NEW WORLD'S WATER RECORD MADE

STANLEY BALDWIN VINDICATED IN BRITISH BY-ELECTION

Gar Wood Sets Mark of 101.154 Miles Per Hour With His Miss America

Previous Top Speed For Marine Craft Was Held By Late Sir Henry Segrave—Broken Twice Today

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., March 20.—Gar Wood, United States speedboat driver, set a new world's record of 101.154 miles per hour for water craft speed today. Earlier in the day he broke the then existing record of the late Sir Henry Segrave by driving his Miss America IX at 100.6 miles per hour. Wood has tried for many years and with many boats to establish a new record.

Fertility of Peace River Lands Shown

FORT ST. JOHN, March 19.—A report which has just been sent to the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa by J. W. Abbott of Baldonell Demonstration Farm near here shows that on 11 acres Mr. Abbott grew 1222 ounces of alfalfa seed. It rated 91% fertile in a test for germination. Mr. Abbott grew peas which won second prize at the World's Fair at Chicago. He will exhibit alfalfa and other seeds at the World's Seed Exhibition at Regina.

Pend Oreille Is Interesting

Well Known Mine Receives Large Order For Lead-Zinc Concentrate

Recent resumption of milling operations at Pend Oreille and the announcement that the company has closed a contract with the American Zinc & Lead Co. of St. Louis to supply 30,000 tons of lead-zinc concentrate on the basis of 200 tons daily has again drawn attention to that company's activity.

TWO HALIBUT BOATS

Prince George Plane Is Down

Pilot Tom Corless Forced to Land His Ship on Field Near Quesnel

QUESNEL, March 17.— Forced down by a blinding snowstorm which struck them shortly after passing over Quesnel, Pilot Tom Corless and Engineer W. Jaquot en route from Vancouver to Prince George in a Stinson-Detroiter cabin monoplane, landed on Nam Sing's field, six miles north of here one day last week.

They left Vancouver at 10.15 a.m. and a half-hour before being forced down they had landed at Alexandria to refuel from tanks carried on the plane. The plane is owned by Dick Corless, of Prince George, and will be operated for private use, chiefly for prospecting purposes.

Cunard Leads On Atlantic

Carried By Far More Passengers Than Any Other Line in 1930

NEW YORK, March 19.—Exclusive of cruises and the Havana service, the Cunard Line carried 231,716 passengers in its trans-Atlantic service during 1930, or a total of 65,322 more than its nearest competitor, it is announced. It is the eighth consecutive year in which Cunard has carried more passengers across the Atlantic than any other line or group of lines.

WOMAN IS CONVICTED

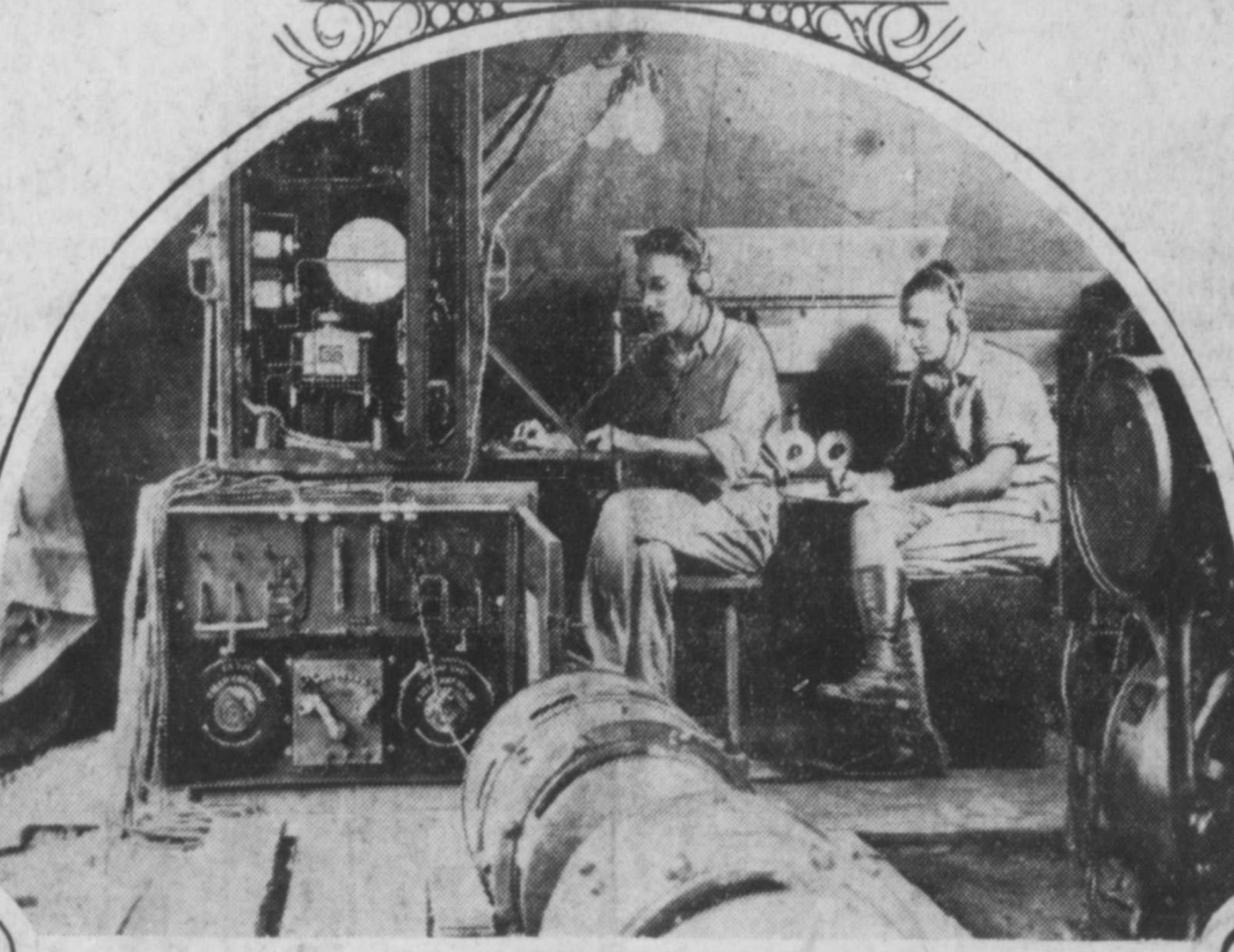
Mrs. Mary Farrell of Revelstoke Performed Illegal Operation. It Is Proven

