UNEMPLOYMENT FUND IS EXHAUSTED

GOVERNMENT'S NEW DUTY SYSTEM ON AMERICAN CARS

Little Money is Left In Coffers For Relief Work States Minister

Interesting Information Elicited By Inquiry of Dr. H. C. Wrinch—Issues Warning to Government

VICTORIA, Feb. 20.—Hon. R. W. Bruhn, minister of public works, informed H. C. Wrinch, member for Skeena, in the Legislature Thursday that there was little money left in the unemployment relief fund but said he would be glad to discuss Skeena's need for further relief with the member. Dr. Wrinch thanked the government for the relief extended during the past year, but warned that the crisis was not yet passed and detailed some of the difficulties experienced by the people in his constituency, he warned against too precipitate a condition with regard to the spectacular Alaska highways while no district would benefit more than his by this great undertaking. He warned that the interests of B.C. must be safeguarded first in considering a project demanded primarily by the United States.

HELPING HUSBAND

Mrs. Linden Turns Over Her Estate to Aid Defence of Former Seattle Financier

NEW YORK, Feb. 20.—Mrs. Linden is turning over her entire private estate of \$750,000 to aid in the defense of her husband, the former head of the Puget Sound Savings & Loan Co. of Seattle, the business of which has been suspended by the authorities, who is to face trial in Seattle on fraud charges.

NAVY BILL HELD OVER

United States Congress Will Not Consider Measure This Session Owing to Opposition

WASHINGTON, D.C., Feb. 20.—The \$74,000,000 naval bill will not be considered by Congress at the present session, it now appears certain. While the House might pass the measure, serious opposition has developed in the Senate. In any case, the expenditures are not vitally needed at this time.

WILL WORK CANNERIES

Eleven Plants in Alaska to Be Operated This Summer By Pacific American Fisheries

BELLINGHAM, Feb. 20.—Eleven canneries will be operated by the Pacific American Fisheries in Alaska this season, it was announced yesterday by E. B. Deming, president of the company. This is two less than were active last year.

No Plebiscite On Dry Laws

Committee of Washington State Legislature Decides Against Taking of Vote

OLYMPIA, Feb. 20.—By a vote of four to three a committee of the state legislature decided yesterday against submitting a plebiscite to the people of Washington State as to whether or not the state dry laws shall be maintained.

LABORITES HOLD ISLINGTON SEAT

LONDON, Feb. 20.—Labor retained East Islington in Thursday's by-election. Mrs. Leah Manning, Labor candidate, secured 10,591 votes; Brigadier General A. C. Critchley, United Empire Crusader, native of Calgary, Alta., 8314; Miss Thelma Cazalet, Conservative, 7182, and Major H. E. Crawford, Liberal, 4450.

20 LASHES METED OUT

Vancouver Highwayman Will Also Serve Five Years Concurrently on Each of Nine Charges

VANCOUVER, Feb. 20.—Pleading guilty to nine charges of armed robbery, Keith Bishop was sentenced to receive 20 lashes, and five years on each charge yesterday. The sentences will run concurrently.

TRAGEDY ON WEST COAST

VICTORIA, Feb. 20.—Olav Sunde, aged 40, New Westminster fisherman, was drowned yesterday when the fishing boat Magna, en route from Vancouver to Barclay Sound, piled up on the beach near Clo-oose during a terrific storm. Charles Jacques, Sunde's partner, was saved. He reported to Bamfield life saving station that the craft was unable to make headway in the storm and was gradually forced to shore. Sunde leaped overboard before the vessel struck and disappeared in the huge seas, Jacques stayed with the boat and walked ashore.

NEW FAST RUN MADE

Empress of Japan Clips More Than Three Hours Off Former Trans-Pacific Record

VICTORIA, Feb. 20.—Establishing a new trans-Pacific record, the Canadian Pacific liner Empress of Japan arrived here this morning after clipping three hours and 15 minutes off her former record, made on the maiden voyage last August, from Yokohama, covering 4200 miles in eight days, three hours and 27 minutes at an average speed of 22 knots per hour for the voyage. Capt. Samuel Robinson, commander of the vessel, reported the weather rough for approximately half of the voyage and stated that the Japan would be able to still further improve on the time.

