### PRINCIPLES CONTINUE

Government to Treat Economic Problems in Same Way, Says Premier Bennett

OTTAWA, March 18.—The general principles, which have guided the government of Canada in dealing with economic problems, will continue to do so at the coming Imperial Conference in Ottawa, it was stated by Premier R. B. Bennett in the House of Commons yesterday.

Premier Bennett was replying to the critical speech that had been made on the preceding day by Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the opposition.

### BUCK PASSING IS CHARGED

Oklahoma Senator Declares That No Effectual Cure Has Yet Been Offered for Oil Situation

WASHINGTON, March 17.—The Hoover administration was charged Monday by Senator Thomas of Oklahoma with "passing the buck" in the matter of providing relief for the oil industry of the United States. Senator Thomas predicted that limitation of oil importations would not cure the situation. In reality, no effectual remedy had yet been offered, he declared.

### Newspaperman Gets Big Post

WASHINGTON, March 18.—Theodore Joslin, who started out in the newspaper game as an office boy twenty-three years ago, has been appointed secretary to President Herbert Hoover, it was announced yesterday. The office of secretary to the President carries with it important executive duties

### Immense Bond Is Taken Out Upon Dam Contractors

SAN FRANCISCO, March 18.—The biggest bond ever taken out in the United States was issued yesterday on the syndicate which has the contract for the huge Boulder dam project. The bond amounted to \$822,000 and was issued by 22 separate companies.

### DRAFTING OF PACT

Details of Anglo-Franco-Italian Accord to Be Settled at Conference in London

LONDON, March 18.—Arrangements have been made for a conference here on Thursday of the five powers concerned with the hope of reaching a final draft for the Anglo-Franco-Italian naval accord.

Dwight W. Morrow, now on his way across the Atlantic, will represent United States, which has now stated that it does not intend to sign the agreement in which it is not greatly concerned, at the conference. He was a prominent member of the London naval conference of last year.

PARIS, March 18.—Governmental circles here are stated to be "much annoyed" at the attitude of aloofness that the United States is manifesting in the matter of the Anglo-Franco-Italian naval accord.

### HOOVER WARNED

Significant Statement is Issued by Senator Hiram Johnson of California.

WASHINGTON, D.C., March 18.—Senator Hiram Johnson of California has just issued what is considered to be one of the most significant warnings that has yet been directed at the Hoover administration.

Senator Johnson declared that "the Republican party cannot continue to ignore economic issues in its 1932 campaign."

### M'DONALD DEFEATED

Labor Government Suffers Serious Reverse—Simon Joins Opposition

LONDON, March 18.—The government of Premier J. Ramsay MacDonald suffered defeat in the House of Commons by a margin of four votes on the critical Electoral Reform Bill.

Defeat of the government was due to Sir John Simon leading ten Liberal followers into the Opposition column on the division.

### M'DOUGALL COMMITTED

Surviving Bandit in Burnaby Gun Fight is Sent up on Attempted Murder Charge

VANCOUVER, March 18.—Fraser McDougall, jailbreaker, who was captured last Friday in a gun battle in the Burnaby bush which claimed the life of his associate in crime, Ellis Wilcox, was this morning committed for trial on a charge of attempted murder of Chief Constable W. J. Devitt of Burnaby.

Chief Devitt testified that bursts of revolver fire preceded his own two rifle shots, one of which struck Wilcox's finger, deflecting into his abdomen and killing him.

### WILKINS AT BROOKLYN

Submarine Nautilus to be Finally Fitted for Under Ice Voyage

BROOKLYN, March 18.—Captain Sir Hubert Wilkins arrived at Brooklyn Navy Yard yesterday, from Camden, New Jersey, with former French submarine, now named Nautilus, in which he is to essay a daring trip under the ice of the Arctic Ocean to the North Pole. The trip is designed to cover a distance of 20,000 miles.

The Nautilus will be christened here and finally outfitted for her long voyage. Already \$500,000 has been spent in reconditioning the craft. The vessel has a surface speed of 16 knots and 10 knots under water.

As well as attempting to reach the North Pole, Wilkins will endeavour to obtain meteorological and scientific data.

### SURVIVORS PICKED UP

Twenty-Seven Men Still Missing Following Explosion of Sealer Viking

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., March 18.—The sealing ship Beothic today picked up a dory containing three survivors of the sealing vessel Viking which blew up Sunday night.

With 128 survivors now ashore, it is believed that twenty-seven men are still missing.

