# Japanese Are Finding Shanghai Occupation Is Difficult Matter

SHANGHAI, Feb. 5:-Summing up results of the past twenty-four hours of fighting between Japanese invaders; and Chinese defenders in Shanghai and vicinity, foreign military observers agreed on Saturday that the Chinese, in holding the Chapei native section of the city, had pushed the Japanese back a little and had improved their own

position slightly. The Chinese, in this their greatest city, are exhib-iting a spirit of resistance such as the Japanese so far in the campaign either here or in Manchuria have not yet encountered. All signs point to the fact that Shanghai may not fall without a determined siege on the part of the Japanese.




