## Much Damage Done To Coast Shipping By Atlantic Gales

### Many Liners are Delayed in Crossing to Halifax by Rough Seas and High Winds of Last Ten Days.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

ST. JOHN'S, Newfoundland, Dec. 17.—Damage to the extent of \$400,000 has been done to shipping by the great storm, details of which have only now become available owing to the crippling of the telephone and telegraph services. As part of the damage half a dozen schooners went ashore.

HALIFAX, Dec. 17.—Half a dozen passenger liners and screw freighters which are overdue are being held up by rough seas and high winds and fog, according to wireless reports, which tell of the slow speed made necessary by the two storms which have swept across the Atlantic in the last ten days.

A large amount of damage was done to shipping but few lives have been lost.

## SNOWFALL LIGHT AT ALICE ARM

### Horses and Teams Will Take Supplies into Dolly Varden Mine During Winter.

Although very cold weather was experienced around Granby Bay and Alice Arm last week there has been very little snow in that district yet this year. Contrary to expectations trains were still running on the Dolly Varden railroad up to the end of last week. However, it is expected, the rain here this week will mean snow up there now.

A. B. Armstrong and Al. Falsonet intend to operate teams over the grade when the snow comes and will take supplies into the Dolly Varden and other mines where operations are still going on through the winter. This will eliminate to a large extent the use of dog sleighs and will prove quicker and more economical.

## DOLLY VARDEN REPORTED SOLD

### Price Said to Be Approximately \$1,750,000, Giving a Million Profit.

ALICE ARM, Dec. 17.—The Dolly Varden mine is reported here to have been sold, the purchase price paid being \$1,750,000. This, it is said, will give the vendors a profit of nearly a million dollars.

The shipments made from the mine this year have proved its value and have shown the mining people of this part of the world that the district is capable of producing silver on a large scale, given the facilities for handling it.

There are a number of other properties at Alice Arm that are looking like shipping mines in the near future and a good deal of activity is due at the camp in the early spring.

## INDIAN ELECTION AT PORT SIMPSON

### W. S. Dudoward is Elected Chief Councillor with Eleven Others.

The election of Indian councillors for the year 1920 was held in Port Simpson on December 10 and the following were elected: Chief Councillor, W. S. Dudoward.

Councillors, John Sankey, Jas. Ryan, L. Gosnell, R. T. Tait, W. White, R. Bryant, Matthew Feak, Wm. Musgrave, E. Dudoward, Harry Brooks and H. Wallace.

The election was conducted by Indian Agent Perry in the school-house.

The Metlakatla election takes place on January 23.

## RECOMMEND LOANS TO MEN NOT FARMING

### Proposal to Give Assistance in Re-establishment in Fishing and Other Businesses.

The British Columbia Soldiers' Commission is now an active body with members from various parts of the province, according to Col. McMorde who attended a meeting at Vancouver recently. It was appointed by the Provincial Government and has already made an allotment of \$250,000 to assist in the re-establishment of returned soldiers in the province. This money is to be loaned to those in need on consideration that it be paid back when circumstances permit.

At the convention a resolution was passed to be submitted to the government that the same assistance be given to men in other useful lines of production as in farming.

The co-operation with the commissions of other provinces was also asked for. Fishing was cited as an occupation that might well be given aid in this province.

The finding of immediate employment and provision of special training were recommendations made by this board in 1915 and these objects have been accomplished in the last year or so. There are also a number of other matters which are to be taken up by the commission and among them is relief for widows and dependents.

## PRESENTATION TO H. A. HARVEY

### Members of the Prince Rupert Symphony Orchestra Spend Pleasant Evening with Conductor.

After the regular practice of the Prince Rupert Symphony Orchestra in the Presbyterian Church Hall last night a presentation was made to Professor H. A. Harvey by the members of the orchestra in the form of a \$100 check as a Christmas present and as a mark of appreciation of his services to the organization.