WILL BE BIG JOB

Passage of United States Soldiers' Loan Bill Will Give Hundreds of Clerks Employment

WASHINGTON, D.C., Feb. 20.—If the \$700,000,000 soldiers' loan bill which was passed yesterday by the Senate and House actually becomes law, it will mean that several hundreds of additional clerks will have to be taken on to handle the hundreds of thousands of applications which will be received from ex-service men throughout the United States. It is estimated that it would take six months to handle the claims.

OUTLET IS ASKED FOR

Legislature of Alberta Asks Dominion to Lose no Time in Giving Peace River Line

EDMONTON, Feb. 20.—The need of all possible speed in getting a coast outlet for the Peace River country to the Pacific seaboard will be urged upon the government of the Dominion by the provincial government of Alberta. A resolution to this effect was unanimously passed in the Legislature yesterday.

TO BOOST CAR TRADE

Action Taken by Federal Government Expected to Help Industry Greatly in Canada

Long Wanted Manufacturers Guarantee That There Will be no Increase in Prices of Autos

OTTAWA, Feb. 20.—New action in connection with the tariff on American automobiles was taken for the protection of the automobile industry in the Dominion of Canada and to afford employment for Canadian automobile workers. Dominion manufacturers have contended all along that such action would guarantee millions of dollars in new employment for workers and the industry in Canada. Certain automobile retailers of high priced cars had opposed the request.

Mrs. Burke Flown Out With Her Children Yesterday to Carcross In Ill-Fated Plane of Husband

Another chapter in the epic story in connection with the death by starvation, after he had made a forced landing with his plane on the Liard River, of the late Capt. E. J. A. Burke was completed yesterday morning when the widow, Mrs. Burke, and her two children were flown by Pilot R. I. Van Der Byl in the ill-fated plane from Atlin to Carcross. From Carcross Mrs. Burke and her children will proceed by train to Skagway whence they will embark aboard the next steamer for Vancouver. They are expected to be here next Wednesday afternoon aboard the Princess Norah bound south. It is understood that Mrs. Burke will later proceed from Vancouver with her children to Ireland, her native home, to reside in future. After taking Mrs. Burke to Carcross, Pilot Van Der Byl went back with his plane to Atlin. He was to pick up W. A. Joerss, co-pilot, and Emil Kading, mechanic, the Government Telegraphs report, and proceed with them to Liard today, heading then for Burns Lake en route to Vancouver where the plane will be given a thorough overhaul before resuming service. The plane is being taken out via the interior snow belt as it is equipped with skis.

NINETY MILLION BUSHELS OF GRAIN SENT FROM RUSSIA

WASHINGTON, D.C., Feb. 20.—According to statistics compiled here, Russia has exported 90,000,000 bushels of grain since October 1 last. It is not believed that the Soviet Republic has much more wheat available for the world's markets.

LUCKY TO BE ALIVE

Los Angeles Aviator Had Hunch to Go Back and Get His Parachute

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 20.—L. H. Jack Atkinson, local aviator, is alive today because he had an afterthought yesterday. Atkinson, a test pilot, was about to take off in a new plane when he thought he had better take along a parachute. Ten minutes later Atkinson and plane were back on the ground—the former alive and uninjured and the latter a twisted mass of burning wreckage. Soon after being taken up, the machine went into a tailspin and Atkinson, being unable to straighten it out, jumped overboard with the 'chute.

VOTING ON POOL PLAN

Regina Provides For Prebiscite on Question of Compulsory Pool

REGINA, Feb. 20.—Saskatchewan will vote on a one hundred per cent pool plan. A motion providing for a referendum on a compulsory pool plan was passed by a vote of 48 to five.

Wheat Prices Take Another Jump Today

VANCOUVER, Feb. 20.—The price of wheat took another upward jump on the local exchange today, being quoted at 64 1/4c.

