CIVIC INVESTIGATION.

For weeks past, the City Council has met several times a week, in private, to discuss the latest move of the bank in regard to city finances. In spite of the reiterated demands of Alderman Montgomery, the public has not been informed as to what is being done, nor how it is being done. Until Monday night, the members of the Council, with one exception, were thoroughly satisfied that they were pursuing a proper course, and that the public should be kept in the dark, until such time as the Council is able to make a final statement. So far as we are aware, that time has not yet come, but, like a bolt from the blue, the Mayor suggests that a citizens' committee be appointed to go through the correspondence which has passed between the bank and the city, in order that outside critics may be satisfied that the Council has done its work nobly. Why this sudden request for an investigation? Alderman Montgomery's repeated requests for information, in public Council, have been deliberately refused. The new move is equivalent to saying, "We still refuse to tell you anything, but whatever you can find out for yourselves, you are welcome to."

The citizens' committee is also requested to go fully into the question of City Hall expense, with a view to furnishing a report, coupled with suggestions. Was there ever anything so ridiculous? The Mayor and aldermen were elected by the ratepayers to conduct the city's business for the space of one year, and it is their clear duty to go ahead and do it. There never has been, and probably never will be a city council which is free from criticism. Had there been charges of graft or dishonesty made against any member of the Council, there

would have been reason for an enquiry, but most people are satisfied that the present Council is doing the best it is capable of doing. The second request is equivalent to saying, "We have fired all the men we could; if you are not satisfied, you must shoulder the responsibility of any further cut."

The forming of a citizens' committee of enquiry, whenever there is criticism of the Council's doings, would be setting up an absurd precedent. The committee habit is like the royal commission habit, it grows. Today the Council suggests an enquiry, and tomorrow, the citizens, having acquired the taste for investigation, may demand one, and, in time to come, enquiry commissions and conferences may be camped all around the City Hall, with each member drawing a salary. If the suggestion is carried out there is a dog's life ahead for some poor mayor of the future.

Let the Council do its duty fearlessly, and to the best of its ability, to the end of its term, telling the people in open Council exactly what the people ought to be told. The Council must shoulder full responsibility for its year's work, without appealing for sympathy, or trying to slide from under the burden, and at the end of the year the people will record their opinion. Meantime, the suggestion of the Mayor sounds suspiciously like a "cry from Macedonia."

