## Attempt to Murder General Viscount French at Dublin

**Fired on by Party of Miscreants Using Revolvers and Bombs as He and Party Drove Through Streets; One of Would-be Assailants Killed.**

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

DUBLIN, December 20.—An attack was made here yesterday on Viscount French who had a narrow escape with his life.

That the attack was coolly planned was indicated by the fact that the assassins played handball at a public house near the scene of the shooting, while awaiting the arrival of the vice-regal party.

Further evidence of the deliberateness of the attack was found in the fact that the assassins carefully flung a cart across the road at the scene of ambuscade, which stopped the vice-regal party procession of four cars. After the attack a case of Mills bombs, similar to those used in war, was found.

Both bombs and revolvers were used by the miscreants, the number of whom is variously estimated at from five to fifteen.

The vice-regal party fired on the would-be assassins as they fled across the fields, but all of them made their escape except one man killed, who was shot through the head, dying instantly.

Around the fingers of the fallen man was found a ring of a discharged hand grenade and in his pockets two revolvers, one of Spanish make and the other of old German make.

When the official party approached the ambuscade, revolvers were fired and some bombs thrown. The assassins evidently expected Viscount French would be in the second carriage, in which only a few bullets penetrated. A shot, however, struck the detective sitting beside the chauffeur of the first car, wounding him in the hand.

Almost immediately the vice-regal party opened fire on the assassins who took to flight on discovery.

## PROHIBITION IN NEW ZEALAND BEEN CARRIED

Government Sustained by Good Majority—Labor Has Ten Seats.

LONDON, Dec. 20.—The High Commissioner of New Zealand announced the general election results as follows: Reformers, 48; Liberals, 18; Labor, 10; Independent, 4, which gives the Government fifty seats and the opposition combined 30.

Sir Joseph Ward, Sir James Carroll, G. W. Russell, and David Blude were defeated.

Licensing returns are incomplete but prohibition seems to have been carried.

## IRISH BILL NEXT WEEK

Governments similar to Canadian Provinces to be Provided with One Superior Body.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, Dec. 20.—The new Irish Bill is expected to be explained by Lloyd George in the House of Commons next week. It is understood that it provides for conciliatory measures and the introduction of a system of government similar to that of the Canadian provinces with separate parliaments for Ulster and the balance of Ireland, both parliaments having full freedom.

There will be also a body composed of representatives of both north and south sections of the country.

Representatives also will be elected to the British House of Commons.

## COLLISION ON C.P.R. IN EAST

Fifteen Persons Killed When a Freight Train Telescoped Into Passenger.

ONWAY, Maine, Dec. 20.—Fifteen persons were killed or burnt to death and otherwise injured when a freight train collided with a special from St. John, N. B., loaded with steerage passengers from the steamship Empress of France.

The accident took place on the C. P. R. line. The freight telescoped the engine and forward cars of the passenger. Fire broke out, burning the wreckage.

The conductors of both trains were among the killed.

## FIVE HAVE SLEEPING SICKNESS IN SOUTH

One Death and Four Now in Comatose State in Vancouver.

Latest reports from Vancouver state that there have been five cases of sleeping sickness break out there already. The first case was fatal and the others are still in a comatose condition at the general hospital.

## Community League For Town of Anyox

Organization Being Formed to Look After the Recreational and Educational Activities for the Mutual Benefit of the Citizens.

The people of Anyox have formed a Community League, the purpose of which is "the development of an all-round efficiency in all the residents of the town; to engage in co-operative enterprises for the mutual welfare of all, and to develop in its members the art of living together in the spirit of the Golden Rule."

The movement for the formation of the league was initiated at a gathering of representatives of all the different activities of the town. As a result of a conference it was decided to petition the Granby Company, through their vice-president and general manager, F. M. Sylvester, to back the enterprise and bring it into being officially. The names of no less than 900 residents of the place were appended to the petition and it is now before the Board of Directors for their approval.

Before the petition was forwarded the matter was thoroughly discussed with Mr. Sylvester, and the advantages of the scheme pointed out. The general manager expressed himself as pleased that the residents were taking up matters of this kind for themselves instead of having to be urged to it by the company.

### Membership and Officers.

The plan provides that all members in good standing in existing educational, social, athletic and musical organizations shall be members and all those who are willing to further the objects of the league. The G. W. V. A., Boy Scouts or other similar organizations may become departments of the league.

