## Machinists Object to Anti Strike Clause In Railway Bill

**Favored Immediate walkout if Bill passed Through Congress. Would Prevent Strikes by Putting Strikers in Jail.**

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
WASHINGTON, December 27.—Organised railway machinists through their president served notice on Congress today that they would not submit to the enactment of the Cummins Railroad Bill with its drastic anti-strike provisions. The voting more than a month ago of ninety-eight per cent of 125,000 members favored an immediate walkout in the event of the bill's passage through both houses of Congress, but this result was not known through the fear that the Brotherhoods might appear in the light of attempting to coerce the lawmaking branch of the Government. All the affiliated brotherhoods, fourteen in number, have been summoned to meet here on Monday to consider the pending railway legislation and define precisely their position on the clause in the Cummins Bill which would prevent strikes and put the strikers in jail.

## GERMAN SHIPS GO TO BRITAIN

**U. S. Shipping Board Now Turns Over Seven Former German Liners Which They Would Not Previously.**

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
NEW YORK, Dec. 27.—Seven former German ships held here by the United States Shipping Board since September last were formally turned over to the local representatives of the British Ministry of Shipping at noon today.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 27.—The unexpected action of the Shipping Board last September in refusing to deliver the "Imperator" to Great Britain is understood to be connected with efforts to induce the return to the Standard Oil Company of twelve tank steamers formerly under the German flag, but now held in British custody in the Fifth of Forth by order of the Supreme Council. The State Department took up the position, however, that these were separate questions and must be dealt with separately. The United States is now carrying out its obligations to turn the ships over to the British. Meanwhile the fate of the tankers remains in doubt.

## TWO THIRDS OF 1919 WHEAT CROP SOLD

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
OTTAWA, Dec. 27.—The Right Hon. Sir George E. Foster estimates that of the 1919 exportable wheat crop, two-thirds of it has already been handled by the Canadian Wheat Board. The remainder of the crop will be handled by the same organization and the removal of the United States embargo will not affect the control or operations of the Wheat Board. Sales in the United States will be pooled with past and future European sales to secure equality in price for the former, whether the wheat was marketed before or after the removal of the United States wheat embargo.

## DISTURBANCE CASE IS STILL IN POLICE COURT

**This Time Tables Turned and Brown Charged With Offence Instead of Pirillo.**

Frank Brown appeared before Magistrate McMordie this morning charged with creating a disturbance in the General Hospital. This is an echo of the Pirillo case which was dismissed yesterday. The evidence is practically the same as in the Pirillo trial.

This morning Mr. and Mrs. Pirillo and Frank Brown were heard. Mrs. Pirillo testified that her husband had asked her to ask Brown to leave her room in the hospital where she was sick. Brown had refused and an altercation started which Pirillo got the worse of. There was considerable shouting and swearing. Pirillo corroborated this.

Brown said that he had been asked by Mrs. Pirillo to protect her from her husband and sister and this was what he was trying to do in fighting with her husband.

The case was adjourned until Monday morning.

## DR. TOLMIE TOOK ILL ON TRAIN WITH DIPHTHERIA

Victoria, Dec. 27.—Dr. Tolmie, minister of agriculture in the Dominion Government, is seriously ill with diphtheria at his home in Victoria. Dr. Tolmie left Ottawa about a week or so ago to go home for Christmas and was taken sick on the train going west.

**Agitation is on Foot and Arrangements May be Made With Department.**

No arrangements have been made by the postal department to have the Princess Beatrice carry mail now that the Saturday G. T. P. boat is to be discontinued. Agitation for the use of the Beatrice as a mail carrier to bring up the middle of the week Vancouver mail is now on foot and it is hoped that it will have effect without delay. The next mail south will be taken by the S. S. Chelohsin on Tuesday night, the closing time at the post office being 7 p. m., the steamer sailing at 9.

## OPIUM FIENDS PLEAD GUILTY

**Two Fined Fifty Dollars for Possession and Inmate of "Joint" Pays Twenty Five.**

Chinese dopesters again took up considerable time at the Police Court this morning. Last night a raid was made and three men were brought to the jail. Fong Fun Chong and Lum Quong How were charged with having opium in possession and Lim Wing was charged with being an inmate of an opium den. To save trouble and extra fines where the charge was clear against them, the three pleaded guilty. The first two were fined \$50 with the option of 60 days imprisonment and the last mentioned, \$25 or 30 days.