CONFIRM BALDWIN

Straight Conservative Party Is Endorsed in St. George's By-Election

LONDON, March 20.— Rt. Hon. Stanley Baldwin and the straight Conservative party scored a great victory over the Beaverbrook-Rothermere Empire Free Trade party and press in St. George's by-election yesterday when Capt. A. Duff Cooper was elected over Sir Ernest Petter by a vote of 17,242 to 11,532.

Leadership of the British Conservative party was virtually involved in the by-election, Beaverbrook and Rothermere having challenged the policy and record of Baldwin. It was a straight fight between the official and unofficial Conservative candidates with the former staging a fine victory to vindicate his chief. There were neither Labor nor Liberal candidates.

MANSON IS CRITICAL

Condemns Government's Administration of University Endowment Lands

VICTORIA, March 20.—Stating that a contract with unreasonable terms had been given the London and Western Trusts Ltd. for the sale of property in the University endowment lands, A. M. Manson K.C., Liberal, Omineca, attacked the whole policy of the government in the administration of the area in the Legislature yesterday.

Hon. Nelson S. Lougheed, minister of lands, defended the government's policy in the area.

VANCOUVER, March 20.—C. W. Tourtellotte has been appointed acting Pacific Coast manager for Canadian National Steamships, succeeding B. C. Keeley, resigned, whose assistant he has been for 11 years.

HOSPITAL MEETING

Institution at Queen Charlotte City Reports Surplus During Past Year

QUEEN CHARLOTTE, March 20.—At the annual meeting of the Skidegate Inlet Hospital Society held recently the medical superintendent, Dr. George A. C. Roberts, submitted comprehensive report of the work accomplished during the year. He reported the addition of new beds, an x-ray machine, a new lighting plant, and the completion of a dam at the water supply, with new connecting main.

A large number of patients had been treated during the year and the staff had been kept busy. The financial report showed \$4000 spent in operation and a credit balance at the close of the year of \$200. The directors declared that the success of the hospital had been due to the untiring efforts of Dr. and Mrs. Roberts.

BIG LOAD OF FISH

Sitka Here With 100,000 Pounds of Halibut But It May Go to Seattle

Bringing 100,000 pounds of fish gathered up from various American halibut boats operating on the banks, the schooner Sitka, Capt. William Doucet, arrived in port from the north this morning. Up to 2 o'clock this afternoon, it had not been decided whether the fish would be unloaded here for the United Pacific Fisheries or taken on to Seattle for the same concern. Telegraphic advices were being awaited before making a decision.

The Sitka is packing halibut for the United Pacific Fisheries.

