## NEW ALTITUDE RECORD IS CREATED

## ANTI-CATHOLIC MOVEMENT IN ITALY IS GAINING FORCE

### German Scientists Ascended To Height of 52,000 Feet In An Aluminum Ball; Wondrous Trip

Prof. Piccard and Dr. Kipfer Went Aloft to Study Origin of Cosmic Rays—Were Up Eighteen Hours and Drifted Over Europe

OBER GURGL, Tyrol, May 28:—After a hazardous exploratory voyage to the earth's stratosphere to study the origin of cosmic rays during which they ascended 52,000 feet, breaking the world's altitude record by 12,000 feet, Prof. August Piccard and Dr. Charles Kipfer were safe today after landing on a glacier near here. They took off from Augsberg, Germany, yesterday morning and were up eighteen hours and thirteen minutes. They were swept by currents over many parts of Europe.

Prof. Piccard declared that the experiment had been magnificent beyond conception.

The ascent was made in a sealed aluminum ball, seven feet in diameter, which was taken aloft by a giant balloon, the largest ever built in Germany.

### ROBBERY ARRESTS

William Dahl Held in Red Deer For Riffing Joe Brown's Store—George Sohonovitch Remanded

Police investigation into recent burglary or attempted burglary incidents in Prince Rupert is apparently meeting with success, two arrests having been announced since yesterday.

The latest arrest is that in Red Deer, Alberta, of William J. Dahl in connection with the burglary several weeks ago of Joe Brown's store. Dahl is being held by the police at Red Deer and escort will be sent from here by train on Saturday morning to bring him here for preliminary trial. Dahl left here about May 7 after having been in town for some time. Cash and goods were taken from the Brown store.

In connection with the attempt two or three weeks ago to crack the safe in F. E. Hunt's ship chandlery store on the local waterfront, George Sohonovitch came before S. D. Macdonald, justice of the peace, in city police court yesterday afternoon and was remanded for eight days. Sohonovitch, who was arrested Tuesday night, has also been around the city for some time.

### Panther Killed In Washington Town Yesterday

BUCKLEY, Washington, May 28.—L. Johnson killed a large cougar near this town yesterday. The big feline had been threatening his three children.

### FISHERMAN LOST LIFE

Capt. Robert Crocker of Victoria Drowned When Trolling Boat Breaks Up After Stranding

SKIDEGATE, May 28:—About midnight last Thursday, Capt. Robert J. Crocker of Victoria was drowned in Massett Inlet near Stray Island.

The late Capt. Crocker was on his way to Port Clements to visit with his brother, David Crocker, when the fatality occurred. He was pulling into a small anchorage near Stray Island when his trolling boat, Miss Pat, struck a reef on a falling tide. Other trollers offered assistance to Capt. Crocker but he assured them that he would be all right. About midnight, as the tide was rising, a sudden and severe storm came up and the next morning the Miss Pat was found a total wreck on the shore. Two days later Capt. Crocker's body was found.

Deceased, who was a native of Newfoundland, was well known among the trollers of the coast. He was a member of the Masonic Order.

The funeral took place at Queen Charlotte City under Masonic auspices with a service in the Premier Hotel where Rev. R. P. Graham of the Anglican Church, Massett, and himself a member of the Masonic Order, officiated.

Nearly one hundred persons attended, among the well known Masons present being H. G. McKenzie, G. H. Jolliffe, A. P. Allison, A. R. Mallory, William Hastie, J. Denholm, A. Andrews, T. Coughlan, F. Ballard, Capt. J. Newberry, and Capt. J. Service. The remains and mourners were taken to the burial ground in launches.

The late Capt. Crocker is survived by his brother at Port Clements, a sister, Mrs. Charmer in Vancouver, and another brother in the United States.

### Archbishop Is Due Saturday

En route to the Yukon to close his ecclesiastical service there, Archbishop-elect Isaac O. Stringer of Rupert's Land is expected to pass through here Saturday morning on the steamer Princess Alice bound north. Last month he was elected archbishop of Rupert's Land and has since been conferring with officials of the church in Toronto.

### Crack Great Northern Train Lifted From Tracks By Wind Near Fargo and Is Wrecked

FARGO, North Dakota, May 28:—Lifted bodily from the track by a tornado, the crack "Empire Builder" train of the Great Northern Railway, east-bound, was wrecked eight miles southeast of here late yesterday, killing one person and injuring a number of others. The dead man is A. Anderson of Montesano, Wash., who was a passenger.