The officers of the organization are to consist of a community council of six members and the heads of the various departments of the league's activities. The secretary is to be the welfare agent of the Granby Company, appointed by them after agreement with the league.

### Departments.

The league proposes to organize and operate such activities as a forum to care for public debates, lectures, and the public library; a recreation department to care for the recreational activities; a choral and dramatic department to foster the production of concerts and dramas; a civics department to provide for the formation of classes in the various subjects in demand and to provide simple courses in English, and Canadian history, civics, etc., for foreign born residents; a home and school department to promote a closer co-operation between home and school; and last, but not least, a public health de-

## SOCIALIST RETURNED TO U.S. CONGRESS

MILWAUKEE, Dec. 20.—Victor L. Berger, Socialist, was re-elected to Congress from fifth Wisconsin District, having defeated Henry H. Bodenstab, Republican, by 4,806 votes. Berger's total vote was 24,367, and Bodenstab's, 19,161. Approximately 9,000 voters did not go to polls.

## FOSTER REFUSES A DOMINION APPOINTMENT

VICTORIA, Dec. 20.—Col. W. W. Foster, D.S.O., stated here that he had definitely decided not to accept the offer to re-organize the Royal Canadian Dragoons of which he had been offered the command. Instead he announces the intention to engage in private enterprise in this province after the new year.

## Negotiations With Soviet Temporarily Broken Off; Demands of the Bolsheviki

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, Dec. 20.—Negotiations between James O'Grady, representing Great Britain, and Maxim Litvinoff on behalf of Soviet Russia, which have been going on at Copenhagen with a view to bringing about the repatriation of prisoners, have not been definitely broken off, according to an official announcement today. Negotiations have been merely postponed to permit representatives to return to their respective countries and confer with their governments.

The Bolshevik demands in the prisoners exchange negotiations at Copenhagen, are given in a Moscow wireless message. The release of British prisoners is offered in return for 100 Bolshevik and 26 others mentioned in a special list. The return of 2,000 Bolsheviks who went to Denmark from Germany is also demanded.

### Leave to Army.

COPENHAGEN, Dec. 20.—M. Litvinoff, representative of the Soviet Government, said today that the breaking off of negotiations was due to the attitude of the British Government. "We must leave the matter with the Red Army," he declared. "We understand from Premier Lloyd George that he wished us to deal first with Admiral Kolchak and General Denikine. That is what the Bolshevik army is successfully doing."

## FINE LECTURE AT ST. ANDREW'S

J. C. Brady Speaks on Life and Work of Great Poet, Byron.

The rooms of the St. Andrews' Society were filled last evening by members of the organization gathered to hear Principal J. C. Brady deliver an eloquent address on the famous English poet, Lord Byron. Mr. Brady has made an intimate study of the poetical works of the poet and in dealing with him last night his observations were manifested in interesting data and close particulars on the authors life and sorrows. As S. D. MacDonald, the chairman, noted in his remarks, Mr. Brady surely excelled himself with his well known eloquence. No minor part of his address, was the profundity of quotations which he recited from his works. Nothing need be said regarding Mr. Brady's skill as a reciter apart from the fact that he held his listeners last night with his selections from "Childe Harold," a work that is full of literary beauty.

### Was Scotch

In opening Mr. Brady pointed out to his audience that Byron should appeal to all Scotchmen because Byron was Scotch by birth. He was a contemporary of Robert Burns and Sir Walter Scott and resembled them in certain respects although, generally speaking, his works were of an altogether different nature. Like Scott he was a poet of nature but in this respect he differed from Burns. Mr. Brady compared Byron with various other of the idealistic poets of his age, Keats, Shelley, Wordsworth and Coleridge. The one outstanding feature differentiating Byron from all of these was that he stood by his convictions or openly criticized them in the time of adversity but never deserted them like these others had done.

## RUSHING WITH REPAIR KHYEX RIVER WASHOUT

No Communication Yet; Mail and Express Probably Here Tonight.

### TWO PILE DRIVERS WORKING ON NEW SPAN

The situation at Khyex River where the grade and bridge on the railway is washed out remains about the same. As yet no communication has been possible across the break. It is thought that a transfer of mail and express may be effected today and the mail that is at present tied up may come over soon. Further mail from the East is now directed over the southern lines. All the passengers westbound for Prince Rupert have been sent back to Prince George where they will be transferred to the Canadian Northern and will go to Vancouver.

