According to Quain's dictionary of Medicine Haemophilia is a congenital disease, often hereditary, characterized by a tendency to immoderate bleedings, and to obstinate swellings of the joints. Men are far more liable than women to this disease, the proportion being about eleven to one. Women who suffer from haemophilia show much less

VICTORIA, March 27:- "Lest we forget," T. D. Pattullo, Opposition Leader, reviewed for the Legislature the three-year record of the

Tolmie government. He concluded with the assertion that when the financial bubble

broke, the government was reduced to a state of panic and, all leadership gone, had become a mere

"The total absence of major legislation offered this session, the complete failure to propose measures to cope with the present serious economic situation, make me wonder why this House was assembled this year," he said. "Presumably because the law says it must meet once a year and the government needs more money to pursue its extravagant course.".

Taking the three years session by session Mr. Pattullo tabulated the government's record as follows: First Session

1.—Premier Tolmie had lent himself to prostitution of his own pledge to abolish patronage.

2.—To cover wholesale patronage the government had embarked on extravagant road policy, largely responsible for landing the province in its present embarrassed financial position.

3.-Millions of dollars worth of road machinery purchased from party favorites which can not now be used as appropriations for road work have to be curtailed.


