BISHOP STRINGER OF YUKON ELEVATED TO ARCHBISHOP

Spotted Fever Breaks Out At Catterick and British Soldiers Ill

Two Have Already Died With Ailment and More Are in Serious Condition—Strict Quarantine is Being Observed

CATTERICK, Yorkshire, England, April 16:- Eight thousand soldiers at a British Army camp here have been isolated as a consequence of an outbreak of the dread spotted fever. Two soldiers have died and many others are in a serious condition. The origin of the malady has not yet been determined, but drastic steps are being taken to prevent its spread. A strict quarantine will be observed, no one being allowed either to visit or leave the camp.

BANK IS HELD UP

Sum of \$4,700 is Taken From Institution at Concrete, Wash., By Bandits

CONCRETE, Wash., April 16:-Two well dressed bandits entered the Concrete National Bank yesterday and held the place up, escaping with \$4,700 in cash and kidnapping the president, a woman employee and one customer who happened to be in the premises. These people were driven at breakneck sped for a distance along the highway and were then thrown out of the car. The bandits then headed in the direction of Sedro-Woolley. A county-wide search has now been instituted for the bandits.



Veteran Missionary Of North to Preside Over All Northwest

Prince Rupert Friends and Admirers Will Rejoice at Esteemed Cleric's Advancement-Well Known in This Diocese Also

WINNIPEG, April 16:-Rev. Isaac O. Stringer, veteran missionary of the north and Bishop of the Yukon since 1905, was yesterday elected Archbishop of the Anglican Diocese of Rupert's Land, which takes in Manitoba and the country north to Hudson Bay. Bishop Stringer, one of Canada's best known and most highly esteemed church-

men, succeeds Archbishop Matheson, former Primate of Canada, who has resigned, owing to ill-health. SIAM KING He will move from Dawson to Winnipeg and a new bishop will have to be named for the Yukon.

The indomitable Bishop Stringer has already spent almost all his active life in the north country. A man of tremendous spirit and powerful physique, he has often endured hardships he would not permit his subordinates to share. He has already felt a great respect for the simple people among whom he has labored and his striking and genial personality has ever impressed itself upon all those with whom he comes in contact.

Sixty-five years of age on Friday of last week, Bishop Stringer is a to Vancouver. native of Bruce County, Ont., having been born in Kincardine. After obtaining his B.A. degree at Toronto University, he graduated from Wycliffe College in 1892 and immediately went as a missionary to the Eskimos at Herschel Island in the BABIES BUT labored ever since

In 1893 he was appointed rector at Whitehorse where he remained until his consecration as bishop in 1905 for the Yukon Diocese including the whole of the Northwest Territories west of the Rockies. At the same time the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity was conferred upon him by St. John's College, Winnipeg.

Pleased indeed will Bishop Stringer's friends be to learn of his elevation to be an Archbishop. He has many devoted friends here, not only among Anglican Church people but among citizens generally. He was here only a few days ago conducting Easter confirmations owing to the indisposition of Rt. Rev. G. A. Rix, Bishop of Caledonia. He proceeded from here to the central interior and the Peace River district and then to Winnipeg. He is expected back here in May en route to the





Fruit trees need a little timely attention in the way of feeding, watering, spraying and pruning. Pruning keeps valuable energy from being wasted in excess branch growth. Spraying will prevent the inroads of insects and diseases.

Frequent cultivation is the secret of moisture conservation. When watering is necessary make a thorough job of it. Never sprinke-a good soaking of the ground once week is far more beneficial than daily sprinkling which causes, tiny roots to come to the surface for moisture where they are then scorched by the sun. Water the garden during the early morning or evening instead of during the heat of the day.

"They have a great catcher in Cochrane,

a great pair of pitchers in Earnshaw ? and Grove and a mighty fine pair of batters in Simmons and Foxx. If BOUT IS they have any handicap it is that they have just won two pennants and two world series in a row. That may make it hard to keep the team teed up and hustling."

The Yankees themselves, McCarthy declared, were a real good ball club. "If the Yankees get good pitching, you are going to see them up there at the finish," Joe asserted. Washington Senators also had a good chance. McCarthy continued in his discussion of the season's prospects. "If the Athletics should meet with a little hard luck, the Senators should figure in the finish. They at least have a good pitching staff."

National League

McCarthy predicted another close race in the National League. The breaks would probably determine which of four or five teams around the top would win. "I like the Cubs and Cardinals, though," continued Joe.