In the meantime repair operations are being rushed as quickly as possible. Two pile drivers are working at both ends of the break and a temporary pile bridge will be installed. Superintendent McCall, who is at the scene of operations expects that communication will be restored in a week's or ten day's time.

## RESTRICTIONS ON LIQUOR SALE TO BE REMOVED

All War Time Restrictions to be Lifted Before the End of the Year.

OTTAWA, Dec. 20.—New Year's Day may be ushered in for the Canadian people with glad tidings that the war order restrictions have ceased to exist.

The Government has ceased to speculate as to when the proclamation of peace will come, and it has concluded that peace conditions prevail, so far as Canada is concerned. They say that Canadian people no longer should be worried with war restrictions which are their own affairs and are not international in character. As a consequence there is reason to expect that all war orders, with the exception of that dealing with enemy property, shall be repealed before the end of the year. This includes prohibition restrictions regarding the importation, manufacture and interprovincial traffic in alcoholic drinks for beverage purposes.

### And Lo, the Dead Comes Back to Life.

It was rather mean of Sir Robert Borden to say he would resign and then to reconsider his decision. A number of nice things were said of him which would have been reserved until he died had it been known he was not really dropping out. It is like a corpse coming to life again and reading his obituary notices.

We are glad to know that Sir Robert is well enough to continue in the position. It is not seriously intended that he shall fill it, however. That seems certain. He is to be the figure head and someone else will try an apprentice hand at conducting the affairs of the country.

Everyone will be interested in the choice of a new leader, but not quite as much so as if that leader were to assume officially the office of premier.

### Union of Effort Among the Churches. (Contributed.)

Most laymen are reticent concerning religious questions and religious experiences. Just as a man does not blazon abroad the intimate conversations he has with his wife, or his son, or his daughter, so he is inclined towards a commendable reserve on the great question of communion with the Infinite. It cannot be doubted that most men who by the manner of their lives have won the deep regard, or the admiration of their associates, have had periods of exaltation and of deep spiritual satisfaction. They do not analyze their feelings in public. Neither, when they enjoy the beauty of a rose are they moved to dissect it with the botanist's scalpel.

Some men are differently constituted. They are found in "revival meetings" conducting introspection in public and indulging the emotional side of their natures. Neither class has the right to criticize the other too rigidly. Temperaments and habits differ. But both the vocal and the reticent man of religious sensibilities are agreed on certain cardinal points. They accept the New Testament as a rule of life. They are convinced of the supernatural splendor of the Great Teacher, and of his continuing power for good in the world. They believe that prayer is a mighty force, and that the ills of society are curable by that mystical exercise. Therefore, they support the activities of the organized churches, and particularly the Home and Foreign Missionary work. On minor points of doctrine, they will probably differ, firmly, yet respectfully.

In the United National Campaign, five denominations of Christians are associated. Men who find spiritual aid and comfort in ritual and men who find ritual a hindrance, may have good reason to worship separately, but they have better reason to say with one voice that the Gospel is the greatest treasure of life and that it should be brought into closer touch with weary humanity. There is a co-operative basis for these denominations. It is the Apostles' Creed, and the Sermon on the Mount.

It may seem strange that in the past this unity of spirit, this "essential one-ness" has not been emphasized as it might have been. Perhaps, preoccupation with denominational concerns may have been to blame. But the comradeship of war awoke a new understanding. The ambition of all Christian people is to serve their generation as well as possible; first, by mending their own lives, and secondly, by spreading abroad the conception of human brotherhood which is the beginning and end of the Gospel. All denominations can help in that work. Five of them are trying it in concert.

