

Abundant Rains on Prairies During Past Week Have Aided Crops to Considerable Extent

WINNIPEG, July 13:-Cool weather, with rainfall varying from heavy showers to prolonged downpours, characterized conditions in the crop growing region during the last week. Crops have made good progress but the moisture in the arid areas came too late to materially benefit early sown grains although the precipitation will in-

sure more complete filling of the wheat berry. Later sown oats and barley will show considerable improvement and pastures are doing much hay harvested in many dis- lasts. tricts. Wheat stands are uneven and about 25% of the crop is in head and 75% in shot blade. A few days of warm weather to promote rapid ROUND TRIP of warm weather to promote rapid growth would assist in making a more uniform sample, according to the weekly crop report of the C. N R. department of agriculture.

Intermittent heavy downpours in Manitoba have given all crops a new lease of life and conditions are greatly improved. MAN TALK

Dr. G. E. Darby of Bella Bella Addresses Canadian Medical Association

The old-time medicine man of the B. C. Indians was at least a psychologist, and had the "jump" on moderns in powers of suggestion, according to Dr. G. E. Darby of Bella Bella, who traced, for a large group of Canadian Medical Association delegates in Vancouver, recently, the history of medicine among the early tribes of the province.

The basis of the Indians' theory of illness, Dr. Darby explained, was that the patient was possessed of an evil spirit. The business of the medicine man was to get rid of that

"They had a good many ways of doing it," he declared. "One method called for the medicine man to wash out his mouth, press his lips against the patient's body, and thus absorb the spirit. with the 'spirit' in his hands, he would proceed to drown it in a bowl of water and finish it off by blowing it away between his hands."



"Certain medicine men would tell a victim that he had seen his spirit soul floating through the forest. This was a sign of death. The patient would get appreciably worse until the medicine man had 'caught' the spirit."


