The land that by its power destroyed the greatest military empire in the world will not be suspected of quailing before a band of wretched assassins: The world will know that we are entering upon a task prompted by that deep sense of justice which sustained this land through these last years of warfare."

The galleries were crowded but it was noticeable that there were no Nationalist members present when the Premier began is address. Extra precautions were taken to have guards at the entrance and a careful scrutiny of those entering was exercised in order to prevent any possible Sinn Fein disturbances.

The Premier characterised the attempt upon the life of Viscount French, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, as one of the most cowardly in the history of political crimes and said that he was glad that the chiefs of the Catholic Church had hastened to denounce it.
