ADJUSTMENT OF WAR DEBTS NEEDED

DEBT PACT IS SIGNED

President Hoover Performs Final Act on Moratorium

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 24.—President Herbert Hoover affixed his signature last night to the Senate's ratification of the one-year war debt moratorium plan. In so doing, the president declared that, by approving the moratorium, United States had saved herself many times more than was involved. It had also averted a financial catastrophe in Germany.

The payments involved under the moratorium were only being postponed and not cancelled, President Hoover explained.

WOMAN FOR DELEGATION

Miss Mary Wooley to Represent United States at Disarmament Conference

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 24.—Miss Mary E. Wooley, aged 68, girls' college president, has been appointed as woman representative of the United States at the disarmament conference in Geneva in February. Other members of the United States delegation will be General Charles G. Dawes and Senator Swanson of Virginia, Democrat.

MRS. TURGEON WINS TURKEY

Gets Coveted Prize in Burns Weight Guessing—Others Get Smaller Birds

At 8 p.m. Wednesday, Sergeant Service weighed the huge turkey at Burns Market and the scale balanced at 31 pounds, 11½ ounces. The closest tickets to the exact weight were seven, each specifying 31 pounds, 12 ounces. The names are Mrs. L. F. Turgeon, R. Pearson, C. Obata, G. Culos, J. Judge, Rupert Gerdner, Mrs. F. A. Rogers.

According to the regulations these lucky individuals decided to place their names in a hat and a little boy drew out the name of Mrs. Turgeon who was declared the winner. The other six were each presented with a smaller turkey.

The contest proved very interesting as over 900 adults deposited their guesses. The guesses varied from 13 pounds, 13 ounces to 139 pounds, one ounce. One contestant even wanted to know the specific gravity of a turkey before bidding.

Germany Justified In Claim Of Being Unable to Pay Her Reparations, Experts Assert

Young Plan Advisory Committee Makes Report Public—Payments Must Be Changed to Coincide With "Troubled Situation of World"

BASLE, Switzerland, Dec. 24.—Any claim by Germany that she is unable to pay her conditional reparations payments beginning next year stood defined as justified today by the report of the Young Plan advisory committee of experts. In the report, which was made public last night, the committee also called for an adjustment of all reparations and other war debts "to the troubled situation of the world."

This, it was said, must be done without delay if new disasters are to be averted.

The report is regarded by bankers here as the beginning of the end of the Young Plan.

IS BEST ANIMAL

British Columbia Heifer Colantha No. 194433 Finest Heifer in North America

VANCOUVER, Dec. 24.—Word has been received here that the British Columbia two-year old Holstein heifer Colantha No. 194433, bred and raised at Colony Farm, has been named champion of North American for 1931. The award was made to the British Columbia animal following deliberations of five dairy cattle judges who had presided at the Royal Winter Fair in Toronto and the National Dairy Show at St. Louis.

The honor marks Colantha No. 194433 as probably the finest heifer in the world.

JAIL FOR CRUELTY

Washington Man and Woman Who Abused Girl to Serve Prison Terms

WASHINGTON, Dec. 24.—Mr. and Mrs. Harry Riley have been each sentenced to two years' imprisonment here on charges of cruelty to Riley's nine-year old daughter. In addition they were each fined \$250.

It was found that the child had been kept for two years in a dark cupboard by her father and step-mother and cruelly beaten and abused. The sentence was the maximum provided under the law. The judge stated he would have given a more severe sentence had the law permitted.

INSANITY IS FOUND

VANCOUVER, Dec. 24.—It was revealed at the inquest into the death of Miss Mary Shaw, who was shot to death in a Pender Street restaurant by Lee Duck, a Chinaman, who later took his own life, that the young waitress had been warned no less than seven times by the Chinaman that he intended to kill her because she refused to go out with him.

The jury found that Lee Duck had killed the girl and taken his own life while temporarily insane.

Roosevelt in Shelter at Neah Bay After Having Sent Out Distress Call

WATERFRONT WHIFFS

Fishing Outlook Much Improved—New Type of
Container at Porcher Island—Biological
Men In Ottawa

In view of the general hard times and the fact that relief work may not continue much longer, it seems more than likely that an exceptionally early start may be made in all lines of fishing endeavor next season. Agitation is on to have the halibut fishing season opened in 1932 on January 15 instead of February 15, the present legal date. In some quarters the expectation seems to be that this will be permitted. In any case, many of the boats are planning to be at work just as soon as possible. It also seems likely that the salmon trollers will be out at an earlier date than usual next season and the end of January or the first of February will, undoubtedly, see many boats at work. Market conditions for all types of fish appear to be encouraging for next year. Frozen stocks of halibut and other fish are authoritatively stated to be much less than at the same date last year. Canned salmon stocks of all varieties are also going down satisfactorily and it is understood that practically all canneries in District No. 2 will operate next year when, incidentally, a big run of pinks is due. Without being unduly optimistic it appears safe to say that times will be a good deal better for the fishing community at least during the coming year than they were in the course of the last.

The Porcher Island cannery packed a quantity of fancy sockeye salmon in half-pound oval tins during the past season. These were all shipped to the United Kingdom where consumers demand the very best and are reported to have been highly spoken of there. Col. F. H. Cunningham, managing director of the Chatham Sound Fishing & Packing Co., is very particular that none but the best fish go into tins at Porcher Island and the resultant pack attests to the care taken in this respect.

Capt. Peter Byrne, owner and skipper of the halibut boat Helen II, is busy this winter fishing ground fish and other varieties which he is landing daily for the Prince Rupert fresh fish market. For this work he is using his smaller boat, Dolphin II. He is fishing in the neighborhood of Metlakatla and off the mouth of the Skeena River.

The local halibut boat Embia has been at the McLean shipyard plant at Seal Cove for the past week or so undergoing recaulking and other hull repair work. The McLean plant is keeping fairly busy on this sort of work throughout the winter.

John Dybavn, member of the Biological Board of Canada, and H. N. Brocklesby, director of the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station, will leave on tomorrow afternoon's train for Ottawa where they will attend the annual meeting of the Biological Board of Canada.