THE COMMUNIST SPECTRE

The heightened communist activity during the past year of industrial depression may have bewildered the public, but it has not frightened it, says the Maple Leaf, a bilingual paper published in Ontario. For the average intellectual the dramatic hushetop shouts of the Reds are merely a source of keen amusement.

The general conception of Communism is that of a social organization in which products and the means of production and distribution are owned in common. This is about as adequate as to define Roman Catholicism by simply calling it a Christian religion. Briefly, Communism is an ideal the ultimate goal of which is a world-at-large communal society. It is an economic philosophy, born out of chaos, the fundamental principles of which are the destruction of the present social order with its poverty, wars, crimes and injustices, and the substitution therefor of a classless society. Its doctrine is not new, for communal ownership was practiced by the most primitive peoples, and correctives to the evils of poverty have had their advocates in every generation since Plato, but as an organized movement its origin only dates back to 1847, when Marx and Engels issued their COMMUNIST MANIFESTO. The first concrete expression of the theory expounded in this epochal declaration was the organization of the First International at London, in 1864, by Karl Marx himself. This meeting was probably the most colorful collection of reformist and revolutionary elements ever assembled under one roof. It provided the movement with a common direction but the International was wrecked by the influence of Bakunin whose anarchism Marx could not condone. The Second International came into existence at Amsterdam in 1889. It was a loose federation of already established socialist or labor parties, and it fell to pieces with the Declaration of the World War in 1914. It was revived after the War and today it is the central bureau of the socialist as against the communist parties.

The Third International was organized in 1919 and is the product of the Russian revolution. It is the representative of those elements in the international revolutionary movement who believe that the theories and practices which led to the Russian success can be universally applied. The aims of the Third International is the internationalization of all social revolutions under one central authority and command, and the dispossession of all present ruling classes. Its means to that latter end is the dictatorship as exemplified in Russia and its method is the instigation of the working classes to public demonstrations, and, where the occasion is favorable, to open conflicts with the authorities.

Such, in brief, is the Communist movement. What are its chances of success? Very remote indeed, if at all existing. But let another international war come, as the communists confidently hope one will soon come, and then watch events. Communism is organized in every country. Every industrial city in the world has its communist group, disciplined, united, drilled in the technic of revolution, and fearless. Demonstrations are a part of the communist propaganda, for which a fertile field is found among the unemployed, the poor, and the working classes in general. They will be repeated from time to time, for Communism never sleeps.

My First Night in Cairo

Written at 2:30 in the morning of the second day, and hurriedly—because we are going to ride some camels at 10 a.m. out in the desert to an oasis near this city of Cairo.

We arrived here from Alexandria at 6:15 and were fortunately seated with a man and daughter from New York who had been here all of January. During the dinner they suggested our spending a few hours in the Bohemian Hall—a special room in the hotel kept for no other purpose than the gathering of hotel guests and their friends.

One by one, by twos and by threes, the Kings and Queens of Bohemia fluttered in and took their seats at the small round tables scattered through the hall; for you must know that the rulers in Bohemia are ever changing on the throne and wear the crown and sceptre for just the moments when they entertain.

It is generally conceded that Heaven and Hell are not locations—but rather conditions—so it is in the Kingdom of Bohemia. You may find yourself suddenly enveloped in its atmosphere on a liner in mid-Atlantic, or where we found it to-night just after the glorious Egyptian moon had rapidly quenched its way up into the star-spangled dark blue sky from under the rim of the desert.

You can find it, where, too rapid to count, the corks are popping in the mansions of the idle-rich all over the United States of America, or at the tables and in the homes of the comparatively penniless throughout the big round world. The restless spirits that rule Bohemia, know less than nothing of that invisible barrier—"The Boundary Line;" they ask no questions of your birth or decorations and they do not ask to see your passport. You will find the vassal and the king, the rich and the poor, have equal chance to occupy the throne. With warm hearts beating a revivelle of welcome, they will wait to see what God has done for you. You may take them to the very gates of paradise on the wings of song or you may sway and thrill their senses by your quick wit, your gift of repartee or story telling—anything that helps to lift the flitting shadows of doubts and fears and sorrow and pain will give you royal welcome when you enter the confines of their Kingdom.

The world makes grave error in judging Bohemia as a land of vulgar jest and immorality. The true Bohemian will give his seat in a crowded car to an old woman worn out with her day's washing, or he will pawn his watch to lift the load of a tired drooping counter girl. But woe to him who may think that the "open sesame" consists of anything like long hair, a greasy shirt, a prodigiously turned down collar and a racy story.

