

NEEDY TO GET CREDIT AT STORES FRANCE'S DELAY IS PROVING DISASTROUS FOR GERMANY

Government Is Losing No Time in Relief Temporarily at Least

Government Agents and Provincial Police Instructed to Issue Credits of 40c Per Day—Should Be No Begging From Now On

VICTORIA, July 9:—Pending commencement of unemployment relief works on a large scale, the provincial government has instructed all government agents and provincial police in all outlying districts to give all persons who need food credit of forty cents per day at their local stores. The allowance applies to women as well as men. This action will, it is expected, tide needy persons over until some permanent plan of relief is devised without making it necessary for them to go begging.

TORONTO, July 9:—John L. Agnew, vice-president of the International Nickel Co., is dead here at the age of forty-five. He fell victim to a heart attack.

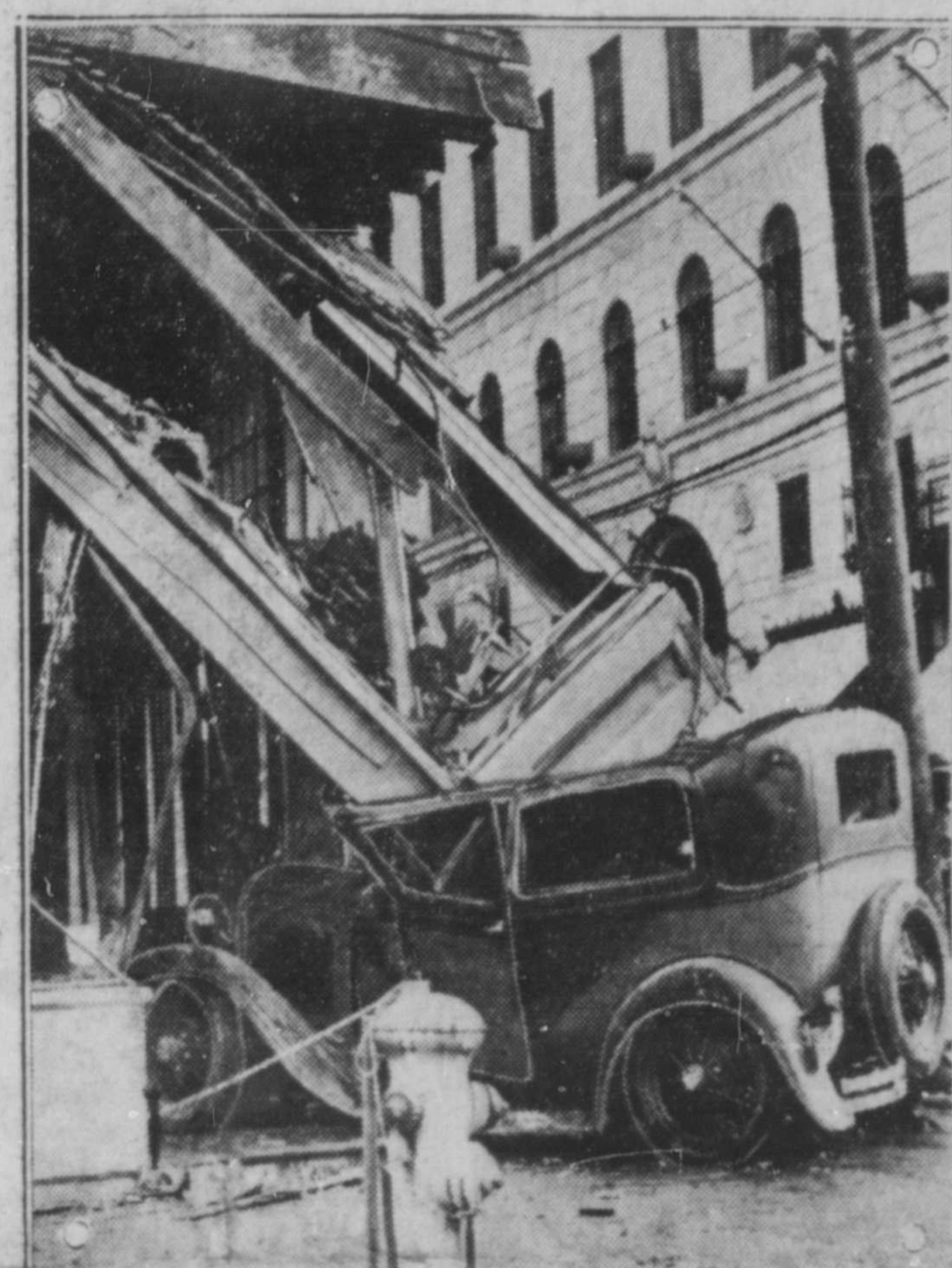

Fine Reception Accorded Grit Leader on Tour of Q. C. Island Communities; Roads Are Wanted

Reporting having received a hearty reception at many points on the Queen Charlotte Islands which they had the opportunity to visit, T. D. Pattullo, M. L. A. for Prince Rupert and leader of the Liberal opposition in British Columbia, and Major S. F. M. Moodie, Liberal organizer for the province, arrived in the city this morning on the steamer Prince Charles from the Islands and proceeded by the morning train to Terrace, where Mr. Pattullo will speak tonight, going from there to Hazelton, Smithers, Burns Lake, Vanderhoof and Prince George.

Although many of them are not blessed with an over-abundance of this world's goods, Mr. Pattullo found the people of the Queen Charlotte Islands to be in good spirits. Considerable in the way of public works is needed on the Islands and the people there are loath to accept relief work, feeling that there is some stigma about it. They would much prefer a program of regular public works which would fill their just requirements.