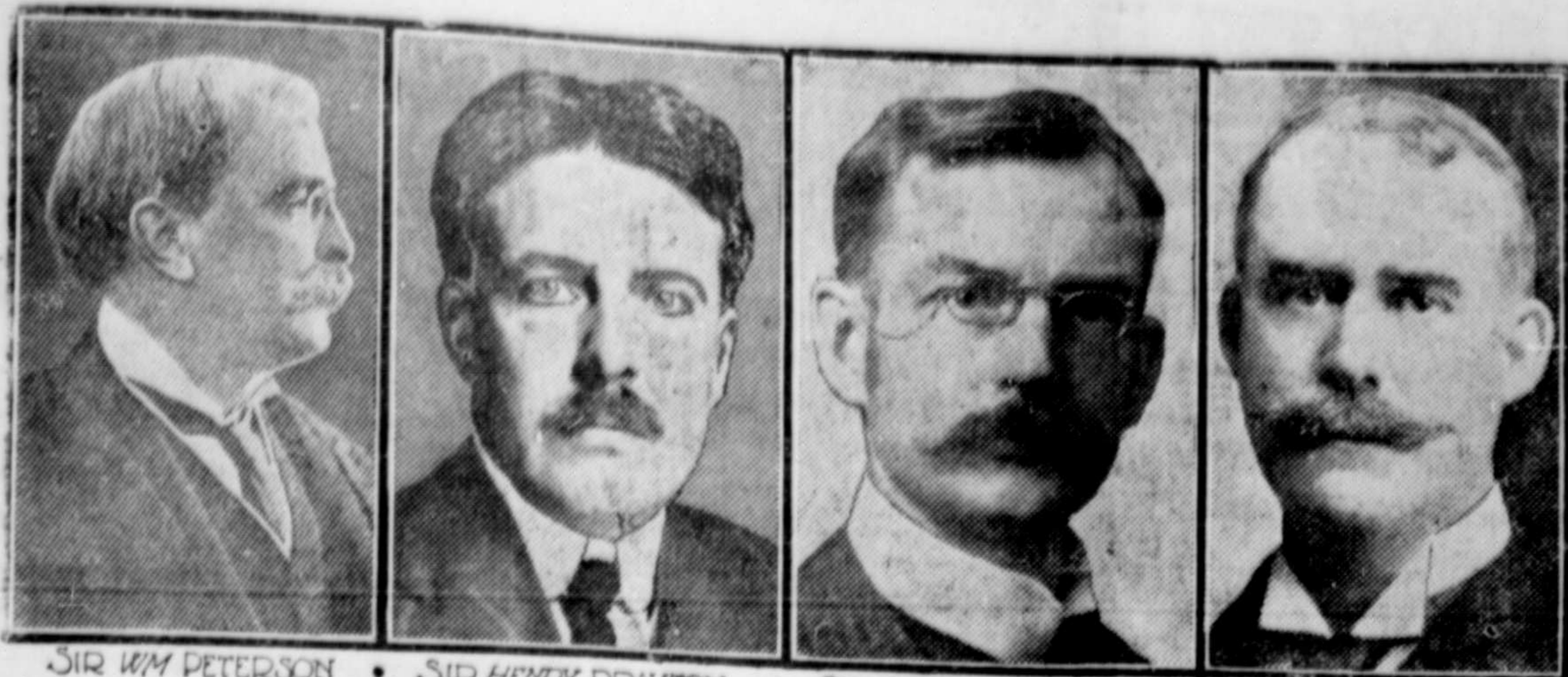

MORE BYLAWS PASSED AT REQUEST OF BANK

Instead of passing one bylaw covering the year's expenses, the Bank of Montreal now requires a bylaw covering each little individual loan made by the city.

One of those bylaws, for \$5,000, came before the Council Monday night, and nobody seemed to know anything about it, except that it had to be passed. The bylaw called for a rate of interest not exceeding 7 per cent.

Alderman Montgomery, seconded by Alderman Maitland, moved that it be referred to the Finance Committee.

The Mayor said this would look like holding up the bank.

Alderman Edge said they had been bylawed to death, and he did not know anything about the 7 per cent rate, instead of the usual 6 per cent.

The bylaw was passed, with the rate of interest amended to 6 per cent.

Steve McNeil came down from Nine Mile Mountain on Monday and brought a sample to The Herald office, where it is on exhibition. This is some of the highest grade ore that was ever taken off Nine Mile Mountain.

REGINA HAS POOLED ITS FIRE INSURANCE

Regina, June 16.—The city of Regina has adopted a novel form of letting its fire insurance, and one which gives each company an equal share of the business. As there are eighty-eight companies represented in the city and as the city proposes to place \$1,300,270 of fire insurance this year, the amount of insurance which will be thus written by each company will be in advance of \$10,000. It is expected that a material reduction will result in the rates of the various risks pooled by the city. Efforts have been made throughout the year towards having the underwriters reduce the rates on the various risks, and as a result the city has been notified that the inspectors had made a thorough reinspection of all property in Regina and are now working on the new rates, which would be submitted before the matter is finally dealt with.

THE DO OR DIE SPIRIT DISPLAYED IN TRENCHES

While the 4th East Yorks (Territorials) were being heavily shelled, and it appeared that the entire battalion would be wiped out, Captain Easton, although wounded three times, staggered up and down the trench encouraging the men and refusing to go to a dressing station.

Two wounded men of a rifle brigade battalion appeared at a brigade headquarters and said that very few were left in their trenches. Captain Railston, the only surviving officer, would not abandon his position.

"I'm damned if I retire," he said, just as a "Ypres express" shell exploded in front of the half-wrecked trench, burying him in the debris.

His men dug him out. A moment later he was buried again by another explosion. Again his men dug him out, this time wounded. Then the Germans began destroying the traverses one by one. Finally, only three men and Captain Railston were left alive. The men refused to leave him, and ran up and down the trench, stumbling over sandbags and corpses, firing first at one point and then another, and "bluffing" the German infantry so that they did not dare attack. Finally two companies of the York and Lancasters came up and reinforced the position.—Ex.