The presentation was made by the president of the orchestra, G. A. Woodland, who stated that the success of the orchestra was due to the excellent leadership of Mr. Harvey, who at all times had been found courteous and kind and full of zeal for the success of the orchestra, even to the extent of refusing engagements rather than put off the practices.

Mr. Harvey made a suitable reply, pointing out the pleasure he had always derived from his connection with the orchestra and requesting that whatever differences might arise between members that they be true and loyal to the orchestra.

Refreshments were served before the presentation took place, and vocal selections were given by Mrs. Millar, and Messrs. Harvey, and Woodland. In a short address Dr. Grant spoke in eulogistic terms of the services of Mr. Harvey in connection with the Presbyterian Church. He stated that Mr. Harvey was full of music and was always willing to assist in any musical undertaking. In the speaker's opinion the orchestra in doing honor to Mr. Harvey was doing honor to itself.

## MORE COASTERS FOR THIS COAST

### Captain Troup, of C. P. R. Service, in England with View to Making Purchases.

LONDON, Dec. 17.—Captain Troup, head of the C. P. R. Pacific Coast Steamships, who is in this country in connection with increasing the fleet of coasting vessels, and especially with a view to augmenting the Alaskan and Prince Rupert services, has been visiting the steamship yards in the north and making investigations. Up to the present he has made no definite arrangements for new boats, but he may do so before he leaves England.

Captain Troup says that business on the Pacific Coast is going to increase tremendously in the near future and the C. P. R. intends to be an important factor in the transportation there.

## NAAS INDIAN SCHOOL OPEN DURING WINTER

The school on the Indian reserve is to be opened this winter under the tuition of Capt. D. B. M. Jackson, D. S. O., who lately returned with his English bride from the Old Country.

Mr. Wynes, a carpenter, who lost his arm recently when working in Prince Rupert, is now here and is improving rapidly.

Mr. and Mrs. Spencer, whose house was burned recently, had a narrow escape and difficulty in saving their children. It is difficult to get supplies of food and clothing at this time of year so that makes the loss heavy.

There is a shortage of potatoes in the valley this winter, as the early autumn frosts caught the Indians before they had their crops housed.

## HOUSING COMPANY DOES GOOD WORK

Something like \$16,000 has been loaned by the Prince Rupert Housing, Ltd., and there are four more applications being considered. Already the concern has helped in the erection of fourteen houses. This is in addition to thirty houses financed by the city through the soldiers housing scheme.

## CROWN CONCLUDES ITS WINNIPEG CASE

WINNIPEG, Dec. 17.—The Crown concluded its case in the trial of R. B. Russell, charged with seditious utterances and it is expected the defendant will take the stand on his own behalf today.

## ARE DISTURBED OVER POLITICS

### Ottawa Busy With Conjecture in Regard to Next Premier of Country.

OTTAWA, Dec. 17.—Political circles are still much disturbed over the expected resignation of Premier Borden in the near future. The difficulty is that there is no outstanding political figure who can, with any possibility of success, expect to carry on the business of the country and hold the party together.

Many do not take seriously the denial of Sir Thomas White that his name is likely to be considered in the selection. At the same time they realize that his financial interests would be like a drag around his neck, in view of the rising power of labor and the coming to the fore of the farmers. Neither the farmer nor the laborer likes to be controlled by the big financial interests.

Naturally there is much scheming by cabinet makers and men who like to pose as the power behind the throne. They are to be seen busy wherever politicians gather.

It is not likely that any announcement will be made until after the new year, although the premier may resign before that.