Yesterday three men, including Harry Sargent, Boston explorer, were rescued from the drifting stern of the Viking.

### Railway Freight Official Here On Trip Through West

Accompanied by a party of officials, including G. A. McNicholl, general passenger agent, Vancouver, and W. H. Tobey, divisional superintendent here, G. T. Pettigrew, assistant general freight traffic manager, Canadian National Railways, Montreal, arrived in the city from Vancouver on the steamer Prince George, this morning, in the course of a tour of the coast on official business, and proceeded East in his special car attached to this morning's regular train.

Mr. McNicholl and Mr. Tobey will leave for Jasper Park of tomorrow's way freight.

### HALIBUT SOLD AT KETCHIKAN

Price of 15c and 13c Reported To Have Been Paid There Yesterday

The radio announcement from Ketchikan last night stated that several halibut boats sold their catches there yesterday to the old companies at an average of 15c and 13c a pound. Salmon fetched about a cent less than halibut.

After having been stormbound for several hours at Sandspit, C. N.R. steamer Prince John, Capt. Neil McLean, coming north from Vancouver via the Queen Charlotte Islands, left Sandspit at 1.30 this morning for Massett and should be here some time tomorrow.

THE GOVERNMENT BLOCK

The Government, at Victoria, has been asked to place on the market the property owned by it in the centre of Prince Rupert known as the Government Block.

A similar stand was taken by the previous government, so it is not a party question but purely one of departmental policy.

The objection to allowing the block to remain practically vacant is that the Government does not pay taxes and the city is consequently robbed of a considerable sum annually in order that the provincial government may secure a larger price for the property.

Another objection is that the big gap in the centre of the city is not good for business.

The city council has decided to bring this matter before the various organizations in the city with a view to trying to bring pressure on the Government to put a reasonable price on the property, breaking it up to suitable plots to suit possible customers who might use it.

METHOD OF APPROACH

Right Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King is opposed to the policies of Right Hon. R. B. Bennett, premier of Canada, and in many respects he is probably right, but when it comes to criticizing his attitude at the Imperial Conference, we believe Premier Bennett took the right method of approach.

It is argued by some that Mr. Bennett was in collusion with the Conservative party in Britain, and that his proposal was part of a general scheme to bring about a change of Government there.

One of the first steps toward co-operation is to clearly state our views. Mr. Bennett had a mandate from the people to do that and he did it well.

The Letter Box

STRANGE ANOMALY

Editor, Daily News:

I desire to draw the attention of your readers to a strange anomaly that exists in the administration of the Fishery regulation in District No. 2 to wit:

It has been the practice of the Federal government for a period of years, to attach Japanese gill-net fishermen in this district to designated canneries at the time of issuance of the said license, and to make the matter perfectly clear I would use the Skeena as an example, though the same practice operates all over District No. 2.

There are 295 Japanese gill-netters permitted on the Skeena who in turn are farmed out by means of Japanese contractors to various canneries on the Skeena, and it results in the condition that each cannery fortunate enough to have Japanese ratings are allocated a certain specified number until the total of 295 has been allotted.

This places an abnormal power in the hands of the contractor who may or may not be under the control of the cannery for whom he is the slavet rafficker. This regulation does not extend to districts Nos. one or three, and the executive of the Northern B. C. Salmon Fishermen's Association fail to see the equity of this discrimination.

It is considered by this Association that the Federal Government have no jurisdiction in the regulation of the disposal of the fish after they are caught, but is specifically the business of the Provincial Government.

The Japanese themselves are most desirous to be freed from this condition, and have approached us repeatedly to assist them in having the same treatment as meted out to their compatriots of the south. They are now faced with the peculiar circumstance that potential Japanese members of the "Prince Rupert Fishermen's Co-operative Association" are unable to sell their fish to themselves.