## NEW MOTOR FUEL TURNS OUT WELL

**U. S. Air Mail Service Makes Successful Test of New Liquid Combination Fuel.**

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
NEW YORK, Dec. 27.—Successful tests of a new motor fuel, which is declared to be more economical than gasoline, and not only so, but is also easier on motors, were announced today by the Air Mail Service. The new fuel consists of 38 parts alcohol, 30 of gasoline, 19 of benzol, 3.50 ether and 4 of toluol. The particular ingredients making up the remaining one and a half parts, wherein of course lies the secret of the new liquid, are not given. It is declared that a saving of 3.9 gallons an hour can be made in favor of the synthetic fuel was indicated in the Air Mail tests, and a great economy of lubricating oil was also shown.

## AEROPLANES SCOUT FOR FISHING FLEET

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Dec. 27.—The aerial fisheries patrol, established here recently, was successful in its first effort. Two seaplanes from the naval air station North Island, within a few minutes after taking off sighted two schools of sardines about fifteen miles north of this city, and a short distance from shore. The news was flashed by radio to a submarine chaser, whose commander soon relayed the message to waiting boats. A few minutes later those boats were speeding to the section named in the dispatch. They reported a good catch.

## BIG ALASKAN EXPORTS

SEATTLE, Dec. 27.—Alaskan products valued at \$9,241,085 were exported from the territory during the month of November, according to reports for the month received from the office of the Collector of Customs at Juneau. Canned salmon valued at \$5,846,648 was the principal item.

## MISS ESTHER NADEN MAKES SCHOOL RECORD

**Is Honored by Victoria Ladies University Club—Highest Matriculant in City Last Year.**

On Saturday at the home of Mrs. J. deB. Farris, Foul Bay Rd., Victoria, Miss Esther Naden, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George R. Naden, formerly of this city, was the recipient of a presentation by the president, Mrs. Winn, of the Victoria Women's University Club. This honor is conferred annually by the club to the girl attaining the highest standing in the Senior Matriculation Examination at the Victoria High School.

Miss Naden, who made this enviable record at the Victoria High School last term, began her school life in Prince Rupert in the first school established here. She went right through the primary grades and made her Entrance Examination and Preliminary High School examination in the local schools before leaving for Victoria where her father is now Deputy Minister of Lands. Miss Naden adds another credit to the scholastic attainments of former school children here and her old teachers will indeed be pleased to see another record among their pioneer scholars.

Jack Naden, son of the Naden family, is now at the University of Toronto, having matriculated last year also.

## ALASKAN COAL MINES NEARLY DOUBLE OUTPUT

The production of coal in Alaska in 1918 was 75,000 tons, valued at \$411,850, according to the United States geological survey. This may be compared with 3,955 tons, valued at \$265,317 in 1917. The production for 1918 was by far the largest in the history of coal mining in Alaska, being 40 per cent larger than the output of 1917, which was also greater than that of any previous year. It is believed that a substantial coal mining industry has at last started in Alaska.

The largest part of the output in 1918 came from the Matanuska field, which yielded 63,092 tons. The remainder came from eight or ten small mines in different parts of the territory. All these mines, except those in the Matanuska and Bering river fields and at Port Graham, produced coal for local use under free-use permits. About twelve mines were operated, employing 239 men for an average period of 254 days.

## MANY DEATHS FROM LIQUOR

**Palatable, But Requiring Water, Twelve Barrels Kill Thirty-two People—Many More Are Critically Ill.**

## WOOD ALCOHOL SUPPOSED TO HAVE BEEN IN MIXTURE

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
CHICOPEE, Mass., Dec. 27.—Thirty-two deaths resulted from drinking liquor bought in Hartford, Conn., and drunk in this city, Holyoke and Hartford yesterday and last night. Fourteen men and one woman died in Chicopee, ten men in Hartford and fourteen in Holyoke. A number of other men are lying in a critical condition in hospitals in Holyoke and Springfield.

The police have arrested four men in Hartford and three in Chicopee pending the result of the autopsies. The police investigations indicate that the liquor, which was sent from New York, contained wood alcohol. Twelve barrels of a mixture presumed to be palatable, but requiring water to lessen its strength were bought from a New York firm for \$12,000 according to statements made to the police.