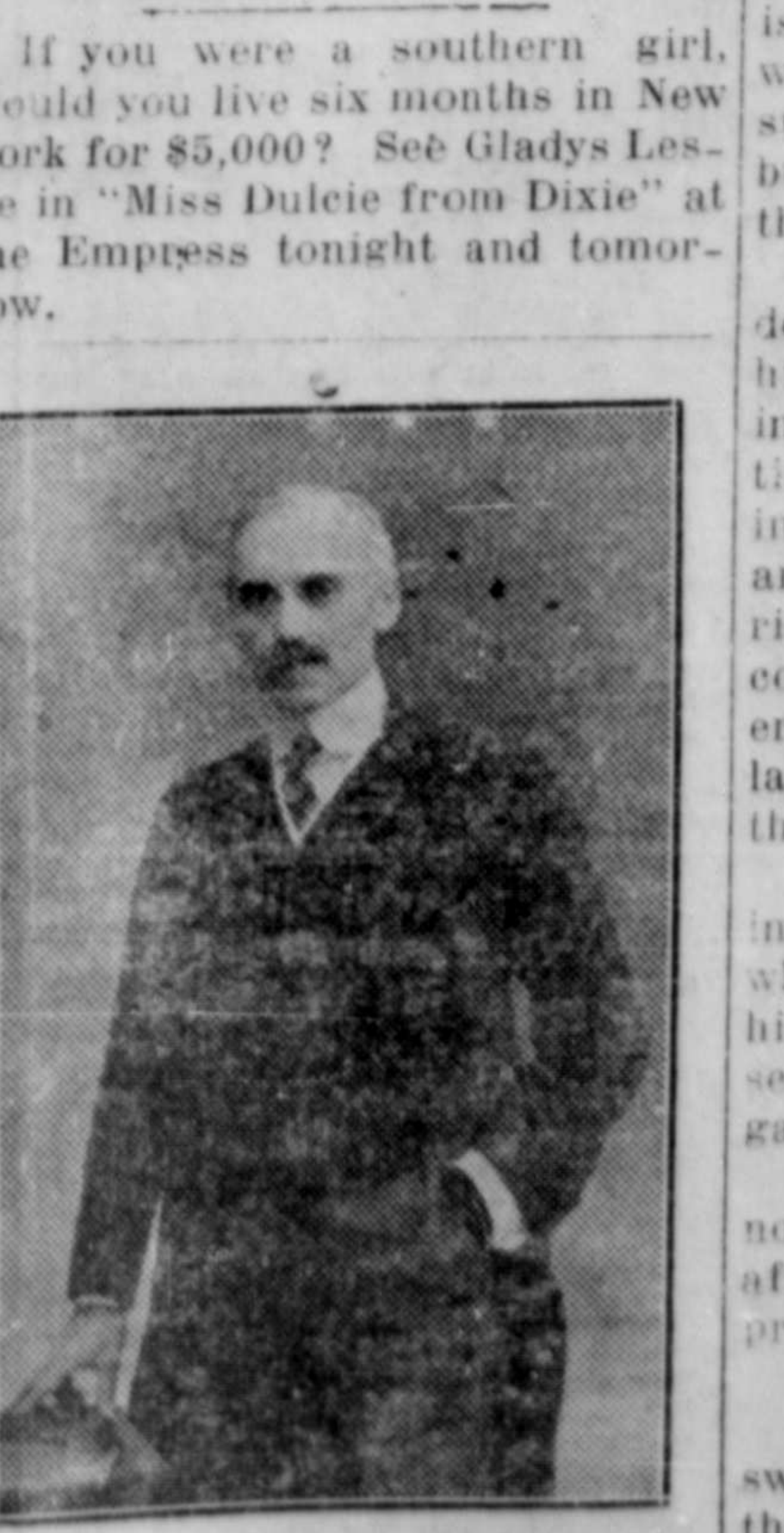

## MAY BE PEACE BY CHRISTMAS

### Baron von Lersner, Head of the German Delegation, Speaks of Possibility.

PARIS, Dec. 17.—Baron von Lersner, head of the German peace delegation, commenting on the peace settlement, said that hope was entertained in Entente circles that ratifications would be exchanged and peace would be proclaimed before Christmas.

Baron von Lersner has been prominent recently in connection with the negotiations between Germany and the allied powers and seems to have a great influence with the German Government with whom he is naturally in close touch.

## HYDER-STEWART ROAD FINISHED

### New Highway Built by Provincial Government is Entirely on Canadian Territory.

A long-felt need in the Stewart district was filled when the road between Hyder and Stewart was finally completed last week. Although the grading has been done ever since November 15, the new highway could not be opened for traffic until the trestle work was done and that has just been finished.

