Lloyd George Will Force Acceptance of Home Rule Bill

While Sinn Feiners Cannot be Compelled to Form their Own Parliament, They will not be Permitted to Interfere With the Ulster House.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, December 26.—Ireland may have to accept Premier Lloyd George's plan introduced into the House of Commons on Monday, whether she likes it or not, an official close to the British premier declared in an interview. The premier is prepared to force the acceptance of his measure, this official asserted. Its passage by Parliament was assured before the measure was submitted, he added. Lloyd George, according to the official, is "heart and soul" for the passage of some legislation which will at least start the government on its mission of solving the Irish question.

The premier places this problem as second only in importance to the winning of the war. It is believed in Government circles, according to this source of information, that the Ulsterites will accept the plan. If Ulster accepts, and its parliament is threatened by the Sinn Fein element, the "entire British" army is available for the protection of Ulster, it was added.

The Government realizes that it is impossible to force the Sinn Fein section of Ireland to organize a parliament, the official said, but he pointed out that it would be easy to offer them a chance to deal with the Orangemen through a legislative body, and to grant the Ulsterites protection in case there was any attempt to interfere with them.

TWO CASES OF BREAKING AND ENTERING XMAS

Prince Rupert Drug Store Broken
Into and Fulton St. Cigar
Store Robbed.

Yesterday afternoon the Prince Rupert drug store, Third Avenue, was again broken into, this time in broad day-light. It being a holiday, the staff were not on hand all day and during the afternoon thieves deliberately cut a window pane and entered the washroom. Here they were met with a locked door and probably before they could get it broken open were disturbed. Immediately on discovery of the entry, the police were notified but no trace was to be found of the burglars outside of some foot-prints and dirt on the window sills. The police found that the place had been entered before this week. Some boys are suspected and it is probable the police will make a round up today.

The cigar store on Eighth Ave. and Fulton St. belonging to Miss Bessie Riley was also entered while the proprietor was out and a considerable quantity of cigars and cigarettes taken. This happened between 8 and 12 last night and the entry was made by means of a pass key.

FRENCH MILLS RAPID REPAIR

Employ Already Forty Thousand
Persons—In Two Years Ought
to Surpass 1914 Output.

LINEN WEAVING RETARDED
OWING SHORTAGE OF FLAX

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LILLE, France, Dec. 26.—Over forty thousand persons are at work in the French textile mills, which were razed or looted by the Germans of their wonderfully delicate machinery. The repairing of the mills and the reinstallation of the stolen machinery is going on steadily and many thousands more will also find employment soon.

Within a year both Government officials and the manufacturers agree that the production of textiles will reach half of the pre-war total and within two years these men forecast that the 1914 output will be surpassed. The woolen industry is said to have recovered the most rapidly, with cotton in second place. Linen weaving is reported to be the slowest in getting back to normal, because of the shortage of flax formerly obtained from Russia.

U.S. RAILROADS TO BE RETURNED TO OWNERS BY FIRST DAY OF MARCH

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26.—The President has today issued a proclamation returning the railroads and express companies to private control on March 1st. Failure of Congress to enact remedial legislation was given for the reason of extending the two months' time originally agreed upon for the relinquishing of government control of the railroads.

GERMAN PASSENGER LINERS MAY BE SOLD

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26.—The Shipping Board has under consideration the sale of all former German passenger ships, with the stipulation that the vessels be run under the American flag. These vessels total 103, aggregating approximately 250,000 deadweight tons. No price has been fixed for these ships, but \$200 a ton is submitted as the probable valuation.

BIG SENTENCE FOR PILLAGE

German Officer Who Destroyed
French Factory Machinery
Severely Doled With.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Amiens, Dec. 26.—The Court Martial held here sentenced the German officer Robert Roeckling, who was administrator of mines at Karlsruhe, to ten years imprisonment, fifteen years exile and a fine of ten million francs, upon his conviction on the charge of organizing pillage of the factories of eastern France. He collected the machinery and other material from the factories and blew it up in November, 1918. His brothers, Herman and Ludwig, were given similar sentences by default.