City Had to Do Good Work in Financing Last Year to Have Such Small Deficit, 'Tis Said

"The expenditure on general account in 1930 has exceeded the year's revenue by \$6,518.85, which on comparison with your budget figure for that year, shows careful and close financing, inasmuch as the over-expenditure can be attributed to the unforeseen circumstances arising from the unemployment situation and from unexpected decreases in the grants anticipated from the provincial government," says the report of George Rorie, city auditor, for 1930 which is now in the hands of the members of the city council for their consideration before being finally approved.

PROGRAM FOR AIR

French Ministry Plans Expenditures of \$200,000,000 to Keep Up Armaments

PARIS, Feb. 20.—An air budget totalling \$200,000,000 is to be presented to Parliament by the Air Ministry of France to cover a huge program of aerial armaments which are planned in order that France may maintain its place among other nations in the air.

FIENDISH KILLING

San Francisco Youth Set Aged Woman on Fire to Steal Small Sum of Money

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 20.—Charles Simpson, 19-year old youth, confessed to the police yesterday to one of the most fiendish murders that has been recorded in the history of this city. Simpson admitted having poured kerosene over an aged woman who conducted a suburban store and burning her to death in order to rob her of a small sum of money.

ALTA. TOWN HAS BLAZE

EDMONTON, Feb. 20.—Fire destroyed the business section of Chipman, 45 miles northwest of here last night, causing damage estimated at \$60,000. Eight buildings were involved in the blaze.

BONUS BILL IS PASSED

Certain Veto of President Will Be Ineffectual Against Measure For \$700,000,000

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—Assuring passage of the measure by a substantial margin despite the certain veto of President Hoover, the Senate yesterday passed the \$700,000,000 soldiers' bonus bill by a vote of 72 to 12. This margin will make the President's veto ineffectual. The bill was approved by the House 363 to 39.

DROWNS IN VANCOUVER

VANCOUVER, Feb. 20.—James McCall, aged 66, employee of the city street cleaning department, was drowned last night when he fell off Second Narrows bridge into Burrard Inlet. The body was recovered.

PORTLAND, Oregon, Feb. 20.—Samuel Hill, veteran western road builder, underwent a major operation yesterday in St. Vincent's Hospital. His condition last night was reported as being fairly good. He has been seriously ill for some time.

POSSIBLE LOCAL INDUSTRY

If the salmon fishermen through their co-operative society can be the means of establishing an industry in Prince Rupert they should be given every encouragement. What is needed above everything else is new industries. There are two canneries on the harbor not operated at present. The closing of these canneries was a distinct loss to the city and if the fishermen can re-open one of those or build a new one they will be doing their part toward a revival of business in the city. A meeting is being held this week for the purpose of organizing and doubtless it will be well attended by those who believe in the co-operative movement.

ACTIVITY TOWARD ALASKA ROAD

When Prince Rupert has been urging as strongly as possible the continuation of work on the Prince Rupert highway, there was never any sign of the Premier making a special trip up here to expedite the work or to investigate conditions. He did not take any particular interest in it. When, however, his friends from south of the boundary wanted a road through to Alaska, he went out of his way to forward the project.

We do not believe in captious criticism but we do think the Prince Rupert highway scheme should receive first consideration. We think the genial doctor should show as much interest in it as he does in the other scheme which is primarily conceived for the benefit of the United States and Alaska.

If work does not proceed any more rapidly on the Alaskan scheme than it has been doing on the Prince Rupert highway, this generation will not be able to use it. But, we predict it will and the prediction is based on the activity of Premier Tolmie in trying to forward the Alaska movement.

Public opinion is a great thing. Yesterday it was announced that the Bennett Government had changed its mind over reducing payments to soldier pensioners. The pressure of public opinion was apparently too great and they found it better to give way.