### Government-Vatican Breach May Come As Result of Disorders

St. Paul's Cathedral and Papal Estate Under Augmented Guard Last Night—Agitation Spreading to Many Cities

ROME, May 28:—Anti-Catholic demonstrations by Fascist students yesterday led to fears that a breach between the Vatican and government might be brought about. Augmented guards were placed around St. Peter's Cathedral and also at the approaches to the Vatican estate last night.

The agitation is spreading to other cities.

### FLOATS FOR GOOD DAY'S FISHERMEN TRAVELLING

Home Oil Distributors to Make Improvement to Local Dock For Benefit of Local Boats

Home Oil Distributors are following up their move of last year, when they built a shed for the use of fishermen, by building floats around their oil dock for the free use of fishermen. This will provide a good deal of accommodation and will, doubtless, be taken advantage of by them. Announcement of the plans of the company was made this morning by L. J. Martin, manager of the company, who has been in the city since yesterday.

Mr. Martin is leaving this afternoon on a way-freight for Burns Lake where the company is to build a new warehouse.

That business has shown a good increase in this district during the past year is the word brought by Mr. Martin. The fact that his is a British Columbia company is responsible for some of its popularity along with the fact that they give the best possible service and product.

### MINE SUIT PROCEEDING

Action for \$53,000 in Connection With Stewart Property is Being Heard in Victoria

VICTORIA, May 28:—The trial is proceeding here in Supreme Court before Mr. Justice D. A. McDonald of the suit of Baron H. Quickstad, Vancouver and Seattle mining capitalist, against J. J. Connors of Juneau and John McNeill of Stewart of \$53,000 damages in connection with the Red Top mine near Stewart.

Quickstad testified that, after McNeill and Connors signed up to sell the mine for \$25,000 to his agent and the first installment had been paid, his workmen were driven off the property.

Quickstad stated that, on August 12, 1925, J. F. Duthie, Seattle ship-builder, and he went to the mine and McNeill, who was in possession, threatened to shoot them if they entered.

### TANK SCOW PICKED UP

Missing Home Oil Craft Salvaged Off Alaska

Adrift in the waters of Dixon Entrance four miles off Capt. Olancon, south of Ketchikan, a British oil tank barge was picked up by the salvage tug Akutan, Capt. J. Jennings, according to advices received from him today by J. C. McBride, Collector of Customs.

Captain Jennings stated that the barge with its oil tank was owned in Prince Rupert, B.C. It evidently had broken loose from its moorings there and drifted out to sea. He asked permission to tow it from American waters into the Canadian port.

The collector granted the request.—Juneau Empire.

### TERRACE TROUBLE

Former Clerk of Municipality is Now Facing Charge of Theft

**PEACE RIVER OUTLET**

Premier Tolmie may be forced by public opinion in the south to attend the conference on the Peace River outlet but whether he goes or stays at home he must remember that he does not have the unanimous backing of the people of the province in his efforts to force the hands of the railways in the matter of taking over the P.G.E. and continuing it to the Peace country.

Northern British Columbia with the exception of Prince George is opposed to it, we may safely say, and there are parts of Southern B.C. which are not very enthusiastic.

Premier Tolmie should also remember that political expediency is not everything. Building the P.G.E. was undertaken as a policy of political expediency because the people were ready at any time to vote for another railway, especially a line leading to Vancouver. Possibly they might vote in favor of spending more money on the P.G.E. but we are doubtful of it. We are more inclined to think they would turn down such a proposal.

It will be noticed in connection with the movement in Vancouver that it is persistent propaganda of one newspaper that carries it along. The more sober thought of the others is against taking action that is bound to prove injurious to the province in the long run.

**ACTION NEEDED THIS YEAR**

Action on the Peace River outlet is needed this year to provide for the unemployed in the fall. If the Dominion does not undertake some big work of this kind, it will be necessary to spend the money in some other way in providing for those who are without money and without the means of acquiring any. It would seem to be the height of folly to proceed with the policy of doles when there is so much work to be done and so many people anxious to work rather than receive meal tickets as was done last year.

If a few thousand men were set to work on the western outlet of the Peace River there would be a general revival of business in the west which would to a large extent cope with the employment situation and bring about a better industrial condition everywhere.

