JAPANESE LEADERS BOMBED AT SHANGHAI
WOULD PLACE DIRECT RELIEF RECIPIENTS BACK ON LAND

Four High Ranking Officials
Seriously Injured As Review
Stand Blown To Bits Today

Chinese Believed Responsible For Outrage and Seven Others Arrested—Birthday of Emperor Hirohito Was Being Celebrated With Demonstration

SHANGHAI, April 29.—Four of the highest ranking Japanese military, naval and diplomatic officials at Shanghai were seriously injured today when a bomb blew to bits a reviewing stand on which they were seated at a military review in honor of the birthday of Emperor Hirohito. The most seriously injured were General Yoshinori Sharakawa, commander-in-chief of the Japanese forces here; Admiral Kichisaburo, naval commander-in-chief; Mamoru Shigemitsu, Japanese minister to China, and Major Kenkichi Uyeda, who commanded the Japanese troops at the beginning of the battle at Shanghai but who was superseded by General Sharakawa.

A Chinaman believed to have thrown the bomb from the crowd and seven other Chinese were arrested.

PASSES IN VANCOUVER

Dr. J. A. Macdonald, brother of Mr. Justice W. A. Macdonald, Died Last Night

VANCOUVER, April 29.—Dr. John Angus Macdonald, physician and surgeon, member of the medical fraternity of Vancouver for more than twenty years and brother of Mr. Justice W. A. Macdonald of the Supreme Court of British Columbia, died last night of pneumonia. He was sixty-nine years of age.

The late Dr. Macdonald was born at St. Catherine's, Ont., on June 11, 1862, and was educated for the medical profession at Toronto and Edinburgh Universities. He first practised at Brandon, Man., where he was city and provincial health officer and surgeon to the Canadian Pacific Railway. He came to Vancouver in 1909 and had practised here since.

Dr. Macdonald is survived by his widow and one son and two daughters. In politics, he was a Conservative.

ANYOX MAN APPOINTED

James C. Hutchinson Succeeds Arthur Halleran on Booth School Teaching Staff

James C. Hutchinson arrived in the city on the Prince George last evening from Anyox to succeed Arthur Halleran as a member of the teaching staff of Booth Memorial School here. Mr. Hutchinson has been in the employ of the Granby Co. at Anyox for about a year and, prior to that, taught at Anyox for three years, having gone there from New Westminster. He assumes his duties here on Monday next. Mr. Halleran resigned recently to go into business.

May Accept Invitation to Spend Summer at Chateau in French Pyrenees

NEWARK, N.Y., April 29.—Col. Charles A. Lindbergh, having almost given up hope for the safe return of his twenty-month old kidnapped son, is seriously considering the acceptance of an offer which has been made to himself and Mrs. Lindbergh of the use for the summer of a chateau in the French Pyrenees. It is reported that the Lindberghs may completely abandon the home at Hopewell where they have had such sorrow.

Mrs. Lindbergh is expecting another child next month.

LONDON TO USE LUMBER OF B.C.

LONDON, April 29.—In line with its recent decision to use Empire timber as much as possible, the housing committee of the London county council has instructed its contractors to order British Columbia timber for use in construction of London county council houses.

Colonel Nicholls Tells About His Visit to the East

In New York the picture houses are kept open all night so that the unemployed for ten cents may have a warm place to spend the night, according to Colonel Nicholls, who, at the Rotary lunch yesterday, told briefly of his visit east. The admission fee is ten cents and the people stay in their seats as long as they wish. The subways also are crowded with unemployed, the charge there being five cents.

Colonel Nicholls travelled a good deal in the east visiting various centres including Montreal, New York, Boston, Cleveland and Chicago. In Cleveland particularly he found prices very low. Milk was selling at five cents a quart, bread seven loaves for 25c, potatoes 35c a sack, and at one store they were specially advertising beef and mutton best cuts at five cents a pound. This last was an advertising stunt but it indicates the general trend.

The Colonel spoke optimistically of the local pulp mill prospects. The people he met who knew the financial men connected with the proposed industry were responsible people and he was assured that the industry would be established, if not immediately, at any rate in the near future.