Dredging and Dyking Project Proposed For Delkatla Will Give Massett Boats Shelter

MASSETT, B.C., Feb. 20.—A dredging and dyking project at Delkatla Inlet, Massett, Graham Island, that will prove of great benefit to fishermen in Dixon Entrance is now in process of negotiations with both Provincial and Dominion governments. Salmon and halibut fishermen frequenting the waters between Rose Spit and Langara Island have long been in need of a good harbor on the north coast of the island. The population of Massett and outlying settlements, acting through the Farmer's Institute of Graham Island, has lately brought to life a scheme that has lain dormant for many years, the dredging of Delkatla Inlet, and is now vigorously pressing for recognition by both governments of the feasibility of the plan.

John C. Frizell, secretary of the institute, has been appointed a delegate to interview Premier Tolmie and members of the cabinet and bring to their attention the benefits that would be realized if this undertaking were carried out.

Massett is the logical centre of the fishing industry of Dixon Entrance and affords many facilities, including telephone, telegraph and mail service, hospital and medical attention, oil station, machine shop, for the fishermen who may have need of them. The drawback up to now has been the lack of adequate shelter for fishing boats in time of storm.

It is proposed to dredge the lower part of Delkatla Inlet so that it will accommodate fishing boats at all stages of the tide; to use the silt and sand thus dredged to construct a permanent dyke across the inlet to replace the present bridge, and by these means also to reclaim several hundred acres of potential farm lands. It is understood that Dominion engineers have reported favorably on the practicability of the plan.

If carried out, the harbor that would be thus provided would be of great service to fishermen off the coast and to the boats plying in Massett Inlet. Every effort is being made to put the scheme before the Provincial and Dominion governments and to secure an appropriation so that work may start early in 1932.