## Rupublican and Democrat Rank and File in Senate Will Join to Pass Treaty

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
WASHINGTON, December 27.—Dissatisfaction with the progress which is being made towards the solution of the Peace Treaty tangle, senators of both political parties have moved today to bring a greater pressure to bear upon the party leaders for some compromise being effected to ensure the ratification of the Treaty promptly upon the reassembling of Congress early in January.

The "Mild Reservation" group of the Republicans declare that unless some compromise is negotiated they will withdraw their support from the Republican side of the House. They are preparing to act independently for an agreement with the Democrats, apart from the leaders of the Republican party.

Although nothing definite can be learned from the Democrat senators, they are said to have told the Republicans that more than thirty of the forty-seven on that side would join in a movement to ratify the Treaty at once on the best terms they could get.

## FEW CANADIAN TROOPS NOW LEFT OVERSEAS

**Only Bare Thousand Still in England Clearing up Details and Loose Ends.**

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

OTTAWA, Dec. 27.—Greater speed has been made in the demobilization of Canada's fighting men than was believed possible at the time the armistice was signed, according to a statement handed out by the Department of Overseas Militia Forces of Canada. By the end of the present month the total number of all ranks remaining in the United Kingdom will have dwindled to 4,030, while the number of active pay accounts dropped from 412,458 to 16,474 within a year of the signing of the armistice.

The statement shows that the policy is to obliterate the organization of the overseas military forces as quickly as possible and the hope is expressed that it will not exist, even in a minor capacity, after the end of the next Parliamentary session. The bulk of the Headquarters Staff, formerly located in London, has been removed to Ottawa, leaving a small organization overseas to clean up, under the direction of Major-General J. H. Macbrien.

## WOOD ALCOHOL KILLS

NEW YORK, Dec. 27.—Twenty-seven deaths from drinking wood alcohol and several cases of poisoning occurred in Manhattan between November 4 and December 1, according to official figures made public by Chief Medical Examiner Chas. Norris.

## THRIFT STAMPS

**Change to Be Made, But Stamps Will Still be on Sale.**

OTTAWA, Dec. 27.—The government has decided to continue the sale of thrift stamps and saving certificates at banks, post office and other agencies, it is announced by the minister of finance Sir Henry Drayton. However, as a means of eliminating unnecessary expenditure, the national war savings committee and the different paid provincial representatives and head office officials are relieved of the duties from January 1, 1920, and the cost of propaganda will be saved.

The 25 cent thrift stamp will remain on sale, but the present war savings stamp will be withdrawn and a new savings certificate issued in denominations of \$5, \$10, \$50 and \$100, maturing three years from date of purchase at 5 per cent on the investment.

## ANTICIPATE GREATER SHORTAGE IN STATES

VANCOUVER, Dec. 27.—Arthur V. White, consulting engineer to the Commission of Conservation, is of the opinion that British Columbia coal may yet be used largely in Canadian industries. He says that the large demand for United States coal from Europe, coupled with the adverse rate of exchange may make British Columbia coal an economical purchase for the industries of Ontario, in spite of the long haul.

The Canadian Manufacturers' Association is investigating the matter in anticipation of a further shortage of fuel, due to conditions in the United States over which this country has no control.

## PRINCESS MAY SAFE AT DELAWARE BAY

**Pioneer Vessel Steamed Past Breakwater Under Own Power.**

Colonel Wilby returned to Victoria a few months ago at the expiration of his military service.

The New Irish Home Rule Proposals.

Supported by even Lord Northcliffe, who has been at outs with Premier Lloyd George for some time past, the latest proposals brought into the House of Commons in solution of the problem of governing Ireland satisfactorily seem to give general satisfaction—outside of Ireland. There is one thing which Great Britain will not stand for, and which seems to be at the back of the mind of at least a proportion of Irishmen and that is separation from the Crown. And just how much the new parliamentary proposals will be appreciated by the Irishmen will remain to be seen. They have been asking for Home Rule for a long time now. It seems likely that they are now going to get what they have asked so long for. According to yesterday's press dispatches, there seemed to be some suspicion of doubt in London as to whether the Sinn Fein section of Ireland would accept the new proposals. They resisted the partition of Ireland into two areas previously, but on this occasion the idea of partition is ingeniously got round by the formation of the joint council appointed from both parliaments. This council shall be representative of all Ireland, equally of both parties.

New Council May Become Real Legislative Authority.