Furthermore, it has nothing whatever to do with taxation, or military service, or compulsory school attendance, or immigration, or any such matter; and the Government itself cannot use it except for statistical totals.

The Government representative will put the same questions to all, and it is your duty as a resident of this country to answer promptly and truthfully. The Government is very anxious to avoid forcing anyone to answer these questions, but it is empowered to do so in the few cases where individuals may refuse.

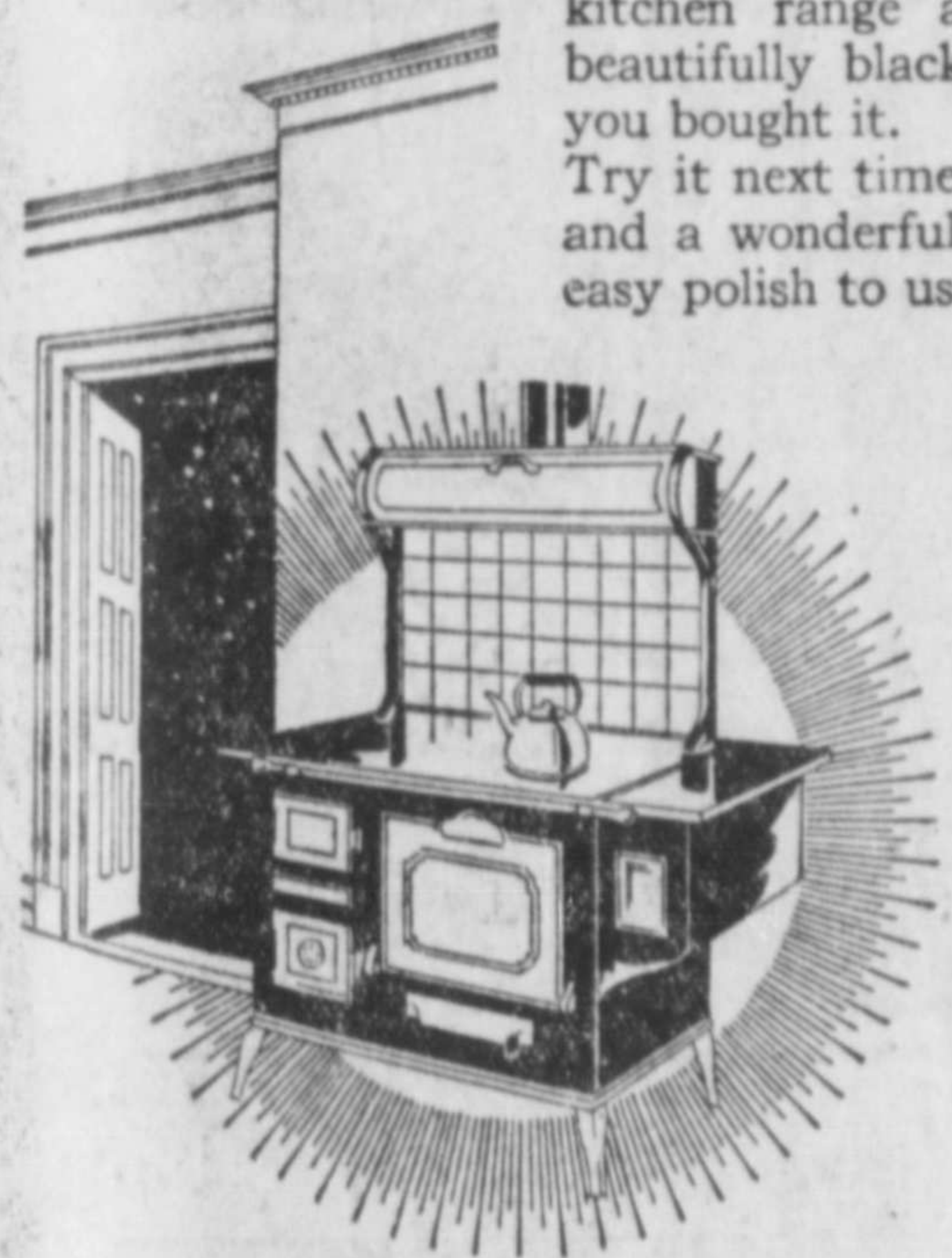

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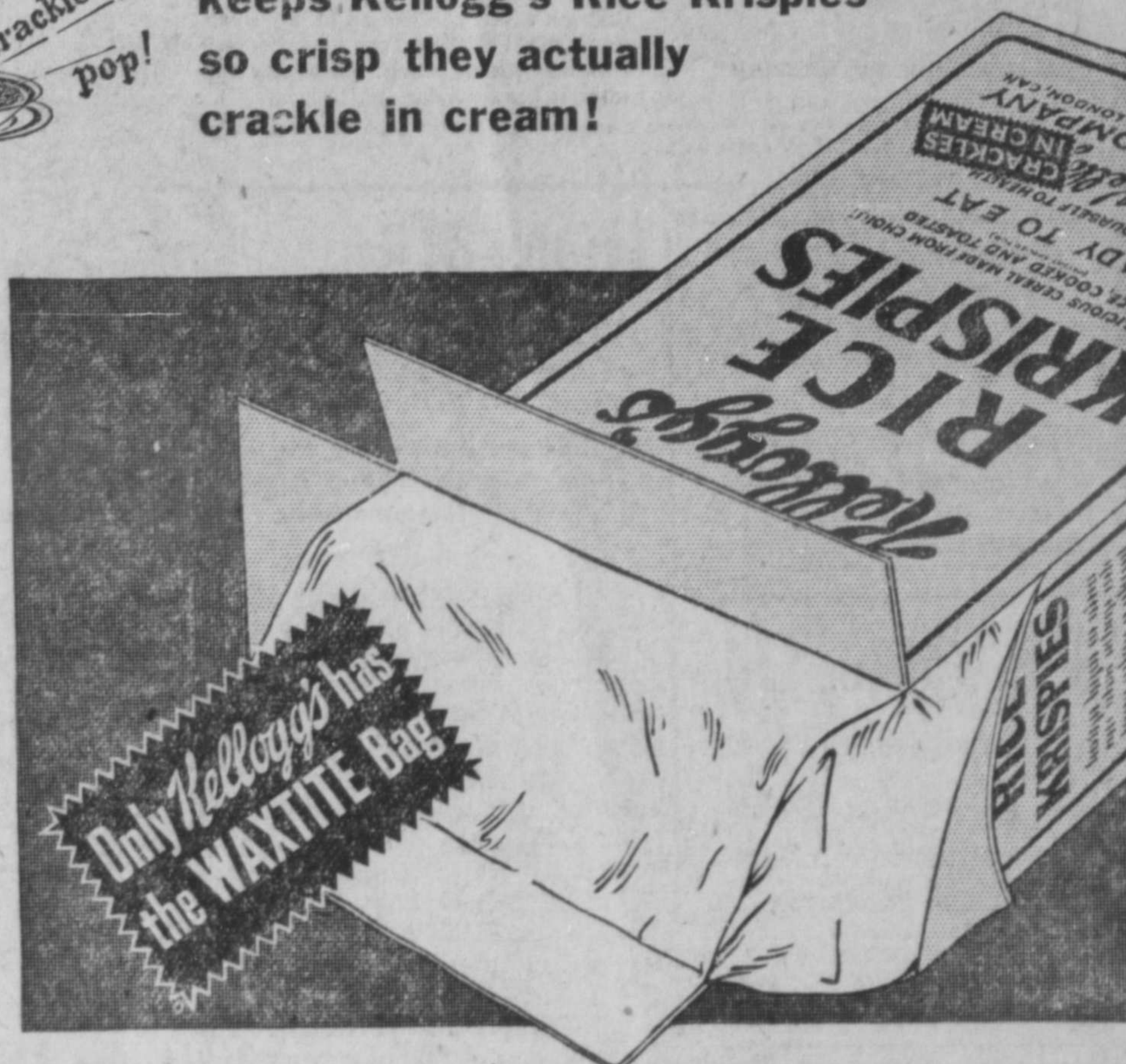

