LINDBERGH'S FORCED DOWN IN NORTH

NO CHANGE IN OTTAWA HOUSE AS RESULT BY-ELECTIONS

Famous Flying Pair Descend on Account Of Fog Nearby Nome

Are Safe on North Coast of Seward Peninsula and Awaiting Clearing of Weather Before Resuming Flight to Tokyo

NOME, Alaska, Aug. 11.—Col. Charles A. Lindbergh, who is accompanied by his wife on a projected flight from New York to Tokyo, landed on the north coast of Seward Peninsula at 11 o'clock last night on account of fog after having left Point Barrow at 5:53 yesterday afternoon. They landed about seventy-five miles from Nome. Mrs. Lindbergh sent out word by radio that she and her husband were awaiting the weather to clear before resuming the flight in their big Lockheed-Sirius low winged monoplane.

QUIET DAY ON MARKET

MUST MAKE NEW START

The company, it is further stated, will be expected for the purposes of navigation to hand over its lands and appurtenances to the Dominion government.

Peace River Pre-emptions

Rush of Land Seekers Continues as Summer Advances

VICTORIA, Aug. 11.—With the advance of summer the rush for free land in the Peace River district of B.C. still continues. For June 159 records were issued and for July 178. This means that since the government took over the Peace River Block last fall, 121,200 acres have been pre-empted for residence and improvement. Latest crop reports from the district show that high temperatures and winds are likely to reduce the wheat yield by five bushels an acre.

WILL SHOW RED WHEAT

Peace River and Central B.C. to Be Represented at Big Regina Show Next Year

VICTORIA, Aug. 11.—Hard red spring wheat and peas from the Peace River Block will be exhibited at the World's Grain Exhibition in Regina next year. Grass seed will be sent from Central British Columbia.

The provincial department of agriculture will co-operate with prospective exhibitors at the big show.

Prince George Tax Collections Higher In 1931 Than 1930

PRINCE GEORGE, Aug. 11.—Despite the depression, collection of municipal taxes in Prince George this year shows a slight increase over last year. Total collections up to June 30, when the first penalty went on, were \$33,983 as against \$33,604 at the same date in 1930.

MORE TRADE IN ORIENT

Hon. Herbert M. Marler States in Toronto That Prospects Are Bright

TORONTO, Aug. 11.—Hon. Herbert M. Marler, Canadian minister plenipotentiary to Japan, in an address here yesterday, stated that there were bright prospects for increased trade with the Orient.

CRAMER MISSING

No Word of Trans-Atlantic Flyer Since He Left Bergen For Copenhagen

OSLO, Aug. 11.—Inquiries along the south coast of Norway have failed to elicit any trace of Parker D. Cramer, United States flyer, and Oliver Paquette, his mechanic and radio operator.

Cramer and Paquette took off from Shetland Islands Sunday for Copenhagen after having successfully spanned the Atlantic Ocean on an air-mail route mapping flight.

As time passes fears are beginning to grow that Cramer and Paquette, a Canadian, must have perished. Their plane was equipped with radio.

Prince George Police Officer Rescues Woman

Provincial Constable D. J. Bingham of Prince George, who is spending a holiday in Vancouver, saved the life of Mrs. G. Groskley last week by jumping into Vancouver harbor and rescuing her from drowning after she had fallen into the water from the North Vancouver ferry dock.

Provincial Constable Bingham is the son of Chief of Police W. J. Bingham of Vancouver.

ENGLAND GETTING GRAIN OF SOVIET

ISTANBUL, Turkey, Aug. 11.—During the first six days of August, 95,000 tons of Soviet Russia grain from Black Sea ports passed through the Bosporus en route to England.

COTTON IS IN PANIC

Liverpool Has Sharp Drop While New York Prices Goes to Lowest Level Since 1900

LIVERPOOL, Aug. 11.—A sharp fall of nearly two cents per pound in the price of cotton below Saturday's closing price took place yesterday on the Liverpool Cotton Exchange.

NEW YORK, Aug. 11.—Cotton prices in a demoralized market broke violently with both October and December contracts selling below the seven-cent level, the lowest price recorded since 1900.

WILKINS TO SPITZBERGEN

Arctic Explorer Leaves Tromsø for Island in Far North After One-Day Halt

TROMSØ, Norway, August 11.—Sir Hubert Wilkins with his polar submarine Nautilus departed from this port yesterday after a one-day halt on its way to Spitzbergen.