The speaker said he found the people of Eastern Canada in better courage over the financial situation. In the United States the people seemed hopeless and he doubted if conditions there had reached the bottom. The people had lost confidence in themselves and in their leaders, political and financial.

Hon. Wesley Gordon Presents Scheme To Remedy Depression

Proposal to Put Unemployed on Farms of Canada is Contingent Upon Provinces and Municipalities Agreeing to Participate in it

OTTAWA, April 29.—Hon. W. A. Gordon, minister of immigration and colonization, outlined a new scheme in the House of Commons yesterday whereby the government hopes to place numbers of persons now receiving direct relief back on the land. The scheme is contingent upon the municipalities agreeing to participate in it. A "Back to the Land" movement, as one means of remedying the present depression, has been advocated by Mr. Gordon for some time.

"HONOR MURDER" JURY DEADLOCK

HONOLULU, April 29.—After having deliberated for 22 hours, the mixed jury in the "honor murder" case, in which Mrs. Granville Fortesque, Lieut. Thomas H. Massie and two United States naval seamen are charged with the murder of a native youth, showed no signs of reaching an agreement yesterday afternoon. It was reported that there was a deadlock with ten for acquittal and two for conviction.

Visitors to Big Los Angeles Event To Visit Province

This is the year of the big Olympic Games at Los Angeles and, at the Rotary Club luncheon yesterday, Colonel J. W. Nicholls drew attention to the fact that Vancouver was expecting 150,000 people to visit that city going to or returning from the games. He suggested that it might be possible to get some of these people to visit Prince Rupert.

Radio Licenses Are Increasing

Number During Past Fiscal Year Double That of Year Previous

Government returns show that, during the past fiscal year, the number of radio licenses issued in Prince Rupert has been just double that of the previous year. For the year ending April 1, the number was 325 whereas for a similar period the previous year the number was 163. The prospect is that there will be a further increase during the coming year.

GRIMES IS IMPROVING

Ancient Spittaller to Make Appearance in Cubs Uniform Within Few Days

CHICAGO, April 29.—Burleigh Grimes, ancient spittaller, who did a great deal to help the St. Louis Cardinals win the World Series last fall, will probably make his debut in the uniform of the Chicago Cubs within the next few days. Grimes has been unable to play since the opening of the season owing to an attack of influenza in addition to suffering with infected teeth. He is now rapidly recovering.

