WILKINSAT BROOKLYN

Submarine Nautilus to be Finally Fitted for Under Ice Voyage

BROOKLYN, March 18-Captain Sir Hubert Wilkins arrived at Brooklyn Navy Yard yesterday, from Camden, New Jersey, with former French submarine, now named Nautilus, in which he is to essay a daring trip under the ice of the Arctic Ocean to the North Pole. The trip is designed to cover a dis-

tance of 20,000 miles. The Nautilus will be christened here and finally outfitted for her long voyage. Already \$500,000 has been spent in reconditioning the craft. The vessel has a surface speed of 16 knots and 10 knots under water.

As well as attempting to reach the North Pole, Wilkins will endeavour to obtain meteorological and scientific data.