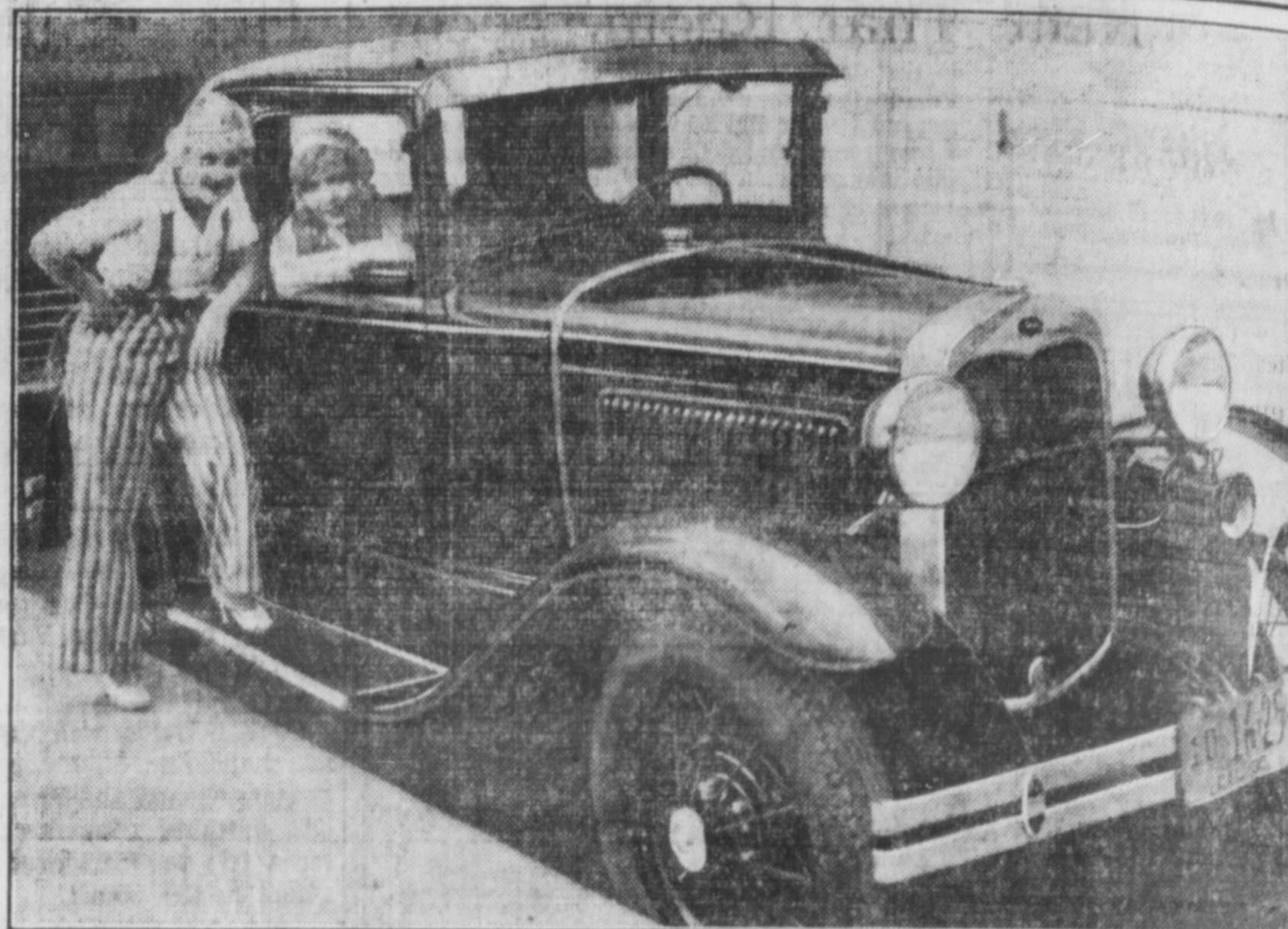

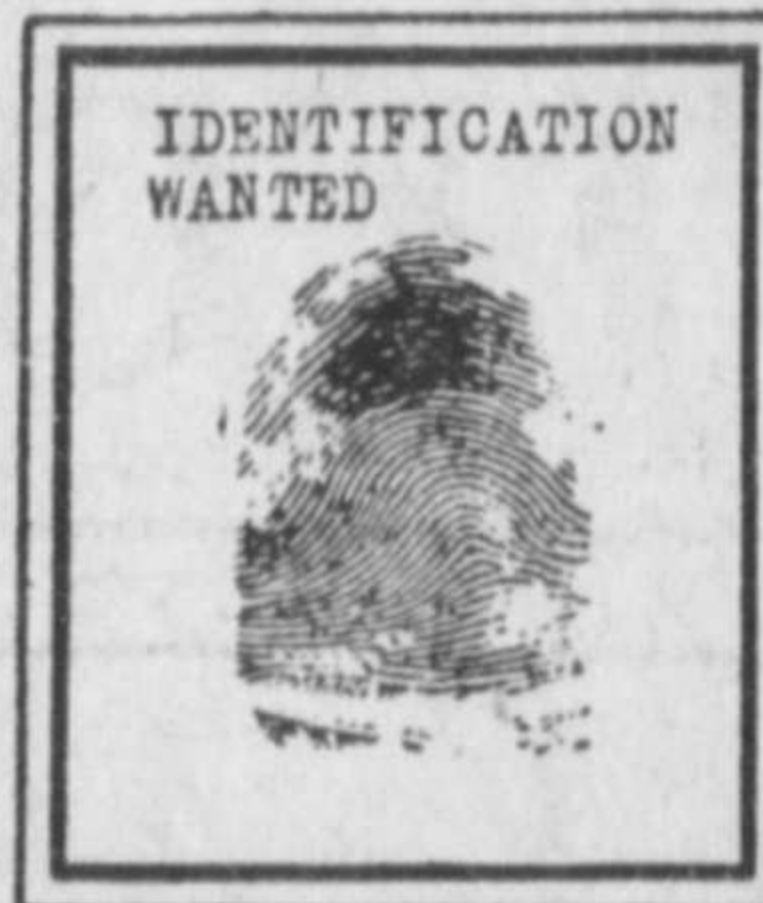

## They Leave Prints

A mill rate of 10 has been set by the board of village commissioners. This rate will apply upon the full value of the