parliament would supply this need, said the speaker.

"The assembly would be composed of representatives of capital and labor equally divided, and representing the various industrial divisions," continued Lieut. Clearihue. The parliament, he said, should be divided up into committees, one for each of the industries, and these committees should be authorities on matters relating to their special fields. Certain powers must be allotted to this parliament by the Government of the Province, and the new body must have paid officials and a permanent home. It would deal with questions of wages, hours, conditions, etc., and would have the power to legislate for industries as a whole. Employers and employees must be organized into unions.

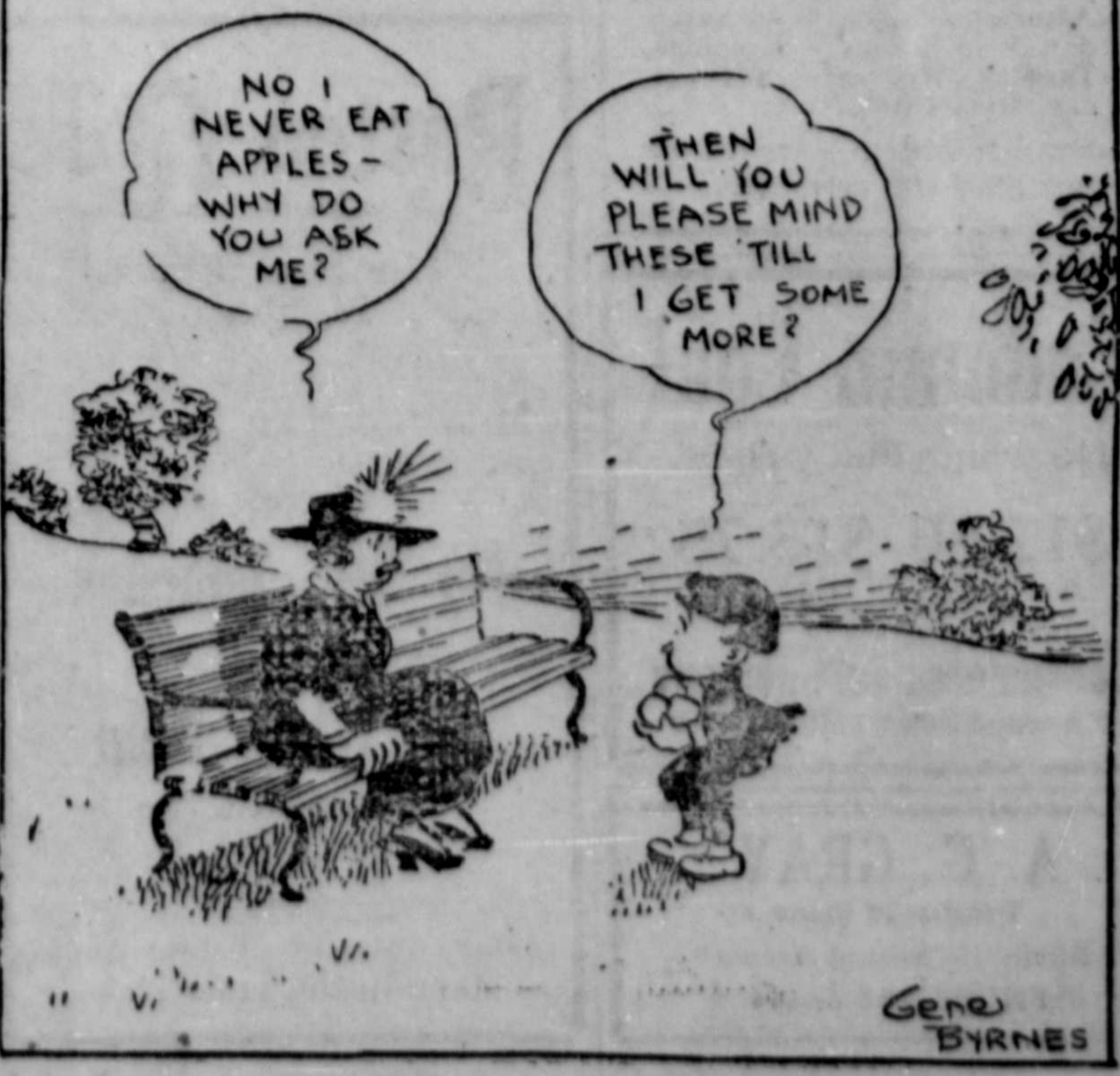