Mr. Pattullo spoke at a scheduled meeting at Port Clements on Tuesday evening and last evening an impromptu meeting was held at Massett. This meeting had not been scheduled at Massett but the people there virtually demanded to hear an address by the popular Liberal leader, particularly in view of the fact that the steamer was staying over long enough to give ample time for such a meeting. Mr. Pattullo received an enthusiastic reception and good hearing at both meetings. He criticized the government for spending so little on ordinary public works although considerable money had been appropriated at the last session of the legislature. Mr. Dunroo was chairman of the meeting at Port Clements while E. R. Walter presided at Massett.

Mr. Pattullo also visited Sandspit, Queen Charlotte City, Skidegate, Lawn Hill and Tiell but meetings were not held at those points.

Desperate Efforts Are Being Made to Hold Up Teuton Finances

Paris Sees In Hoover Plan Move Towards International Disarmament—President Proposed Survey of War Debts and Reparations

BERLIN, July 9:—France's seventeen-day delay in acting upon the proposal of President Herbert Hoover of the United States for an intergovernmental war debt moratorium may prove fatal to Germany's finances. Governmental officials, bankers and others are exerting frantic efforts to prevent the country's financial structure from toppling over, pending France reaching its decision.

Argument of counsel was heard this morning and the case was then adjourned until after luncheon for decision.

REGISTERING UNEMPLOYED

The needy unemployed are to be registered, it is announced. This is the first step toward the institution of an entirely new method of dealing with the present condition by the Victoria and Ottawa governments. It matters little whether the registering is done by provincial or federal governments so long as the work is carried out promptly and well.

The announcement, which comes from Victoria, is reassuring to those who feared that a policy of drift might be adopted. Dr. Tolmie will get the full support of the people in any reasonable scheme for alleviating the condition with which the country is faced. He and Mr. Bennett are the men to whom we have to look in this crisis and their future politically will depend to a large extent on the manner in which they handle the affairs of the country during this difficult time.

The Victoria government is now awaiting action from Ottawa and they promise that as soon as they receive word that Parliament has ratified the proposed plan of federal assistance to provincial works, registration will commence. In other words, Victoria puts it up to Ottawa.