land and on fifty per cent of improvements.

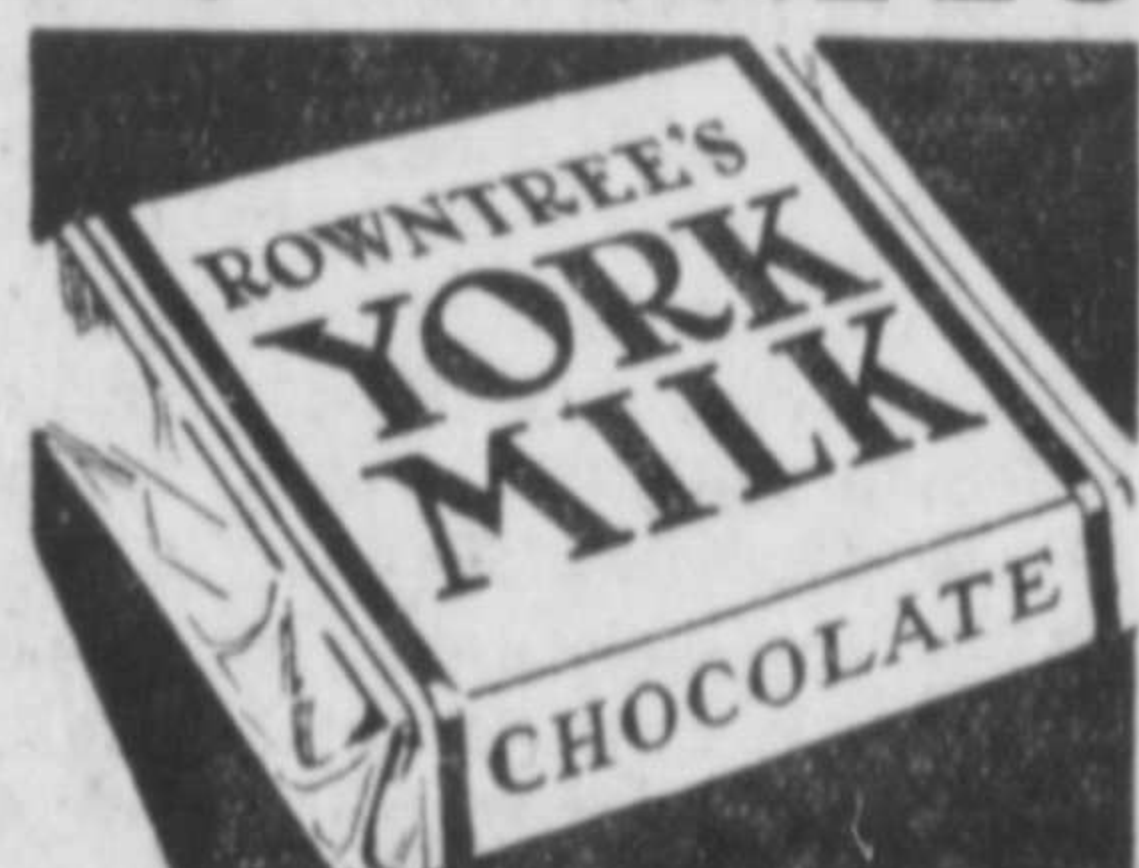
The thermometer in this district last week took the lowest dip of the winter, going down to from 10 to as much as 20 degrees below zero.