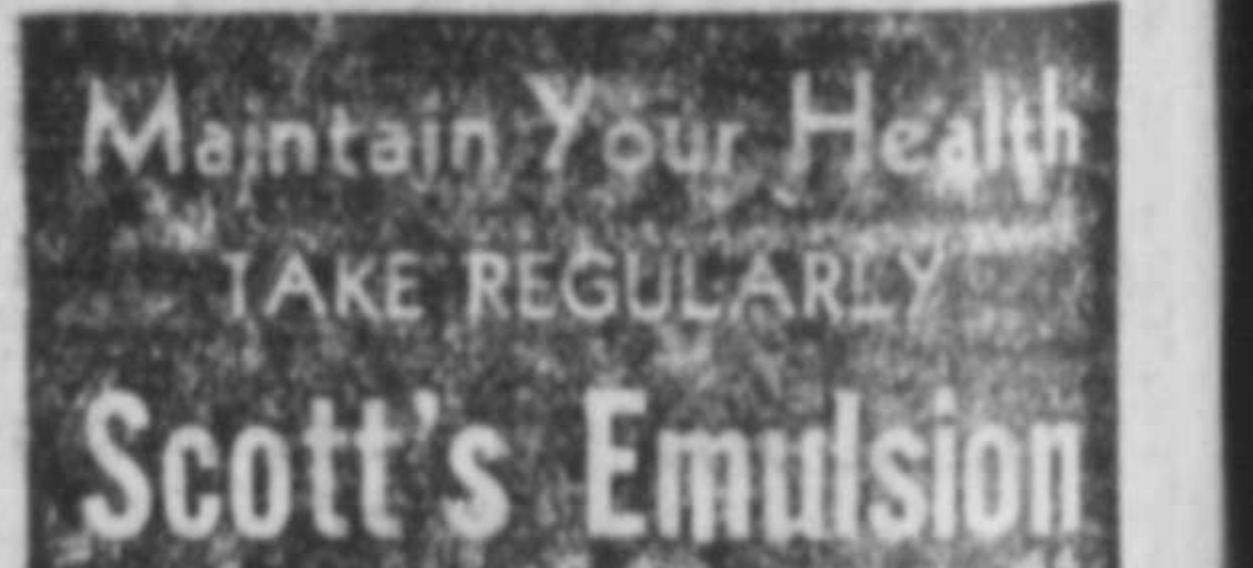

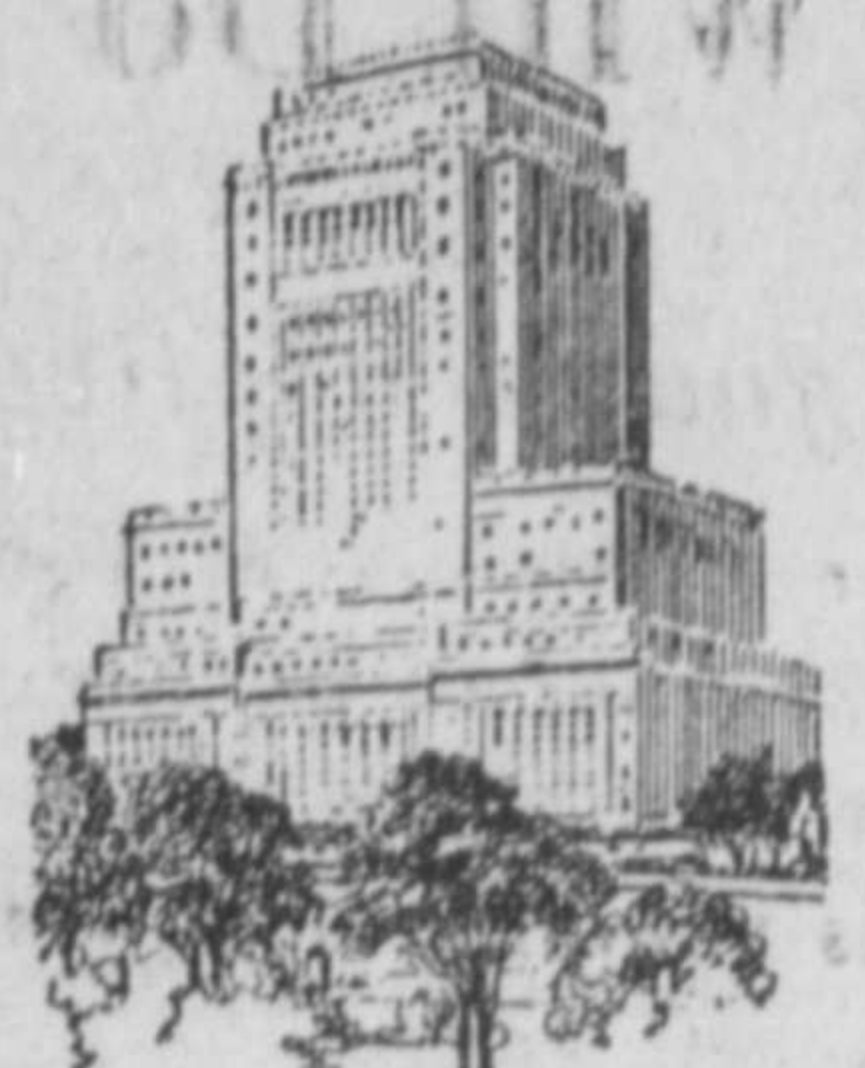

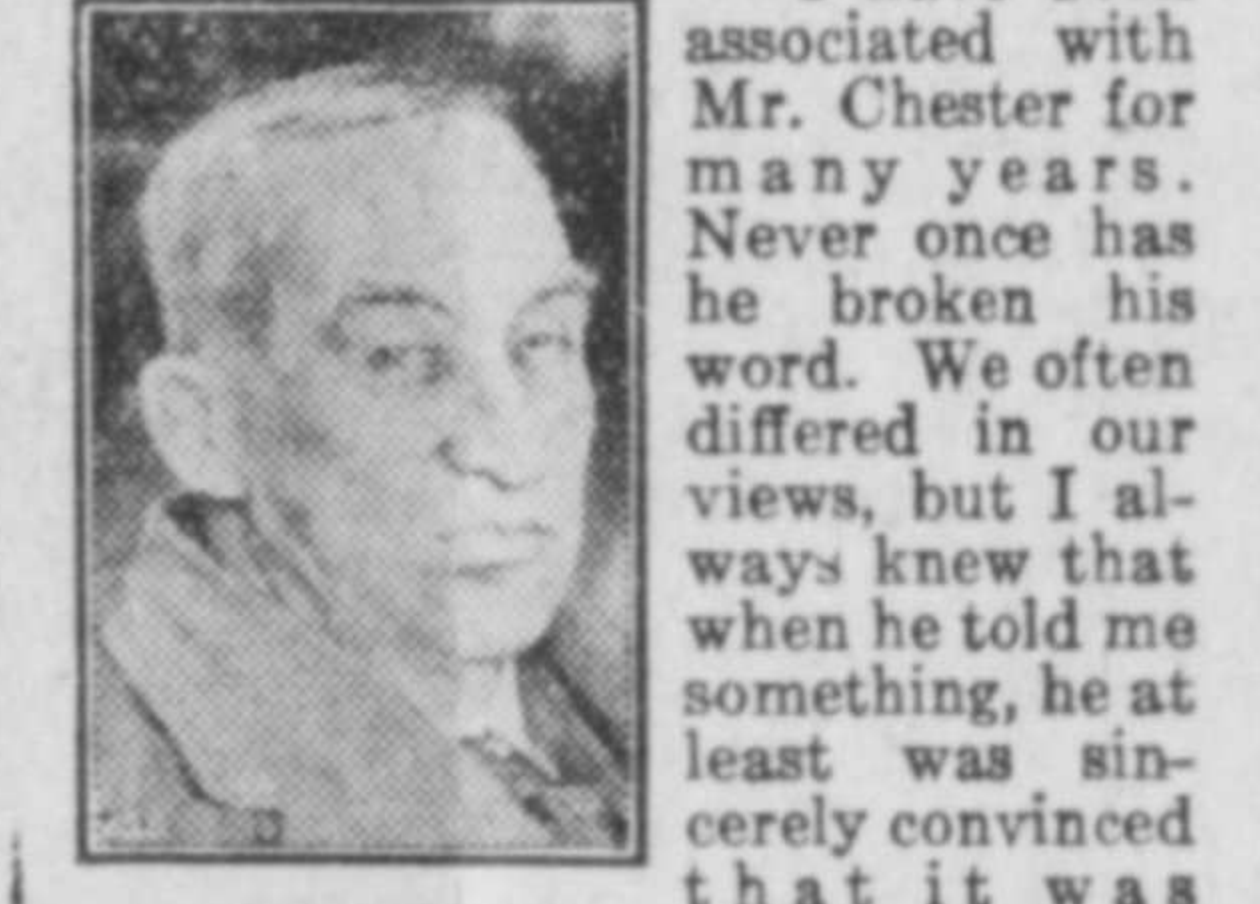

**Combine to Honor Railroad Veteran**

W. G. Chester Serves Order Railway Conductors for Quarter Century

When W. G. (Billy) Chester, of Winnipeg, retired after twenty-five years service as general chairman of the Canadian Pacific section of the Order of Railway Conductors, something of the character that had won him the esteem of not only the men for whom he acted as chief spokesman, but of the company with which he negotiated was revealed by Grant Hall, senior vice-president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, when he said:



"I have been associated with Mr. Chester for many years. Never once has he broken his word. We often differed in our views, but I always knew that when he told me something, he at least was sincerely convinced that it was right."

Speak to the conductors whom he represented so well for a quarter of a century and one learns that "Billy" Chester was a "square shooter," that which in the ranks of his kind there is no prouder title.
