Tokio Hopeful of Settlement Being Reached in Manchurian Situation

TOKIO, Dec. 1:-Official Tokio expressed hope yesterday that direct negotiations might be opened soon with China for a settlement of Manchurian differences. The Japanese charge d'affaires in Nanking was to visit Dr. Wellington Koo, Chinese foreign minister, to discuss the possibility of a neutral zone in Manchuria including Chinchow and it was hoped that common ground would be reached to base a permanent truce.

Meantime, Japanese troops were reported to be moving from Mukden to Tsitihar to act as reinforcements in case of further engagement with General Chang, the Chinese commander-in-chief.

British Columbia Population Is Announced as 689,210; Big Gain Since Census Decade Ago

OTTAWA, Dec. 1:- The population of British Columbia is announced as 689.210 following the holding of the decennial census this year. This is a gain of 164,628 over the British Columbia count of 524,582 in the 1921 census. Incidentally, British Columbia had the largest percentage gain of any province in Canada. Quebec had the largest actual gain, showing an increase of some 500,000.
