LONDON, December 26 .- Ireland may have to accept Premier Hoyd George's plan introduced into the House of Commons on Monday, whether she likes it or not, an official close to the British premier declared in an interview. 





Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre. Pre-emption new confined to surveyed lands only.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant

Where pre-empter in occupation not less than 8 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, begranted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided appli cant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required. Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in confunction with his farm, without actual occupation, pro-vided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown

granted land. Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions. For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be

leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage. Natural hay meadows inaccessible

by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchas price, is made. PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees

of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from for one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made re-No fees relating to pre-emptions are

due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4. 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions. Interest on agreements to purchase Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 21, 1920.