SANTA CLAUS VISITED JAPANESE KIDDIES

Grand Christmas Tree in Anglican
Mission Hall Yesterday
Pleased Little Ones.

The Anglican Japanese Mission Hall at the corner of Sixth Avenue and Fulton Street was the scene of Christmas festivities yesterday. Over sixty Japanese were present, of whom half were children. There was a Christmas tree and Santa Claus was in attendance. Christmas hymns were sung, some in English by the children and some in Japanese by the whole assembly. Recitations were given in both languages. Mr. Higashi, the missionary in charge, gave an address on Christmas and Mrs. Higashi directed the various classes of children in their motion songs and other parts.

Mr. Enyu, who came to Port Eslington nearly twenty years ago, was the chairman of the evening, and interpreted Bishop Du Verne's brief address on the Spirit of Christmas. Canon Bix and the Bishop were invited guests. The peals of laughter over Santa Claus indicated that child nature, whether Japanese or Canadian, is essentially the same.

RUSSIAN PROPAGANDA BY GERMAN AGENTS

German Agent Had Free Entry to
U. S. State Department and
Was Well Vouched For.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26.—The disclosures at the Senate investigation into the Russian Bolshevik propaganda in the United States, which will begin soon after the New Year opens, are expected to show the presence of German secret agents here masquerading in the guise of Russians, a senator said yesterday. One of these agents, who during the war, was active in the German spy system, had free entry to the State Department, where he had been well vouched for.

NORTHCLIFFE PRESS PRAISE PREMIER

Signs of Healing the Breach Be-
tween the Two Big Men of
Great Britain.

LONDON, Dec. 26.—Some of the political observers yesterday saw in the unanimously laudatory attitude assumed by the Northcliffe Press toward Premier Lloyd George's proposals for Irish Home Rule, the possible rapprochement between the great Britisher and Britain's statesman. Both the London Times and the Daily Mail, the two leading Northcliffe publications, were profuse in their praises of the premier's plan. Heretofore these newspapers have been bitter in their attacks upon Premier Lloyd George, following upon the break between him and Lord Northcliffe during the Peace Conference.

John D. Rockefeller Gives Hundred Million Dollars in Christmas Presents

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

NEW YORK, December 26.—John D. Rockefeller has given \$100,000,000 in Christmas presents for public purposes. Half of this sum will go to the General Education Board to raise the salaries of College professors and the other half will be placed at the disposal of the Rockefeller Foundation to aid in the work of combating disease, through the improvement of medical education, public health administration and scientific research. It is estimated that Rockefeller's gifts now approach the large amount of \$450,000,000.

Canadian schools will benefit from this sum to the amount of \$5,000,000. Appropriations will be made to the medical schools by the Foundation upon the condition that they raise additional sums from other sources.

Esthonia and Soviet Russia Peace Negotiations Seem Likely to be Successful

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

DORPAT, Livonia, December 26.—Some indications that an agreement might be reached in the negotiations for peace between Esthonia and Soviet Russia are being observed here. The Bolsheviks are showing a distinct willingness to make further concessions in the matter of territorial adjustments, which it is believed would obviate the necessity of the Tarva front, to which the Esthonian Government has been offering strong objections on account of its strategic position.

According to the Esthonians, the Bolshevik forces on the Tarva and Pskof fronts combined now total 100,000 men.

CLEMENCEAU TO BE PRESIDENT

"The Tiger" Expected to be Elect-
ed Without Opposition; Cabinet
to Resign January 17.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

PARIS, Dec. 26.—President Poincare's successor will be elected on January 17, according to the inference generally drawn by the Parisian press from President Clemenceau's statement in the Chamber that the cabinet would definitely resign on that date. It is also deduced that he will be a candidate for the presidency, which means that he will be elected virtually without opposition.

Speculation regarding "The Tiger's" successor as head of the cabinet is consequently eclipsing discussion as to the next president of the republic. Alexander Miller, governor of Alsace Lorraine, seems to have the greatest lead in popularity, so far as can be judged meantime.

WOULD POOL RESOURCES OF ALL EUROPE

General Bliss of United States In-
dicates Method of Recon-
structing War Torn
Countries.