Sir Hubert has given up his plan of travelling under the ice to the North Pole but will do some exploration work around Spitzbergen. The Nautilus was today reported adrift in the Arctic seas with engine trouble.

RATE ON LEATHER

Canadian Railways Ask U. S. Commerce Commission For Re-consideration

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11.—The Canadian railways have asked the Interstate Commerce Commission to re-open consideration of joint rates on scrap leather shipped from Canada into the United States.

Conservatives Take Traditional Liberal Seat in Quebec But Lose Ontario Contest to Laborites

OTTAWA, Aug. 11.—The Conservative government emerged out of the East Hamilton and Three Rivers-St. Maurice by-elections yesterday still holding a majority in the House of Commons of twenty-four over the combined opposition. The Conservatives gained the stronghold of Three Rivers-St. Maurice after it had remained thirty-one years in the Liberal column but lost East Hamilton which they had held since 1904.

PRAISES MEMBERS

Capt. Ian Mackenzie Tells of Good Work B. C. Representatives Did at Ottawa

VANCOUVER, Aug. 11.—Hon. Ian Mackenzie, ranking Liberal member from British Columbia and conqueror of Hon. H. H. Stevens in Vancouver Centre at the last Dominion election, has arrived home from his sessional labors at Ottawa.

Wilfrid Hanbury, M.P. for Burrard who accompanied him most of the way, left the train at Kamloops to visit his mill. A. E. Munn, member for Vancouver North, and Angus MacInnis, Vancouver South, are expected soon.

"It was a strenuous session—five long months of it," said Capt. Mackenzie, who declined to discuss the issues at this time. "I've said enough about them already." But he was enthusiastic in his praise of the British Columbia group of oppositionists.

"Collectively and individually, they made themselves a real force in Parliament," he said. "All of them took prominent parts in the big issues of the session and worked indefatigably for this province."

Olof Hanson was listened to with respect on the fisheries question; Wilfrid Hanbury took a leading part in discussion of the Australian treaty and was on the National Railways committee; Thomas Reid on agriculture and other matters made his presence felt, while Mr. Munn's skill in piloting the Second Narrows Bridge Bill through the House was generally commended, said Capt. Mackenzie.

A holiday is the Vancouver Centre member's immediate objective.

FLYERS AT MARSEILLES

Made Non-Stop Flight Yesterday From Istanbul To France Seaport

MARSEILLES, France, August 11.—Russell Boardman and John Polando, who flew non-stop from New York to Istanbul a couple of weeks ago, landed here yesterday after a non-stop flight from Istanbul, Turkey.

Boardman and Polando have given up plans to enter the Tokyo-United States non-stop flight race but will ship their plane home across the Atlantic Ocean to New York.

**WHY NOT OPEN BRIDGE?**

Considerable impatience was again expressed on Sunday because the Galloway Rapids bridge still remains closed to vehicular traffic. Night work was resorted to in order to bring about the completion of the bridge several weeks ago, supposedly to give the public use of the span and the road beyond at the earliest possible moment.

Motorists were patient at first when it was explained that driving across the bridge would interfere with road work on the other side. Traffic beyond the bridge now, however, would not interfere with road work, it is said. In fact, it is stated that several cars have already gone across after the bars had been removed.

**TO CHURCH OR STATE?**

The quarrel between Mussolin and the pope centres around the question whether the children of Italy belong to the state or to the church. The Italian dictator contends they belong to the state—and he is the state in Italy today—to be done with as the state deems fit. The pope, of course, maintains that they belong to the church.

This is a historic controversy dating back to Spartan days and before. Wherever the church has become a highly organized institution it has ever disputed the state's right to sole and absolute jurisdiction of the citizen. Wars have been fought in futile attempts to decide the question and civilizations and governments have fallen because of it.

After the bill of rights and with the introduction of the democratic and republican forms of government the ancient feud became a three-cornered one, the new disputant being the free man who maintained that the child belonged to neither state nor church, but that the state and church belonged to the child.

Russia has established a new government on the principle that the child belongs to the state, which is free to do with it whatsoever it will. The same principle is at work in Rome, although there the church has not surrendered to it.

**SETTLERS IN PEACE**

More Than One Thousand Families Arrive in Four Months. According to Official Reports

VANCOUVER, Aug. 11.—During the past four months 1074 families settled in British Columbia's Peace River block and are fast becoming established. This report comes from W. S. West, superintendent of land settlement of the provincial colonization department, who is in the city after a five-month stay in the Peace River Country.