The road has been an expensive undertaking and has required considerable engineering skill as well as careful building. It has been built entirely by the provincial government and is all in Canadian territory. It is 2 1/2 miles long, 1 1/2 miles of this being the old Dominion Government approach. The remaining mile is entirely rock and trestle work skirting a steep bluff. There are three large trestles.

The new road connects up the Salmon and Bear River valleys and makes the mines of both valleys easily accessible to either Stewart or Hyder. Wagons or motors may now go from the Red Cliff mine, 14 miles up the Bear River Valley to the Premier mine, 15 miles up the Salmon River, a distance of 29 miles in all. It is being used by sleighs.

## BUBONIC PLAGUE IN SOUTH AMERICA

BUENOS AYRES, Dec. 16.—Bubonic plague is reported to have attained grave proportions in Santa Fe Province of Argentina.

## ALIENS RUSH TO MONTREAL FOR WINTER

### Hope of Peace Declaration with Liberty to Return Home Takes Them to That City.

MONTREAL, Dec. 17.—The rush of aliens to Montreal for the winter has set in. The prospect of a declaration of peace in the near future has caused hundreds of aliens in Canada, whose movements were restricted during the war, to swarm to this port in the hope of getting back to their native countries.

Today no less than 500 people from points in the prairie provinces reported to the registrar of aliens.

## JAPANESE WANT THE COLDSTREAM RANCH IN THE OKANAGAN

VANCOUVER, Dec. 17.—The Japanese Consul, Ukita, would buy the famous Coldstream ranch in the Okanagan, against which threatened invasion by Orientals the Vernon Board of Trade recently passed a protest.

Ukita said that when Mr. Lundy, representing Lord Cowdray, was recently in Vancouver he offered the ranch to a syndicate of Japanese but they turned down the proposition.

Government Again Is Vacillating.

A dispatch of yesterday's date seems to indicate that the Dominion cabinet is not going to back up General Mewburn and C. G. Ballantyne in regard to strengthening the Canadian army and navy. Both of these ministers are members of the Government, and they made their suggestions without protest from their colleagues. Now there have been protests and the other members of the cabinet inspire a press message which indicates that the two ministers in question were not speaking for the Government but purely for themselves. That seems to be a cowardly way to act. Either they stand for a larger army and navy or they do not. They should cease side-stepping and let the people know where they are. Surely the Government must know by now whether it intends to increase the army and if there is to be a navy.

Pay Contractors With City Bonds.

Shall we pay for the work on the city streets with Dominion Government bonds or with city bonds? If we pay with Government securities we then have to sell our own. If we pay the contractors with our own we save ourselves a lot of trouble and expense.

It was intimated some time ago that there were contractors in the city who would undertake to pave the business section of the city and take city bonds in payment. Why not? A ten dollar bill is but a negotiable bond, but it bears no interest. A city bond would carry interest coupons. There may be reasons why this cannot be done, but if there are any, it would be well for the public to know them.

It will cost as much to purchase and develop a quarry as it would to pave half the business portion of the city. Why not let the contractor for the work and allow the contractor to hustle for his own rock. There would be no nice holiday jaunts up the Skeena by people who know nothing about quarries, but there would perhaps be a chance of getting something done within the next few years.

Election Anomaly In Ontario.