WOULD APPOINT ONE MAN
DIRECTOR OF SUPPLIES

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26.—The fate of all Europe is so closely interwoven with that of Germany that the other European nations should lend her every assistance in the organization and maintenance of a stable government, General Tasker H. Bliss, United States representative on the Supreme War Council, said today. The present unrest in Europe is due almost entirely to unfair or economic conditions. General Bliss continued, but this could be raised and wholly corrected if all Europe combined their resources in one big effort.

General Bliss suggested the pooling of necessities and raw materials under one man, vested with the necessary authority and organization. This man would be designated Director General of Supplies and would have associated powers as Director General of Distribution to see that the supplies available were apportioned where they were the most urgently needed.

ALLIES VERIFYING GERMAN STATISTICS

Ratification of Versailles Treaty
Depends Upon How Soon
Figures Can Be
Checked Up.

PARIS, Dec. 26.—The final date of the repeatedly postponed exchange of ratifications of the Versailles Treaty now depends upon the speed with which the Allied Missions in Germany can verify the German figures of the available floating docks and other marine equipment claimed by the Allies as compensation for the sinking of the German ships at Scapa Flow.

Prince Rupert the Warmest Spot in Canada.

One of the noticeable things in connections with the official meteorological reports is the variations in temperature at the different places along the Pacific Coast. None of the recording stations for some considerable number of weeks past has shown as high a temperature as Prince Rupert. This city has been from four to ten degrees higher than the larger cities in the south. In fact, there is no place on the coast which has disclosed a temperature showing the same mildness of the winter season as here. This fact is one, too, which makes itself evident on the coal bin. If the imaginative member who spoke of "Prince Rupert's ice-bound harbor" in Parliament knew of the mild winters here, he would possibly change his residence. The Pacific coast is much milder than the Atlantic and Prince Rupert is shown to be the mildest place on the Pacific, in Canada.

Would be There, But Stay Here.

Notwithstanding our mild winters, there are those amongst us who once in a while tell that they would prefer to live in a cold country. They like the cold. It is so dry, and crisp and invigorating. So it is, doubtless, and a whole lot more than that, too, which these people who like to be different choose to forget. Or else they have short memories. One thing is certain and that is that although they need travel only a short distance to get where the thermometer hovers around zero most of the time, they prefer to remain here. There is no great influx to the prairies for the winter. It is rather the other way around. For weeks at the end of the fall, every train is crammed with people coming out from the interior just to escape the winters. The delightfully cold and dry and crisp atmosphere inland is a thing to get away from, if possible. Actions speak louder than words.

Never Go North When You Can Go South.

The dictum "Go west, young man, and grow up with the country," which was so popular a few years ago, brings to mind another by an equally well known person. He said: "Never go north when you can go south." The whole trend of the movement of population in Canada has been West and North. And there are still vast spaces in the North yet unfilled, which may be, someday. Nevertheless few people have gone north from choice. Rather from necessity. They have said, "This place is become too strait for me; Give place that I may dwell." Conditions in Canada have been such that there have been more opportunities for the individual in the North. But from choice, the majority of folks would prefer a less rigorous climate.