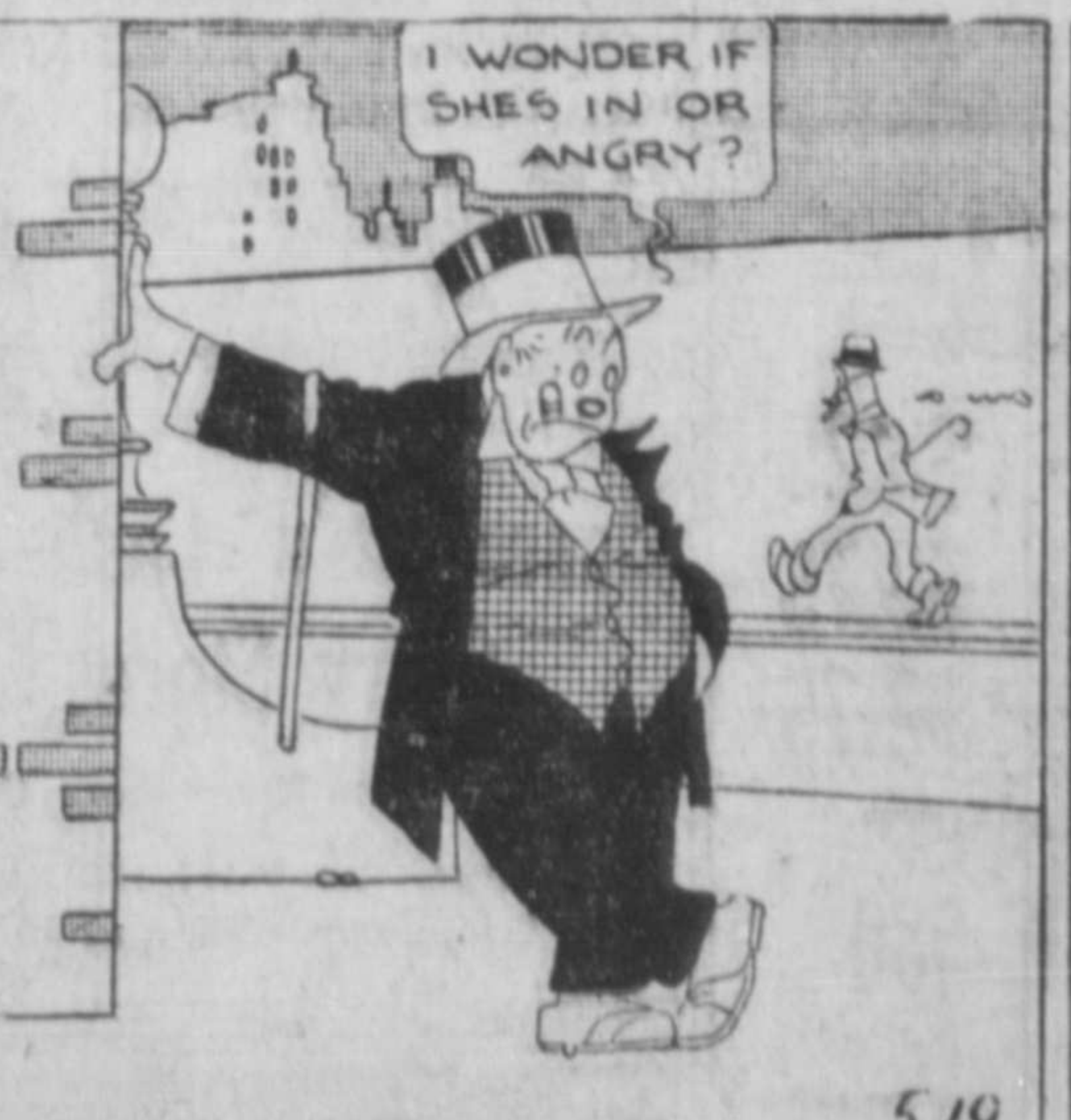

The steamer Prince George or Prince Rupert will arrive Friday mornings at 11:30 from Vancouver via Powell River and Ocean Falls, sail at 3 o'clock the same afternoon for Anyox and Stewart, return here at 8 o'clock Saturday evenings sailing for Ocean Falls, Powell River and Vancouver at 7 p.m.

The steamer Prince Henry will arrive at 11:30 Saturday mornings from Vancouver via Powell River and Ocean Falls, sailing at 3 p.m. for Ketchikan, Juneau, Skagway and Wrangell and returning here at 7 o'clock Wednesday mornings to sail at 9 a.m. for Vancouver direct where she will arrive after a 25-hour run at 10:30 a.m. Thursdays.

The summer schedule of the steamer Prince John on the service to the south end of the Queen Charlotte Islands has not yet been announced.

The six-day a week train service on the railway in and out of here will come into effect co-incidentally with the resumption of the steamers to summer schedule.