Well, between the wine, cigarettes, songs merry-making, display of comic and emotional talents of both men and women, our first night in the old Egyptian city was one to be remembered long after. The fascinating local color must come tomorrow, for it is like another planet.

TRIBUTE TO MISS WEST

All Queen Charlotte Islands Mourn Death of Pioneer Woman Missionary

SKIDEGATE, March 19:—News of the death recently in Prince Rupert of Miss Margaret West came as a great shock to many people on the Queen Charlotte Islands. Deceased was one of the pioneer missionaries of the north and was known and esteemed by a great many people.

In 1892, the late Miss West founded the Ridley Home for white children at Metlakatla. To this home many of the pioneers of the north, who were at that time battling with the elements to eke out an existence, turned to have their children educated, schools at that time being very few and far between.

Later on another noble lady, Miss R. M. Davies, joined Miss West in the great work. The torch that these two fine women held on high for the many children in their care has not been in vain. In 1916 the torch again reflected along the Canadian battle lines in France and today it still burns brightly north, south, east and west. The many who were brought up under the late Miss West's charge will continue to carry on.

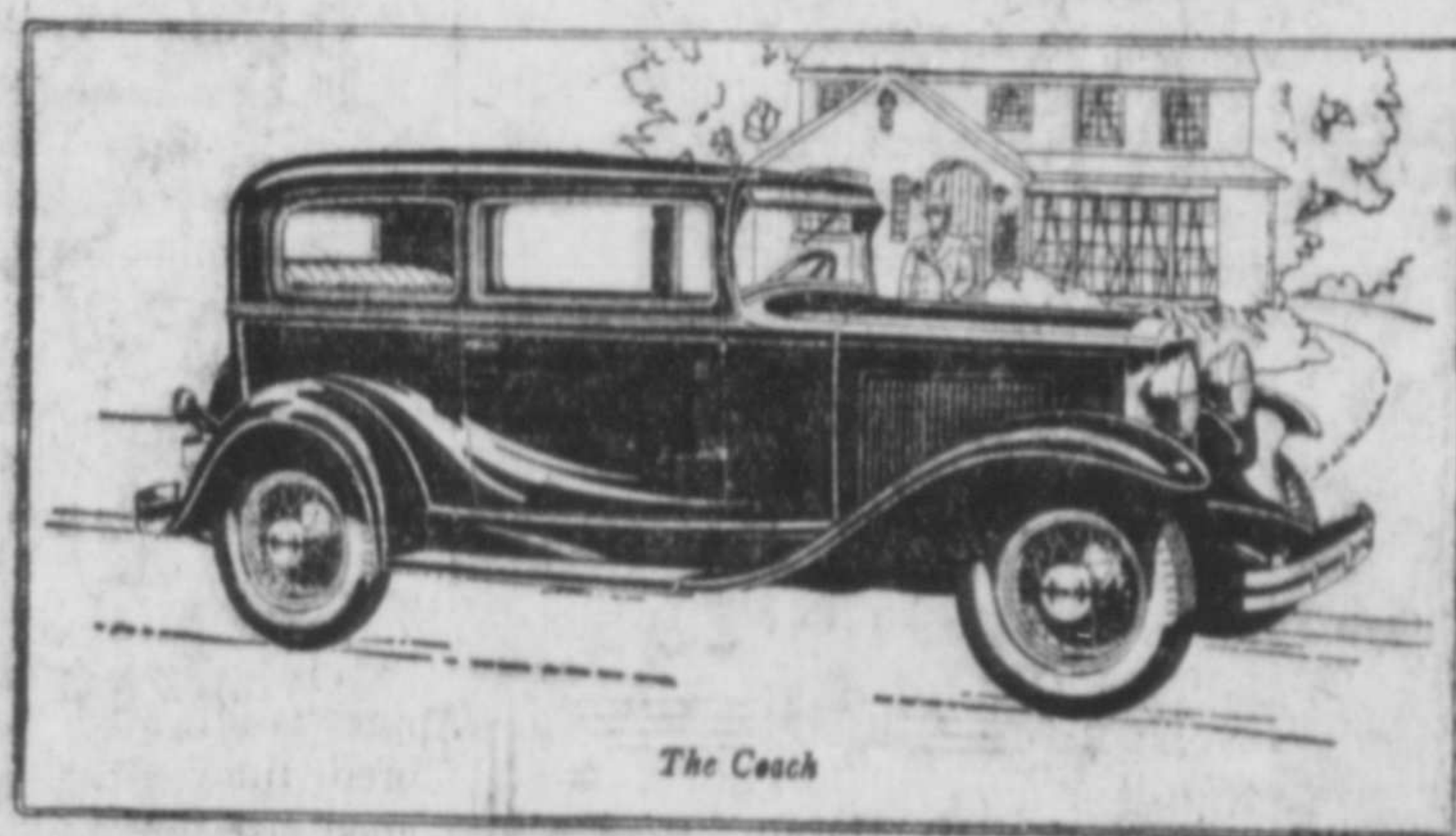

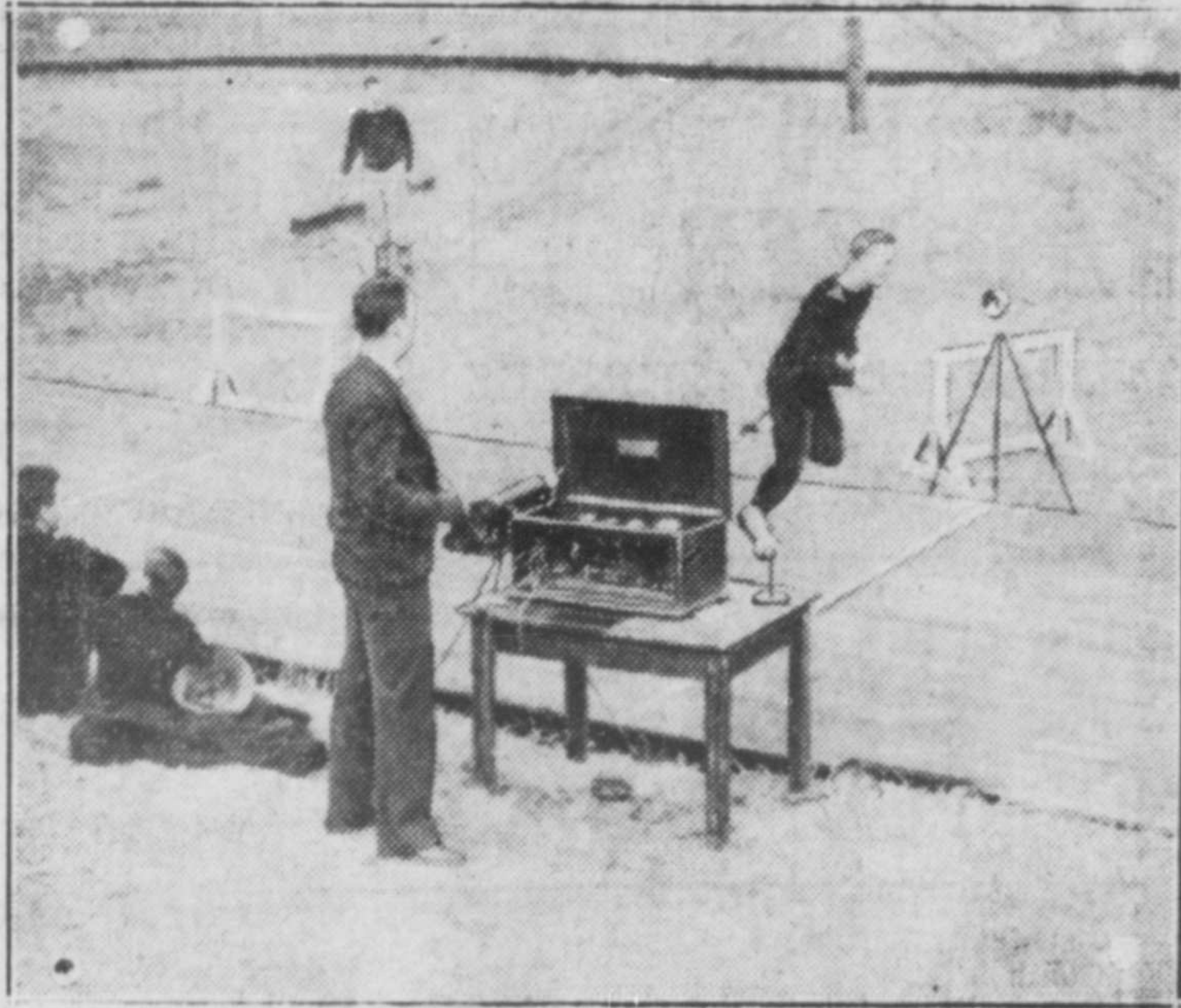

Dowry on Bride In Greece to Be Banned by Gov't

ATHENS, Greece, March 20.—A profound change in the status of women of Greece is foreshadowed by the decision of the committee for revision of the civil code to abolish the legal obligation of a father to provide a dowry for his daughter.