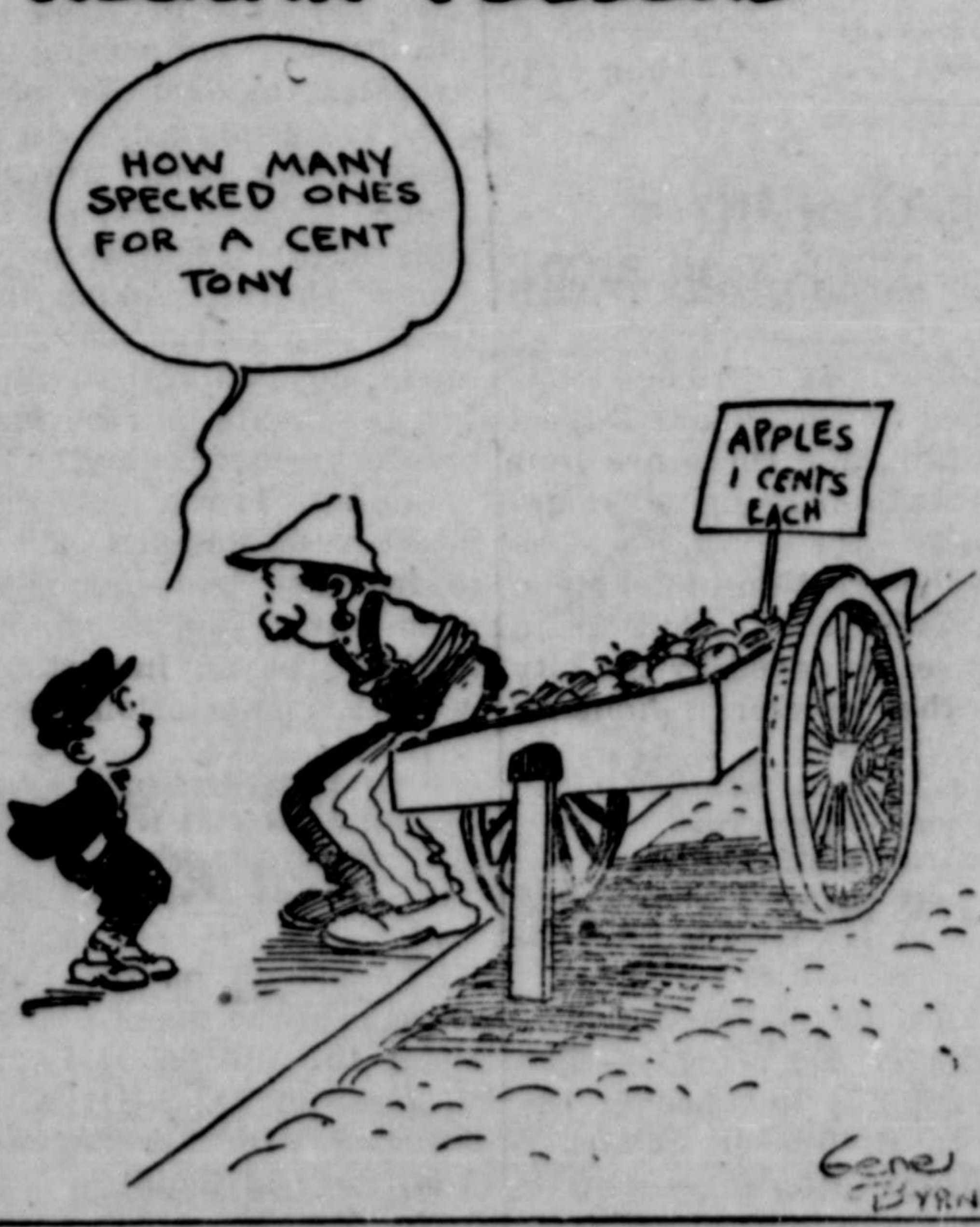
After analyzing the returns of the recent provincial election in Ontario, which placed a Farmer-Labor Government in power, The Gazette, of Montreal, which as a rule has little use for reforms of the established order of things, concludes that the result is a good argument in favor of proportional representation. Says the Victoria Times. The Gazette's analysis discloses the following strange, but significant, figures.

The combined Farmer and Labor vote was 383,970, less than a third of the total polled in the election. It was smaller than the vote given to the Conservative candidates, only 25 of whom were elected. The total Liberal vote was 50,000 less than the Conservative vote, although more Liberals were returned than Conservatives. The present Government of Ontario obviously represents a minority of the electors, an anomaly which glaringly reveals a fatal weakness of the present electoral system. Almost every election nowadays furnishes a strong case for proportional representation.