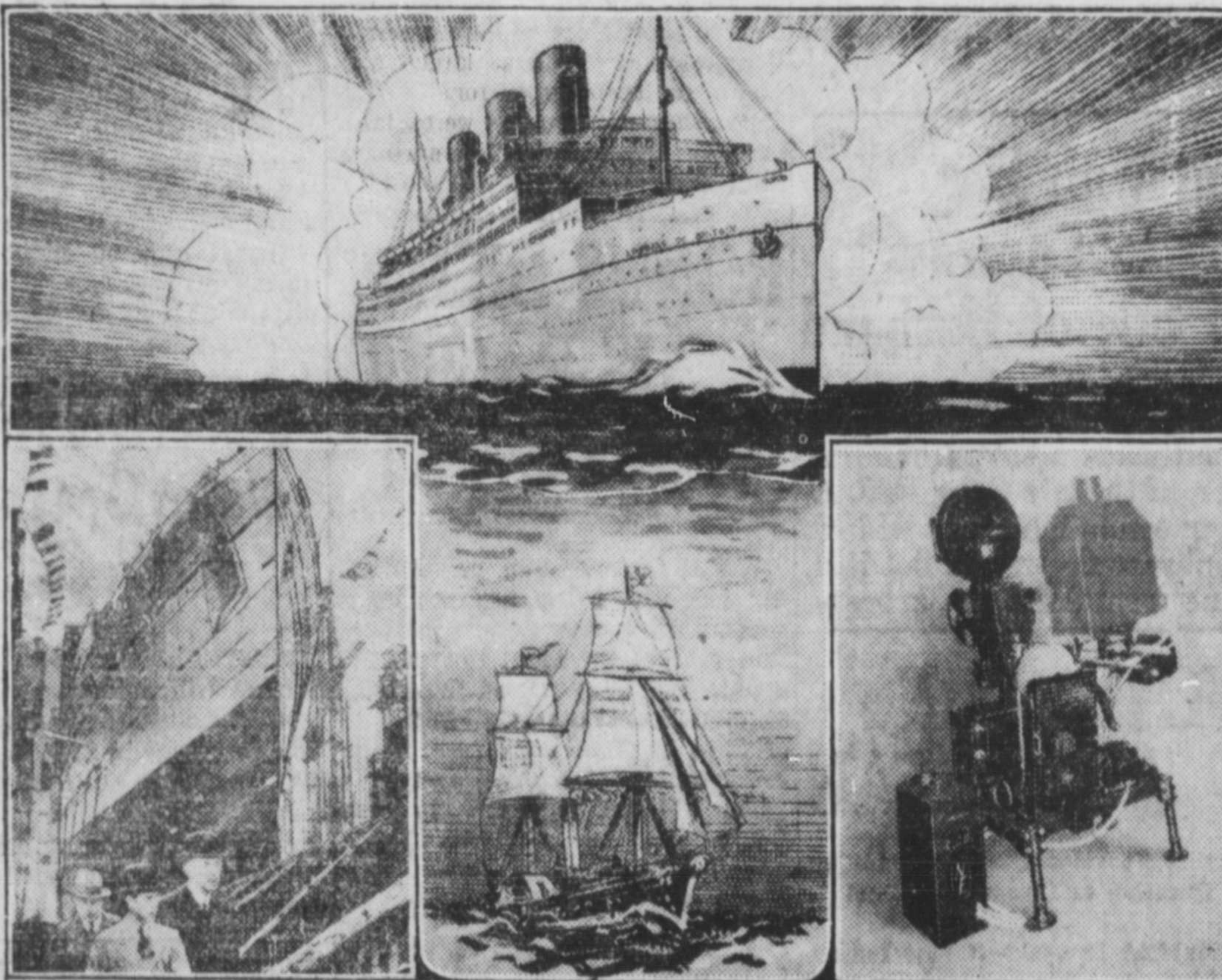

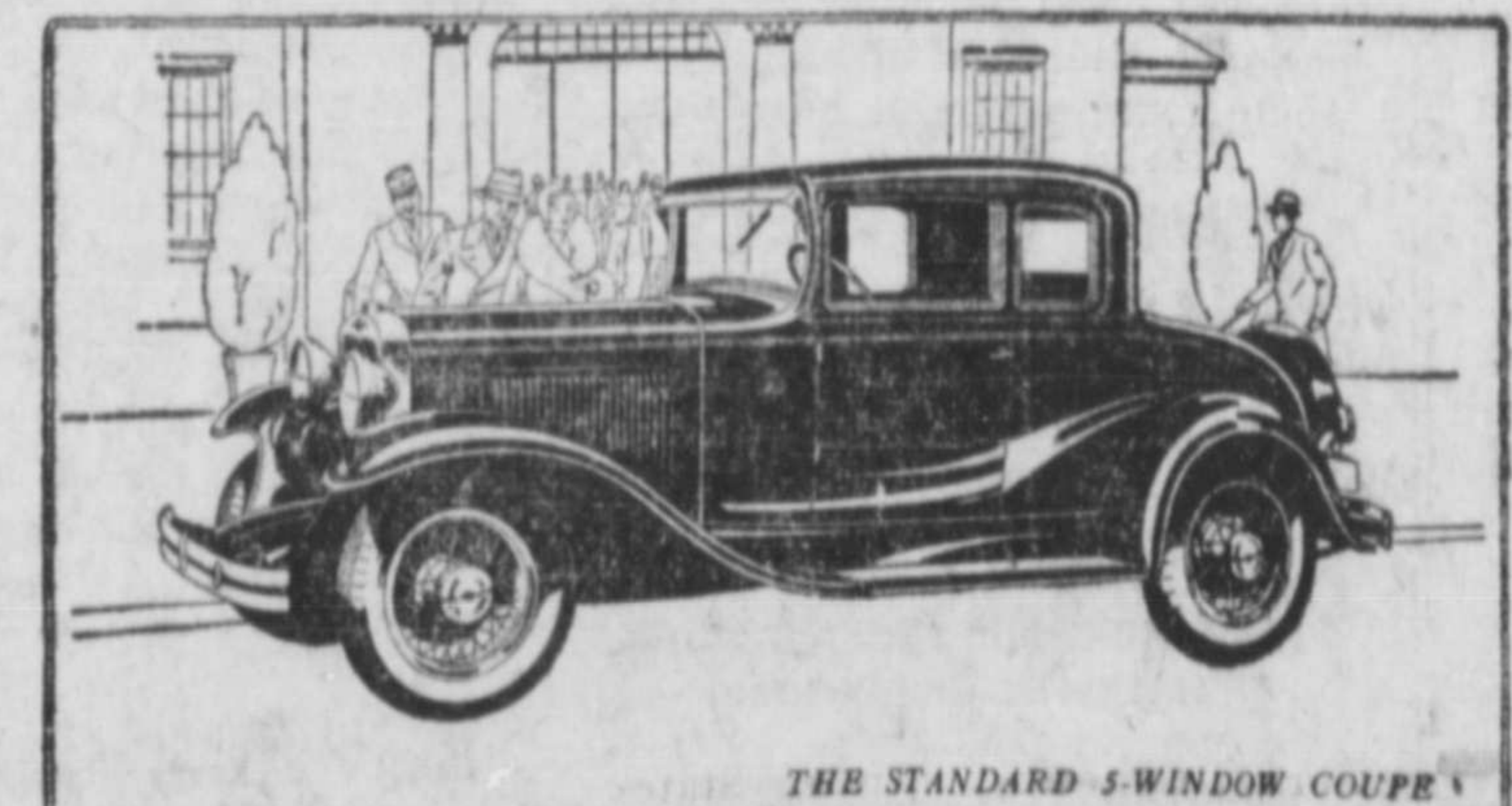

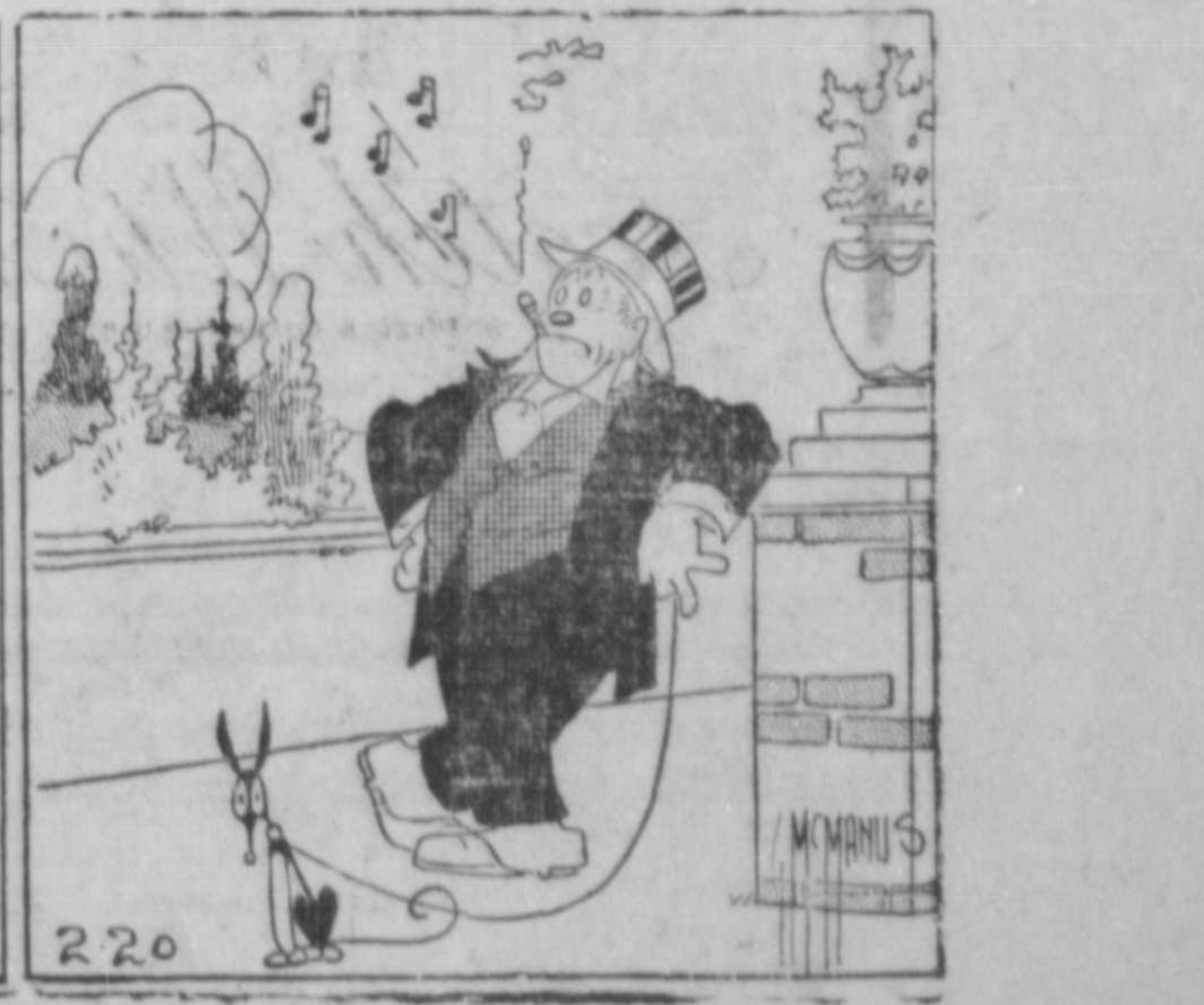

NEWS OF THE MINES

AROUND PRINCE RUPERT

George Copper Still Prospect—Granby Co. Big Factor in Canadian Industrial Life—Dr. Mandy Speaks at Vancouver

Official reports of the Consolidated Mining & Smelting Co. indicate that the George Gold Copper Mining Co. Ltd. property cannot be considered as other than a working prospect, says the Financial News of Vancouver. No work was done during the last year owing to extremely low copper prices. Considerably more work must be done before any opinion can be formed as to whether George Copper can be made into a paying mine. In the event of successful production, Consolidated will have first call on all earnings until all the funds it has advanced for development have been repaid.

In "Industrial Canada," a magazine published in Toronto by the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, appears an article from the pen of Charles Bocking, president and general manager of the Granby Co., dealing with operations of that important copper producing company. "For over thirty years," says Mr. Bocking's article, "the Granby Co., by developing and operating