To begin with, limited powers will be given to this new council. Certain services will be reserved as the exclusive province of Imperial Parliament, but among these services will be several—customs, for instance—which may be transferred to the Council. Transference will take place, without any other formality, if and when both the Irish Parliaments pass resolutions to this effect. Gradually, therefore, if the scheme works out, as its sponsors think it will, Ireland will secure powers not dissimilar with those possessed by the Dominion parliaments, and the Council of All Ireland, in course of time, become the All Ireland Parliament. The ideal will thus be reached by a process of evolution—it may be slow, but the machinery will exist for the bringing together of the two rival sections.

Hope at Last to Settle A Troublesome Question.

No one who has studied the Irish question will deny that in this novel scheme there is at last hope of a settlement. It respects the opinions of Ulster and fulfills the pledge of no coercion, and it avoids, by the provision of a Council of All Ireland, the rock of partition on which former attempts to settle the question have split. It will now rest with the Irish people themselves whether they desire union. The financial provision of £1,000,000 for the preliminary expenses of each of the two new parliaments ought to be ample and just so soon as the new Council is formed, it will have the powers of arranging whatever taxation it may consider proper for the providing of the necessary supplies to carry on the country. How the Irish will govern themselves will be watched with considerable interest.

Home Rule for Scotland and Wales.

The devolution committee of the House of Commons having agreed to the establishment of a subordinate legislature for Scotland, has also come to a similar conclusion in the case of Wales. No formal decision has been come to in regard to England, although the majority of the committee prefer one national legislature for the whole country. The idea is to relieve the Imperial Parliament of a whole lot of congestion. There are numberless local things which could be settled by a lesser authority than the House of Commons, which will then have more time at its disposal for Imperial matters. With so much business taken off its hands by the subordinate legislatures, representation to St. Stephens will have to be reduced. A total reconstruction of the whole British Parliamentary system appears to be not so very far off.