# FIVE FIRMS HANDLE HALF OF ALL SALMON

**B. C. Packers Put up 232,234 Cases During Past Season, Mostly On Skeena and Naas.**

More than half the salmon caught in British Columbia waters this year was canned by five packing firms; one quarter by six packers, and the remainder by some twenty-three canneries, ranging in their output from 1000 cases to nearly 30,000 cases.

The total pack for the 1919 season amounted to 1,393,156 cases, and of this the B. C. Packers' Association contributed 232,234 cases, the greatest proportion of which came from their canneries along the Skeena River, although the Fraser River, Rivers Inlet, the Naas, and other British Columbia salmon areas did nearly as well. The Gosse-Millard Packing Company ranks second, with a pack of 140,227 cases. The other large packers are the Anglo B. C. Packing Company, with 133,716; the Wallace Fisheries, with 115,125, and J. H. Todd & Sons, with 103,324 cases. Fifty thousand cases of the Wallace Fisheries' salmon was caught along the west coast of Vancouver Island, and of these 38,030 cases were chums.

The pack of other canners for the season ranks in the following order: Northern B. C. Fisheries, 85,000; Western Packers, 76,273; Nootka Packing Company, 49,939; Kildala Packing Company, 48,881; B. C. Canning Company 41,889, and M. DesBrisay & Co., 36,450 cases. The remaining twenty-three canneries range from the Maritime Fisheries with a pack of 28,996 cases, to H. B. Babington with 1056.

The falling off in this year's catch as compared with that of 1918 was due principally to smaller packs from the Vancouver Island canneries, and to the disappointing run on the Fraser River. In 1918 the output of the island canneries was 392,663 cases; in 1919 it was 276,519. The Fraser has been on the down grade as a salmon field since the banner year of 1913, when 732,059 cases were packed. This year the output of the Fraser River canneries was 158,748. Since 1896, when the first attempt was made to record the total number of cases of salmon canned in British Columbia, the pack of this year has exceeded only two years, 1917 and 1918, and in those years by a comparatively small margin.

## CALLIES VICTORIOUS OVER TRAVELLERS

**Last Night's Game Went All the Way of the Scots—24-12.**

A large crowd turned out at the Skating Rink last night to watch the second game of the Senior Basketball League series. The Callies met the Travellers and beat them by a score of 24-12. There was nothing exciting about the contest, the Scotsmen having the best of it all the way through. Lee Dell proved an efficient and satisfactory referee. The next game will be played on Friday night between the Sons of England and the Drydock after which there will be no game until January 6.

Col. T. A. Lamb, who is associated with Sir Donald Mann, has just made an inspection of the work at the Big Missouri mine and expresses himself as very well pleased with operations and indications there.

It is reported that the George Copper Group, owned by W. B. George and R. George, is under option to W. A. Melloche, of New York. Mr. Melloche spent some time this summer looking over this district.

The roadbed on the way to the Premier mine is in excellent condition and a record in ore transportation is being made. It is anticipated that 3,000 tons of ore will be shipped this winter.

# MINER SHOT FOR A DEER

## Killed by Chum at Comox When Hunting on Sunday.

COURTENAY, Dec. 17.—Ben Williams, 28, a Cumberland miner, was shot and killed by mistake for a deer by his chum Albert Wesley, miner, on Sunday morning near Royston.

The case is another instance of the extraordinary danger of hunting for deer in the bush even when practised by such experienced and cautious hunters as these men were.

On Sunday morning last Ben Williams, Edwin Williams, his brother, and Albert Wesley, with whom Williams had been hunting for many years in succession, took their rifles and went out towards Royston. At half past eleven they were in the valley of the Tisent River near Royston. They were about three hundred yards apart walking parallel. It was related at the inquest that the men had a code of signals by whistles whereby if they were held up they could communicate with one another. In the drive Ben Williams was on the left, his brother on the right and Albert Wesley in the centre.