The steamer Prince Charles will come north this week on her final voyage on spring schedule. She will be replaced next week by the steamer Prince George, which has just completed annual overhaul in Vancouver. The Prince George, making one trip on spring schedule, will call at Powell River and Ocean Falls northbound, arriving here at 10:30 Saturday morning, sailing at 4 p.m. for both Anyox and Stewart and sailing Sunday evening at 10 o'clock for Vancouver via Ocean Falls and Powell River.

Effective next Monday, it is announced that all Canadian National steamers will arrive and depart from the company's own dock at the foot of Main Street in Vancouver. Since the burning of the C. N. R. dock in Vancouver last summer, steamers of the line have been using the C. P. R. Pier D. at the southern port.

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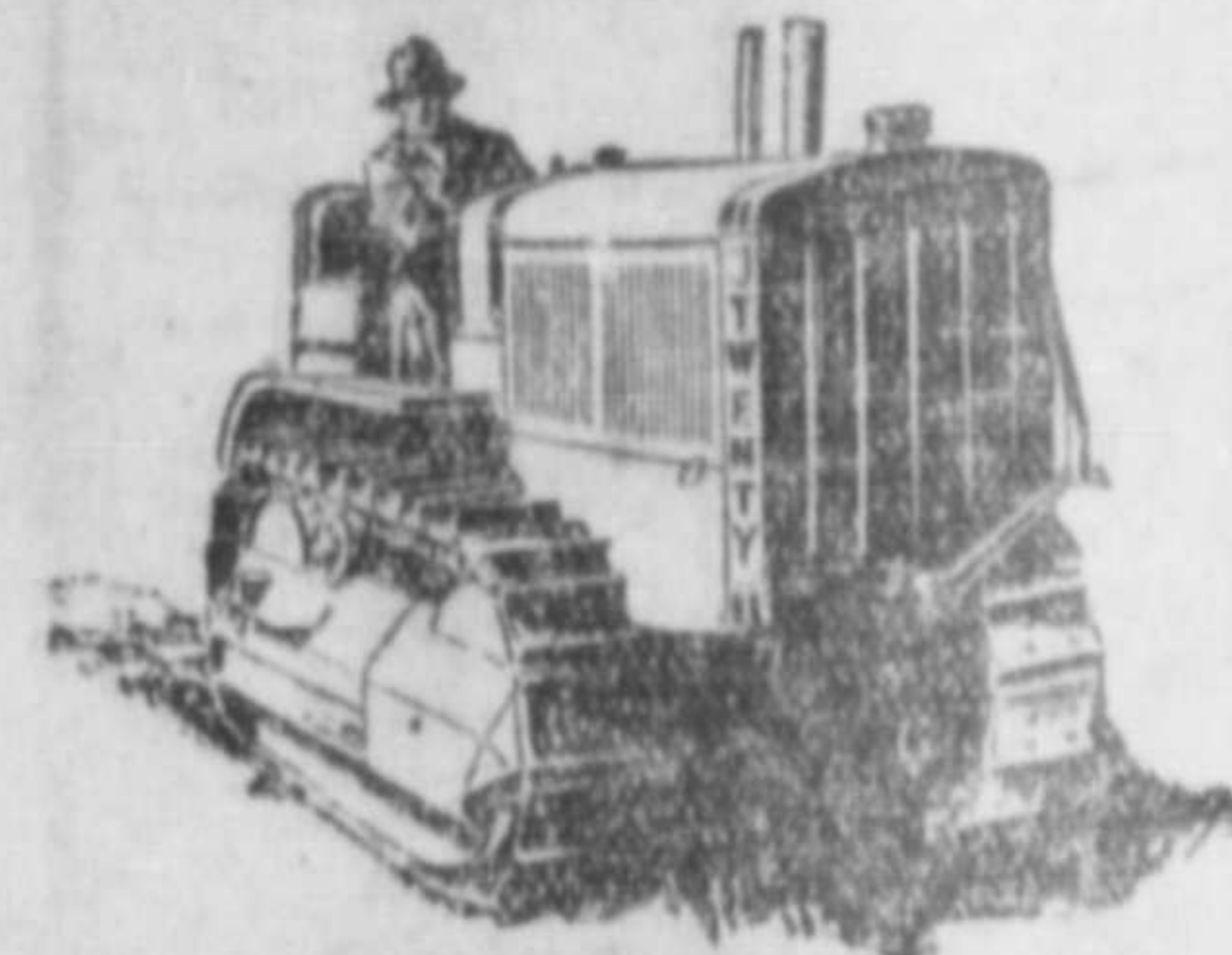


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
