CHANGES IN HALIBUT REGULATIONS

to Premier Tolmie

That British Columbia's Railway Rights Are Protected

There is a persistent rumor going around to the effect an outlet at or near Hansard is reported to be the route favored. It is said, and that with considerable authority, that the Hansard route is the only one surveyed and that the railway authorities very strongly favor it as giving the possibility of most rapid returns on the investment.

While, doubtless, the railways are a very important factor in the present situation, the people of the country should also have some say as to where the railway should be located. The probability is that the railways will be asking for privileges. Judging from the forecast in connection with the railway heads meeting Premier Tolmie, the Province of British Columbia will be asked for help in connection with this project. In view of that, British Columbia should have some say as to where the railway should be built.

Under the Monkman Pass scheme British Columbia would be practically ignored insofar as new construction is concerned. It would tap the rich grain country around Grande Prairie and the crops from British Columbia would have to be hauled eastward as at present, only not so far, and then southward and west. Of all the routes suggested the Hansard route is the least attractive to British Columbia as offering the least development and the poorest service.

According to all the information available, the Hansard route would open up very little new productive country, whereas the alternative routes, either that through the Pine Pass or the more northerly one through the Peace Pass would develop a wonderful country, rich in productive farm land, timber and mines. It would serve the Peace River block, which is generally accepted to be the richest part of the Peace River country and would open up a good stretch of country west of that in British Columbia. In other words, it is British Columbia's solution of the transportation problem of the Peace.

Naturally Prince Rupert people want to see the Peace railway lead to their port but they also want to see British Columbia developed. It would make little difference to the port of Prince Rupert whether the Hansard route or one of the other routes were chosen, if the latter turned southward toward Prince George. It would make a difference to us, however, as citizens of British Columbia to

see that our own province is developed. Now look at it from the point of view of the Peace River farmer. The Hansard route to Vancouver would a much more costly route for hauling grain from the British Columbia Peace River block than would either of the other routes. That would mean that the farmers of the Peace would be handicapped by just that much. They would be the people who would suffer. The rate is always

set to give a profit in hauling to the most difficult compe-

titive port and in this case it would be set to suit Vancouver to the disadvantage of the farmer.

In saying this we have no objection to the method of setting rates which is one generally accepted by railwaymen. We have no objection to Vancouver getting a big share of the business, which that port will probably do anyway. What we object to is to the British Columbia section of the Peace River country being handicapped to suit the convenience of the railway companies or anyone else. The natural route for the British Columbia Peace is out through British Columbia territory and that is the route it should take.

We make a special appeal to Premier Tolmie on behalf of the people of the B. C. Peace River block, and on behalf of Northern and Central British Columbia to see that the first Peace outlet be one that will open up Brilish Columbia and will not handicap her own farmers for all time to come. We believe that Dr. Tolmie can do this and we urge upon him its desirability.





How often have we all deplored the fact that thousands upon thousands of our most promising young men and women find it necessary to leave Canada, in order to seek in some other country opportunities for the employment of their talents that seem to be lacking here?

These people provide the foundation and, according as they succeed, opportunity is created for others in all the occupations that constitute the super-structure, such as transportation, banking, insurance, trading, the professions and public service.

The more the people of a country favor their own producers, thus giving the latter all the incentive necessary to increase the volume and broaden the scope of their production, the more abundant will be the immediate opportunities they create for themselves, and the future opportunities they create for their children.

If in the past opportunity has not been as abundant in Canada as it has been elsewhere, it is because Canadian producers as a class have not been as successful as producers elsewhere have been. And the chief reason our producers have been less successful is because they have failed to receive from Canadian citizens generally the same loyal support that the producers in certain other countries have received from their citizens.

Some of these countries import practically nothing that they are capable of producing for themselves. But we Canadians are so careless about our daily buying, so thoughtless of the welfare of our producers, so shortsighted about keeping the door of opportunity open for our sons and daughters, that every working day we allow ourselves to be sold about \$2,500,000 worth of imported merchandise that our own producers would have been glad to make for us, if we had only given them the chance!

Why not let us all resolve that from now on we'll try to bring our boys and girls back home by remembering, in our buying, that it must always be "Canada First"!





WRINCH'S WARNING

Fears Alaska Highway May be Another P. G. E.

OTHER MATTERS

If it moves too fast in building the proposed Alaska highway, British Columbia will find itself with another P. G. E. and all the attendant expenses and grief on its hands, Dr. H. C. Wrinch, Liberal of Skeena, warned the Legislature in Victoria last week.

While the road would run directly through his own constituency and probably start at his own town of Hazelton, Dr. Wrinch declared provincial interests as a whole must be protected from a vast expenditure which British Columbia could not afford at this time.

"The initiative for this scheme," he said, "comes from the United States. If any member of this House had suggested a project which would cost perhaps \$16,000,000, he would have received no encouragement. If we were to build this road ourselves the results would not justify the heavy expense involved. We are paying thousands of dollars a day because of our enthusiasm in constructing the P. G. E. As the proposed road would join two parts of the United States, Dr. Wrinch urged that Canada's international interests much be safeguarded, and the matter thus was . 