Coming down the bluff Wesley rose a deer and the animal swung over the top of the bluff towards his left front. Wesley then stood where he was expecting to see the flank men turn the deer towards him. Previous to seeing the deer, Edwin Williams and he had been travelling through thick underbrush and had made slow headway. After seeing the deer he stood for a few minutes. Then he heard a noise in the thicket directly in his front and he saw what he thought to be the head of a deer about 200 yards away. He took aim and hesitated for a few seconds without lowering his rifle because he wanted to get a little better view and get a head shot. He never doubted it was a deer; it was just what he was looking for at the time and expecting to see. The bush was fairly dense at the point where he thought he saw the deer. Finally he fired as he thought at the head of the deer. Edwin Williams called out to know if he had got the deer, and Wesley said he thought he had not. Then the two men went forward and found Ben Williams lying in the thicket.

# GOVERNMENT SIDE-STEPS

## Seems to be Trying to Evade In- quiry Regarding Tariff.

OTTAWA, Dec. 16.—International and economic conditions which are not only far from normal but much worse than a year ago, when promise of a general tariff revision was made or at any time during the war period are responsible for a change in the Government plans regarding a general tariff inquiry, according to a general statement by Sir Henry Drayton, minister of finance.

Instead of a commission being named for the purpose of touring the country, as had been anticipated, the program is now to gather preliminary information by means of securing written statements from all interested. This will be made the basis of a general public inquiry to be held throughout the country later.

He had a long and brilliant military and clerical career and retired shortly before the war and went to England, but returned to Canada. He was born in Dublin, Ireland, Jan. 16, 1838.

Records will be granted covering only  
land suitable for agricultural purposes  
and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished,  
but parties of not more than four may  
arrange for adjacent pre-emptions  
with joint residence, but each making  
necessary improvements on respective  
claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for  
five years and make improvements to  
value of \$10 per acre, including clear-  
ing and cultivation of at least 5 acres,  
before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not  
less than 3 years, and has made pro-  
portional improvements, he may, be-  
cause of ill-health, or other cause, be  
granted intermediate certificate of im-  
provement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent resi-  
dence may be issued, provided appli-  
cant makes improvements to extent of  
\$200 per annum and records same each  
year. Future improvements or records  
same will operate as for-  
feiture. Title cannot be obtained in  
less than 5 years, and improvements  
of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres  
cleared and cultivated, and residence  
of at least 3 years are required.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20  
acres, may be leased as homestead;  
title to be obtained after fulfilling res-  
idential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes  
areas exceeding 640 acres may be  
leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on  
timber land not exceeding 40 acres  
may be purchased; conditions include  
payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible  
by existing roads may be purchased  
conditional upon construction of a road  
to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of  
road, not exceeding half of purchase  
price, is made.

**PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.**

The scope of this Act is enlarged to  
include all persons joining and sur-  
viving with His Majesty's Forces. The  
time within which the heirs or devisees  
of deceased pre-emptors may apply  
for title under this Act is extended  
from one year from the death of  
such person, as formerly, until one  
year after the conclusion of the present  
war. This privilege is also made re-  
troactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are  
due or payable by soldiers and sur-  
vivors recorded after June 25, 1918.  
Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys ac-  
crued, due and been paid since August  
4, 1914, on account of payments, fees  
or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase  
town or city lots held by members of  
Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired  
direct or indirect, remitted from en-  
listment to March 31, 1920.

**SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.**

Provision made for issuance of  
Crown grants to sub-purchasers of  
Crown lands, acquiring rights from  
purchasers who failed to complete  
purchase, involving forfeiture, on ful-  
fillment of conditions of purchase, in-  
terest and taxes. Where sub-purchas-  
ers do not claim whole of original par-  
cel, purchase price due and taxes may  
be distributed proportionately over  
whole area. Applications must be  
made by May 1, 1920.

**GRAZING.**

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic  
development of livestock industry pro-  
vides for grazing districts and range  
administration under Commissioner.  
Annual grazing permits issued based  
on numbers tagged, priority for estab-  
lished owners. Stock-owners may  
form Associations for range manage-  
ment. Free, or partially free, permits  
for settlers, campers or travellers, up  
to ten head.
