

EXAMS AND THE SCHOOLS

The men and women who helped to formulate the educational policy of British Columbia, which is similar to that in many other provinces and countries, have laid down a borating the platenesmial theory of course of study and also have ordained that tests be given T. To a large extent the plan has proved effective but it velocity of light. has weaknesses, and one of these is the desire of principals and teachers to have their pupils pass the tests ir- ibly miute distances in terms of the respective of the value of the education and its adaptation to the individual. The parents and the public generally have been led to look on the examination results as the only indication of the work done and this has had a bad effect on the system generally.

As a revulsion against this system there have been efforts made to do without examinations and this has almost always had the effect of slowing up the work and stitutions of learning in the world. making both teacher and pupil indifferent to results and in many cases has induced laziness and carelessness.

There seems to be no other method of judging results that has proved satisfactory except written examinations. Possibly education of parents and others to the fact that examination tests are only partially correct and that good students may fail while poor students pass, might help Now it's spring and now it isn't. matters.

One weakness of our machine methods is expecting every student to be equally expert in all branches of school work. Teachers know that while one boy excels in mathematics he probably can hardly spell his own name, writes poorly and his literature studies are as mechanical as his mathematical calculations. That student is probably cleverer and will make a greater success in life than the allround student yet he is the bane of the teacher's life. It is a duty to make him fairly proficient in something besides juggling figures in order that he may not in future life feel the handicap.

In spite of all the weaknesses and failures it is probable that no system of education has yet been evolved that is more effective than the one in practice in this province except for its lack of technical facilities. Probably this will be remedied in the not too far distant future and then the proportionate co-ordination of mind and hand will be looked upon as the ideal system.

DEATH OF

PASADENA, Cal., May 13:-Dr. Albert A. Michelson, eminent American scientist, died here Saturday night after a brief illness. The end came quietly, deceased slipping peacefully from coma into death.

Professor Michelson was the first American scientist to win the Nobel prize, as head of the department of physics at University of Chicago. He probably was best known as the discoverer of the length of light waves and for his accurate measurement of the speed of light.

Once Professor Halleck, of Columbia said of him: "If we are ever to have interplanetary communication, it will be by means of Michelson's discovery of light waves. He has obtained the one unit of measurement that we know to be the same on Mars and on the earth."

Professor Michelson was born in Germany, December 19, 1852, coming to this country when very young and attending school at San Fran-

Among his many honors, Professor Michelson received the Copley medal of the Royal Society of England and also was a member of that 2 society and the French Academy. In 1923, he was elected president of the 15 National Academy of Sciences.



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
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
