Mr. Brocklesby told of the halibut the Abbott Laboratories supplying Parke Davis Co. and suggested that a Canadian industry along these lines might be built up.

The speaker also described the making of artificial pearls which were formerly all made in France. They were glass beads covered with a pearl lustre substance taken from the scales of fish. Any fish with true scales could be used but those of the herring family were best. The bearl essence was tried near Nanaimo by Japanese but the industry was removed to the United States.

At the close of his address, the speaker was thanked by President George Munro who spoke appreciatively of the work of the Fisheries Experimental Station of which Mr. Brocklesby is the acting director.