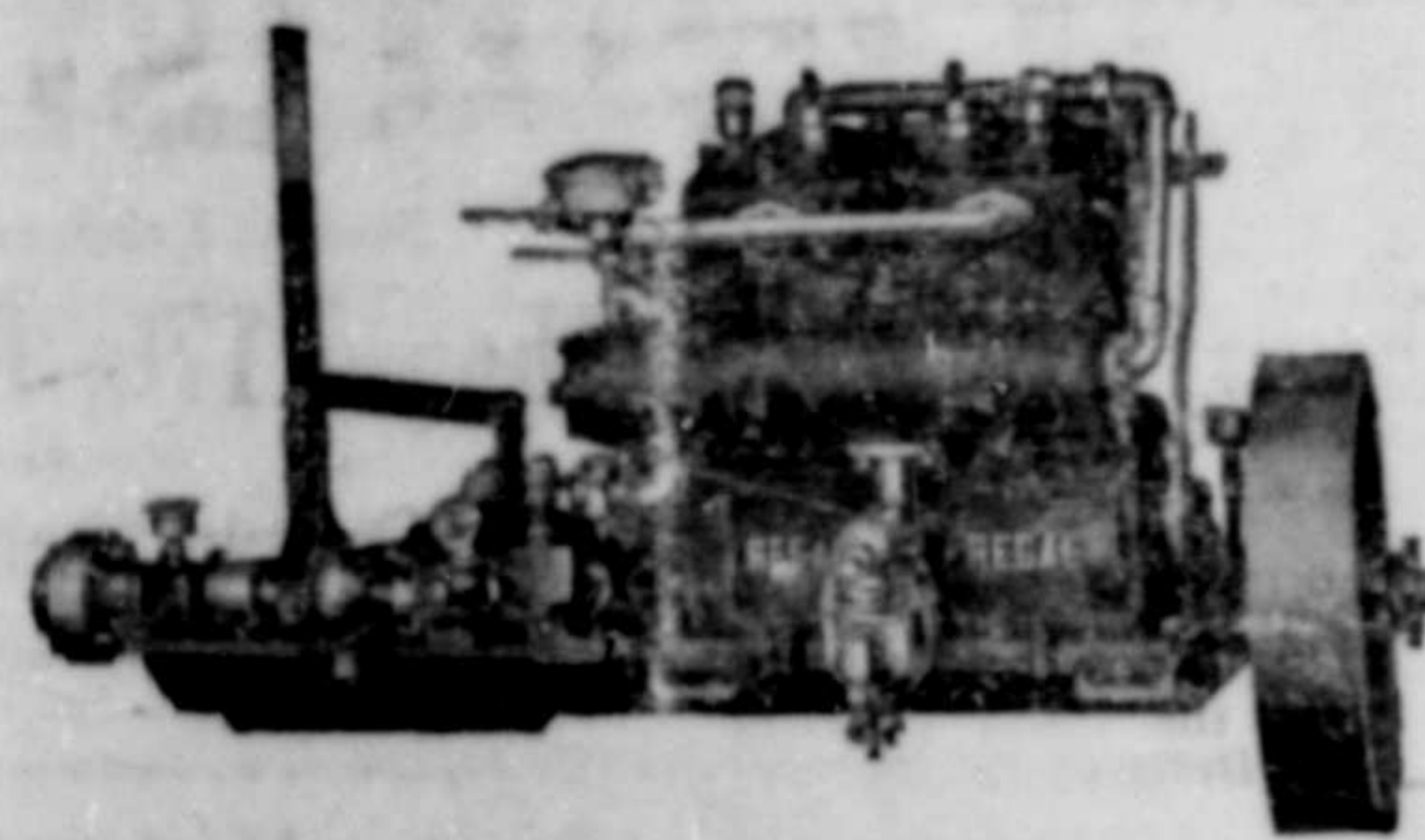

Reclamation Scheme For Massett Inlet

Residents Claim that 600 Acres of Fine Land and Boat Anchorage Could be Made.

MASSETT, Dec. 24.—A reclamation scheme in Massett Inlet between New Massett and Delkatla is being talked of here. Flats exist at this point that could be easily drained, it is believed, and would provide 600 acres of the finest agricultural land. Besides the land an anchorage could be provided for 200 fish boats by the same scheme. This is a pet project of many local people and they hope to see it carried into effect before long.

Moreton Frewen, on his recent visit here, inspired great confidence in the residents and they are confidently expectant of seeing the wealthy Englishman go ahead with his scheme of colonizing the district. They would welcome the returned men among them with open arms as they feel that the coming in of a number of settlers under the auspices of such an influential man would mean great things in the development of the district.

The people of Massett and Port Clements are by no means satisfied with the present boat service that is given them by the Prince Albert or Prince John on the fortnightly schedule. They maintain that it hinders people from the outside coming into the district to see and learn of its possibilities. Besides that it works a great hardship on those who are already settled here.

STORY OF AMRITSAR TRAGEDY LAST APRIL

Troops Fire Upon Huge Gathering at Religious Ceremony Hundreds Killed and Injured.