metal and coal mines in British Columbia and by establishing towns at their mines and reduction works, has contributed in a large measure to the progress of Western Canada." Mr. Bocking tells how the company was incorporated in 1899, starting its first operation at Phoenix with the establishment of a smelter at Grand Forks. About 1910, the company acquired the Hidden Creek mine at Anyox, about ninety miles northwest of Prince Rupert, considerable development being carried out there prior to the smelter starting operations in March, 1914. "The company's operating expenses," Mr. Bocking declares, "at Cassidy, Allenby and Anyox plants in cash outlay amounts to approximately \$7,000,000 annually. It is conservative to state that the company has spent in their operations within the Dominion of Canada since 1900 upwards of \$200,000,000. Since 1900 the Granby Co. has produced in round figures 1,000,000 ounces of gold, 13,000,000 ounces of silver and close to 1,000,000,000 pounds of copper."

Addressing the British Columbia Chamber of Mines in Vancouver a few days ago on mining developments and possibilities in Northwestern British Columbia, Dr. Joseph T. Mandy, resident mining engineer, Prince Rupert, declared that an important feature of the last year's depression had been the stabilization of the mining industry in the district. All producing mines

had worked continuously, he said, with increased efficiency and reduced costs and development had progressed steadily. Several prospects advanced appreciably toward the production stage. Interesting new features pertaining to the probable existence of a gold belt in the batholithic rocks of the coast from which several small producing mines might result and the characteristic features of the rocks of these areas were explained by Dr. Mandy. The importance of developing the non-metallic resources of the coastal section was stressed and attention was directed to opportunities in clays, limestone, marble, building stone and the possibility of finding commercial deposits of phosphates in some of the younger sediments along the coast.

Priests Had Hard 400-Mile Trip in Central Alaska

SEWARD, Alaska, Feb. 20—Conquering the ice, snow and bad weather of Central Alaska for a distance of 400 miles, Father B. J. Hubbard, priest-explorer of Santa Clara, Cal., and a companion priest succeeded in making a trip from Nenana to Ulotto in 11 days, according to word received here. They travelled with a team of 13 dogs.