Mr. West, whose headquarters are in Vancouver, expects to go to Pouce Coupe shortly and will remain there until the middle of November.

Referring to new settlers, who total approximately 3000, Mr. West declared they represent an excellent type of citizen, approximately 95 per cent. being British-born. More than 100 additional families are expected to settle in the area before winter sets in.

All are experienced farmers and the majority possess full agricultural equipment," Mr. West stated. "Most of them came from drought-stricken areas of Southern Saskatchewan in vicinity of Gull Lake, Willow Bunch and Biggar, although some have come as far as Dakota, Texas and Oklahoma."

**Real Pioneer Spirit**  
Railroads conveyed the settlers in most cases, but many came with carts and vans, taking as long as eleven weeks to reach their destination.

Mr. West stressed the fact, however, that these people have shown the real pioneer spirit and are settling out in a determined manner to earn their living.

"Those who enter the Peace River district must be willing to take off their coats and work their hardest if they wish to succeed in the district, which is really one of the finest in the world," Mr. West asserted.

Great advances are taking place in the Peace River country at present, according to Mr. West. There are now sixty-two schools in the block and nine more will be opened shortly. Two well-equipped hospitals have been established, one being the Red Cross institution at Pouce Coupe and the other a Roman Catholic hospital at Fort St. John.

**Mixed Farming Profitable**  
Crops have been good, especially at Rolla, and high-grade dairying is also advancing at a rapid rate. Agriculturists are recognizing the fact that good profits may be realized from mixed farming and are experimenting along those lines. At Squaw Creek and several other localities cattle raising and other ranching is being carried out successfully.

Mr. West emphasized the fact

that any kind of a coast outlet is absolutely necessary to the district.

"Business which could be easily absorbed by Vancouver and Victoria is now being diverted to Edmonton and even Winnipeg just through lack of proper transportation systems to the Coast," he asserted.

Referring to living conditions in the block the superintendent observed that the average family can obtain its food "by the rifle" as the country abounds in game.

**Glowing Picture Of Peace River**

Sergeant Greenwood, in Vancouver, Tells Paper of Wonderful Crop Nearly Ready

"A wonderful country of vast wheat fields just now turning into color ready for a great harvest," was the way Sergeant G. H. Greenwood, provincial police, describes the Peace River district to a Vancouver paper.

Sgt. Greenwood, who is stationed at Pouce Coupe, is paying a brief visit to Vancouver, having motored south with his wife.

The fair board at its recent meeting decided to enter a candidate in the International Beautequest at Los Angeles in connection with the celebration of the one hundred and fiftieth anniversary of the founding of the city, when the most beautiful girl in America will be chosen.

The local candidate will be chosen at the time of the fall fair and immediately after her selection she will have to leave for the south to get there in time for the big California event. The attraction for the candidate is set forth in the following letter from the south.

"Your candidate will be met at the railway station, dock or airport by a committee representing the Ocean Park Businessmen's Association.

"She will be the guest of screen stars at various functions.

"She will be included in all parties listed as part of the program of the International Beautequest and La Fiesta de Los Angeles.

"She will occupy a position of honor in all gatherings including pageants, parades, spectacles, receptions and, in fact, all events planned for the International Beautequest and Los Angeles' great reception."

Candidates must be between the ages of 16 and 30, unmarried and of good character and the one going from Prince Rupert will be chosen in the following manner:

# SUSPENSION SPAN TEST

Squaws Were Sent Ahead to Test Bridge Before Warriors and Hunters Cross

HAZELTON, Aug. 11.—A traditional custom for retaining numerical fighting and hunting strength of an Indian tribe was recalled by pioneers upon completion of a steel bridge over Hagwilget Canyon, near here.

The bridge, one of the main links in the proposed Alaska Highway, is the longest and highest bridge of its kind in British Columbia, 260 feet above the swirling river, and required 1,000,000 pounds of steel and cable and six miles of 1½-inch wire rope to complete.

It is located on a historical site, where many years ago Indians built two wooden structures a few feet above the water.

Tribesmen, in order to spare a warrior and hunter, sent their squaws on ahead to test the strength of the span every time they were to cross it.

If it bore the weight of the squaw then it was safe—if it didn't the warriors did not cross.

Indians later built a spider-web suspension bridge across the narrow neck near the upper end of the deep canyon, using wire. This suspension bridge was used for many years until the government constructed a steel bridge with wooden towers, which was later replaced by the present structure.

Numbers of British Columbia's unemployed are taking to prospecting owing to failure of other regular occupations.