LONDON, Dec. 24.—Statements made in official quarters that 500 persons were killed and 1500 wounded in the tragedy at Amritsar, India, during last April, under-estimated the casualties greatly, according to the narrative of an Indian lawyer named Said Hassan, which is printed in the Pall Mall Gazette today. Giving an account of the tragedy, which he says was witnessed by relatives of his at Amritsar, he told how people had gathered from all over the Punjab for a religious ceremony, which was held in the Gallion Watabagh, where a dais had been erected, upon which several hundred speakers stood, surrounded by a gathering of from 20,000 to 30,000 persons. Suddenly the military appeared and opened fire upon the crowd without warning. Soldiers stood on the high ground and fired upon the helpless people from the distance of a hundred yards.

PORT CLEMENTS IS STILL BUSY

Two Mills Continue Operations Employing Over Seventy Men —Hub of Islands.

PORT CLEMENTS, Dec. 26.—Activity at Port Clements, Graham Island, is still great although the winter season is on. Several storms have been experienced but the weather is considered quite normal this season and some excellent weather has prevailed.

A number of the spruce camps and mills have closed down for the winter but at Port Clements itself, two mills employing over 70 men are working full shifts. Between the two, the Lewis and Lynch mills, there is at present 7,000,000 feet of cut spruce in the yards and this is being continually added to.

The tug Lorne left on Monday last with a scow of 400,000 feet for Prince Rupert. The little G. T. P. steamer is making regular trips across the straits with scows but the barges cannot be obtained as often as they could be used. The result is that lumber is accumulating in the yards faster than it can be taken away.

Port Clements now boasts a population of about 350 people besides quite a number of transient folk who are always passing through. It is by far the most active point on the Queen Charlotte Islands at the present time. Besides the two mills right at Port Clements there are about 25 men employed at Woolridge's logging camp. These are the only three timber plants at present operating actively on the Islands.

HAZELTON

At the church bazaar held last Friday over two hundred dollars was received to be divided towards the support of the local churches. The ladies of both towns worked hard towards the success of the event and their efforts were most fittingly rewarded with the gratifying result.

The closing exercise at the New Hazelton School reflected great credit on the teacher, Miss Wallace. The closing was held on Friday afternoon last and there was a large attendance of parents and friends.

Leonard and Ralphine Wrinch have returned from Edmonton to spend the Christmas holidays with their parents, Dr. and Mrs. H. C. Wrinch. They are attending school in the prairie city.

Fred. Duboard has returned home from a fur buying trip to the Cariboo country. While in the south he visited Vancouver.

Harry Larmont, Francois Lake, and James Eastmount, of Colley-mout, passed away at the Hazelton Hospital last week. They were aged 51 years and 57 years respectively.

The Cassiar Crown and the Ruby mines are developing well and a lot of good ore was uncovered this season. The former has made a particularly good showing, running copper ore to a value of \$35 per ton.

Word has been received here of the death at Guelph, Ont., of Miss Helen J. Bone, who, for several years, was superintendent of the local hospital.

VANDERHOOF

On Tuesday night last T. A. Barnard, defeated labor candidate at the recent Victoria bye-election addressed the public at a meeting held under the auspices of the Great War Veterans' Association. He discussed points of current interest and urged specially that war veterans should stand, determinedly, for adequate re-establishment. At the close of the meeting a resolution was passed criticizing the extravagance of the Federal government and advocating that Federal Government be compelled to test the feeling of the people on the re-establishment issue.

A new loading station is to be built in the local railway yards. The increasing business passing through this point has made this new structure necessary to avoid congestion.

The wedding of Ada Mary, eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Milton, to Joseph Rife, of Chilco, was solemnized on Christmas Day

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$3.50 an acre.
Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.
Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.
Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.
Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.
Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than five years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.
Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$100 per acre, and recording a claim of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.
Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided studies and records made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.
Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.
For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 40 acres may be leased by one person or company.
Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.
Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.
PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.
No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers or pre-emptors recorded after June 28, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.
Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.
Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enactment to March 31, 1920.
SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.
Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, including payment of taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.
GRAZING.
Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under County Boards. All numbers ranged; priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travelers, up to ten head.