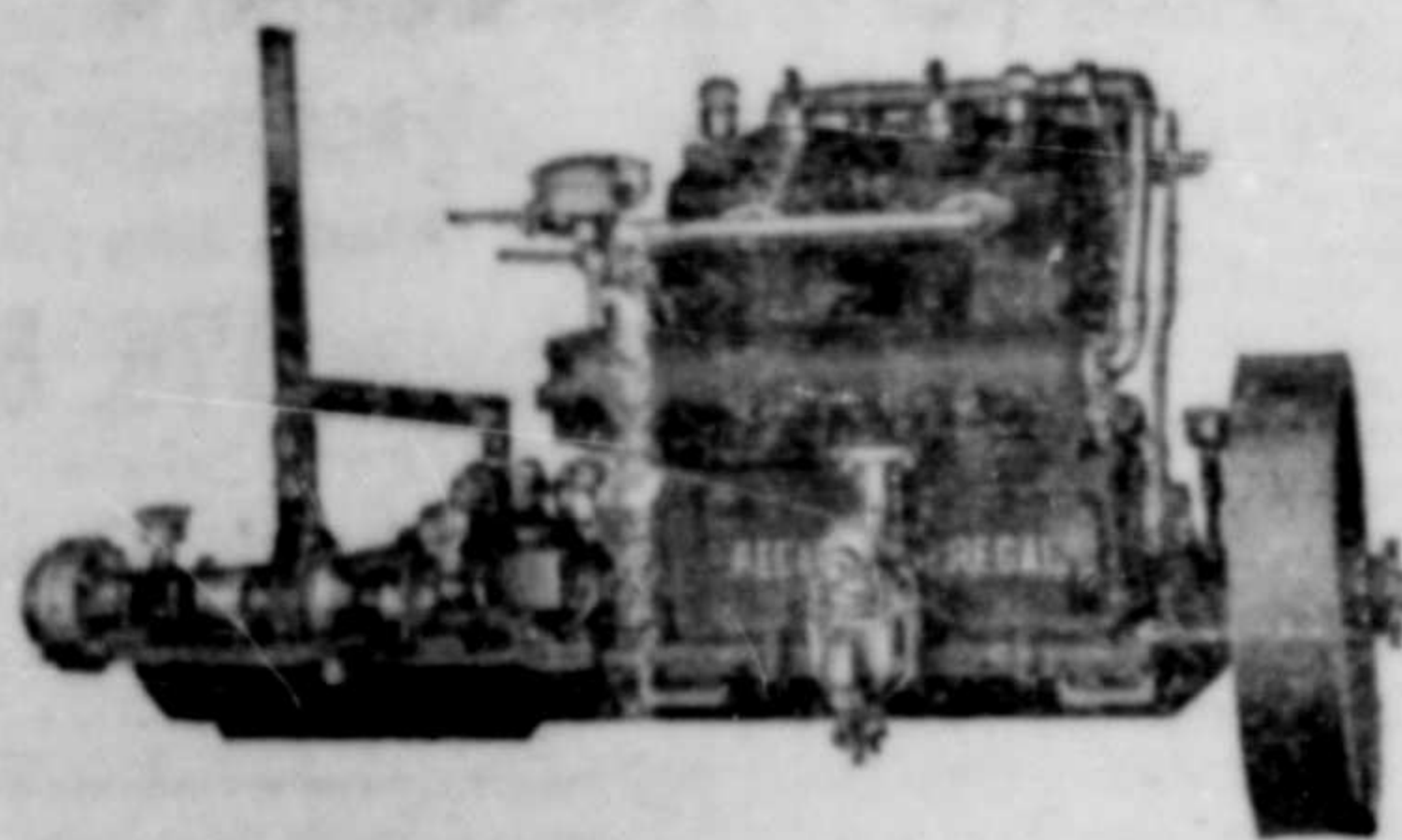

# GOOD PROGRESS IS BEING MADE AT LOCAL DOCK

Two Hulls Are Beginning to Take Concrete Shape in the Ship Ways.

REPAIR WORK STEADILY GOES ON—ALBERT DONE

With a force of about 250 men steadily engaged at the local shipyard and repair dock, work is going steadily forward. Being considered practically unnecessary the small night shift that has been engaged at Hays Cove for the past few weeks has been cut off and the men are now on day work.

For the past few weeks repair work has been taking a lot of attention at the yards. The "Prince Albert" has completed her repairs and is now on her regular run again. The "Prince John" is expected to go on the dock very soon and will be replaced on the outside run by the "Albert." The "Tilamook" is laying up for the winter at the drydock and repairs are being gone on with. She will not be needed for active use for some months yet. The officials of the yard expect to get the big three-stacker "Prince Rupert" on the pontoons next Monday. She will proceed to the dock after her return from Anyox on Sunday night next.

### Car Barge Work.

The car barge for use by the Whalen Pulp and Paper Co. in carrying pulp and lumber between this port and Swanson Bay for shipment over the G. T. P. to the east is being put in shape. There is a great deal of repairing and alterations to be put on the barge and it will be at least a month before she leaves the yards. After that the galls will have to be put on at the slip but this will take very little time.

Besides this repair work smaller boats are continually coming in for minor repairs and now is the time that the fish boats come in for their overhaul. The repair section of the crew at the local dock has been kept very busy.

### Ship building Progress.

Work on the two hulls is going on apace and progress is considered quite satisfactory by the officials. More than half the bottom frames of both ships are already in place and real progress can be seen as the first Prince Rupert ships gradually take shape. Although rumors regarding changes in the management and general policy of the plant fill the air none of these are confirmed by the officials. They admit that changes in the plans are considered, still nothing definite has yet been settled upon. No official statement regarding changes can yet be obtained.

# MR. TITE HONORED BY HOSPITAL BOARD

Much Assistance Given to the Institution to Be Recognized.

A brass plate bearing the words "George D. Tite Ward" is to be made and placed over the door of the ward in the General Hospital furnished and kept up by the popular furniture man. Such was the recommendation brought to the meeting of the Hospital Board by the House Committee at last night's meeting and unanimously adopted. It was considered that this recognition was the least the ward could give Mr. Tite for the interest he had always manifested and so consistently backed up with various gifts which he had made to the institution ever since its inception.

Mr. Tite has furnished more than one ward in the hospital and has always shown a public spirited interest in the institution.

### ALL RED WIRELESS

London, Dec. 26.—A scheme of Imperial wireless communication is being prepared under the supervision of the Secretary of the Colonies for the purpose of linking up all British overseas possessions for both commercial and strategical purposes.

### Synopsis of

## Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties hereto may still arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 1 acre, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 1 year, and has made proportional improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$500 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture.

Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10 per acre, including 1 acre cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 1 year are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homestead; title to be obtained by fulfilling residence and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 40 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mulch factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.  
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such pre-emptor, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.  
Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, including 2nd taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.  
Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and ranges administration under Commissioner.

Administrative permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for established owners. Permits may be issued for five, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.