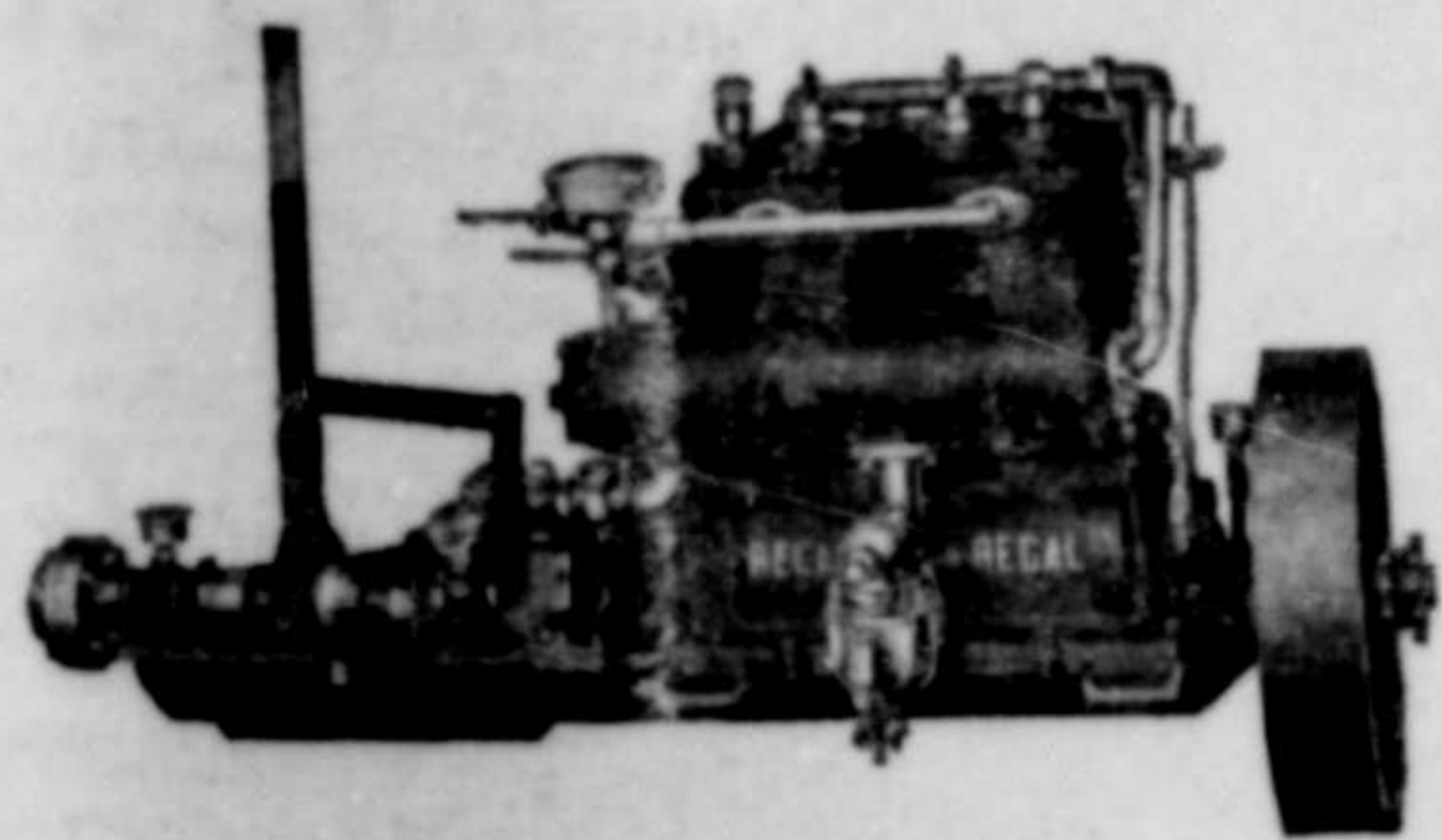

## FINE LECTURE AT ST. ANDREW'S

(Continued from Page One.)

other people ridiculed him, Byron had early become acquainted with the sorrows and discouragements of life. His mother had been an heiress, but his father was dissolute and greedy. Before Byron had reached fifteen years the father had squandered the mother's fortune and decamped, leaving mother and son in dire financial straits. This had tended to reflect on the mother's disposition and no doubt accounted for the reputation which she bears in history of being a termagant and changeable. The boy made no friends but had acquired a deep and lasting love for nature which was manifested in his poem, Loch Nagar.

### Critics After Him.

His first volume of poems was published when he was 21 years of age. It met with a torrent of adverse criticism in the old Tory critic, the Edinburgh Review. This was met by Byron with a powerful reply and the literary world of Europe realized that here was a force to be contended with, a power to be put down. Byron was then made the victim of public opinion and all the evil that could be scraped up against him was used with the result that he soon gained the reputation of a vile, absolute inebriate. His name was spoken of with horror as a thing unclean and on his first appearance in the House of Lords he was treated with cold disdain. The remarkable speech made on that occasion met with applause. His reputation was not enhanced by the testimony of his young wife who left him a few days after their first child was born and added to the talk of ignominy against him.