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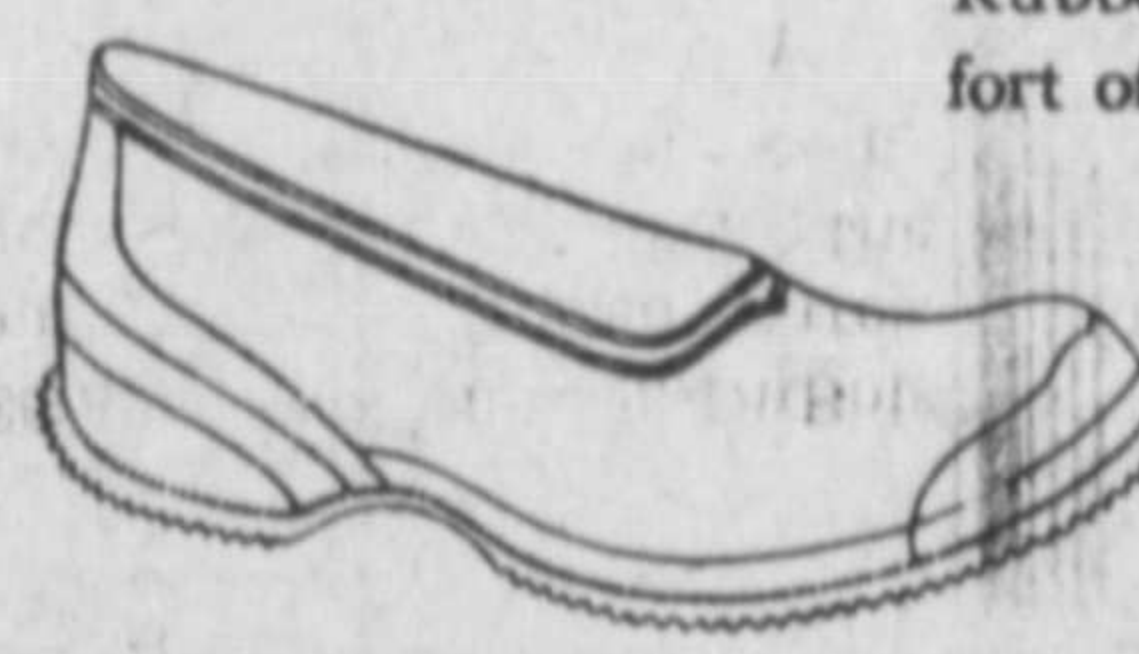

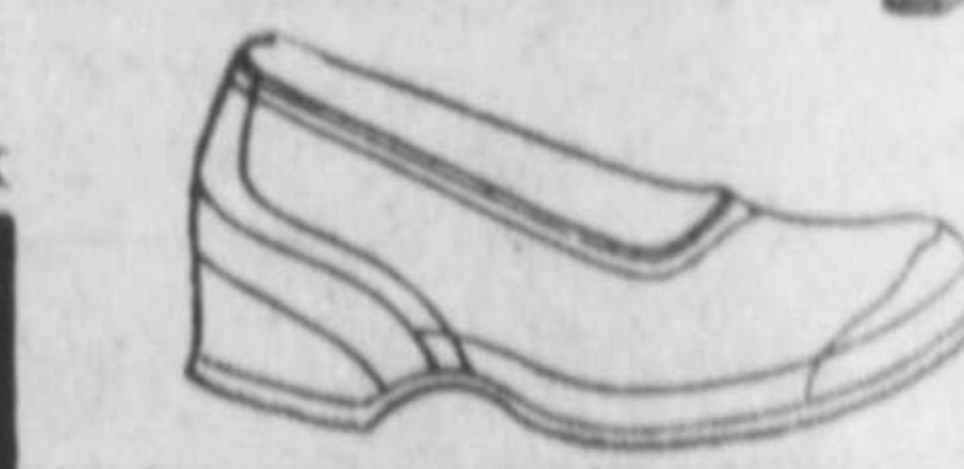