LOG SCALE DECREASED

Figures For 1931 Losing Ground As Compared With Those For Last Year

Log scaling in Prince Rupert forestry district for the first six months of this year have totalled 31,943,175 board feet as compared with 45,851,937 board feet in the first half of last year. The scalings for June this year amounted to 2,717,832 board feet as against 18,677,859 board feet in the same month of 1931.

Production of poles and piling in the interior as well as hewn ties also shows a decrease for June this year as compared with the same month last year.

MEETING OF SCHOOL BD.

Miss Margaret Palmer is Appointed Principal of Seal Cove School

Commercial Class

Teachers to Turn Over Three Per Cent of Salaries For Unemployment Relief

The regular monthly meeting of board of school trustees was held last evening. Those present were Mrs. Spenser, chairman, L. W. Waugh, W. J. Greer, J. J. Gillis and E. Barrie, trustees, and J. O. Williamson, secretary.

Applications were read for the principalship of Seal Cove School and the board appointed Miss Margaret Palmer, who has been teaching there for the past four years.

Tenders having been called for various jobs around schools, the following were awarded contracts: Shingling Borden Street School on one side to H. M. Daggett. Painting Seal Cove School, Bell & Keays.

Kalsomining King Edward High School, nine rooms, Bell & Keays. Kalsomining Borden Street School, eight rooms, F. Scadden.

Strong efforts are being made by Trustee Greer to overcome the leaking in one or two rooms at Booth School, and it is believed that the source of the trouble has been discovered. He has personally been overseeing the work of locating the leaks, and is very hopeful of success. The board thanked him for his efforts, and also for his kindness in lending certain parts of the scaffolding being used, and for his method of erecting staging, which has saved the board considerable money during these strenuous times, and is very much appreciated.

Accounts amounting to \$7,799.16 were passed for payment. A large number of applications were received for the two vacant positions on the High School staff, 32 being received yesterday morning in the mail. The board decided to wait for another mail or two before making any selection.

Smell at High School
A strong complaint was made by one of the trustees regarding the obnoxious smell that is prevalent at the High School, and the secretary was instructed to at once take the matter up with the medical health officer. The chairman stated that this smell has been a constant worry to the board for the past three or four years, and so far the board's efforts to have this fixed have not been successful. While the rain is

in season, there is very little smell but, after a spell of dry weather, it is very bad and certainly should be attended to at once without fail.

On recommendation of the principal of the High School and after a thorough discussion by the board, it has been decided that, commencing September, 1931, no pupils just promoted from Grade 8 shall be allowed to take commercial course, and that, on and after September, 1932, all pupils must have passed Grade 9 in English, Hygiene, History and Arithmetic, and that pupils will then complete their commercial course in two years. This has been decided upon on account of the change in the School Act, and also to save the expense of having to build another room for this class at a time when money is very short. It is expected that this will turn out better for the pupils who will concentrate to pass Grade 9 before entering commercial, instead of having the High School course and commercial course intermixed during the same year.

The Teachers' Association has notified the board that, commencing September, 1931, and continuing until June 30, 1932, they will donate three per cent of their salaries to be expended as directed by the school board for the relief of unemployment.

HOSPITAL HAS SMALL DEFICIT FOR LAST MONTH

The financial statement of the Prince Rupert General Hospital for the month of May, presented at last night's board meeting, showed a deficit of \$47.78 on the month's operations with collections standing at \$4,320.48 and disbursements at \$4,368.26. There were 1647 hospital days at cost per day of \$3.65.

It was decided to leave the matter in the hands of the executive committee, the feeling being expressed that, if Matt Videck desired to continue the operation of the ambulance under present conditions, he should be allowed to do so as the service he had given in the past had been quite satisfactory. The executive will also take up the matter of the insurance of the ambulance and other such details.

The board agreed to pay the extra sales tax on purchase of the ambulance, an addition of three per cent having been made in the tax since the ambulance was ordered. Ald. Rudderham reported for a committee of which he was chairman on a conference which had been held with V. S. Moore of the Kaien Motors in connection with certain details of the ambulance. The vehicle will have a light grey body with darker grey trimmings. It will be designated by the words "General Hospital" along its sides.