### In Revolution.

Meeting with no encouragement or friendship in his native land, Byron went to the continent. He was in France at the time of the Revolution and went through its horrors, but supported the cause of the rebels although he did correct them in their revenge, stating that they were drunk with slaughter. He spent some time in Italy and Switzerland and in the former country was led into a body of soldiers which he believed had a purpose of national uplift in view, but which turned out to be nothing more than banditti. In Switzerland he wrote several wonderful poems on the natural grandeur and power of the Alps.

It was in Greece where he

He died at Missolonghi at the age of 36 but the consummation of his desires was in sight and Greece was freeing herself. After his death Europe realized his worth and even tardy old England was at last forced to admit that Byron was one of the greatest factors in the life of Europe, both as a reformer and a poet.

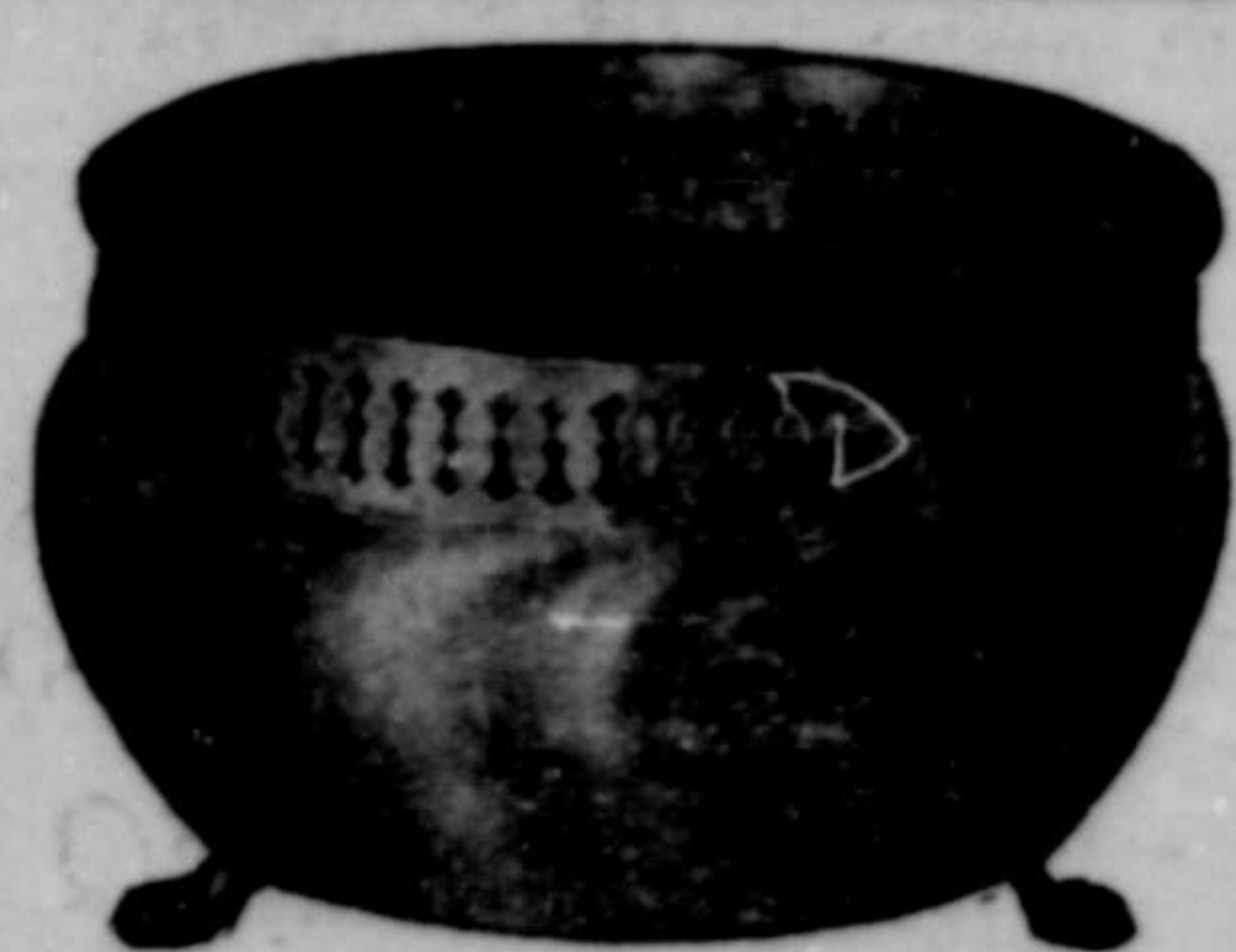
